Top Priority Job: To Double Width Of Newbridge Rd

ALBANY—The State will increase the right of way for Newbridge Road, a state highway, from an average width of 50 to 60 feet to 110 feet and the three-mile section from Hicksville Rail Road station south to Hempstead Tpk. may be given the "highest priority in construction," the Herald was advised this week. It will be part of a \$2,500,000 project covering three sections for a distance of 5.4 miles south from Hicksville.

DON'T WASTE WATER: Board Repeats Appeal For Less Sprinkling

HICKSVILLE—"Don't waste water," was the warning repeated this week by the Board of Water Commissioners to all consumers of the district. The new pump on Newbridge Rd. began operating this week on diesel power, but until the additional storage capacity adjacent is completed and other new wells on Jerusalem Ave. and Hempstead Ave. are functioning, the situation is still difficult—especially on warm days.

The Water Board says there is enough water for everyone's needs, but not enough to waste it on extensive lawn sprinkling. Residents are asked to curtail sprinkling and to turn off sprinklers whenever they get notice of a fire in the district.

Bob Williams Started Something

THIRTY-SEVEN YEARS after Henry Hudson discovered Long Island in 1609, a Welshman by the name of Robert Williams, a kin of the celebrated Roger Williams of Rhode Island, met with a group of local Indian chiefs and made a purchase of land.

That was on May 20, 1648, and the property Robert Williams bought—recorded as the Williams Purchase—became the community of Hicksville.

This Sunday, May 20, Hicksville celebrates Robert Williams Day and the 303rd anniversary of the community's founding. Curiously, the place where this historic transfer of property ownership from the local Indians to founder Williams is within feet of the place where the Ringling Bros. - Barnum and Bailey circus will set up its tents on June 7, 8 and 9. (A painting of the purchase decorates a wall panel in the auditorium).

The site is on West John Street, about opposite the Jones Institute. It was marked with a special plaque until a motorist clipped it one New Year's eve. County Historian Jesse Merritt has been trying to get it replaced ever since.

The cluster of trees about this site is what is left of the Cantingue Woods.

The deed obtained by Robert Williams 303 years ago starts off with a declaration by Pugnigan, the Matinecock Indian Chief, that he does "bargain and sell and make over unto Robert Williams of Hempstead (Hempstead) part of the great plains lying northeast from Hempstead beginning at a point of Trees called by the Indians Ciesascata or Cantingue"

A rock at the point described above is known as the Cantingue Rock and it marks the boundary point between the Townships of Oyster Bay and North Hempstead. It was set in position in 1797 when William Stewart was commissioned by the New York Legislature to survey the boundaries of townships. There are copies of the original maps around our community which show that the line between Oyster Bay and Hempstead Townships, to the south, for example, has been established for 154 years. (And yet there are folks in Levittown who feel they can erase that line and move north to Old Country Rd. with a few editorials!)

Robert Williams lived in Jericho (then called "Lewseem" or Lusum) from about 1668, twenty years after his purchase, until 1679, which is the date of his final land sale. He probably died in 1681 in Maryland (according to a copy of his will), but the location of his grave is unknown. His widow lived at the old homestead (see picture above) until her death in 1692. His sons moved to

Cold Spring Harbor and Oyster Bay. Of all Williams' descendants, only a granddaughter, Hannah, seems to have stayed rooted in the Williams Purchase section.

Heirs married the Hicks, Seaman and Undibills, which names are still represented in this community. Valentine Hicks, son-in-law of Elias Hekewas one of the first presidents of the Long Island Rail Road and for him Hicksville was so named about 1857.

HERALD GARDENING DEPT.

Avoid Disappointment at Harvest Time

Between now and early June all home gardeners in the State will set out several million tomato plants and millions more of pepper, egg plant, cabbage and broccoli, as well as the flower plants.

To avoid disappointment at harvest time, check to see that you start with healthy plants, advises Prof. C. B. Raymond of Cornell's vegetable crops department.

Early blight shows up on tomato plants as brown spots, an eighth or a quarter-inch in diameter, irregular but with concentric rings. A look at the stem down near the surface of the soil will show whether there is collar rot which will girdle the stem.

Set Out Early.

The sooner plants are put out after frost danger has passed, the better. Most plants that have been kept in cold frames or have been sitting around a store without an abundance of water are likely to be hardy enough to set out. Other plants, though, might be quite tender. It is a good idea to keep them in the box two or three days to let them toughen a bit. They should be exposed to sun and air but not watered so they will wilt down in the late afternoon but freshen in the morning.

Soil in the plant box should be saturated (blocked off) so that it won't dry out. Other plants that have been sitting around a store without an abundance of water are likely to be hardy enough to set out. Other plants, though, might be quite tender. It is a good idea to keep them in the box two or three days to let them toughen a bit. They should be exposed to sun and air but not watered so they will wilt down in the late afternoon but freshen in the morning.

Soil in the plant box should be saturated (blocked off) so that it won't dry out.

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

Board, as follows:

Section 1. The acquisition and con-
struction of street signs within the Fire
District, to facilitate the movement of
fire trucks, to exceed \$1,500, is
hereby authorized. The estimate of the
maximum cost of said object or purpose
is \$1,500 and the estimated incidental
costs is \$1,500 and the said amount
is hereby appropriated therefore.
The plan of financing is the payment of
the principal of said Notes in the
first two ensuing fiscal years as here-
after provided, and the interest there-
on.

See 2. For the purpose of financing
the nonappropriated by section 1, the
District is hereby authorized to issue in
the principal amount of \$1,500, pursuant to
the provisions of the Local Finance Law,
Notes of the same kind as those authorized

Notes shall mature and be paid not later
than the end of the second fiscal
year succeeding the fiscal year in which
such Notes are issued.

See 4. The Notes authorized by this
resolution shall contain the recital of
the purpose for which they are issued, the
amount of said Notes, the general obligations of the Fire District,
payable as to both principal and interest in
the manner and time and place as
hereinafter provided, and the
limitation as to rate of amount.
The faith and credit of the Bethpage Fire
District are hereby unconditionally
pledged to the punctual payment of the prin-
cipal and interest on said Notes and
provision shall be made annually in the
opinion of the Fire District, to afford
for the payment of the principal and
interest on such Notes in such sum and
at such times as may be necessary to
make such payment in full and due date
and payable in such manner.

See 5. Subject to the provisions of
this resolution and of the provisions of
said Local Finance Law, and pursuant to
section 50 of said Law, the powers and duties
of the Board of Fire Commissioners relate-
ting to prescribing the terms, form and
contents of such notes and the issuance
of Capital Notes are hereby delegated to
the District Treasurer as the chief exec-
utive officer of the Fire District.

See 6. A copy of this resolution for the approval
of the voters of this Fire District at a spec-
ified meeting of this Fire District to be
held on May 2, 1951, shall take effect upon approval by the
voters of this Fire District at that
resounding vote.
