# Bigger and Bigger? Penner Checks Sandpit Authority for Civics

HICKSVILLE—The alleged expansion of sandpit operations in the west end of the community is destroying values and should be halted without delay, Isaac Penner of Cantague Rd. asserted at a meeting of the Civic and Community Assoc. Thursday night. He charged that "millions of dollars worth of sand, wealth in the earth," is being removed and will leave the village of Hicksville a "great big hole in the ground."

Stanley Mruz, president of the Civic group, agreed that the sandpits are getting "bigger and bigger." He named Penner chairman of a committee to investigate the records of sand digging operations and permits granted for such activity by the Town of Oyster Bay.

Sandpits on both sides of the Long Island Rail Road near Charlotte Ave., Penner told the Civic Association, are "a danger and a menace to the children of the community. They are a blight."

Penner wanted to know if there are bond-posting requirements in the town laws to force back filling of excavated tracts.

The motion to appoint a committee to call upon the Town Board and question the continued digging of sand here was made by Ernest F. Francke.

Penner also reviewed his action against the town to force the owner of Press Wireless operations on Cantague Road. He said the matter is now in the courts where answering briefs have been filed by his attorney, the radio communications firm and the town attorney.

## Permit Option as OPS Deadline Nears

Many small mid-Island retail stores can avoid filing list price charts under Ceiling Price Regulation No. 7, according to a notice recently received by Patrick Buffalino, Hicksville Business Men's Association president, from the OPS.

These stores, with limited bookkeeping facilities and clerical help are given an option permitting them to remain under the General Ceiling Price Regulation rather than under CFR 7. According to OPS officials a supplementary regulation to the General Ceiling Price Regulation was also issued on May 28 designed to relieve certain "squeeze" situations in which these retailers have been caught since the General Price Freeze of January 25, 1951.

The OPS warned that all other retailers selling items controlled by CFR 7 and its amendments must file their pricing charts by Thursday, May 31, if they want to continue to sell legally after that.

...now the builders who have promised that some action will be taken. How many more floods we must survive until this action bears fruit, remains to be seen.

"It is a certainty that the town ship would never approve the road and so-called drainage with the inadequacy of the sum and poor surveying proven by pictures."

Residents claim that "poor surveying" placed houses on the north side of Island Street, at the east end, "many feet lower than the surrounding homes" and as a result they are in "danger of inundation when it is high tide" in the Plainview Country Homes.

A spokesman for the neighborhood told the Herald the street is pitched to the east in the direction of the sum. The sewer opening is located in the street at a height approximately six feet below the junction of the sum so that when the sum is three-fourths filled with water, the sewer becomes a discharge opening into the street, resulting in flood conditions.

What this does to the cesspools only time will tell.

An appeal to the County Board of Health brought to light the fact that they have no jurisdiction over such matters.

"A check with the Superintendent of Town Highways disclosed that the streets and sum were never presented by the builders to the town, nor recorded for approval by the township as of May 24.


Distribution of the report is expected to bring the incorporation campaign to a speedy climax with an early presentation to the Town Board of a petition and consent.
