HICKSVILLE—Guards will be posted at the two swimming pools in this community built and owned by Levitt & Sons on Newbridge Rd. and Levittown Parkway starting this Saturday, June 9, and only persons with identification tags issued by the NLHOA or the Levittown Park District will be permitted to use the pools, it was announced this week.

Charles C. Miller, president of the North Levittown Home Owners Assoc., said this week identification tags have been received for the use of residents and their guests at the two swimming pools.

Residents of Oyster Bay Township section are asked to bring identification with them to the pool nearest their home (Parkway or West Village Green) this Saturday or Sunday, June 9 or 10—such as driver's license or similar document showing street address "of the residents of North Levittown. Parents are asked to accompany their children on one of the two days in order to show identification and receive the tags."

The NLHOA is seeking voluntary contributions of one dollar per family for the year to defray the costs involved "in providing for the tags, guards and necessary insurance on the guards."

"Negotiations are under way to obtain for residents of North Levittown," Miller stated, "reciprocal rights with the Levittown Park District, and when the agreement has been reached, all Levittown identification tags will be honored at any of the eight swimming pools now in operation."

Report Indicates: Lower Tax Possible With Incorporation

HICKSVILLE—Incorporated village government for this community, besides the obvious advantages of local government directed and controlled by local property owners, could be less expensive to the taxpayers than the present form of municipal management, the Committee for Incorporation of Hicksville asserted today. In a factual report on incorporated local government compiled by the committee after months of study and research, a tentative budget for the operation of a local village system forecasts a possible tax rate of about \$1 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Eight thousand copies of the report have been printed and will be delivered to every property owner of record, local and out of state, according to General Chairman, Lawrence A. Roman. Tonight (Wednesday) the village division of the committee led by William L. Geyer will meet at the Legion Hall to get copies of the report.

The village division expects to soon clean-up the circulation of consent petitions which must be presented to the Town Board before a referendum vote on the question of incorporation can take place.

The report to the taxpayers of Hicksville discusses the present government for Hicksville, the advantages of incorporation, present tax rates compared with village tax rates, functions, services to be maintained and provided by a local government, cost of village government, and how incorporation is achieved.

Regarding tax rates, a proposed village budget has been outlined which, considering revenues which Hicksville now fails to receive, estimates that village government would cost \$330,400 for general government, protection of persons and property, youth activities, parking fields, public works, street lights, water department, fire department, and payments on presently outstanding debts. Revenues are estimated at \$93,200 leaving \$237,200 to be raised by taxation. On a current \$20 million district valuation, the rate would be \$1.19 per \$100. The present tax levied by the township for the same or lesser services is \$1.28, Roman pointed out.

All persons interested in assisting the incorporation campaign are invited to attend the meeting tonight (Wednesday) at the Legion Hall, Geyer announced.

BUSINESS BEGAN IN 1904:

Celebrate Opening of Warehouse

HICKSVILLE — The new Empire Storage Warehouse on a 2 1/2 acre tract along Duffy Ave. was the scene of a gala reception Saturday afternoon, when Henry C. Brengel welcomed more than 200 business associates and friends in the community to celebrate completion of the building project. Empire Storage has been in bus-

ness in the community for 47 yrs. since Christian L. Brengel started the concern in 1904.

The new structure of steel and masonry is absolutely fire proof. It is 100 by 100, containing 10,000 square feet. Set back from Duffy Ave., the surrounding grounds will be suitably landscaped. The frame warehouse building at 126 East Marie St., behind the Brengel home, where the Empire firm had its beginning was erected in 1910 and measures 30 by 100 feet.

The older building stands in what was known at the turn of the century as "Brengeltown" because Chris Brengel, who was also in the contracting business, erected a number of houses in the vicinity. The new structure is in a section of the community which is fast developing today as a commercial and industrial center along the LIRR with a number of plants and distribution stations in the neighborhood.

Henry Brengel, long active in the Legion, fire department and community affairs, has been associated with the Empire Storage Warehouse since a boy. His father owned two of the first motorized moving vans on the Island, high cab Maeks (numbered by the factory 505 and 525) and he drove them when he was a lad of 14. Be-

fore he went in the Navy in World War I, he was in the business. His father retired from the business about 1918 and went to Miami, Fla. to make his home.

Henry Brengel has been an active member of the Charles Wagner Legion Post for 30 years and was recently honored with a life membership. He has served two terms as Post Commander. He is also a 25-year member of the Hicksville Fire Dept. and has been on the School Board for 18 years, serving as president for most of that time, a position he holds today.
