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

That brought the third base coach of Hempstead running in with arms outstretched and palms open in protest. The umpire immediately called the runner safe.

In the same instance the Hempstead runner who was on second base turned third and another member of the Hub team raced up to put the coach away so that the winning run could score.

Ferrara had the ball and started to run down the man with George Karmann on the other end of the play. Ferrara got past the two Hempstead nonrunners who were in the baseline and dove for the runner. He missed only because the runner went outside of the baseline a good six feet and romped home with the winning run.

The greatly confused plate umpire had his eyes glued on third base expecting a throw and play there and did not see the distance by which the runner evaded the baseline.

His partner in blue stood like a great stone statue between first and second base with his arms folded and no decision.

A wild argument ensued, but the umpires allowed the winning run to tally as the stands hooted and howled.
