Delegation Requests Town Board Extend Garbage District to Line

OYSTER BAY—A group of residents from the Levitt-built home area of Hicksville was scheduled to appear before the Town Board, here, yesterday (Tuesday) and present a formal request for extension of the Hicksville Garbage Collection District south to the Township line. They were armed with a petition, requesting extension of the district, signed by nearly 500 home owners of the area.

Councilman Frank Chumsky told the Herald earlier this week the Town board was preparing to again propose extension of the district, embracing the same area as was proposed a year ago and opposed—at that time—by representatives of the NLHOA, who claimed residents were satisfied with the collection of rubbish by private contractors. The Town Board is expected to call a public hearing on the proposal in a matter of days.

William Sill of 2 Bank Lane, Hicksville, who had directed the circulation of the petition, was scheduled to present the request to the Town Fathers.

Meanwhile, Charles C. Miller of 24 Summer Lane, NLHOA president, told the Herald Sunday night that his organization is delaying a final decision on the proposed extension of the district now pending its July meeting. At a session held in Hicksville Legion Hall, Friday night, it was decided to withhold recommendations pending "conferences with private collectors and public officials."

Miller also indicated that some NLHOA members favored creation of a new refuse collection district for the Levitt area in the Township rather than extension of the Hicksville District.

Erratic collection of garbage in the section of Hicksville outside the collection district, down to the township line, has caused growing concern among home-owners of the area, with the arrival of warm weather and fear of sickness and disease resulting from accumulations of rubbish. Town officials and the county health department have been swamped with complaints.

Ask Vamps Parade At Hempstead Today

HICKSVILLE—All Hicksville firemen were urged to report this morning (Wednesday, July 4) to the firehouse by 8:30 in uniform to take part in the Hempstead Fire Dept. parade and tournament. Chief Stamford Weiss said he would like as many men as possible to turn out for this program. The local vamps are in the second division of the parade.

The racing team, a new team this year directed by Capt. Leonard Offenloch, won a second place trophy in motor pump at the Southern New York tournament at St. James, Saturday. The ladies auxiliary took top honors for the "best appearing" in the parade of 56 departments.

Hicksville Dept. also won a winner, being chosen to receive a TV set awarded by the St. James vamps in addition to a radio set.

HICKSVILLE—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey is being asked by the Civic and Community Assoc. to appoint a special investigator "to probe the operation of sandpits" here. All other local civic groups will be invited to take like action. "These pits are a danger and a hazard and it appears the Town Fathers don't want to do anything about them," Isaac Penner asserted at the Civic meeting, Thursday night, when he offered the motion to write Dewey, "The state has the power to subpoena and can get at the truth. A private individual can't."

Penner reported on his study of the town records regarding sandpit operations here. He said he found it difficult to unearth the facts since he found permits and variances were obtained in the individual names of corporation officers rather than company names "and you can change the names of the officers every five minutes if you want to," he said.

Reversed Decision
He read a transcription of the Zoning Board of Appeals record which disclosed that application had been made in Feb. 1941 to dig a sand pit on two and a half acres of property on the south side of the Hill Road near Charles Ave. and adjacent to a small pit "north of town property."

After a public hearing, the application of Robert S. Renison of Westbury was denied because the Zoning Appeals Board felt it would not be the "best or most appropriate use" of the property. The Board in its verdict cited the growing demand for industrial sites along the LIRR and said "it is true that this is adjacent to a sand pit but we do not feel that this is sufficient justification for extending this use to practically unlimited limits."

However, Penner pointed out, the same application was resubmitted in July 1941 (five months later) by the same person. Renison promised to erect a fence, preserve a set-back of 15 feet from the property line at any point and make every effort to "fill in the property with solid fill of which we are assured he is in a position to get free time to time so ultimately it will be brought back to the natural grade level. The Board of Appeals thereupon reversed itself and it granted the application.

Penner stressed that Ernest Franke was (and still is) a member of the Board at the time both applications were considered and acted upon. He noted that the town board has on file "a lot of complaints" about sandpit digging. (continued on page 4)

START BIG PROJECT

SWIMMING POOL CONTROL WORRIES NLHOA: Petition to Slice Off Park District

HICKSVILLE—Petitions are being prepared asking cessation of a quarter of the Hicksville Park and Parking District, which now embraces the entire school district, and formation of a new district in the township for "North Levittown." The petitions are being drawn by the North Levittown Home Owners Assn. for circulation among residents of Levitt-built houses and for presentation to Oyster Bay Town Board, according to NLHOA president Charles C. Miller.

Action on the secession was proposed and adopted at a NLHOA meeting Friday night, in the Legion Hall here. The control of two swimming pools, built by Levitt & Sons, in "future years" is seen as the reason for the movement. The pools are being operated this season privately by Levitt, but the Levitt organization has already proposed that they be taken over by the town under the Hicksville Park and Parking District.

Offered to Hicksville
If the pools, parks, and playgrounds, the new community has in Levittown, France, were taken over by the Hicksville District,

HICKSVILLE—William Olitsky of 73 Sleepy Lane, commander of the Hicksville Jewish War Veterans Post, today denounced the flood of Communist propaganda mail in the community this week. Neighbors complained to him that they had received in plain envelopes reprints from the Daily Worker and offers of sample copies of the paper.

ring here. He also quoted the town zoning ordinance which regulates sandpits wherein it is stated as town policy "to provide for the property use of land to prevent all manner of excavations which create pits, holes or hollows in the earth, leaving it in a hazardous or dangerous state."

Frankie informed the civics that it is "not the function of the Board of Appeals to enforce regulations—that is the duty of the Building Dept." He added that in 1944 the town board took away the authority on permits for sand pits from the Appeals Board.

The defeat was the second for the Black and White and seriously hurt its quest for the Beach championship. Hicksville was winning 3-2 going into the last of the eighth inning and a very tired Jim Barone was on the hill facing the PBC batters. He walked the first two batters and Manager Bernie McGunnigle waved Bill Bordiuk in from his rightfield position.

Bordiuk got the first two batters out and walked the third to load the bases and set up a play at any base. A steal had advanced the original runners a notch.

George Thomas then hit a ball to Bordiuk's right side and, off balance, the Botto hurler tossed it to catcher Ralph Ferrara for what would have been the inning-ending out.

But Ferrara neglected to touch home plate! Here the plate umpire showed real brilliance and signalled the runner out without looking as to the position of Ferrara's foot.

That brought the third base coach of Hempstead running in with arms outstretched and palms open in protest. The umpire immediately called the runner safe.

In the same instance the Hempstead runner who was on second base turned third and another member of the Hub team raced up to put the coach away so that the winning run could score.

Ferrara had the ball and started to run down the man with George Karman on the other end of the play. Ferrara got past the two Hempstead nonrunners who were in the baseline and dove for the runner. He missed only because the runner went outside of the baseline a good six feet and romped home with the winning run.

The greatly confused plate umpire had his eyes glued on third base expecting a throw and play there and did not see the distance by which the runner evaded the baseline.

His partner in blue stood like a great stone statue between first and second base with his arms folded and no decision.

A wild argument ensued, but the umpires allowed the winning run to tally as the stands hooted and howled.

There was no question about the tying run, but when the two illegal Hempstead men blocked the baseline and consequently Ferrara's view and playing area, which enabled the winning runner to gamble the turn at third, time should have been out.

However, we are sorry. We report what we see. The chips will have to fall where they may.

If the two county dailies were to take a great interest in the league—which they do not—the standard of play in the league would be what those who originally conceived it wanted it to be.

Last year a good Levittown team was not picked for the loop, and in view of the population of that area one daily did harp for a better way of selecting the clubs.

That got the boys in the State Park Commission busy and they announced an elimination tourney for this season. That silenced the big papers.

The question remains, just how much of an elimination the tournament was?

It is unfortunate that most of the sports reported in the county papers are anxious telephone descriptions to the feet-on-the-desk reporter from club managers or league operators.

The State of New York has provided an ideal setting for a good softball operation and it is a shame that those responsible for it do not seek to make it better instead of hiding behind the authoritative but little respected defense of political patronage.
