## No Decision Made Yet On Postal Boundaries

WASHINGTON — The question of establishing a post office at Levittown, rather than the present branch there of Hicksville PO, and "the retention of the present boundaries of Hicksville" is still under consideration and "no decision has been reached as yet," Congressman Ernest Greenwood advised Patrick J. Buffalino, Hicksville Business Men's Assoc. president, this week.

## Prominent People For Incorporation

HICKSVILLE — Prominent citizens of the community are among the first to sign the petition to Oyster Bay Town Board calling for the incorporation of Hicksville as a village, it was disclosed last night by Committee Chairman Lawrence A. Roman. Among the first to sign the petition have been William Duffy, president of the Long Island National Bank; Henry G. Eissmann, vice-president of the Bank of Hicksville; and a prominent real estate and insurance broker; and Dr. Edward A. Curtis, past president of the Chamber of Commerce and long active in civic affairs of the community, township and county.

The petition to the town must carry the signatures of at least 500 resident property owners. In addition, thousands of names are required on a consent to the petition which is now in circulation. This week the Committee received just more than 5,000 copies of its report on incorporation have been mailed to property owners with almost 2,000 more to go out.

## Fire Damages Local Bakery

## Refuse District Hearing July 23

OYSTER BAY — The Town Board has set 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, July 23, for a special hearing and meeting upon its revised plan to extend Hicksville Garbage District south to the Township line, embracing all the 2200 houses built by Levitt & Sons.

Three residents of the area appearing before the Town Board on July 3 presented a petition with almost 500 names asking for the extension already planned by the Board and verbally stressed the need for "reliable" rubbish collection in their neighborhood. A strong plea for extension of the district was voiced by William and Joseph Sill of 2 Bank Lane, accompanied by A. C. Banashefski of 2 Boxwood Lane.

They also urged that the town act to halt dumping of rubbish along roadsides and on vacant tracts in their section.

Planning to have a large group of residents appear at the hearing on July 23, William Sill announced that a motorcade will go to Oyster Bay, leaving from the Parkview Village Green at 1 o'clock sharp on that day. There will be plenty of cars for those without transportation, he said.

Councilman Chigurinsky told the petitioners at the board meeting that if the extension is approved on July 23 the Board will be ready to call for bids on collection service by Aug. 7.

## Cedar St. Chosen As Tournament Course

HICKSVILLE — Cedar St. off Fairview Rd., east of East St. School, has been selected as the racing course for the Labor Day firemen's tournament on Sept. 3, it was announced this week by Chairman Edward Koenig. The firemen will award an electric ironer at the annual Labor Day weekend block dance set for Saturday night, Sept. 1. James Morace is chairman of the committee in charge of the award and tickets are available from any fireman and at Botts Bros.

HICKSVILLE — Slight chance that the elaborate electrical Christmas decorations of the Business Men's Assoc. may be in use this coming season (cool enough for you?) was seen today as the Long Island Lighting Co. gave notice that no permits for special lighting installations for the holidays can be granted.

Howard B. Wekman, ass't. vice-president of the Lighting Co., wrote the BMA "present indications are that the material and manpower supply will not improve and, consequently, we will not be in a position to effect either materials or manpower for outdoor lighting."

The BMA in recent years has accumulated more than \$4,000 worth of lighting fixtures for Christmas which are annually strung along the business streets. Special transformers are required to connect to the utility power lines which have been provided, for a fee, by the Lighting Co.

**OYSTER BAY** — The Zoning Board of Appeals denied variances for a farm stand on Hempstead Ave., Hicksville, and a garage for trucks in Jericho at a meeting Thursday night, July 5.

Mrs. Anna Hoeffner of Hempstead Ave., Hicksville, had requested a variance to use the present building at the northeast corner of Hempstead Ave. and Wantagh State Parkway, Hicksville, for a farm stand. The request was denied.

The Board also denied a special permit to build a garage for trucks and contracting equipment, including a bulkhouse, to be located on the west side of Brush Hollow Rd. south of Jericho Tpk. Jericho.

Philip and Morris Sintiar of 29 Salem Ln., Hicksville, were granted a special permit to use the building on Jerusalem Ave., south of Newbridge Rd. (near railroad depot) for a dry cleaning plant and tailoring.

Walter Bansch of 171 Cottage Blvd., Hicksville, was granted a variance to build an attached garage with less rear yard than the ordinance allows at the corner of Cottage Blvd. and Lenore Ave.

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## OFF SOUTH BROADWAY: Marty's Private Independence Day Plea



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
## NEW RADIO RELAY TOWERS SPEED LONG DISTANCE CALLS

THAT STRANGE-LOOKING TOWER you may have seen on some hilltop is one of a series used to relay Long Distance telephone calls and television programs across the countryside. It is called a radio relay antenna tower. Such towers are generally set about thirty miles apart. Telephone conversations and TV pictures in the form of microwaves are focused like searchlight rays and beamed accurately from tower to tower. Hundreds of Long Distance conversations can ride the beam side by side.

Radio relay is a valuable supplement to wire lines, coaxial cables and other cables. It has greatly expanded Long Distance facilities—and is especially valuable right now when America's telephones are busy round the clock with defense calls.
