PROTECTING COMMUNITY: PSC Orders Automatic Crossing Warnings

ALBANY—The Long Island Rail Road has orders from the Public Service Commission to install, on or before the end of this year, electrically automatic flashing signals at two unprotected Hicksville grade crossings, it was learned today. The Commission's order was made here last week. The automatic signal devices, which the LIRR complained at public hearings in New York City would cost it more than \$25,000 each, are ordered for installation at Charlotte Ave. and New South Rd. crossings.

The PSC hearing was held on Mar. 27 and Apr. 19 of this year upon complaint of Oyster Bay Town Board and the urging of local civic organizations, the Women's ERA, and individuals. Appearance at the hearing were made by Councilman Frank Chlansky, Pat Boland, president of North West Civic Assoc. and president of Mid-Island Civic Council, and James J. Condon, vice president of Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc.

The PSC found, in its recommendations, that both crossings are utilized by "vehicles seeking to avoid the main thoroughfares through the congested areas of Hicksville" and that the present protection by signs — without bells or lights — is inadequate. The LIRR has until Aug. 9 to notify the PSC whether the order will be obeyed.

Don't Sprinkle, 4pm to 9 pm: Cooperate or Expect Strict Water Rules, Officials Warn

Homeowners in Hicksville and Bethpage districts were today warned to refrain from lawn sprinkling from 4 to 9 P.M. daily on a voluntary basis or face the alternative of possible compulsory regulation in the community's interest. The current prolonged dry weather, with no immediate relief in sight, coupled with the tremendous community growth has severely taxed the capacities of local water systems. Farm irrigators as well as home owners are also requested to stop using water whenever the local alarm for fire sounds.

Frederick E. Davidson, superintendent of Hicksville Water District, called for the cooperation of residents to stop sprinkling between 4 P.M. and 9 P.M., the peak demand period of the day, "until further notice." The Hicksville water system, with all new pumps and equipment operating, hit an all-time record peak of 3 1/4 million gallons pumped for a single day this week. In recent years the peak had been about 2 million gallons.

The Hicksville District now has a combined storage of a shade less than a million gallons but even with this, is unable to cope with the peak demand when four or five thousand home lawn sprinklers are turned on at once, Davidson pointed out.

Bethpage Warning
The Board of Water Commissioners at Bethpage in an open letter to all consumers stated: "With the present extreme dry weather and with no rain in sight, the Board strongly urges each and everyone to assist in the conservation of water."

"This can best be done by refraining from the practice of sprinkling lawns excessively. The Board requests the public to refrain from sprinkling during the hours of 4 P.M. and 9 P.M. as this is the peak load period. We strongly urge all farmer irrigators and home owners who are sprinkling lawns to stop using water when the fire alarm sounds."

"In the Town of Hempstead it has become necessary to adopt ordinances making it mandatory to stop sprinkling lawns at certain hours. We do not want to go in for such regimentation."

"Our phenomenal growth has completely changed the picture of what was considered an up-to-date water district, both in the matter of bringing water to the surface as well as the storage and distribution of same. It is hoped that the plans we are now about to adopt will be favorably accepted by the Taxpayers when you are called upon to decide."

Sandpits Worry RR

HICKSVILLE—The Long Island Rail Road has been alarmed since 1946—a period of five years—over the sand-pit operations adjacent to the LIRR tracks in the west end of the community near Charlotte Ave. it was learned this week. Isaac Penner made public a letter he received from the LIRR acknowledging grave concern, "what we considered a hazard to our right-of-way and our tracks in this area," the Rail Road stated.

As the result of a report by Penner at the last meeting of the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. Inc., that organization is going on record requesting that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey order a probe of sandpit operations in the community. Huge pits in the earth are located on the north and south sides of the LIRR mainline. The condition has been described by Penner as "a bridge of sand".

HICKSVILLE—The importance of the primary elections on Tuesday, Aug. 21, from 12 noon to 9 P.M. was cited by Sidney Pelly of the county election board staff at the Republican Club meeting in the Masonic Temple, Friday night. President Ernest Francke was impressed with the large attendance at the first mid-

summer session in the club's history.

Pelly pointed out that enrolled party members will vote on Primary Day to elect their respective committeemen, two in each election district, who will convene shortly thereafter in convention to select the party candidates for town positions to be filed in November.

Vacancies this Fall in Oyster Bay Township include a supervisor, tax collector, town clerk and two town councilmen. Harry Tappan, incumbent town supervisor, at the start of his present term two years ago announced it would be his last. "As a result there has been considerable speculation about his successor with Francke prominently named as a likely contender."

EDITORIALS:

George Is Tired

AS WE MOVE toward incorporation, the increasing numbers who say, "Let George do it," are honestly overwhelming the poor guy. Incorporation itself is accepted by many as a foregone conclusion. It is possible George won't be able to do that job or later to run the village for us. How many have thought just whom they would like to see govern our proposed village?

The associations, business and home owners, the clubs and other groups and some few individuals have been and are, through voice and influence, the governing factors in Hicksville. The final action by a governing body is merely the legal consummation of their decisions. If it were not so that governing body should and would be changed. Oyster Bay can no longer satisfy our local needs; we are petitioning for incorporation. That is democracy.

Homeowners Like Allen

JAMES ALLEN of Hicksville, who did a very efficient job in the collection of refuse in Hicksville Garbage District until he lost the contract because he bid \$100 higher for a year than Main Transfer of Massapequa and Bay Shore, has been getting a lot of customers in recent weeks among the owners of homes built by Levitt and Sons outside the Garbage District.

The people who have signed with Allen are delighted with the service he provides (see letter elsewhere on this page) but for that very reason they are concerned about the proposed extension of the garbage district to include their homes. They fear that if the district is extended they will have to take service from Main Transfer because this company already has the Hicksville contract. Such does not appear to be the case, however, since the extension area would be a separate contract until such time as the contract awarded for the original area or district is terminated. Then a new contract for the combined area or district would be considered.

It would be unfortunate if the proposed extension of the district, which is the only practical way to arrange for collection of rubbish on a regular and dependable basis—were again postponed or rejected for fear of losing the superior service now enjoyed by such as our correspondent.

The hearing upon the proposed extension takes place next Monday afternoon, July 23, at Oyster Bay Town Hall at 2 o'clock. The fullest expression of all concerned, by letter or in person, is greatly desired.

CURRENT COMMENT:

Town Park Law

OYSTER BAY TOWNSHIP Board will hold a public hearing next Monday afternoon at Oyster Bay Town Hall upon a proposed "Town Park Ordinance." Based upon observations of the enforcement of unsorted ordinances upon which the Board held public hearings in the past year, we see little cause for grave concern about some of the provisions of the proposed local law.

However, there are some points of the ordinance which deserve attention since as we read the proposed version in the Oyster Bay Guardian (Herald readers are obviously not expected to know about this), the playgrounds, athletic fields, the law will apply to all parks, beaches, etc., "whether the same be now or hereafter owned or acquired by the Town of Oyster Bay," etc.

This could mean, as we read it, that any park lands in Hicksville—for example—which may be acquired by a local district under town board jurisdiction would come under these rules.

Among the things you will not be allowed to do in the future at the town beaches (or parks), if this law is adopted, are: kite flying, make or use fire (except charcoal or sterno, under special permit), fishing, bring any bear, ale or other alcoholic beverages in a keg or case (how about a bottled), make a speech, hold a parade or meeting (except by special permit).

Also, no person under 12 will be admitted to any park unless accompanied by an adult who must assume full responsibility for his safety and his conduct.

Some folks are cynical about the proposed township park ordinance because—(a) the township has a fine topsoil ordinance but there are a good many new houses about us which do not have topsoil, (b) township over a year ago adopted a plumbing code but to date no plumbing inspectors have been named and no plumbing permits are being issued, (c) township more than a year ago held hearings upon a proposed ordinance to eliminate overhanging signs in business sections, but nothing has been heard of the matter since, and (d) the township some months ago adopted an ordinance to control free-running dogs but many children fall victim to these animals every week.

THE PROPOSED law also makes reference to the requirement that Beach Beach at Bayville and Albee Beach at Massapequa will be limited to "residents and owners of taxable real property in the Town of Oyster Bay." It lists fees for auto parking at the other town beaches and, strangely, does not specify that these other beaches will be free to township residents.

We have long bemoaned about the system used in issuing windshield identification stickers for "township residents." Actually, it has been our experience that stickers are issued only upon presentation of an automobile registration which gives an address in the Township. We know of a man who drives a company-owned car which is registered for an address in the City. He lives in Hicksville, owns his home and pays township taxes. He has been unable to get a windshield sticker (or even free admittance to the township beaches) because he can't prove ownership of an automobile registered in the township. In other words under the current tag system, auto ownership rather than proof of residence or ownership of property is the real requirement for use of township beaches.

Incidentally, Monday afternoon promises to be a busy session for the Town Board. Besides this Town Park ordinance hearing, they also have on the fire a proposed extension of Hicksville Garbage District south to the township boundary line, a Bethpage zone change and other matters.

A—You will receive a sticker from the parking field attendant upon producing an auto license registration to identify you as a resident of the Township of Oyster Bay.

HERALD READER OPINION: Attn, Levitt Homeowners in Hicksville

On Monday, July 23, at 2 p. m. in the Town Hall, Oyster Bay, a proposition for the extension of the Hicksville Garbage District will be acted upon.

To those of you who have considered favoring such a proposal I would like to state the following:

Effective July 1, 1951, several of my neighbors, including myself, contacted James Allen of Hicksville for garbage and rubbish pickups every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Monetary, there is no difference from our previous contract with Levittown Sanitation Service as the cost is the same (\$3.75 for 3 month period). The important thing is, however, that the Allen organization has been found to be far more prompt, efficient and courteous than Levittown Sanitation or their predecessors, Nassau Main Transfer Corp. In addition, no limitations are placed on the individual concerning rubbish pickups such as those imposed by our former collectors.

At every pickup of garbage, rubbish is also collected and by the term "rubbish" Allen means anything the individual wants to throw out and not just "grass clippings and small stones" as defined by our former collectors. As a final touch, I would like to say there has not been one day missed by Allen in their collections and we feel assured that there will be none.

Now, we who have contracted with Allen are faced with the prospect of having the Hicksville Garbage District extended to include our homes. This undoubted-

ly, will mean reverting back to the Main Transfer Corp. which, unfortunately, may lead to our experiencing the same difficulties as encountered in the past. Those of you who have had prior dealings with Nassau Main Transfer know what I am talking about!

To me, this is an unsatisfactory situation. Of course, I can't wait any longer with those of you who are still under contract with Levittown Sanitation and feel that "anything is better than nothing." The fact is, I had been in that same state of mind, myself, a month ago. However, you have the same opportunity as we to change over to the service of Allen when your present contract expires. All that is necessary is a telephone call.

For the present, however, I must say that I am well satisfied with the service being rendered and my neighbors have expressed similar satisfaction. Of course, since I am only speaking for myself and do not wish to give the impression of acting as a spokesman for anyone else, I can only say that, personally, extension of the Hicksville Garbage District will do us more harm than good and will mean the loss of all benefits we have derived in the past few weeks. Therefore, I would like to suggest to all who are concerned in this matter that some thought be given to changing over to James Allen before concluding that extension of the District is the only way to solve this serious problem.

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

it is really long past time, and much damage has already been done. Most vegetable crops that have two or three weeks growth with complete freedom from weed competition get enough start to coast along the rest of the season with very little help from the gardener.

QUACK GRASS
One of the most serious weed problems is quack grass. There is no madder weed. Its root stalks may have been used by our ancestors as a medicine, but when they grow with the garden vegetables they are bad medicine. What people think of it is told by its various names—witch grass, dog grass and devil's grass.

There is no easy way to get rid of quack grass. Energy is stored in the creeping root stalks, which can remain dormant for some time, but quickly revive in moist soil. Quack grass also spreads from seeds.

Raking, picking up or pulling out all roots as they appear in the garden is a sure way to get rid of quack grass eradication. C. B. Raymond, Cornell University.
