WIDE RANGE OF BIDS:

Garbage Extension Bids Spread \$25,000

OYSTER BAY—Bids for the municipal collection of garbage in the area known as Hicksville Garbage District Extension 5, starting Aug. 15, range from a low of \$54,350 to a high of \$79,300 for the period ending Feb. 28, 1954. Four bids were submitted when the Town Board received them yesterday (Tuesday) morning.

Levittown Sanitation, successor to Main Transfer in the private collection of garbage in Levittown as well as the area now in Hicksville District where municipal collection is scheduled, was low with a bid of \$54,350. An additional bid of \$55,000 for new homes per month, plus 50¢ per house per month, after the start of the contract was offered.

Super Market Shopper, Charles DeCade of Hicksville bid \$64,044 for the period ending 25 cents per house per month, \$50 per business per month and \$50 per supermarket per month, additional.

Main Transfer, which now has the contract until 1954 on the Hicksville District, makes this new extension, bid \$79,300 and asked \$1 for new houses and \$5 for stores per month.

James Allen of Hicksville, who recently had the Hicksville contract and has some garbage contracts away from Levittown Sanitation in the Levittown house area, made a flat bid of \$78,144.

The present contract in Hicksville held by Main Transfer is for \$125,300 for full three years with 75 cents a month for new houses and \$4 for new places of business per month. Allen, who lost the bid, had asked \$137,400 for three years, 75 cents per new house and nothing additional for business places.

William and Joseph Gill of 2 Bank Lane, Hicksville, who had done much work in circulating petitions calling for the garbage district extension, were present at the bid opening. William Gill raised several questions regarding the contract and asked that a stipulation be included that the successful bidder be liable for violations of the contract. Town Board mem-

bers said such a proposal would delay landing the contract but Gill said that he felt the delay would be worth it.

The Board referred the bids to Councilman Frank Chludzky for study and recommendations.

School Tax Rate \$2.59 Hicksville Valuation Gain Tops All Nassau

The Hicksville School District valuation to tal for 1952 tax purposes is \$39,538,408, a gain of \$13,000,000 over the current year and nearly double the value of 1950, it was learned this week. The Hicksville district recorded the greatest dollar-value gain in the entire county, according to the County Assessment Dept. With the valuation official, the Hicksville Board of Education was able to disclose that the tax rate for the district will be \$2.59 per \$100 of valuation compared with the 1951 rate of \$2.18 per \$100.

The new valuation figure for Hicksville, which is also the valuation for the fire district, does not include the anticipated increase as a result of construction at Hicksville by the Long Island Lighting Co. of its four million dollar electric operating centre on a 64-acre tract on OM Country Rd. It does not include several other industrial and commercial establishments now under construction, which will appear in the 1953 total.

The County Assessment Dept., in announcing the new assessment figures, disclosed that the entire gain in all of Nassau County in 1951 was \$17,412,000. The Hicksville increase this year is nearly equal to that amount. This year the entire county showed a gain of \$17,815,000 or 12.32 per cent. Valuations in Oyster Bay Township increased 19.52 per cent and Hicksville accounted for more than one-third the total increase for the township of \$35,497,000.

Bethpage School District increased almost two million dollars in valuation to a total of \$14,414,645 and Plainview District nearly added a million to reach \$5,453,270. A table of comparative assessments over the past three years is published elsewhere in this issue. The County Board of Assessors, through the Committee for Equalization will have additional work ahead for it. To achieve one-third of the total valuation of the district, as represented by property owners signing the consent, the committee will have to accumulate about \$12,000,000 in value. Before the new assessment was disclosed, the Committee had needed about \$7,000,000. Lawrence A. Roman, Committee chairman, said last night he is confident the volunteer workers will achieve the goal.

What New School Tax Rate Means

The announcement that the 1951-52 Hicksville School District tax rate will be \$2.59 per \$100 of assessment is important news to property owners. To determine the school taxes you will pay, you must know your individual property assessment. Valuations are at 1939 replacement costs. If your home is assessed for \$700, which is said to be about an average on a Levitt house (corner plots are higher), your tax bill will be \$95.83. At last year's rate of \$2.12 it would have been \$78.51. Statistics indicate it costs \$150 or more per year to educate a child.

Owner of Property Sends Okay Overseas

HICKSVILLE—In addition to the hundreds of local, resident property owners who are signing the consent to the incorporation of Hicksville proposition, dozens of others who own property here but reside in other parts of the nation have also been giving their consent, according to Chairman Lawrence A. Roman. This week the mail brought to Roman a consent by the owner of Hicksville property assessed at \$4,500 from Paris, France.

Besides a petition signed by at least 50 resident property owners, the Committee must offer the Town Board a consent signed by property owners representing one third of the total assessed valuation of the district which is now \$33,533,408.

The recent release of the Committee's report on Incorporation, citing arguments for the proposal, has stimulated the receipt of signatures on the petition and consent, Roman stated. More than 80 volunteers are canvassing all sections for signatures.

The community can only profit by the activity of all civic groups, which strive to sense the community needs and requirements and then direct their energies toward seeking to achieve results for the benefit of all.

Ticks, Spiders, Bugs

TWO AGENCIES came thru this week with timely information for homeowners and vacationists. At fairly regular intervals we receive phone calls or visits from residents concerned about various types of bugs and spiders found upon their premises.

Regarding spiders, the Greater New York Safety Council points out that the majority of them are harmless. The black widow is the only poisonous one found in every state of the nation. The black widow's bite can be fatal unless proper treatment is administered quickly.

The black widow is described by the Council as glossy black to sepia and has a "naked" appearance because its hair is almost microscopic. The characteristic "hour-glass marking" on the underside of the abdomen, rarely absent altogether, varies among individual spiders from a distinct hourglass to a design comprising two or more distinct triangles or occasionally only an irregular longitudinal area. The mature females—the deadly ones—are more abundant during late summer and early fall.

Adult black widows are hard to kill with usual insecticides. Corners in garages, cellars and outbuildings may be sprayed with a penetrating creosote, which has some repellent effect against spiders, the Council reports. The best method of control is to search out black widow spiders in cabins, barns and other structures, destroy the webs with a long-handled broom and kill the spiders in any convenient way.

The Nassau County Medical Society gives some timely data on ticks and "Rocky Mountain Fever." Not every tick is infected with the virus. The little tick goes along as company with woodchucks, squirrels, rabbits, dogs, horses, cows and human beings.

Symptoms of the disease include high fever, pain in the bones and muscles, red spots, etc., after exposure to ticks in woods or farm areas. The prompt medical treatment is vital.

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CURRENT COMMENT:

Traffic-Safety

YOU DON'T HAVE to be a traffic engineer to recognize the fact that Hicksville—and other mid-Island communities—has some terrific traffic control problems. You can see for yourself the bottlenecks, the lack of safety devices, the absence of street marking, the urgent need for various signals and regulations.

And you can beef about such things to your heart's content without much hope of getting anything done—until someone is killed or maimed.

Not so long ago, the Hicksville Civic Assoc. and neighbors along Lee Ave. made a strong plea for the installation of a trip signal light at the corner of Lee Ave. and South Broadway. They were told, in effect, that no one has been killed there—so don't expect a traffic light or a policeman on duty.

The Civic Assoc. has also written repeatedly to the authorities about the need for correction in the arrangement of signals at the five corner intersection of North Broadway, John St. and Jerusalem Ave. Everytime we drive through this intersection we wonder if we'll get by with all fenders still intact. The only time we have seen an attempt made to regulate the congestion and snarls at this point was when the Big Circus came to Town and then there were about six cops on every corner.

You can also wonder when someone in authority is going to spread a little paint on the roads and mark the proper point for pedestrians to cross at our heavily travelled corners. With the opening of school less than a month away we can only trust that such corner necessary painting will be done before the little ones take their lives into their own hands and trust to the courtesy and judgment of motorists at these assorted death-traps.

And would we be really nasty if we brought up again the need for a little painting of the spaces for autos in Hicksville's parking fields? Last time the Business Men's Assoc. complained about the lack of proper designation of car spaces, it was informed that the authorities had to wait "until the surface of the field" was dry. But soon it will be winter and the field will be covered with snow so perhaps that's not so important.

And the spaces for metered car parking on our streets would use a little touching up. Mention of meters recalls to mind the unique distinction enjoyed on Herzog Place where one side of the street has a string of "hitching posts," pole without meters.

Consideration of parking and traffic always seems to recall the fact that we are unable, for some reason, to get a few benches erected at our increasing bus stops around Hicksville. It is a disgrace that bus passengers are forced to drape themselves wearily on a splintered and broken piece of telephone pole at Newbridge Rd and Jerusalem Ave.

The Hicksville Lions Club wanted to provide the community with several benches for our bus stops, more than a year ago, but were advised that the provider of such a convenience would have to carry the insurance. Why the township insurance could not cover such installations was not then—nor is now—very clear.

We wonder if Levitt & Sons ever asked permission from anyone before they erected those most welcome benches along Jerusalem Ave near Walnut Lane, Spindle Rd., Rising Lane, etc?

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ZONING APPEALS CASES INCLUDE:

Another Gas Station Proposed Here

OYSTER BAY—Another gas station for Hicksville at Plainview Rd. and Park Ave. and gasoline storage tanks of Duffy Ave. are among the requests for variances to be heard by the Zoning Board of Appeals at a meeting Thursday night, Aug. 16, in the Justice Courtroom at 7:30. There are more than 30 service stations now operating in Hicksville.

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

HERALD GARDENING DEPT.: Plant Late Crops to Discourage Weeds

Sure spots in the garden only give encouragement to weeds, according to Prof. C. B. Raymond of Cornell's vegetable crops dept. Late crops planted where early ones have been harvested are a much better bet for the family's food supply and will save the gardener trouble later, he said.

Lettuce may be used to cover some of this space. The big Boston variety is good for fall planting, but leaf lettuce varieties are a little safer since the head varieties do not always develop satisfactorily.

Spinach is a safer crop in the fall than in the spring because the spring crops so frequently go to seed after a few hot days. It may be planted almost any time for the next week or two in much of the state or until early September in the larger sections.

It is too late for these crops in your section or you have all you want, then plant domestic dry grass in the bare spaces. It is also a good idea to put it in among the corn and cabbage and any space thus year. The dry grass should be sowed at the rate of about a pound for each 100 square feet. It will help keep down the weeds, prevent erosion, and add organic matter to the soil for another year.

Mulches are the most valuable for use on the long-season crops such as muskmelons, tomatoes, peppers, and sweet corn. People also find them useful on asparagus, either in the spring or after the cutting season ends and before the asparagus grows up to fern. Other advantages Prof. Raymond lists are that mulches conserve moisture, keep the moisture supply more uniform in the soil, and keep fruits like tomatoes and melon cleaner.

Some of the mulching material can be left on the surface of the ground and worked into the soil the next year. If there is a heavy application, part of it may easily be raked off and saved for use the following season.

MULCHING IN GARDEN
Mulching is a good labor saving method for controlling weeds in the home garden and it's economical at the same time, according to Prof. Raymond.

Even some of the most troublesome weeds can be eliminated that way, he said.

Leaves raked up in the fall make one of the best materials for mulching for the average home garden. Other good materials that are quite commonly used include straw, old hay, tall grass that is never made into hay, lawn cuttings, and wood waste products such as sawdust, shavings, and wood chips. Newspapers may work equally well but are somewhat more difficult and take more time to apply.

Like other means of weed control, mulching needs to be done before the weeds get a good start. On the other hand, it is necessary to wait until the vegetables have

grown enough to start to shade the much material can be spread easily without injuring the individual plants.


