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HONORARY MAYOR BURIED!

Duffy Was President Of Bank for 24 Years

HICKSVILLE — William Duffy, long-time Democratic party leader, banker and farmer, died at his late home on Duffy Ave. early Friday, Nov. 16, at the age of 69. A solemn requiem high Mass was sung at St. Ignatius R.C. Church on Monday morning and burial followed at Holyhood Cemetery, Westbury. He was the third prominent community leader to die in the past two weeks.

He was president of the Long Island National Bank for 24 years. Joseph J. Ulmer, president of the Bank of Hicksville, had died two weeks before and Dr. Walter F. Stilliger, well-known physician, had passed away just six days before.

Honorary Mayor

Mr. Duffy was Hicksville's honorary mayor during the Tercentennial Celebration in 1949 and took a leading role in the festivities during that time.

Born in the community, he was long active in its affairs. He became a volunteer fireman in 1892 and later served as a chief and fire commissioner. He was on the School Board for 15 years. At the time of his death he was a member of the Volunteer Firemen's Exempt Association.

He was secretary-treasurer of Nassau Seed Co. and besides his affiliation with the LI National Bank was a director of the Bank of Hicksville for a period of years ending in 1940. In the field of politics, he had been Democratic leader for 27 years retiring from active leadership in August of this year.

He was chairman of the 11th Mercy Ball two years ago and his fraternal affiliation were numerous. He was a 4th degree Knight, one of the organizers and a member of Joseph Barry Council, Knights of Columbus; Hempstead Lodge of Elks, Holy Name Society and Trustee of St. Ignatius RC Church.

The funeral was from his late home on Duffy Ave. under the direction of Henry J. Stock Funeral Home.

The honorary pallbearers were: Edward A. Braun, Charles R. Carroll, Norman C. Godfrey, William E. Koutensky, Henry J. Weickmann, Henry T. Wilson, Lawrence A. McNamee and Joseph A. Reinhardt.

He is survived by his wife, Loretta (nee) Mollitor; two daughters, Mrs. Margaret Stoltz of Hicksville and Mrs. Mary L. Suggs of Chattanooga; and seven grandchildren.

Clean Literature Assoc: Proposes Youth Centre As Positive Action Plan

HICKSVILLE — An ambitious plan to provide the youth of the community with a youth centre as a positive move to meet the serious problem facing local youths in the type of reading matter made available to them was disclosed today. Dr. Harold E. Hammond, temporary president of the Clean Literature Assoc. of Hicksville, made public today a report of the temporary executive council of the Assoc. The report will be acted upon when the Assoc. meets next Monday night, Nov. 26, in the high school study hall.

Representatives of all local organizations as well as other interested residents are cordially invited to the meeting next Monday when permanent officers and committees will be elected according to Dr. Hammond who is administrator of the LIU-Hicksville annex and a local resident.

The executive council report goes into the objectives of the Association, the scope of the problem, and purposes creation of three committees: Indecent Literature, Newsstand Publications, and Youth Centre.

The object of the third committee will be "to consider plans for a community youth centre — consider various plans, investigate location sites, estimate costs and suggest means of raising the necessary funds for the centre. The civic, service and community clubs of Hicksville would find service on this committee consistent with the objectives of their organizations," Hammond notes.

At the meeting on Monday night, the Association will be asked to elect a permanent executive council consisting of the president, vice-president secretary, treasurer and chairmen of the three sub-committees. This group will meet about Dec. 10 to prepare by-laws and prior to the "regular" regular meeting on Dec. 17 each of the three chairmen will be expected to call committee meetings and prepare oral reports for the December meeting.

Board Denies Permit for Cement Plant

OYSTER BAY—An application for a special permit to operate a cement mixing plant and store trucks on Midland Ave., Hicksville, was promptly rejected by the Zoning Board of Appeals following a public hearing here last Thursday night. More than half the audience consisted of property owners from Midland and Twinlawn Aves. and vicinity led by Daniel Dunlap, president of Twinlawn Ave. Civic Assoc. who presented a petition of opposition signed by 102.

The request was made by Hicksville Transmix Corp. which was under contract to buy the property. It was planned to construct a building 80 x 144 to house 20 trucks and a sand hopper 40-foot high with a capacity of 118 yards. An attorney for the applicant said it was planned to bring in cement by freight train while sand would

be trucked to the site. The mixed cement would be trucked out via Midland Ave.

Ernest Francke presided at the hearing in the absence of Chairman Floyd Griffin of Oyster Bay. Immediately after the heavy calendar for the evening was concluded, the Board announced the Transmix plan was denied.

Anthony Klobukowski of Jericho was granted a variance to re-open a gas station and make an addition to the structure on Brush Hollow Rd. about 1500 feet south of Jericho Tpk. Jericho. A request to install a lunch counter was denied.



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

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
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NORTH WEST NOTES:**Flood Conditions, Lights At Top of List**

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

It will make little difference where you look because the committee left containers at the sellers' cages in the banks, on the counters of groceries, bakeries, delicatessens, butchers and liquor stores, as well as all supermarkets and many of the bars and grills and stations. Naturally, every establishment in town was not visited, but of those reached we received but one refusal. The rest is up to the people of Hicksville.

Because many people must be curious regarding the final disposition of funds collected by the American Legion in Hicksville, we plan to devote next week's column to a discussion of our charitable works. We hope it will enliven for a better public understanding of the Legion work.

Normally in this column we refrain from using too much national news, since most of it is available through the daily newspapers. However, we think a recap in part of the 1952 American Legion program deserves publication once for the benefit of those who may have missed some of the news. A full report would cover five or six of these columns, so will just touch briefly on the major items.

The Legion has called for a continuation of the House Committee on Un-American Activities, with adequate funds, and has urged that the study of American history be made a college requirement. It reiterates its demand for the outlawing of the Communist Party.

The recent convention demands strengthening of the United Nations and called for foreign aid which would not undermine American economy. It adopted a comprehensive rehabilitation platform calling for increased disability and

death compensation and pension awards; demanded all GI Bill benefits for Korean War veterans, and called on Congress to immediately pass a deficiency appropriation bill to restore \$300,000,000 to the budget to maintain the Veterans Employment Service. It also adopted a 10-point employment program including fair treatment of mature workers in employment and job retention.

Strictly under the heading of Americanism are the following resolutions:

Change the designation of Armistice Day, Nov. 11, to Annual Veterans Day for veterans of all American wars.

Enacture of the Indian Liquor Law from the statutes of the United States.

Commanding organized labor for its campaign against Communism.

The Legion also repeated its opposition to the participation of the United States in any form of World Federation of World Government and demanded that avoidance of military service under the draft be punished as severely as desertion from the Armed Forces.

There's lots more, but for those interested we'd suggest a visit to the clubhouse, where the information will be displayed on the bulletin board.

To return to local news, do you realize the hall has been the scene of affairs by the Northwest Civic Assoc., K. of C. and the Democratic Club recently? Remember it when your own organization is looking for a hall.
