Harbes Cites 21 Year Record for Plainview

The Plainview Water Commissioner contest between John G. Harbes, member of the Board for 21 years, seeking re-election, and Ralph P. Atchae of 26 Vernon St., in Country Homes, promises to highlight the special district elections in the mid-Island area next Tuesday night, Dec. 4. Hicksville, Jericho and Bethpage will elect Fire Commissioners and Treasurers the same night, apparently without contests.

Harbes in an open letter to the Herald today levelled a blast at his critics, alleging that David Weltz spearheads the opposition to him, and cited his own service to the district over a score of years. The Plainview voting, limited to resident property owners, takes place in the firehouse on Old Country Rd. between 6 and 10 p.m. on Dec. 4.

Tank Drowning Scare May Force Safeguards

HICKSVILLE—Access to the top of the Long Island Rail Road's ancient, wooden water storage tank next to Jerusalem Ave.—scene of a spectacular but futile 7-hour rescue attempt by firemen Sunday night—remained wide open yesterday. A LIRR spokesman said Monday the "master carpenter's office would see if any possible danger to children exists and if a child could gain access." He added that "appropriate action will be taken, if necessary." Local youths have scaled the ladder many times, usually on a dare, since it was first erected at the turn of the century.

Levitt Home Owners To Elect on Tuesday

HICKSVILLE—Further nominations and election of officers of the South Hicksville Assoc. of Levitt Home Owners takes place next Tuesday night, Dec. 4, at the Community Hall on Levittown Parkway. Five members of the Assoc. were scheduled to call upon the Town Board, yesterday, to request the renaming of Jerusalem Ave. property near Walnut Lane from business to residential use. They will report at the Dec. 4 meeting.

Nominees for office include Arthur Isaacsen of 51 Arcadia Lane and Steve O'Brien of 35 Arcadia Lane, for president; Bob Wathey, Evelyn Haas and Joseph Leonard,

Hicksville firemen, with the use of an ingenious improvised 4-inch pipe siphon and 750 gallon per minute fire pumper, worked until midnight Sunday to empty the tank when it was reported to police that nine of ten-year-old youngsters had climbed the unguarded ladder to the top, toppled in and drowned.

Second Police Precinct Detective Squad told the Herald yesterday that investigation had failed to turn up the youngster who first gave the alarm to the crossing watchman at Jerusalem Ave. The boy had vanished after telling about the alleged accident to his chums and has not been located to date.

More than 100 volunteer firemen under Ass't. Chief Edward R. Schluter, who was the only casualty of the operation, were on the job with the county police, for seven hours. Drainage of the tank became necessary when grappling hooks tangled with debris at the bottom of the 60,000 gallon tank. Schluter suffered a gash in his scalp when a heavy pipe coupling dropped during the pipe hook-up. He was on the 50-foot fire dept. ladder, about ten feet from the top, when he was struck. The coupling missed another vamp on the ground below by a fraction of an inch.

The dramatic "rescue" drew hundreds of spectators and received widespread coverage by radio and daily newspapers. The tank, owned by the RR and standing on its property here since about 1900 and is used to supply water for steam locomotives. Some residents recall that it was rebuilt about 20 years ago. It is a wooden structure with a wooden ladder extending from the top to the ground level, permanently attached to the structure. Police on patrol have caused youngsters off the ladder many times over the years.

Alaskan Victim Of Plane Crash Home for Burial

HICKSVILLE — Final services for John Puvogel, age 28, of 164 Broadway, who died over a year ago, on Aug. 6, in Alaska, were held here Saturday, Nov. 24. The Rev. George M. Bittermann, pastor of St. Ignatius Church, conducted services at the Henry J. Stock Funeral Home, Saturday morning. Interment was at Pine-lawn National Cemetery with full military honors.

He died following a plane crash in Alaska where he was employed as a civilian brush pilot. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Puvogel. Surviving is a sister, Caroline Puvogel.

Extended Coverage Premiums to Double

Adverse loss experience on the protection afforded by the Extended Coverage Endorsement No. 4 in the last ten years has necessitated an increase in the rate of premium it was announced recently by the NY Fire Rating Organization. The endorsement refers to insurance against loss by windstorm, hail, explosion, smoke and other enumerated perils, according to local insurance authorities.

For private dwellings in Nassau, the increase amounts to 100 per cent in the annual premium. The increase is effective Nov. 19, excepting renewal policies expiring on or before Dec. 31, 1951, may be written at the lower rates, the Herald learned.

Harbes Cites Water District Record

(Continued from Page 1)

Miller, who is chairman of the fire board.

Bethpage candidates are Chief Robert Gillespie for commissioner and James Sturtevant for treasurer; both unopposed.

Jericho candidates, apparently unopposed, are incumbents Roy Van Nostrand for commissioner and George Casey for treasurer.

Harbes' open letter to the people of Plainview follows in part:

"It being that the district is growing so fast, it is impossible to meet you all personally; therefore we are trying to bring before the qualified voters of the district and especially the people in the new home sections, some of the facts in the present campaign for the election of a water commissioner for the Plainview Water District which you all know will be held on Tuesday evening, Dec. 4.

User Own Home

"We come before you with a record that any community should be proud of. We have served your district for 21 years and for 21 years we have used our own home for a public office with all the wear and tear and electric bills and all other liabilities connected with it; and for 21 years we have used our own buildings, lawn and properties for a general storage headquarters for the materials of your district; and for 21 years we have used our own automobiles and burden our own gas and oil, worn and blown-out our own tires without costing you as taxpayer one penny."

"Think these things over, folks, and try to understand what they all mean to you as a taxpayer. Now, what could or be able to do? On what did Weltz ever do for the interest of the community without being compensated for it, except cause a lot of disturbance ever since he has been in the district. This is nothing new, folks. Weltz makes the balls and he is enough to throw them." Harbes always gets someone who is foolish

enough to believe him.

"Your district is growing much faster than anyone ever expected and there are at present 12 developers operating or just about ready to operate and another 10 who will be ready at some later date. Therefore you can see what is expected to properly administer your affairs at this time. Plainview Water District is a municipal water district, created and operated under the laws of the State of New York and must operate and function pursuant to the Kirkland Act which does not govern our adjacent districts (namely Hicksville and Central Park Water District) and that will perhaps answer the question of why there is a different method for the conducting of the election. There are a lot of new problems that your district must face in the near future in order to comply with the requirements of all the authorities having jurisdiction. We are not and never did make any petty pre-election promises, but we come before you with 21 years of experience which at this time, more than ever, is worth a lot to you homeowners. Now what does David Weltz or his group know about running a water district? Your water district is worth far over \$1,000,000. It needs experienced people to direct a million-dollar corporation.

Need Experience

"We have over 38 miles of pipe lines in the district and all valves and pipe lines must at all times be located and maintained, so you can see what it would mean to you to throw this district into the hands of any inexperienced group which would be guided by a few agitators.

"We have served you for 21 years and in 21 years the auditors of the NY State Audit and Control Dept. and other auditors could not find one single cent of discrepancy in the accounts. Isn't that a record for anyone to stand on and fit to be presented before you? You may hear a lot of mud-slinging and false propaganda and you will be promised a lot and perhaps all kinds of ways and means by which your water bills will be reduced."

"Everyone of you has a right to think the way you like, but after all is said and done you will understand that the more water you use, the more you have to pay for. It is the meter in your house that sets your water bill and not your water commissioner. You will hear also a lot about the different rates. We have several times in the past stated and again we will repeat — there is only one source of water in the Plainview Water District and the more times you request your meter read, the more it will cost the district to operate and the more expense you will make for yourself and the district.

"Under the law, the minimum charge is one in advance, so if at any time you owing us any amount in your account will be credited for it. We know that on some of the accounts we are not up-to-date; but folks, we have over 900 accounts of record in the district and we expect several hundred more in the near future. So you can see that there is a lot of work to be done without any additional staff. If it were not for the able assistance of my daughters who are experts in banking, we could not have built up the fine record of the district.

"Weltz and his friends, we are told, are going to set up a very fancy outfit and at the same time they promise you a reduction in water rates; but folks just think this over for a minute and you will realize that the answer to it is that they must either raise your water rates or your taxes on your homes — because the money to be spent doesn't grow on trees. If there should come a time in the next few years when the district will be able to announce a reduction in water rates, there wouldn't be anything more pleasing for your present board of Commissioners to do but to announce it to you.

"We know that most of the homeowners in the district do not want to have any additional expenses added to their homes, but how can you or anyone else avoid additional expenses when you employ inexperienced management for your affairs? By progressive and cooperative administration we have saved you in the last few years over \$100,000.00 in capital construction alone, and in operation we have saved you over \$10,000.00 per year for many years.

"If there are any matters you wish to have answered, why not arrange a place where we could meet you in general and perhaps a lot of this petty whispering, mud-slinging and false propaganda could be avoided, and perhaps we could build up a better community in which to live? Another one of Weltz's affiliates, a Mr. Fred Baum, went around and told a lot of people that the district was operating without any books. That remark soon died when we were asked and did bring some books to the satisfaction of everyone present at a meeting of the Plainview Country Home Owners Assoc.

"There are many things we could explain and it would take days to talk about everything. We also know that many times we enjoy new things, but most times, they cost us extra money. So, don't make a hasty decision, but think the matter over and ask yourself why should Weltz or anyone else try to make up your mind for you? The most important sports story of the week in the community is not the fight for the N-S Conference championship that the Field Club will wage this Sunday, but the fact that the Board of Education has decided to clamp down completely on any sort of "commercialism" in connection with the use of school property by athletic teams.

This came to light when Empire Diner was denied the use of the high school gym for the basketball team it planned to sponsor this court season.

It was not unexpected. It is entirely legal. The Board was fully within its rights.

The alarming thing, however, is that the Board intends to follow through its plan and even deny the use of its softball diamonds to any outfit that has the name of a business in the village.

That, too, is still entirely legal.

It is, however, the first time in this community that such a policy in connection with the fields of the high school plant has been so drastically outlined.

It is a blow to those who derive some advertising from the fact that they sponsor a team.

It is also a blow to good clean athletics in the town..

We acknowledge that fraternal and service clubs in the community still have the chance to place teams on the field, but that nevertheless stunts the athletic program of the village.

It is unfortunate that modern sports require a good deal of money to keep going. League fees, uniforms, insurance, equipment all are costly.

Experience has more than proved that the interest of fraternal organizations is far from sufficient in respect to keeping a sports program thriving.

If the younger people of our community are to have proper outlets for their energy, the interest of certain business concerns to sponsor athletic teams should not be blocked.

It may be "commercialism," but Hicksville has never suffered from it before, nor has any other town.

In past years many business concerns have sponsored softball teams and those teams have conducted long campaigns under the name of their sponsor on the high school fields, and they do so with Boards decidedly less friendly to sports than the one now in existence.

One can only hope that time will see a reversal of this attitude.

This has been a good year for striking blows against sports all over the country.

In some places a blow against "commercialism" has definitely been needed.

But what we need in Hicksville is a blow for realism.

Chip Gannon will be on hand for the Riverhead contest and John Slofkin, sorely missed in the line against Lindenhurst, will also attempt to go in the Field Club's title quest against Riverhead this Sunday.

The hard running Pete Zeller will also put on the uniform and the Black and White, particularly with the presence of Lou Koji, will be generally stronger than in last Sunday's loss.

Close to 2,000 persons are expected for the contest which we think Hicksville will take 19-14.

Hicksville High School opens its basketball campaign at St. Dominic's this Friday night.

Coach Chet Jaworski has Harold Manaskie, Stan Kellner, Harry O'Mack and Dick Alcock from his front line teams that in the past two campaigns rang up 29 victories and six losses.

They are available to him, and the Orange and Black is expected to have an equally brilliant mark this season and would seem to be the only challenge to Dick Crawley's astoundingly powerful Oyster Bay five, which is a heavy favorite to defend its 1950 county championship.
