Harbes Lost by 23 as 678 Cast Votes

John G. Harbes, water commissioner of Plainview for 21 years, was defeated by 23 votes last night (Tuesday) as an all-time record of 678 votes were cast at the Plainview firehouse during a 4-hour period. He was defeated by Ralph Atches of 28 Vernon St., resident of the Plainview Country Homes section, who will assume office for a three-year term on Jan. 1. Atches had 348 votes and Harbes 325.

A runoff will be held against Fred Miller, candidate for re-election for Hicksville Fire Commissioner, failed to develop last night. Miller was elected for his third 5-year term with 96 votes out of 102 cast. Fred Schaeffer was re-elected district treasurer with 71 votes. There were 18 votes written in for Fred J. Noeth for treasurer.

In Bethpage, 68 voted for fire district officials. Unopposed Robert Gillespie got 64 ballots for commissioner and James Sturtevant '66 for district treasurer. In Jericho, Roy Van Nostrand was re-elected commissioner with 32 votes and George Casey, treasurer, with 31 ballots. There was no contest.

Santa Arrives Saturday: Utility Co Rules Dim Xmas Lights

Santa Claus makes his official arrival in Hicksville this Saturday, Dec. 8, as he has for the past five years, but he may not find the community's business street trimmed with colored lights. Officials of the Business Men's Assoc., Inc., had hoped, today, that an alternate plan to provide lighting across Broadway may be achieved by the end of the week, but they had already suffered two setbacks—both at the hands of the Long Island Lighting Co. Santa will make his grand entrance in a parade up Broadway from Old Country Rd. to the corner of Broadway and Herzog Place, starting at 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

Award Contract

Hicksville finds itself in the same position as other Island shopping centers served by the Lighting Co. Advised last June that no power would be available for outdoor displays this season, the BMA has been working steadily on various alternate plans.

One arrangement to have portable generators brought in and illuminate the strings of colored bulbs appeared possible until the Lighting Co. said it could not allow another source of power attached to its poles—or the grounds of public liability.

Two weeks ago it appeared that arrangements were set to have the strings plugged into 32 stores and the necessary number of permissions were granted. Goettelman Electric Service was awarded the contract to do the job and was ready to start installation, when the Lighting Co. withheld, temporarily at least, permission to attach the wires to its poles.

The strings of lights are owned by the BMA and represent an investment of several thousands of dollars.

At a late hour yesterday the Lighting Co. was attempting to get storekeepers where connections are to be made to agree and cut down the use of lights in their establishments equivalent to the power consumed by the string of bulbs. Local merchants noted that the Village Greens in Levittown and Levitt section of Hicksville apparently had little difficulty on the score. There outdoor lighting is connected to the nearest stores.

Huntington has experienced much the same difficulty as Hicksville, Amityville, Glen Cove and other areas. At Huntington the wires have been strung but all efforts to get power have failed and the lights do not shine at night.

Big Tree Going Up

The Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. for the fourth year will erect a tree on the Bank of Hicksville property at Bway and the RR crossing, tonight (Wednesday) obtaining power for lighting from the bank building. The giant tree will be sprayed with aluminum paint. It has been donated by Mr. and Mrs. Edward Karran of Grove St.

Police will prohibit parking in front of the tree site starting at 7 o'clock tonight to permit the unloading of the 26-foot blue spruce.

Charles Schwartz is chairman of the BMA decorating program again this year.



Auspicious Start for New Season

HICKSVILLE—Alice Howland, mezzo soprano, opened the Community Concert season here Friday evening, Nov. 20. It was a most auspicious beginning for Miss Howland is charming of manner, very easy to look at, and the possessor of a very warm, rich voice. Top these qualities with musical intelligence and artistry and a beautiful concert is assured.

The program arrangement, itself, was interesting, opening with a group of English songs which had a 17th or 18th century flavor and climaxed by Gluck's

beautiful contralto aria from "Orfeo."

The second group was entirely German, with well-contrasted numbers by Strauss, Brahms, Hugo Wolf and Mendelssohn. In this group Miss Howland seemed particularly at home, both from a language and an interpretive standpoint.

The ever-popular aria, "Mon cœur s'ouvre à ta voix," from "Samson and Delilah" represented the French school and made up the third group.

Following the intermission, Theodore Schaefer, Miss Howland's capable accompanist, gave a group composed of a Chopin nocturne and Toccata by Francis Poncet. The delicacy of these two extremely contrasting numbers made a perfect foil for the sombre richness of Miss Howland's lovely mezzo voice.

An all English group of very modern songs followed, most of which were quite short, but well

contrasted in mood and tone color.

The final group was again sung in English, and included many requiring the round flowing tones in which Miss Howland especially excels. It was interestingly lacking in any pretentious effort toward a final climax, but instead simply aimed to please—which it certainly did.

A most enthusiastic audience called for many encores, which were graciously and generously given. Among the encores was Carmen's famous "Habanera," Grieg's "I Love You," "Comin' Through the Rain" and many others.

Particular high spots were Mendelssohn's "Fruhlingsgale," The Seal Man by Rebecca Clarke, To the Children by Rachmaninoff and May Day Carol of Deems Taylor, beside, of course, the three arias which were all beautifully done. Especially mention should go to the encore, "Think on Me," a simple, affecting song which was perfect in the artistry and beauty.

Alice Howland set a high standard for the new season. She and Theodore Schaefer made a thoroughly integrated team which richly deserve the success they have had. Our best wishes for their future careers.

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
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
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Speaker and Organist At Church of Christ


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

Working Together

THE PROPOSED plan for the division of Nassau County into three Congressional Districts agrees with us. We refer in particular to the fact that the plan, as disclosed, will utilize the boundary between the Townships of Oyster Bay and Hempstead in marking out the boundary between Hicksville (1st District) and Levittown (3rd District). This again adds weight to our long repeated (and often misunderstood) statement that the Township line is firm and important.

A few weeks ago we found that the same township line will be the official boundary between Hicksville and proposed Levittown Postal Districts. For this dual recognition of Hicksville's boundary by the Federal authorities in Washington and the State authorities in Albany, we are grateful.

Further, we are pleased and encouraged to find that the Educational Assoc. of Hicksville in all its publicity and statements stresses over and over again the fact that all sections of the school district must work together to achieve its purposes. The fact that this movement had its origin among the residents of the section developed by Levitt and Sons is of further interesting significance.

However, we continue to find some assorted agencies and groups which shy away so religiously from any mention of Hicksville. We refer in particular to the Nicholai St. School Parent-Teacher Assoc. which managed to issue a program notice without once indicating that this it is a Hicksville organization. "District 17" was the only concession and that, of course, is both misleading and inaccurate since there is also a School District 17 in the Town of Hempstead (Franklin Square).

As we have said many times before, we harbor no ill will against Levittown or its inhabitants. We do want to protect for Hicksville what rightly belongs to it. We think it is important, not only from the standpoint of community pride, but also so that the people involved will come to realize what constitutes their community, who their neighbors are with whom they must work and live, for the ultimate benefit of all.

In the case of education—for the sake of their children. In the case of public services such as fire protection, water supply, refuse removal, street lighting, etc.—for their own safety and comfort.

A great stumbling block in the path to eventual community unity, we believe, is centered today about the signs which stand along Old Country Rd., Newbridge Rd. and Jerusalem Ave.—all in Hicksville—misinforming the public. The signs say "Levittown" as you turn off the main highways into roads under the jurisdiction of the Township of Oyster Bay. A number of people who live in the Levitt houses have protested to the town highway department the installation of these signs by Levitt & Sons. Superintendent John R. Brandt says he has written to Levitt asking their removal. But the signs still hang, swaying in the wind, and adding to the confusion.

One Man's Opinion: Youth Centre Idea Is Not New, But Worth Trying

AS A PARENT, public spirited citizen, and as an educator for the past nine years, I am vitally interested in the subject of youth. In my opinion, anyone of the above mentioned qualifications imposes the obligation of concern with the subject of youth on the citizenry of this community. In a dynamic community which is as rapidly progressing as Hicksville, there is no problem of greater importance. Yet a degree of lethargy is apparent on the part of so many people to overcrowded schools, double sessions, lack of wholesome recreational facilities, and the manner in which our youth spend their leisure time. It is my suggestion, this column, to treat as many aspects of this problem as possible.

A short time ago, in the columns of the Herald, the idea of a youth center was revived. Suddenly the idea was original with everyone. The fact is, it is a very old idea and a very good one. It matters little who thought of it or who should be credited with it. The important thing is that the idea has received a good deal of attention recently and discussion has been stimulated. As I understand it, the history of a youth center for Hicksville dates back some 12 years and impediments to its organization always appeared. The spontaneous enthusiasm with which discussion of the matter has been created bodes well for the prospects of the plan at this time.

There are many arguments for the advocate of a youth centre to combat. One of the principal ones is that the expense will be too great. The answer to that is simple: What price do you place upon the social and psychological well-being of your children? The price cannot be too high for me. Certainly a youth center must eventually go on the tax rolls, but it cannot possibly cost you

more in a year than you spend on your own recreation for a single Saturday night out. Another argument is that those who must bear the heaviest weight in financing a youth center require one least. As one gentleman put it to me, "I take care of my children's adjustments from my home and through the Church. Why should I take care of other people's children?" Such an argument is equivalent to rejecting police protection because one harbors no thieves in his home, expects none are affiliated with his church. In any social organization, the welfare of the individual is so closely associated with the welfare of the group that one is safe until the safety of everyone is guaranteed.

It is not enough for children to have good schools, good homes, good churches. They must also have proper and carefully directed recreational outlets. The essence of education is good citizenship and the cultivation of a sense of social responsibility. Reduced to simpler terms, this means learning to adjust. The school, the home, and the church all contribute heavily to the ability of the child to adjust, but perhaps more is learned from other children than through any other vehicle. Children develop their own society, with particular codes and regulations. Children are influenced greatly by the responses of their playmates, and it is while at play that much of their character and personality is formed.

All this is why it is important to direct and observe the play of children. Who will deny that carefully supervised play under the guidance of an expert recreational director will mean more in terms of social and psychological health to the children of our community than permitting them to devise their own forms of recreation on street corners or wherever they may congregate?

We are aware that football players' memories are short when it comes from one season to the next, but right now it looks like a good many who played this year will not be interested next season.

Three weeks ago the season looked to be moving to a successful conclusion.

A Hicksville championship appeared to be the way the semi-pro sport was going to get its foot on solid ground for the first time in years, but in view of the poor morale at the end of the season perhaps the title means only the rally before the end.

Harold Manaski Sr., head of Hicksville's fine Police Boys' Club, has undertaken steps to form a Senior PBC Alumni to save amateur basketball in the community.

Under his plan, which has been highly successful in Mineola and Hempstead, boys out of high school could play in the amateur loops under the PBC banner.

Objections to the use of the high school court could not be raised under this plan and the post-high school players would have an equal chance to continue play just as every other player in other Nassau Communities.

If this plan should fail for some reason the other recourse open to local players would be to go to Bethpage.

Inquiries have already been made in that direction and officials have been favorable. The Bethpage Kiwanis has shown some interest and the School Board there will okay the use of its fine new grade school gym if the Kiwanis will back the team.

Hicksville High will make its home-debut Friday night against Port Washington. Last season the Comets defeated the Blue and White 75-43 in the season opener.

Roslyn High School has announced that all its home basketball games will be played in the new grade school gym in that community, to accommodate more people this season.

Most new grade school gyms on the North Shore far exceed the old high school gyms in many respects, and how fondly Hicksville folk hope that such an opportunity would present itself here.

This time Riverhead intercepted a Ted Celery pass on its own 41. Ed Booth stepped back to throw but Lou Koji came tearing thru again and had him nailed for a 14-yard loss.

Boden, however, refused to take the loss, and tossed a wild pass

which Emil picked off on the 35 and he went full steam to the endzone.
