## Train Smashes Car at New South Rd.

HICKSVILLE—The 5:35 p.m. east bound Long Island Rail Road train for Greenvale demolished the back end of an auto at the unguarded grade crossing at New South Rd., here, Sunday. Theresa Mark of 26 Stanton St., Uniondale, was injured and taken to Meadowbrook Hospital. The driver of the car, Eugene Magee, of 76 Thorne Ave., Hempstead, was not hurt.

The crossing is one of two in the community which was the subject of a Public Service Commission hearing and order some months ago, directing the LIRR to install automatic warning signals. The RR had until the end of this year to complete the job. The other dangerous crossing, also the scene of several fatal accidents, is at Charlotte Ave.

LEVITTOWN — Mrs. Louise Crane has opened a private salon at 14 Plow Ln., to specialize in the permanent removal of superfluous hair.


