# Civic Goals in New Year: RR Crossing Elimination, Vote On Incorporation Top Aims

The new year, 1952, will see renewed action by local civic groups on many fronts. With a change in the administrative direction of Oyster Bay township affairs, civics are looking forward to the completion of some projects of long standing.

More parking facilities for both shoppers and commuters promises to be easily a top subject for the new year. With new home development reaching new peaks, the number of daily commuters is expected to multiply, adding to the problem of parking.

**Debate on Jan. 3**  
Also in the new year, according to the Committee for Incorporation of Hicksville, will come the vote on the subject, which received wide-spread interest in 1951. A lead-off on this topic will be the discussion of pros and cons next Thursday night, Jan. 3, before the South Hicksville Assoc. of Levittown Home Owners in the Community Hall on Levittown Parkway. Taking part will be Lawrence A. Roman, chairman of the Incorporation Committee, and Ernest P. Francke, president of the Republican Club.

Grade crossing elimination efforts will also be renewed as the State Legislature convenes and the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. plans to repeat its demands of last year for the appropriation of state funds to remove several local crossings which have been listed by the state for elimination since 1941. The crossings are at Jerusalem Ave., Bway, E. Marie St., Nicholas St., Woodbury Rd. and Old Country Rd. The installation of safeguards at Charlotte Ave. and New South Rd., ordered by the Public Service Commission in 1951, will also be pressed vigorously, according to President Stanley Mruz.

The question still to be settled in 1952 is whether the park and parking district should be split along the line where homes were built in Hicksville by Levitt and Sons. This topic will again assume prime importance when the swimming pools in the community, now owned by Levitt, are again prepared for Summer use.

**Schools Top News**  
Schools and Education is expected to again receive top attention throughout 1952. Every mid-island district is confronted with the necessity of providing classrooms faster than the student population increases and census data indicates this will be an almost impossible achievement for 1952. Hicksville has five schools under construction and a sixth will soon be the subject of bid taking. Bethpage will be asked to purchase two elementary school sites on the north and south sides. Plainview will need another school with a site vote question before the voters on January 22.

The new year will see more widespread discussion and debate on zoning questions and it may also see the unveiling of the study of township zoning which has been in the works for three years. The complete details about the registration will be available in a few days in local stores and at the high school.

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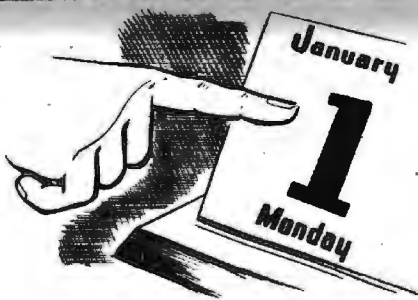

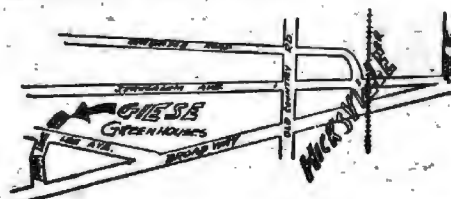

Want to Mystify Your Friends? Here's a little arithmetical trick that will be fun to pull on the visiting friends and relatives. Give

He would then do the following: 9x5 is 45; 45 plus 6 is 51; 51x4 is 204; 204 plus 9 is 213; 213x5 is 1065 which is the sum your friend will give you. Drop the 65 from this amount and you will have 10; subtract 1 from 10 and you'll have the original number 9.
