Urge Public Attend Big CD Show Jan. 19

HICKSVILLE—Several unique entertainment features are in store for adults of Hicksville and Plainview who attend the Civil Defense get-together at the Community Hall on Levittown Pkwy., Saturday night, Jan. 19. All enrolled CD volunteers are being urged to attend and all interested residents are invited, according to local CD officials.

A highlight of the evening will be the showing of two short motion pictures. One is "London Can Take It" which has been referred to as the first great film of World War II. Quentin Reynolds gives a reporter's eye-witness report on the first blitz to hit London. The second is "London Fire Raids" made during the fire raid on the City of London the night of Sept. 26, 1940. It shows one of the biggest blazes in modern history, presenting a vivid idea of what happens to a city under concentrated incendiary bombing.

LEVITT HOMES IN HICKSVILLE:

Claims NLHOA Misleads Neighbors

HICKSVILLE—William Sill of 2 Bank Lane this week sharply challenged the North Levittown Home Owners Assoc. to prove the reason for its existence—in the face of geographic facts as well as federal postal regulations—and suggested that the NLHOA leadership is deliberately attempting to "mislead and create antagonisms."

Sill achieved prominence for his untiring efforts in getting municipal garbage collection extended to embrace the Levitt home area in Hicksville District after it had been repeatedly opposed by the NLHOA. He resides in a "Levitt-built" house.

There is no such place as "North Levittown," he asserted in a letter to the Herald, and efforts to promote such a locality is building ill-feeling and misunderstanding. The Post Office department has officially set the boundary between Hicksville and the proposed Levittown Postal District along the Township line. That should have closed the question, Sill declares.

"Charlie Miller and his associates," Sill continued, "object to the removal of the signs that state 'Levittown' from our streets in Hicksville. Miller and the NLHOA and certain newspapers don't care to inform the people that this area

is Hicksville, the post office is Hicksville, the water district is Hicksville, together with the fire department, street lighting and garbage district. Deeds on our property give the location as Hicksville. Your children can't go to Levittown schools because they live in Hicksville."

"The people in Levitt houses in

Hicksville would have enjoyed garbage collection service as they do today much sooner only for the opposition of the NLHOA. And we are getting it cheaper than Levittown where the charge is \$28.80 per house compared with \$14.80 for our houses in Hicksville." Sill "thanked the Oyster Bay Town Board for its cooperation."

Town officials last year said they were attempting to negotiate with the Rail Road for a nominal rental of the area. 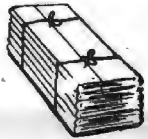

Nothing is expected to "break" on the new county position for ERNEST F. FRANKKE, Hicksville Republican leader, until the county Board of Supervisors meets next Monday. This week the Oyster Bay Town GOP committee endorsed him for the position of County Clerk, vacated since CHARLES E. RANSOM resigned on the last day of 1951 to take office as Township Supervisor. FRANKKE retired recently after 41 years with the New York Telephone Co. He recalls when EMMA CHAPMAN was the first phone operator in Hicksville, handling 30 to 50 calls a day. Now almost 50,000 calls a day in the Hicksville exchanges are not unusual.

Hicksville Lions are planning a testimonial dinner in honor of a leading local citizen, tentatively set for Apr. 19. The Kiwanis of Hicksville is leading its division with an attendance record of 95.4 per cent. The Firestone store will be open Friday nights till 9 but closes Saturdays at 6 p.m. since the first of the year. NLHOA Jap beetle grub-proofing has been postponed until the Spring. 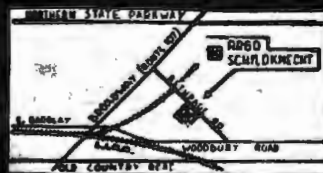

OPEN LETTER TO PLAINVIEW PEOPLE:

Discuss School Proposals on Jan 8; Dedicate New Building This Month

PLAINVIEW—Marie Funfgeld, public relations member of the Plainview School Board, today addressed an open letter to residents of School District No. 19 reminding them of a series of important dates during the month of January. The events will climax with the vote upon two questions by the district on Jan. 22.

Mrs. Funfgeld's letter follows:

"Members of the School Board hope you will see it your duty to come out and meet your board and take part in the events to follow and hear what's what direct."

"On Jan. 22 we are voting on two important issues. One to transfer \$7,000 from the working fund, for bus transportation, and the other, on a new school site. A discussion meeting on these two issues will be held at the school house on Tuesday, Jan. 8, at 8 o'clock. As a board member, I urge you to come out to this meeting. Voting on issues you know nothing about, when they are so near home, often do more harm

than good. If transportation is keeping you home, call the school or a board member and I am sure we will find someone to transport you. There will be letters sent to residents on this voting proposition."

Dedicate New Bldg.

"On Sunday, Jan. 20, at 3 p. m. we are having the dedication of our new school. We hope all of Plainview will be out to that and see our new building. It may not be a big one but it is a beautiful one and a start toward higher and better education for this district."

"There will be notices sent home with your children in regards to class sessions and bus

schedules when sessions start in the new school."

"The board extends its best wishes for a Happy and Prosperous New Year to all and hopes to see you at our gatherings in 1952." Mrs. Funfgeld concluded. She added the postscript "Members of the site committee will be present at the discussion meeting, also the P-T-A meeting this Thursday night."

Cisler Charges Entire Tax is 'County'

HICKSVILLE — Two local organization leaders, individually, today criticized the new Nassau County tax levy for 1952.

William A. Cisler, Hicksville Democratic zone leader, asserted that since County Executive J. Russell Sprague "has admitted that Nassau County is a city, he no longer can deliberately describe a small portion of the tax burden imposed on county residents as the 'county tax.'" Cisler claims that the entire tax bill paid by property owners is in fact the "county tax."

Maurice L. Schoenwald, chairman of the county law committee of the Nassau County Liberal Party, and resident of 15 Gull Rd., released a statement regarding the hearing held Monday morning, Dec. 31, at Mineola.

"One-Third Increase" "We consider it inconsistent that the Republican party, which claims to be the party of economy, should ask for a 33 1/3 per cent county tax increase without adequate prior public discussion. It is our opinion that before such increases are established, it is the administration's obligation to the taxpayer to make a thorough exploration of means to eliminate current waste of public funds. Such waste of funds, we feel, is exemplified by the employment of public servants on the basis of honoring party obligations instead of on the basis of efficiency."

Schoenwald said the Liberals urged that the proposed tax increase be tabled until State Aid is sought.

Cisler quoted a newspaper report of Dec. 28 in which Sprague

was quoted as saying "Nassau County performs many governmental functions for its cities and villages, as well as its towns. It is, in fact, a large city, and common sense should indicate that the county has the right to extend its tax levy per cent on a comparable basis."

The question is, Mr. Sprague, what is a comparable basis?" Cisler wants to know.

"The resident of a city does not have special district taxes to pay; nor is he burdened with a special school tax. If, as Mr. Sprague now admits, and as we Nassau Democrats have long contended, Nassau County is indeed a city, then all the taxes I pay for Fire, Water, Garbage, Schools, Lighting and Park Districts, plus Police taxes, State Supreme Court taxes, and Town Highway taxes, must be considered in estimating the rate of the real county tax."

Cisler Own Tax Bill

"As a resident of Hicksville," Cisler continued, "my real county tax rate in 1950, for instance, was \$5 per \$100, not \$1.20 as Mr. Sprague states. As a County taxpayer, the 33 1/3 per cent tax levy increase now under consideration, threatens me not with a rise in possible 'county tax' from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per \$100 assessed valuation, but rather with a contemplated increase from \$5.50 to \$6.00 or a tax rate greatly in excess of that with which the taxpayers of a nearby municipality, New York City, are burdened."

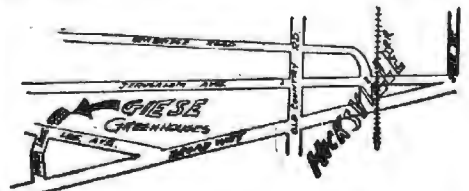



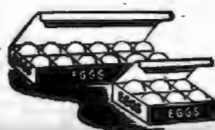
