Russel Sprague "has admitted that Nassau County is a city, he no longer can deliberately describe a small portion of the tax burden imposed on county residents as the "county tax." Cisier claims that the entire tax bill paid by property owners is in fact the "county tax."

Maurice L. Schoenwald, chairman of the county law committee of the Nassau County Liberal Party, and resident of 15 Gull Rd., released a statement regarding

"One-Third Increase" "We consider it inconsistent that the Republican party, which claims to be the party of economy, should ask for a 33% per cent county tax increase without adequate prior public discussion. It is our opinion that before such increases are established, it is the administration's obligation to the administration's obligation to the taxpayer to make a thorough exploration of means to eliminate current waste of funds, we feel, is exemplified by the employment of public servants on the basis of somoring party obligations instead of on the basis of efficiency." Schoenwald said the Liberals urged that the proposed tax increase be tabled until State Aid is sought.

The question ig Mr. Spragueu, what is a comparable basis," Cisler wants to know. "The resident of a city does not have special district taxes to pay; nor is he burdened with a special school tax. If, as Mr. Sprague now admits, and as we hassau Democrata have long contended, Nassau County is indeed a city, then all the taxes-I pay for Fire, Water, Garbage, Schools, Lighting and Park. Districts, plus Police taxes, State Supreme Court taxes, and Town offighway taxes, must be considered in estimating the rate of the real county tax. Cites Own Tax Bill

"As a resident of Hicksville," Cisier continued, "my real county tax rate in 1950, for instance, was \$5 per \$100, not \$1.20 as Mr. Sprague states. As a County tax-payer, the 33% per cent tax levy increase now under consideration. Threatens me now under consideration \$1.50 to \$2.00 per \$100 assessed valuation, but rather with a contemplated increase from \$5.50 to \$6.00 or a tax rate greatly in axcess of that with which the taxpayers of a nearby municipality. 

## Familiar Pattern Seen In Fuss About Signs

THE QUESTION of a couple of signs illegally stationed on township highways in Hicksville was played up all out of proportion to the importance of the issue this past week by

minority Levittown interests who have repeatedly accused us of formenting discord. Most reasonable people had felt the issue was settled for good when the Post Office Dept. on Oct. 3, 1951 officially set the boundary between Hicksville and Levittown along the township line.

The behind the scenes activity on the sign question is of more than passing interest. Oyster Bay township wrote to Levitt & Sons and said the signs erected on certain streets in Hicksville are there illegally. Would Levitt & Sons please remove same or permit the highway dept to do the job?

Whamo!

The township did not get a reply from Levitt. The builder, rather, apparently turned over the town's letter to Charles C. Miller, most vocal leader of the NLHOA. Miller spread the word to the Levittown papers and they took it from there. One paper called it a "petty ruling" gave it a five-column banner headline to say so!

The ferocity of Miller's statement makes us wonder if there is a real desire to end disputes and bickering. The NLHOA boys took the ball to Oyster Bay and got in on an unscheduled meeting, Friday, to plead Levitt's case.

We were not at the meeting but understand the argu-ments offered were varied. A favorite line of reasoning, often presented at times like these, was naturally repeated: Levittown is really a housing development just like Zelda Park. Other builders put up signs to mark their development, why not Levitt?

The answer is that (1) Levittown is not a housing development "like Zelda Park." It is recognized as a community and will soon have its own post office. (2) Levitt has finished building around here, according to announce-ments from Manhasset. There is no need to "advertise" for sales purposes. (3) Oyster Bay township has regulations governing billboards and development signs. Such signs may not be erected, even on private property, without a permit of the building dept. Levitt got no such permit.

Members of Hicksville service organizations are well aware of highway authority rules on signs. Kiwanis, Rotary and Lions Clubs have all been-refused permission to erect their roadside signs. Certainly no one would dream of saying the authorities are anti-Kiwanis (or Lions or Rotary) because of such decisions.

There is no argument, as we see it. The Town has decided the signs must be removed and people with faith in the officials they elect should expect to see the ruling carried out. A good hard winter might have done the same thing. We note that three signs of this type in the Town of Hempstead, along Jerusalem Ave., are now flattened.
