COMMUNITY HALL NOT INVOLVED: Pledge Public Hearing Before Verdict On Park District Split

ALBANY—Public officials emphasized this week that provision is made for a public hearing in proposed legislation which would permit division of Hicksville Park and Parking District. The original report on the bill, introduced last week on Monday, as received by the Herald made it plain that no public hearing before the Town Fathers would be necessary. Local civic want the hearing held in Hicksville.

Assemblyman John J. Burns, commenting upon the opposition of the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. to efforts to cut down the size of the parking district, wrote: "it was deemed desirable to enact legislation to permit the future disposition of the matter by the Town Board, after public hearing, and in which municipality such a determination properly belongs."

Roman Tells Workers:

Simpler Local Government Goal Of Incorporators

HICKSVILLE—Elimination of overlapping layers of government, so complex today as to be rarely understood by the average homeowner, and the coordination of all agencies for greater efficiency and economy is a basic reason for the current movement to incorporate, it was announced this week by Lawrence A. Roman of Notre Dame Ave., chairman of the Committee for Incorporation of Hicksville.

"Professional politicians charge that if we incorporate, we will be 'adding' another layer of government and additional taxes," Roman told volunteer workers on the committee last night (Tuesday) at a weekly report meeting. "The direct opposite is our aim. Today we have numerous special taxing districts, each operating with independent budgets and tax rates. Individually, they cost little to operate; but together on the tax statement they add to a considerable charge and burden."

"And yet," Roman added, "each unit now operates independent of all others. For example, water district equipment cannot be used for clearing streets of snow. On the other hand, township highway equipment cannot legally be used to maintain our parking fields."

"In modern incorporated villages, these services are grouped under the heading of a 'public works dept.' and manpower and equipment is used to the best overall advantage—at savings to the tax payers."

Roman suggested that homeowners might well question the motives and ambitions of those most vocal in opposition to incorporation—"are they concerned for the welfare of our community, or for their own political futures?"

The meeting marked the start of a renewed push to complete the signatures of property owners to consent petitions which will permit the question to come to a referendum vote. Weekly meetings will be held until the block-by-block petition circulation is concluded, Roman said. The assistance of all interested will be appreciated he added.
