## 4 Brush Death At Crossing

HICKSVILLE — Four local residents said they narrowly missed death at the East Marie St. railroad crossing when the gates were not lowered Thursday night. The car operated by Vincent Cramer of Cold Spring Harbor had entered upon the crossing when passenger Thomas Bergin of 111

Park Ave. spotted the west-bound diesel locomotive and shouted a warning to Cramer.

The engineer and conductor of the train, which stopped about 150 feet over the crossing, walked back to the crossing and roused a sleeping watchman, according to the report received by the Herald.

The train engineer told Cramer, who had his wife and Mr. and Mrs. Bergin as passengers, he saw the car entering the crossing in time to apply the brakes but could not stop till he had passed the crossing. —The Cramers and Bergins said they did not press charges against the watchman or LIRR.

## State To Widen B'way By 50 Feet

HICKSVILLE—Plans for the widening of North Broadway from John St. to Jericho Tpke. to a width of 100 feet have been developed by the State Public Works Dept., it was disclosed this week. Broadway is a state highway and widening of the entire road from Jericho to Massapequa, a 10-mile stretch, is contemplated in a project which is expected to take several years to conclude. The plans have been filed with John R. Brandt, Town Highway Superintendent, at his office in Oyster Bay.

At present plans for widening of North Broadway by the acquisition of an additional 50-foot strip on the East side have been developed from Jericho south to John St. intersection. Set back on new building construction have been established.

The route to be widened continues south from Old Country Rd., skipping the several blocks of the business section and engineers are said to be studying the possible use of Jerusalem Ave. or some alternate street to carry the state route around the business center.

No money has been appropriated for the Bway project as yet, it is understood. Also in the works is a plan to widen Newbridge Rd. to a width of 110 feet from the RR station south to Hempstead Tpke. as a state project also.

## Gas Conversion To Start Monday

MINEOLA — Long Island Lighting Co. gas conversion men will start work in Hicksville and vicinity, north, next Monday morning, Mar. 10, preparing the area for the introduction of natural gas, it was learned today. The job is expected to continue until Mar. 14 when the crews will move further south and go to work in Bethpage and Farmingdale.

The crews will visit every household which uses gas and make preliminary adjustments of all gas burning appliances. In some cases the ports or holes in gas burners will be drilled to a slightly larger size because natural gas burns more slowly but the appliances will continue to operate satisfactorily on the present manufactured gas. These facts were outlined at a

meeting of the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. Thursday night, by spokesmen from the Lighting Co.

Howard B. Wakeman, who spoke at the civic meeting, will be guest speaker on the same topic on Wednesday, Mar. 12, at the Hicksville Democratic Club meeting in the Legion Hall, E. Nicholas St. Thomas Powell, Democratic Club president, said that everyone is welcome to the meeting to hear the speakers.

The Lighting Co. crews will return to this area about July 1 to actually convert the supply from manufactured to natural gas. The cost of converting equipment to natural gas, Wakeman said this week, is being borne by the Lighting Co. and no bills will be rendered to customers for the work done on their premises.

There are about 3300 gas consumers in the section to be converted starting Mar. 10 and another 3300 in the area to be commenced on Mar. 14.

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

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

## 'Save Children Federation' Seeks Aid For Kids In Korea And Greece

Four projects by the "Save the Children Federation" in Tennessee, Finland, Korea and Greece, for Nassau County were announced, this week by Mrs. Robert Gillespie, chairman of the Bethpage area of Save the Children Federation.

"Membership in the Federation is open to anyone in the community for a \$1.00 fee which can be designated for a particular project or left to the judgement of the workers," Mrs. Gillespie said.

"For those who would rather do hand work, there is some knitting yarn available and some flannel-ette to be made into layettes," according to the local chairman.

The project in Tennessee is a school at the Bumpus Cane in Union County which needs \$72 to operate the school. The one-room, frame building with a pot-bellied stove and open spring for water, is seven miles from town in a mountainous region where zinc is mined. There are some desks, no shades, no lunch program because the school has no kitchen. The children are in need of glasses and medical attention.

Five children from that school have been adopted by families in this area to date. All that is required is some clothing, sweaters, socks and underwear. At Christmas time they enjoy receiving presents.

A school in Finland with 22 pupils needs \$150 for school supplies, warm clothing, high shoes as many are barefooted, and long woolen underclothes.

The Korean school where classes are held in the open field as there is no school building needs \$50 to purchase materials and books.

An entire village at Gannadion, Greece, is in need of care as few buildings are left and most of the animals have been killed. This town where tin cans are used for cooking utensils is in need of about \$765 a year to care for the 153 inhabitants. They need clothing, shoes, baby layettes, tools, blankets, lemons and food.

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
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

# More Parking Fields Likely

COUNCILMAN FRANK CHLUMSKY, speaking publicly at the Oyster Bay Town Board meeting this week, made several statements of real interest to local residents. He made them in his official capacity during the Board meeting with the approval of Supervisor Charles Ransom and the rest of the Board. He said:

- 1—Regarding the proposed park and parking district split, a public hearing on this question will be held in Hicksville, in the evening—as he previously promised at the Hicksville Civic Assoc. meeting in October—before a final decision is reached on this controversial question.
- 2—The Town Board is planning to provide commuter parking spaces near Hicksville station with use of such field limited to the residents of our Park and Parking District which finances such facilities. Presumably, this would be protected by the issuance of some kind of distinctive car tags.
- 3—The Town Board will take immediate action to find locations for additional shopper parking fields in Hicksville.
- 4—The Town Board will direct that the Lighting Co. make a survey to consider the cost and other facts in a possible conversion of Hicksville's 600-watt ornamental light fixtures on Broadway and other business streets to a newer-type light. The Board has been asked to consider the kind of light recently installed experimentally at Old Country Rd. and Levittown Pkway. intersection.

The occasion for Councilman Chlumsky's comments on these assorted subjects was the appearance at the meeting, on Tuesday, of eight members and officers of the Hicksville Business Men's Assoc., Inc., led by President Eugene Staller, in search of information about the progress of plans for more parking facilities.

The Town Board was reminded by BMA spokesmen of the tremendous home building in the area—with more to come. In the process, a request was voiced for painting out of parking stalls along the curbs at meter posts and in the parking fields now available opposite the firehouse and off West Marie St.

As a result, the Councilman will meet with a BMA committee to go over the available possible sites which can be developed into parking fields.

The statement was made at the meeting that the Huettner building at Marie St. and Bway, has been standing empty for several months now because, it is reported, various prospective tenants have been discouraged by the general shortage of off-street parking areas in Hicksville.

Among those present for the meeting, in addition to President Staller and Past President Pat Buffalino, were Vice President Myron Sausmer, former Vice president Phil Illman, Helmut Kraft, Joseph Weidman and Irwin Kenneth.

Supervisor Ransom revealed during the meeting with the BMA that the township is attempting to get control of the so-called Rail Road Plaza property at Hicksville station to permit resurfacing of the area and traffic control. The RR has asked \$60,000 for the property between Bway, and Jerusalem Ave. and the township, through its attorney, has a counter proposal that the area must be kept open to public use since it has been used as a "thoroughfare" for many, many years.

It was a busy day for the Town Board, Tuesday, with a number of contested zone change applications up for consideration. A hearing on a tract in Plainview brought forth a considerable audience of Plainview area residents objecting to the creation of a business zone and lowering of zoning on a tract out near the Suffolk-Nassau County Line.

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

## Account Of Freak Auto Mishap

Residents of Zelds Park were startled by a series of splintering crashes that brought many of them rushing from their homes Friday night.

The same crashes brought me to my back door with thoughts of a terrific head-on collision a half block away. Outside I was horrified to find the wreckage practically at my feet.

The back wall of my own garage, fence and clothesline pole were leveled in my neighbor's backyard and continuing from there I could see straight into the kitchen of the HOWARD EADS at 25 Libby Ave.

In the words of my husband who witnessed the entire scene it happened as follows:

"I pulled into the driveway of our garage about 7:15 p.m. With me were my father and his friend EDDIE O'CONNELL. I stepped

out of the car on my side to open the gate and raise the garage door while Eddie got out on his side. Suddenly the car started rolling. I leaped out of its path and watched it plow through the four section door, splinter past the ladder and garden tools, jump out through the back and smash out through the base of the garage tearing the clothes pole and fence with it.

"The car careened over the LUTZ'S property, on over to the SKIDMORE property and crashed into the kitchen of the EADS' house with Pop still inside the car! My shouts of "step on the brake" roused him to action and he stopped the car before any further damage was done. I ran to the car to find Pop getting out unassisted — he must have been stunned with the very first impact."

A hurried check determined no one in the Eads' home was injured and my father-in-law was apparently alright but dazed and shaken. Arthur brought the car back to our driveway and we began to inspect the damage. The car itself was in miraculously good condition. Its bumper, buckled only slightly with the impacts, prevented the car from being demolished and my father-in-law seriously injured or killed. We were mighty grateful for that.

The garage door was shattered, the entire back wall ripped out and canned goods which had been stored on its shelf were scattered. Except for the damaging of a few trees on the two adjoining properties, both houses were intact. But the EADS' house suffered extensive damage. The whole kitchen wall was pushed in, breaking the sink, plumbing, cabinets etc. It was fortunate that my father-in-law's quick thinking avoided the car from smashing into the bath-

room where the children were being bathed.

Immediate action on Arthur's part brought a contractor to the EADS home within an hour and arrangements made for repairs. The carpenters were on the job at 8 a.m. the next day. By 11 a.m. the wall was rebuilt and a new door put on, making the house weather-proof despite complications of a raging snowstorm outside. Plumbers and electricians were on the scene too restoring the use of the sink and electricity.

All in all we were badly shocked but also grateful that it wasn't worse. Arthur, if he hadn't leaped out of the path of the car would have been crushed to death. So this nightmare ended and a blanket of snow covered much of the ugliness of the night before.

The initial action cannot be condoned. Nor will it happen again. Harold Manaskie, President of the PBC, would not pay the fine out of the treasury and made the players get up a dollar apiece.

It was a sound lesson for the players that if they want to play the game they should not consider funny any foolishness that detracts from business operation of the club.

Bob Thomas of Syosset who was a track star at Hicksville High School a few years ago lost a decision to Jackie Surgeon, New York City flyweight champion, in the Eastern Golden Gloves Championship at Ridgewood Grove, Monday afternoon.

Thomas was extremely popular two years ago when he scored three straight victories in the LI Golden Gloves and this season he started late but won the Island title and was one of six Long Islanders to make the Eastern Champions which has its final bouts tonight in Madison Square Garden.

# Comets' Fight To Block 5th Bayman Fag Repelled 62-40

HICKSVILLE—For fourteen sensational minutes, here Friday night, Hicksville High stayed with the powerhouse from Oyster Bay but just at the point where the courageous Comets had the roaring crowd convinced that their uphill fight did not have to be in vain, the Baymen bolted to a nine point lead thus rocketing to a 62-40 victory and fifth straight NSAL Eastern Division championship.

It was the Baymen's 28th consecutive triumph and the Comets second loss in 16 starts on the season.

The game Comets did make a real fight of the issue just as they did the entire season. They were counted out of the race after dropping the opening game to the Baymen back in January, but despite the fact that they lost five varsity players via graduation a month ago, they stayed in the fight and won every game on the slate.

Earlier last week the Comets assured that their game with the Baymen would have a bearing on the championship when they defeated Sea Cliff 56-41.

### McCarthy Fires Comets

The Baymen weren't exactly worried, but they were surprised to find the Comets just one step behind them on the final day of the season. Worry lines started to show when their brilliant veteran, Whitey Seeler, fouled out early in the second period. They became deeply etched when Stan Kellner slashed in a jump shot from the bucket after six minutes of the second period to tie the score 18-16.

John McCarthy fired the Comets in the first stanza with three one hand push shots from the middle that kept the Comets even with the visitors.

Coach Chet Jaworski rigged his offense to take advantage of the attention he knew the Baymen would pay his scoring star Dick Alcock. The visitors were zealous to overload on Alcock's side and that left it open for McCarthy to hit from the middle, Kellner to pop from the bucket, which he did nicely, and the other forward position was also set up for a good deal of shooting.

Two thirds of the intentions were carried out and Hicksville looked cool as it hammered in basket for basket with the heavily favored visitors.

Oyster Bay lead 12-10 at the end of the quarter and the crowd of 450 persons—the majority of them Comet supporters—gave the Orange a thundering ovation when the period closed.

The Baymen jumped into a five point lead early in the second stanza but as mentioned before Kellner knotted the count 18-18.

Immediately after this Ray DeLay committed his third personal and Jaworski withdrew him so that the backboard fighter would not

spend another foul before the half.

In the unchecked rough house that ensued Oyster Bay asserted its physical power under the boards and flipped in 11 points while Alcock counted with the only Hicksville basket.

The score was 29-20 at halftime and although the Comets came out briskly with two buckets in the third period Frank Carl of the Baymen went completely wild with five baskets in the quarter and Hicksville's bid was leaked.

DeLay fouled out in the third period and big Reg Giddens had a free reign under the boards as he scored 21 points although Carl's spree earned him scoring honors with 22 points.

Coach Dick Crawley's defense once again completely bottled up the scoring of Alcock.

The winners had a 20-point lead early in the fourth period. The insertion of Mort Rosser into the lineup injected new fight in the Comets and on his efforts reduced the margin to 18 points but the edge went up later as Hicksville was disorganized in the final minutes.
