DEWEY GETS PROTEST

Find Town Can Limit Pool Use Without District Split

HICKSVILLE—Opposition to the proposal to whittle down the size of Hicksville's Park and Parking District and surrender one-third of the community to Levittown was carried to Governor Thomas E. Dewey at Albany this week. A bill which will permit Oyster Bay Township to break down the Hicksville community area breezed through the State Legislature and went to the Governor late last week. Opponents put through a call to the Governor's office, Saturday, and followed it up with telegrams.

Further opposition to the measure developed this week from the area which would be chopped off from Hicksville. George W. Kunz of Arcadia La., in a letter to the HERALD questioned the motives of the sponsors stating "Perhaps, it is intended that there should be rancor and bitterness, and that the Hicksville Park District be partitioned, not to protect the residents' rights to the swimming pools, but merely to add a slice to Levittown".

The objections registered with Gov. Dewey were made by the Hicksville Civic Assoc. in accord with the decision made at a meeting last October when it was voted to oppose piece-meal butchery of the community.

Miller Provides Plan

Kunz in his letter said "it seems to me that Charles Miller, president of the North Levitt Home Owners Assoc., in speaking before the South Hicksville Assoc. of Levitt Home Owners on the question of partition of the Hicksville Park and Public Parking District, contributed a valuable formula, application of which might easily, quickly and amicably solve the whole problem of retention of the restricted right to the swimming pools of the Levitt houses in the Hicksville area.

"Mr. Miller referred, to Section 64, para 8 of the Town Law, and emphatically asserted that a donor (Levitt) could make a gift (swimming pools) to a Park District with 'strings' attached. The section reads:

"Gifts to Town (The Town Board) may take by gift, grant, bequest or devise and hold real and personal property absolutely or in trust for parks or gardens, or for the erection of statues, monuments, buildings or structures, or for any public use, upon such terms or conditions as may be prescribed by the grantor or donor and accepted by said town, and provide for the proper administration of the same."

Can Restrict Use Now

"If agreement on the terms of acceptance of the swimming pools has been tentatively reached between Levitt and the Town Board—and it would be reasonable to assume from Mr. Miller's emphatic assertion that the gift could be made with 'strings' attached—then the Town Board could accept them for the restricted use of the inhabitants of the Levitt houses, taxing only them for the maintenance of the pools, without partition of the Hicksville, Park and Parking District. If the Town Board is

Gas Conversion Working South

Gas conversion crews will continue in the area of Hicksville (south of the LIRR), Levittown, Bethpage and Farmingdale during the period from today (Mar. 13) thru Mar. 19, excluding Sunday, the Long Island Lighting Co. announced. Crews were working throughout Hicksville and north to Syosset and East Norwich during the past week. The men will call upon 3,975 gas consumers in the section to make preliminary adjustment of all gas burning appliances without cost to the customers.

The crews will return in June or July to make the actual conversion of the supply to natural gas piped to the metropolitan area from Texas, the utility company stated.

Brilliant Recital By Young Pianist

Hicksville Community Concert Assoc. presented Monahem Pressler in a recital of piano music on Feb. 21 at the High School. These concerts are designed to bring to smaller towns and country areas, accomplished artists performing good music by the great composers of the classical, romantic, and modern schools.

Mr. Pressler is an artist with a commanding technique, a wide, dynamic range, fingers of steel and considerable temperament. In view of such a complete equipment, it was surprising that he disappointed in the pieces of a lyrical nature.

The Rakoczy March of Liszt was a magnificent tour de force and in contrast he achieved a gossamer-like delicacy in Debussy's Chromatic Study which was truly bewitching. It was Rachmaninoff who said "Without technique there is no interpretation." Mr. Pressler has the technique; it was therefore disappointing to listen to a pedestrian performance of Debussy's Claire de Lune in which the chords in triplets were not made to "float" and the rubato was choppy and to

the same composer's Grieg with the Flaxen Hair, delivered quietly but with very little poetic feeling.

Bach's Chorale - Prelude - Jenu-Joy of Man's Desiring, at the commencement of the programme, began so well with a lovely legato and promised so much in the lyrical sense only to become over-loud as the chorale emerged.

Of the three pieces by Mendelssohn which followed, the Spinning Wheel was the best—a wonderful performance—but what happened to the Spring Song? This charming salon piece with its blithe, carefree, sunny melody, seldom heard on the concert platform, was not played allegretto grazioso (as it should be) but almost adante. It was repressed, studied, calculated and the final measures which skip along the keyboard so prettily were played increasingly reluctantly to end with a gravely performed final cadence!

Mendelssohn's fairy music—the Scherzo in E Minor of 16, was magical in its swift staccato and clear

articulation but the fortissimo recitatives became snarling and clanging. Lockwood would have said, "possibly it was intended for father fairies!" Here, the piano may have been at fault as it inclined towards harshness.

The programme included an early Allegro of Schumann, Op. 8; two Etudes from Chopin's Op. 10, the same composer's E Minor Waltz and B-flat Minor Scherzo; Liszt's Liebestraum No. 3 (the popular one), and Rachmaninoff's G Minor Prelude from Op. 23.

In the Liebestraum, the artist's apparent desire to avoid sentimentality was overdone and robbed the performance of expressive thoughtfulness. It was begun too hurriedly and the flowing accompaniment seemed to be practically absent. The first and last sections of the Rachmaninoff were handled in a brilliant manner—the lyrical middle section was disappointing as were the more lyrical sections of Chopin's great B-flat Minor Scherzo; the bravura sections and the rapid coda were delivered in fine style. The E Minor Waltz was variable and in the first of the two Studies (Etudes), the harmonic texture was sacrificed to the melodic line in the opening and closing melody—the latter part of the middle section was excellent. Like the Rakoczy March of Liszt, the Revolutionary Study, the second of the two Etudes from Chopin's Op. 10, was a veritable tour de force.

The encores included Debussy's "Golliwog's Cake Walk," Liszt's "Music Box" and the Brahms' "Cradle Song"; the Lisztov, in particular, was charming.

One felt a sympathy for the artist with regard to the noises in the auditorium, the loud banging of outer doors and the late arrival of several children after the interval. These faults should be prevented in future recitals.

He also teaches at the Melitosh School of Music in Rockville Centre. Mr. Scott plans to give a recital in this area before returning to England for a visit.

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

**Old Country Rd
Needs Lighting**

TWO PEOPLE HAVE DIED as the result of accidents on Old Country Rd., Hicksville, in recent weeks and the absence of adequate street lighting along this extremely busy traffic artery can be considered a major contributing factor. This past week an elderly woman was fatally injured when she was struck down at about eight o'clock in the evening. The driver of the car told police he did not see the woman until it was too late.

Residents in the vicinity of Old Country Rd. and Underhill Ave. have been campaigning for the installation of more adequate street lighting on this highway. They have also been asking for a decent speed limit and traffic signals. Petitions have gone to the Town Board without apparent result. There has also been a campaign to get a traffic signal a little further west at Levittown Pkway intersection.

A quick check this week disclosed that there are low power street lights along Old Country Rd. starting at Newbridge Rd. and proceeding west. The lights, many of them heavily shaded by trees, are located at long intervals—some fewer than one to a block.

Old Country Rd. has become an important east-west traffic channel, jammed with cars and heavy trucks. Immediate action by the authorities to prevent further loss of life is imperative.

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

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

Can You Afford to Look Pained?

Was you dere, Scharley? No? Well, then remove that mask of pain and righteous indignation and stop recriminating. You're one of those guys we've all met before. One of those "the country's going to pot" guys who never has time to vote, attend civic meetings or fulfill your community responsibilities.



In other words, brother, you're the streetcorner legal brain with all the answers—provided no one asks you to leave your comfortable living room for an evening to meet with your fellow residents to plan for the community good. Now stop popping your baby-blue eyes; close your mouth and pay attention for a minute:

Last year at the annual public hearing of the Plainview School District held for the purpose of adopting, revising or rejecting the proposed school budget, ten out of a possible 500 persons showed up to discuss and decide on the budget. Shortly after, when the approved budget was made public, the roar

of complaint that swept across Plainview was comparable to the big wind of several years back. Of particular interest, and a common right in these parts at that time, was the "I've been stabbed" expression adorning the heretofore shining faces of the residents.

Maybe it'll happen again this year. Who knows? At the end of this month — the date will be announced later — the Plainview school board will again hold its annual budget meeting and judging by last year's attendance about 40 should be present. Forty out of approximately 1,000!

At the present time, the tax bite for schools in this community is \$3.43 per \$100, and going up. Figures on just how high it will rise will be available soon. Perhaps some idea of the new rate will be revealed at the public hearing.

At any rate, and from what I can learn, the greatest portion of the tax jump can be attributed to teachers' increments, transportation and debt service. Another factor is the tuition paid for high school students attending Hicksville and Oyster Bay. It's \$150 a student in Hicksville and \$250 for those attending Oyster Bay.

This new budget coming up for approval is not the end product it

self. It can only become final upon the approval of the residents. So when you receive notice of the public hearing, which is to be held sometime around the end of March; get out of that easy chair; get over to the meeting and say your piece. It's your pocketbook, brother.

Things we've just learned: That title search on our new 16-acre school site will be completed about March 15. . . . that about 20 architects have submitted plans for our proposed new school and that the new school as far as students and teachers go, is about a year and a half away.

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



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Loop Bus Route Starting Today

Hello Folks:

I've got good news for you today. The Hendrickson Bus Co. is starting its new line today (Thursday, Mar. 13). At long last, we'll be able to get into Hicksville without hiking all the way up to Old Country Rd. The bus route will be as follows: Starting in Hicksville on Broadway in front of Ferro's Real Estate office right near the tracks, it will run along Broadway, slightly past Grumman Aircraft to Central Ave., where it will turn north and head up South Oyster Bay Rd. to Woodbury Rd. From Woodbury Rd., every second bus will run into Syosset and back to Woodbury Rd. and from there head down Woodbury Rd. into Hicksville. In other words, the bus will run in a circle. Those of us wanting to go into town can catch the bus on South Oyster Bay Rd. and will travel to Woodbury Rd. and on into town.
