Collect Mail On Sunday Also

HICKSVILLE — A Sunday mail collection service in Hicksville Postal District, which includes Levittown, has started, it was announced yesterday by Postmaster William G. Mollitor. Each Sunday, starting about 12 noon, mail in 74 boxes on three collection routes will be brought into the Post Office, sorted and dispatched out-of-town on a train leaving here about 8:30 p.m. The time for collection on Sundays, as well as other days of the week, is posted on each of the 74 boxes, Mollitor added.

Unverhau's Moving Next Week

HICKSVILLE — Unverhau's Drug Store, which has been a landmark in the community at the corner of Broadway and Marie St. for almost three decades, will move to 184 Broadway next week, it was learned today. Curt Unverhau, owner, said there will be no interruption in service for patrons during the moving which starts about Apr. 7. He has been operating a second, auxiliary store at the new address for several months. The building in which Unverhau's has been located was for many years owned by the Heuttnera. Before it became a drugstore it was the original quarters of the Long Island National Bank and for that reason still has bars on the rear windows. The property was recently acquired by Jack and David Youdelman.

Half Of Families Are Catholic

HICKSVILLE — There are 2,258 Catholic families in the 4,536 homes in the new Holy Family Roman Catholic parish which embraces sections of Hicksville (south of Old Country Rd.), Levittown, East Meadow and Westbury, largely Levitt-built homes, it was disclosed today. Edward Collins of 38 Hope Lane, chairman of a parish census committee, disclosed that 97 per cent of the homes in the area have been contacted. On the basis of a sample survey of 800 of the 2,280 families it is believed that there are at least 4,250 Catholic children of which 2,800 are pre-school age. The parish will build a church on Newbridge Rd. near Cherry Lane.

New Columbia Report Warns

Over-Building For 12,000 Pupils May Cost \$9 Million

HICKSVILLE—While the community will have about 12,000 pupils in the local public schools by 1960, if the present home building rate continues, it will find that 10 or 12 years later there are only 8,500 pupils. To build permanent-type facilities for the peak enrollment could cost Hicksville nearly \$9,000,000 for extra space which probably could only be used effectively for a dozen years. Whether the people want to tax themselves for nine million dollars worth of vacant space is up to the people of Hicksville to decide.

This is among the conclusions made in the new supplemental report to the Columbia Study of Hicksville School District released this week. The new supplement, dated Mar. 19, reviews developments since Columbia made a complete study and report for Hicksville District in 1950.

The supplement recommends that the district proceed "as rapidly as possible" to provide permanent-type facilities for about 8,500 pupils. This would require, in addition to schools now under construction, plans for eight-room additions to Fork Lane, Dutch Lane, Old Country Rd. and Burns Ave. elementary schools (these four buildings of 10 rooms each are now under construction and are expected to be ready in the fall), a 20-room elementary school on Woodland Ave. (north-east section, off Woodbury Rd.), and two more elementary schools (one around New South Rd. and the other off Division Ave.).

Further, the new report urges purchase of 20 more acres south of the new high school site between Division Ave. and Newbridge Rd. to allow room there for an elementary school also. Also recommended is a new senior high school.

Recall 'Free Pool' Use Promised In Levitt Ads

HICKSVILLE—Levitt & Sons in newspaper advertisements promised home purchasers here the "free use" of swimming pools and thus has a responsibility to the homeowner of the area, it was determined at a meeting of the South Hicksville Assoc. of Levitt Home Owners, Tuesday night. The SHALHO went on record opposed to the split in Hicksville Park and Parking District, now proposed. The civics will ask the Levitt organization to fulfill the pledge of "free swimming pools".

SHALHO also went on record opposed to any move to change the post office designation from Hicksville to Levittown, currently being sought by another group, and to the designation of the area by a "Levittown" phone exchange instead of Hicksville.

WARN OF TAX LOAD

The South Hicksville group will carry a message to every home in the area giving warning of over-powering increased tax costs, which it felt have been grossly misrepresented by advocates of the park district split, if Levitt & Sons is permitted to "shrug off responsibility" for the upkeep and operation

Trucks Replace Train On Parcels

HICKSVILLE—For the first time in history regular scheduled daily parcel post shipments are arriving here at the Post Office from Flushing via huge, brand new, freight-car sized trailer trucks. The service began on Tuesday, Apr. 1, with a shipment of about 100 sacks of parcel post for the local office, according to Postmaster William G. Mollitor.

A fleet of 40 trucks are now carrying parcel post out on the Island. The material was previously transported exclusively by the Long Island Rail Road.

The truck is making two daily trips out to Hicksville, Bethpage and Farmingdale from Flushing, returning to the City with city-bound shipments. First class mail will continue to arrive daily via LIRR, it was reported.

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Can't Ignore Regrouping

REGROUPING OF SCHOOL DISTRICTS is proposed in a report of the Nassau County School Study Committee which has been working since the fall of 1950. Of particular interest in the mid-Island area are these facts:

There is no suggestion of consolidation involving Hicksville, Levittown (Jerusalem District No. 5), or Jericho.

There is a recommendation that Bethpage, Old Bethpage, Plainview, Island Trees and Plainedge get together or that Plainview, Old Bethpage and Bethpage form a new unit and a second group be constructed with Island Trees and Plainedge.

Of more than passing interest to us is the fact that suggestions for regrouping of districts involving some of these mid-Island school districts have been kicking around for years. Most recently, former Bethpage School Board members Charles Schwarz and Henry Strauber were criticized in some quarters for proposing and working for a merger of Bethpage and Island Trees (and we believe it included Plainedge.) That was only a few years ago.

Back in 1943-44 there was a strong movement toward merger of districts involving Bethpage, Plainedge, Island Trees, Old Bethpage. This plan did not include Plainview but it did embrace Farmingdale and District No. 15, Melville, Town of Huntington.

Bethpage is now preparing to start on a program of providing a high school program for its students. Island Trees has started building a junior high school. Plainedge, Old Bethpage and Plainview are busy trying to keep abreast of the elementary school enrollment which threatens to engulf their facilities.

We don't wish to pass judgment upon the proposed merger of local districts. However, it does appear obvious that something must be done along these lines. As the report just released points out "the alternative to an orderly district reorganization is to drift into a high school in every present school district in the County. To permit this to happen would in effect allow the 1812 school district system to continue to dictate the present and future district machinery."

The formation of local committees of lay citizens in each district is recommended by the Report to gather data and formulate long-range plans. The suggestion can not be overlooked. It deserves prompt action and attention.

You Must Register To Vote

ALL VOTERS in Hicksville School District who hope to vote upon the annual school and library budgets on May 6 and upon the election of a school trustee for a three year term on May 7, must register.

Previous registrations are out the window with the new school fiscal year. Registration of voters this year will be held in Hicksville High School, instead of Nicholas St. School in previous years. The dates and hours are: Saturday, April 19, 3 to 9 p.m.; Friday, April 25, 4 to 8 p.m.; and Saturday, April 26, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Keep open the night of Tuesday, April 22, at 8 o'clock at the High School when a preliminary discussion on the Hicksville School Budget will take place. This is your opportunity to ask questions and get the answers.

It's about the best way for them to determine what they really want to do in their own garden, according to Prof. C. B. Raymond who heads the home garden planning committee at Cornell.

Most seed concerns already have mailed out their annual catalogs and the College of Agriculture at Cornell has a good supply of a new garden bulletin to mail to gardeners who request it from the Mailing Room, Roberts Hall, Ithaca, N. Y.

Called "Gardens for Better Living," (No. 869), it includes recommendations on the production of all the important vegetables grown in the State and on four of the most popular garden fruits. The control of diseases and insects of each crop is also given and gardeners who have been troubled with rodents or other wild life also will find many suggestions.

A valuable part of the bulletin was contributed by the foods and nutrition department of the College of Home Economics. Members of the staff worked out recommendations on the best use of vegetables and small fruits in meal planning.

Gardeners who want more details on individual crops can obtain brief bulletins on them from the Mailing Room.

Still more information is available from the College to gardeners who want to enroll in a Home Study Course of ten lessons. Additional information about this can be obtained by writing to Farm Study Courses, Roberts Hall, Ithaca, N. Y.

With Charlie Rosengren, Harold Manaskie and Reggie Jedorowski leading the attack, the Hicksville PBC Alumni defeated Hempstead 78-56 for the 1952 Alliance League championship. It was the third title for coach Steve Ruggiero. He guided the Kiwanis club to the 1948 Northern Division title and won the Alliance trophy last season operating then under the banner of the Hicksville Lions. . . . Rosengren was merely sensational in the first half registering 17 points on deadly one hand pushes. Midway in the second period, Hicksville fell behind by five points but Charlie pumped in four straight baskets to get the PBC over the critical period and it was never headed again. . . . The Champions will be feted by the league at its annual Dinner-Dance in the Wheatley Hills Tavern, Thursday night. . . . Not one Hicksville name was recorded on the first two All Star ballots turned into the league and if a local player is named the Most Valuable in the loop it will be vastly unexpected. Manaskie's late season performance and particularly his work in the playoffs should make him a strong candidate but he joined the club in the second half and most likely will be disregarded for that reason. . . . Chet Jaworski appeared briefly in the final game and had just enough part in the contest to score the club's 2000th league point of the year. . . . The Alumni played 24 games, won 20 and lost 4, scored 2018 points to the opposition's 1498. . . . Doug Jones dropped in three nice sets from the side in the third period and one can understand what Jaworski means when he says the Hicksville players are a year away from realizing their ability. Like Ted Schwarting, Jones is improving with every game since he left high school. . . .

Hicksville Rejects Eastern Shore League Invitation

HICKSVILLE—Botto Bros. Softball team early this week rejected a bid from President Dan Belcastro of the Eastern Shore Softball League to replace the Grumman Yankees in the 1952 operation of the newly formed loop. Belcastro's earnest bid to Hicksville softball bigwigs came twelve hours after the Grumman Yankees were disbanded by the Bethpage factory in a move that stunned most of the Island and the softball nation.

In recent years, Hicksville has had a striking effect on the Nassau County softball picture. It has turned out many hometown softball players and, combined with a few out of towners, has recorded hundreds of victories in fast competition.

Belcastro had hoped that the strong backbone the game has received in these parts would serve as a springboard to a broadening of interest but after thoughtful consideration the bid was rejected.

CONSIDERABLE TRAVEL

In an interview with the HERALD Manager Bernis McGunnigle stated the offer had to be turned down, "Because there was just too much travel involved for our players. Sixteen games would have been a minimum schedule and Newburgh and New Rochelle in New York State and New Haven and Stamford in Conn. Each wanted at least four home dates apiece."

The fact that Hicksville did not have a home field entered the picture but Belcastro assured local interests that Glen Cove or Freeport stadiums could be had for a small rental if approached properly.

The only money involved would have been a \$250.00 forfeit fee which would have been returnable after the season was completed. The entire amount would not have been lost for failure to make a game.

Since most of the local players have varied jobs and many are married, the proposed week-end swings would have been impossible.

According to the league plan a swing would consist of a Friday night date at New Haven or Stamford, a move over to New Rochelle for a Saturday night date and then a run to Newburgh for a Sunday afternoon encounter.

Those teams were to comprise the Southern half of the League while five teams in Massachusetts would operate in the Northern Division.

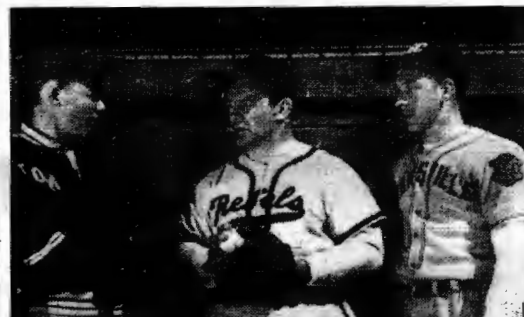
A playoff between the two division winners was scheduled for late August at the alternate victor representing the loop at the World's Championship in September which will be held at Bridgeport, Conn.

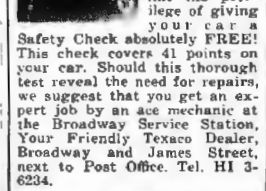
