Call Forum For Monday Night On Split Park District Question

HICKSVILLE—A forum meeting upon the proposal to split the Park and Parking District and its significance to the more than 6,000 property owners involved will be held next Monday night, April 14, in the high school auditorium. Mead C. Dobson, managing director of The Long Island Association, has consented to serve as moderator for this "town meeting". There will be three speakers and opportunity for questions from the audience. The meeting will start at 8:15 o'clock.

Gov. Signs Bill
Gov. Thomas E. Dewey late last week signed the bill which will allow Oyster Bay Town Board to hold a public hearing on the proposal that Hicksville Park and Parking District may be cut down in size, paving the way for creation of a new Park District embracing only the Levitt-built homes in Hicksville. The Town Board is not expected to set a public hearing date until after its next regular meeting on Tuesday, Apr. 15, according to Town Clerk Leslie C. Disbrow.

Since there must be at least 10 days advance notice of the hearing, the official Town Board consideration of the proposal is not expected to take place until the end of this month.

To crystallize opinion and bring the issues involved to the attention of all interested — local property owners who may be confronted with a change in their tax burden because of a split in the district — the "town meeting" or forum has been scheduled for next Monday night.

Expected to take part in the meeting are the South Hicksville Association of Levitt Home Owners, the North Levittown Home Owners Assoc. and the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc.

This weekend circulars will be distributed throughout the Levitt-area in Hicksville urging the public to attend. Residents will be warned that "taxes are likely to increase" and that the meeting Monday night will provide the opportunity to find out the full facts. Widespread radio and press advertisement of the meeting is being sought by the sponsors.

Gov. Dewey in signing the bill attached a memorandum which notes that the Nassau County Attorney had written his approval of the measure and that enactment of the law was requested by Oyster Bay Town Board. He noted "the bill is permissive in form. It will enable resolution of a local problem by the Town Board."

The county attorney was quoted: "The enactment of this bill would permit the town to hold a public hearing and explore the question, with power to divide the district (Hicksville Park and Parking District, which is cited by name), if, after a full consideration such division should be deemed in the best interests of the people of the district as a whole."

The three panel speakers are expected to concentrate upon three phases: (1) division of the district as it concerns the district as a whole, (2) support for division of the district, and (3) opposition to the division.

School Board Race Narrows Down To Szendy vs Mrs Apicella

HICKSVILLE—The contest for election of a school board member for a three-year term starting July 1 today had apparently narrowed down to two candidates for the single vacancy. They are Emil J. Szendy of 5 Walnut Lane and Mrs. Antoinette J. Apicella of 340 Ace Lane as other candidates mentioned withdrew from the field.

Election of a trustee will be held in the high school on Wednesday, May 7, from 4 to 9 p.m. Voter registration will be held Apr. 19, 25 and 26 at the high school.

Mrs. Apicella is the mother of two children and a native Long Islander. She was employed until her marriage as a construction cost and material analyst for the Shell Oil Co. Previously, she was a time study engineer for the International Projector Corp.

She is a member of the Nicholas St. P.T.A., Education Assoc. of District 17, North Levittown Home-owners Assoc., Holy Family Parish Women's Group, League of Women Voters and a CD Air Raid Warden. Her husband, Anthony, is superintendent of maintenance and construction for a large LI electronics manufacturing company. A veteran, he is chief air raid warden of the Hicksville-Plainview CD.

HICKSVILLE—New officers of the fire dept. will be seated during the regular meeting next Monday night at the firehouse. Edward R. Schluter, Jr., of Co. 3 has been elected Chief, replacing Stanford Weiss of Co. 5 who was not a candidate for re-election after serving two terms.

Lawrence Hattle of Co. 4 was elected second assistant chief, Monday night, in the only contest of the department election. He received 64 votes. Louis Saueracker of Co. 2 got 23 votes and Fred Masters, Jr., of Co. 5, sixteen votes.

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
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
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Prayer To Start Each School Day

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

The Home HANDYMAN'S CORNER

OUTDOOR FIREPLACE

An outdoor grill and fireplace is an exciting idea for informal parties as well as being useful the entire summer and fall. It's especially so with the men of the family who want to prove their culinary skills. Before determining the size of the grill it is wise to buy the iron fireplace first, (an iron box-like contraption with doors). Decide on the proper location and exposure to the wind. Then excavate 10 or 12 inches deep around the outside dimensions. Fill the bottom with cinders, tamp them to a solid level base for the bottom of the pit. Firmly set the brick or stone in a cement mortar mixture. Build the brick or masonry walls around the iron box and before you know it you're in business. A fireplace has a number of advantages over a grill. It gives a more even heat and it carries the smoke away. It will handle two or three cooking trays and a spit. Then too, with a few colored slates you can build a sort of terrace in front to complete the idea.

WE SINCERELY URGE all property owners of Hicksville School District to attend the forum meeting at the high school next Monday night, April 14, starting at 8:15. The boundary of the Park and Parking District is the same as the 6.5 square mile school district—thus if you live in the school district you are concerned with the proposed split in the Parking District.

This will be an opportunity to hear all sides of the question. This is not a question which concerns the Levitt homeowners alone. The district was created to do two jobs: (1) establish and maintain public parking fields for shoppers and commuters, and (2) establish and maintain public parks and park areas throughout the district.

We are opposed to splitting the district, as regular readers of this department are aware. However, we believe that you as a property owner should come out for this meeting and hear the arguments for yourself—for and against splitting the district.

The Town Board obviously favors the split. So does the County of Nassau. Both authorities asked the Governor to sign the bill permitting this to happen, eventually. The Town Board must still hold a public hearing before acting, but you can't express an opinion on this issue unless you know the facts—hence the "town meeting" or forum next Monday.

There will be NO VOTING on this question. About the end of this month or early in May the Town Board will hold its official hearing and, based upon what is said then, will reach a decision to divide, or not divide the district.

Our position is that if you don't want to see Hicksville cut down about one-third in size and valuation (increasing taxes in the process), and don't want to postpone the day when it will be economically possible to do something about commuter parking and park areas, then you must oppose the split. Furthermore, the swimming pools Levitt built are not a part of the issue because there has been no official offer, and Levitt promised the FREE USE of the pools to the people to whom he sold the houses. To transfer them to a taxing district is to make the homeowner pay for something he was promised without cost.

Come out Monday night and bring your questions.

EDUCATION AID FOR KOREAN VETS: The House of Representatives Committee on Veterans Affairs has been holding extensive hearings on edu-

cational aid and training benefits for Korean veterans. Veterans organizations strongly endorsed educational aid and training as generally outlined, with some amendments, in the Toque bill. The committee was urged to adopt premise that any legislation approved should be Federal education aid for veterans rather than Federal aid for education. It was strongly suggested that educational aid not be considered as general benefit by reason of service but as special assistance to those veterans whose educational programs had been interrupted or deferred by reason of military service. Recommended that under such a limited program subsistence allowances be increased and that education and training be confined to courses and trades which would benefit the national economy rather than avocational training.

It was also recommended extending home and business loans to Korean veterans but did not press for extension of readjustment allowances, sometimes referred to as 52-20 unemployment payments. The Committee was also advised that consideration is being given by House Ways and Means Committee and U.S. Department of Labor to granting unemployment insurance coverage for military personnel to make them eligible, upon release from active duty, for payment of unemployment benefits if otherwise eligible. The Committee was warned that heavy cost of fringe veteran benefits tends to destroy fundamental benefits and as proof pointed to recent action of committee in rejecting a bill which would make age 65 a pensionable age, subject to income limitations, for World War I and II veterans. It is predicted the present Congress will grant some form of educational aid and training, as well as home and business loans, to Korean veterans.

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
