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Town Sets May 9 For Parking Split

OYSTER BAY—The Town Board will hold a public hearing in Hicksville High School auditorium on Friday night, May 9, starting at 8 o'clock upon the proposal to chop down the size of Hicksville by about one-third, thru reduction in the size of the park and parking district and creation of a new North Levittown Park District, it was learned yesterday. The form of the meeting notice was not available immediately but is expected to provide for a hearing upon a resolution of the Board dividing Hicksville from "Levittown" along Old Country Rd. instead of the Township line.

Phone Co. Puts 900 Out Of Town

The telephone numbers for about 900 Hicksville residents will be changed to "Levittown" exchange on Sunday, May 11, Mother's Day, it was learned this week. There are about that number of instruments in Hicksville now in the "Hicksville 5" exchange affected by the total change over from "Hicksville 5" to Levittown 3 and 9. The two new exchanges embrace an area around Levittown, including East Meadow, portions of Bethpage, Plainedge, Wantagh, North Bellmore and vicinity. Protests by civic groups in these areas to the phone company and Public Service Commission have been unsuccessful to date. With the change over will come the operation of dial systems in the new exchanges.

Order All CD Forces Out For State Alert

All Civil Defense volunteers are ordered to report for duty this Saturday morning, Apr. 26, starting at 9 o'clock to take part in a state-ordered Nassau County test alert. When the air raid signal sounds at 9 a.m. (the signal is 99 in Hicksville), all vehicles will be stopped and the public will be directed to take shelter for 10 minutes until the all-clear is heard.

Since it will be assumed an atomic bomb has blasted over Hempstead, local fire fighters will be called to assist, Hicksville and Jericho will send pumpers to a nearby assembly point before 9 o'clock and will take part in a drill at the Mineola Fair grounds.

The current tax rate is \$2.59 per \$100 and the net budget \$388,848. With a net budget of \$970,166 proposed, the rate would be \$2.55 on a district valuation of \$38,000,000 or \$2.43 on \$40,000,000. It is now \$38,582,408. The valuation will not be fixed officially by the county assessors until Aug. 1.

The total gross budget for the coming year is \$1,661,643 compared with \$1,172,798 this year, or a gain of about a half million dollars. Detailed copies of the budget are now available. The vote upon the budget takes place on Tuesday night, May 6.

Carpenter On School Board As Corcoran Suddenly Resigns

HICKSVILLE—Allen S. Carpenter of 11 Loretta Lane is the newest member of the Hicksville School Board, filling the vacancy caused by the resignation late last week of Robert W. Corcoran of 74 Twinlawns Ave. Corcoran's successor will not be elected at the annual election on May 7 and legal opinion from Albany is being obtained to determine if (1) a special election must be held after May 7, or (2) the appointment will carry thru to the annual election in 1958.

At present there is a three-year vacancy to be filled on May 7 in the expiration of the term of Lawrence C. McCaffrey who is not seeking re-election. His term expires on the last day of June of this year.

Two candidates have filed petitions with District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer for places on the ballot on May 7 for McCaffrey's position. They are Emil J. Szendy and Mrs. Anthony Apicella.

SURPRISE DECISION

Corcoran was obliged to resign from the board on short notice after he was given the appointment of Assistant Counsel to the New York State Liquor Authority this week.

State law prohibits a member of the SLA from holding a position in the educational system. Corcoran, who is 32, was born in Brooklyn and educated at Holy Cross Parochial School, Erasmus High School, and St. John's College. Admitted to St. John's in 1940, his law studies were interrupted the following year when he was called for active duty in the army.

Must File Petitions By Apr. 26

Candidates for election to School Boards in the Mid-Island area must file nominating petitions with their respective district clerks ten days prior to the annual meeting and election of trustees, according to a recent amendment to the New York State Education Law announced this week by the district clerks of Plainview, Bethpage and Jericho.

The petitions of nomination must be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the district and will be filed with the clerk by this Saturday, April 26. Copies of the petitions are available at the office of the principal of the various schools.

The name and address of the candidate and the office being sought must appear on the petition.

3 Jericho Vacancies

Jericho voters will elect three members to the Jericho School Board at the annual meeting on Tuesday, May 6, in the Jericho School.

The terms of Thomas Samelson and William Scobie expire this year. A third trustee will be elected to fill the 2-year unexpired term of Harry Miller. Petitions must be filed with the clerk, Miss Margaret Wilson, c/o Jericho School, Jericho.

The terms of Mrs. Marie Fungold and Edward Prause, as members of the Plainview School Board will expire this year. Petitions must be filed with the clerk, Charles Voorhees of Barnum Ave., Plainview.

Szendy Seeking Election To Help Board Finish Job

HICKSVILLE — Emil J. Szendy of 5 Walnut Lane, first candidate to file for the election as a trustee of Hicksville School District on May 7, today emphasized his platform and the reason for his candidacy.

"The Board of Education of the Hicksville School District is to be commended for the manner in which it has met the problems of a difficult and trying period. Initiation and continuance of the Columbia University and Government Statistical Bureau Surveys, made faithfully and thoroughly, has provided a firm base for planning for the future during rapidly changing times. The Board has practiced what I advocate: Get the Facts; Face the Facts, Solve the Problem," Szendy declared.

Campagne Files For Re-election

BETHPAGE — Charles Campagne of 601 Stewart Ave. has filed his petition of nomination to succeed himself for a three-year term on the Bethpage School Board for the election to be held Tuesday, May 6.

Campagne has served on the School Board for the past seven years and has always favored progressiveness in the school system," according to his supporters. He said that if elected he will continue to work for "a good educational system for the children and the community according to its financial means."

He has two children now attending the Bethpage Schools and operates a trucking business in Bethpage.

He seeks election to succeed Lawrence C. McCaffrey, who is not a candidate for re-election, because he wants to assist the Board in carrying out its program, Szendy stated. The Board of Education has repeatedly stressed its desire to bring the system back to "single sessions" at the earliest possible date, with full utilization of state emergency aid programs and Szendy wants to assist in carrying out this ambition.

Cite His Background

"The Committee for the Election of Szendy to the School Board at Hicksville High School May 7 between 4 and 9 PM is convinced that his background as a building consultant, architect, and in the field of education eminently qualifies him for the office. His presence on the Board should achieve economies at a time of great expenditures," a spokesman said today.

"We cannot afford to save money at the expense of a good program," Szendy said. "To ensure a good program we must get the most for the building and maintenance dollar. I intend to apply 20 years of specialized experience to helping the Board do just that."

Szendy also made it plain today that he believes the problems of the entire school district with its population of over 24000 — not just a small fraction of the 6.5 square mile area — must be progressed.

"It makes no difference whether a child lives in the 'older section' or in a new house built in Zelma Park, Spiegel Homes or the Levitt section," Szendy asserted. "The Board is obligated to strive and make possible the best education

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
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

The first step toward civic unity and concentration of purpose and effort in Plainview will take place tonight, Thursday evening, April 24, at 8:30 at the Mannetto Hill School when the members of the Briar Park and Plainview Home Owners Associations join forces in a special meeting called by the officers of the respective groups to discuss the proposed 1952-53 school budget and the accompanying school board elections. The budget approval vote and board elections take place May 6.

Current Comment:

A Real Threat To Our Identity

SOME OF OUR FRIENDS in high places are not going to like this little piece, but what must be said is only the result of their actions. The night of Friday, May 9th, has been set in the auditorium of Hicksville High School for the Oyster Bay Town Board to deal a telling blow to our community growth. If ever there was a reason for local home rule, the progress of this issue provides it.

The State of New York, thru its legislature, enacted on March 20, 1947, a law permitting townships in Nassau to create special taxing districts for the development of local parks and parking fields. In those days Oyster Bay Town Board was right on the ball and within seven months the first district of its kind was established as the "Hicksville Park and Parking District" by resolution of the Town Board on October 21, 1947. Hicksville School District was the area taken and the town board, in its resolution, said "The Board has determined that all of the property, property owners and interested parties within the proposed district are benefitted thereby and all the property and property owners benefited are included therein".

At the same time the Town appropriated \$30,000, to be raised by local taxes, to build the parking field on East Marie St. Subsequently events moved more slowly, but due to local urging of shoppers and merchants, money became available for the smaller public parking lot on W. Marie St. opposite Big Ben. Almost without interruption, the demand for more shopper AND commuter parking has continued to this day.

The district was created with a view to the FUTURE; for example, the time when the community would number 25,000 people (as it does right now) instead of 8,000 (as it did in 1947).

But there has come upon the scene a group who, as we pointed out here last week, wants no part of Hicksville by name. They do not object to using our facilities, such as schools, fire protection, etc., which are paid by the entire district. They do object to our community identity. They have, with eager support of Levitt's empire-builders including Levitt's own newspaper, come up with a plan to chop off one-third of our identifiable area by slashing our Park and Parking District. This same element has already made an official request to the Long Island Rail Road that the Hicksville station be renamed "North Levittown" on timetables.

Now comes the stinger! A petition was circulated last fall with the warning that "Hicksville is trying to take over our swimming pools" and phoney claims regarding homeowner costs to operate pools. Actually, to this very minute, there is NO OFFICIAL OFFER OF LEVITT'S TWO SWIMMING POOLS TO EITHER THE HICKSVILLE PARK DISTRICT OR TOWN OF OYSTER BAY. Levitt owns the pools, operates them and can decide who uses them.

But the violently anti-Hicksville NLHOA got its petition before Oyster Bay Town Board which, on other occasions has been rather stuffy about acting upon petitioned requests (including enforcement of the top soil law, urgent demands for commuter parking, taxicab regulations, etc.) greeted it with open arms. What the petition wanted was not legally possible but, displaying unusual ingenuity—which has not especially marked town action in other more important problems—got a special law passed to set the stage for what is probably going to happen on May 9th.

Some of the "other problems" to which we refer include the control of gasoline service stations (which would not require a special act of legislature, but only a local law amendment), effective control of sand pit operations.

Hicksville people are not going to give up one-third of their identity, retaining all the shared costs including their rather attractive high valuation industrial development, without a fight. Five men will sit in judgment on the problem, but only one of them is a Hicksville resident. The rest come from Sea Cliff, Syosset, Massapequa, Locust Valley. There will be no vote taken.

On May 9th everyone will have his say, for or against. Decision will be reserved as the hearing concludes and sometime thereafter a verdict will be given. We fear the outcome unless Hicksville strongly presents its case. Ask yourself: Do I want parking fields for commuters? Do I want areas set aside for public parks against the day when every square inch of local ground is occupied with dwellings, or even worse, more gas stations? Do I want to see this constant bickering with the Levitt forces ended? Do I want the community united or split asunder beyond repair and eventual harmony?

The key is this: What is to the best interests of the district AS A WHOLE? That is how the Town must view the problem because that is what the law provides. Just as in our school district, the best interests of the ENTIRE DISTRICT must be considered, not this section or that development to the disadvantage of other portions.

Frankly the entire question of butchering our community, all nice and legal-like, would never have come to this point if the Town Board had not encouraged the enactment of the special law which will permit it. The whole process could have easily been halted before it got started—if our public officials really wanted to do so.

They call up, come in, and so eagerly clamor for the very latest fiction and non-fiction that reserve cards have to be filled out for the most popular books: "The Caine Mutiny", "The Sea Around Us", "The Wanderer", and "The Cruel Sea".

New users of the Library, people who have come to this vicinity from the city, declare that The Hicksville Public Library has one of the best collections of Science Fiction that they have found.

There are, of course, many readers of books of travel who like to learn the geography, the temperatures, and the customs of their point of destination. Our World War II veterans wish to revisit in memory Ogrizok's "Paris", "London Is A Place" by Feeney, and Michener's "Return To Paradise". The armchair traveler derives a thrill which defies analysis from a book like "I Cannot Rest From Travel".

There are caters—
out to mention which appeal to readers, but in conclusion we should say that there are just as many readers of books classified under Useful Arts as under any other non-fiction classification, without a doubt more. The readers select Dyke's "Automobile Guide", "The Complete Dog Book", "The Encyclopedia of Gardening", "Refinishing Old Furniture", "How To Make Toys", Betty Cornell's "Guide To Glamor". There is a widespread interest in the upkeep and repair of the person and of the possessions.

The registration of the library members grows daily and the circulation of books increases weekly. Library patrons are ardent about books. They could say with Chesterfield, "Learning is acquired by reading books."

Mortar and color should be thoroughly mixed in dry state before adding water. Once a satisfactory formula has been found, it should be used in each batch throughout the job to insure uniformity.
