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## Vote On Woodland Ave School Set For June 24

HICKSVILLE—Appropriation of \$1,000,000 for a new elementary school on Woodland Ave. in the Northeast section of the district will be presented to voters of Hicksville School District at a special district meeting on Tuesday, June 24. Polls for voting at the high school will be open from 4 to 9 p.m. Similar in architecture to the Lee Ave. School, the proposed 20-room building will be constructed on the district-owned site on Woodland Ave. off Woodbury Rd.

A registration for school district residents who have not as yet enrolled for the 1952-53 school year will take place Saturday, June 14, at the high school from 4 to 9 p.m.

## 600 More Register To Vote In Special Election June 4

HICKSVILLE—Another 600 persons registered to make a grand total of 2,000 voters qualified to decide the selection of a trustee of Hicksville School System at a special election next Wednesday, June 4, at the high school. Allen S. Carpenter, incumbent who was appointed in April when a board member resigned, is being opposed by Edward R. Ripple and Mrs. A. J. Apicella, both of whom insist that Levittown is their addresses. Voting hours are from 4 to 9 p.m.

The election contest entered into its final phase this week as a district-wide committee of almost 50 men and women prepared a statement of support for Carpenter which will be sent to all enrolled voters of the district. Ripple, who is comparatively unknown locally, issued a final statement in behalf of his candidacy. Friends of Mrs. Apicella last week sent out a form letter which was widely denounced for "attempting to create issues."

Carpenter said this week: "I am running for the board, first, because of my interest in the welfare of our children; and second, because my native business background has been administrative. The Board, in my opinion, is concerned with top-level administration. The district employs the best engineers, teachers and other personnel to carry out the educational program for

tor of the Methodist Church, will give the invocation.

Floral wreaths will be placed at the memorial and the Amvets will give the gun salute. Taps will be played by Eugene Toten and George Marks of the high school band. The Hicksville Choral Society under the direction of Mrs. Elwood A. Curtis will sing during the services. In case of rain, the program will be held in the high school auditorium.

Services will be concluded with benediction by the Rev. Leo Goggin of St. Ignatius R. C. Church.

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

## Double Non-Resident Beach Fee; Sign-Up For Levitt Pools In June

The Decoration weekend marks the opening of world famous Long Island beaches and recreational facilities, including Oyster Bay Township beaches on the North Shore and Atlantic Ocean. Restricted Levitt swimming pools in the mid-Island area will also be open starting on Friday.

Township residents enjoy the free use of their beaches upon presentation of their car owner's license to gate attendants. Oyster Bay Town Board will hold a public hearing next Tuesday morning, June 3, upon proposed upward re-

vision in rates charged non-residents at town beaches.

A fee of \$1, instead of 50 cents, for Saturdays, Sundays and holidays is scheduled for Oak Neck, Centre Island, Glenwood Landing, Roosevelt Memorial Park and Beekman Beaches. Tobay will be 25 cents on weekdays and 50 cents on weekends for non-residents. It is also planned to reserve Stehl Beach, Bayville, exclusively for township residents.

The two swimming pools in Hicksville, owned by Levitt & Sons, will be open on Decoration Day (Friday) with a system of homeowner registration scheduled for June by the NLHOA pool committee, according to Chairman George L. Kneur of 44 Arcadia Lane.

The Committee news release follows:

"Levitt & Sons has assigned to the NLHOA the responsibility of administering the two pools so they will be available to every resident of Levitt homes in the Township of Oyster Bay. In order to prepare a program of recreational activities and a system of restricting the pools to Levitt homeowners, a volunteer committee has been formed to assure that the greatest benefit will be enjoyed by all residents from their pools this summer."



Hello, Folks:

We've had a busy week at our house. Jim had a week of his vacation and we tried to paint. With all the rain we had, there wasn't much we could do, but we have just about finished the kitchen and the small bedroom. I'm delighted to finally have a light and cheerful kitchen. Dark grey walls with dark green woodwork and a black floor was terribly drab to work with. Now I can be happy again.

I've got some bad news to report on the dog situation. To date, approximately six or seven dogs have been poisoned. I don't know who is doing the poisoning—though I can guess why—but in addition to being unnecessarily cruel to dumb animals, you are endangering our children. Most of our youngsters are at the toddler stage and, if they are like my Jimmy, they are still sticking things in their mouths. They could just as easily be poisoned as a dog.

Poisoning-dogs is a criminal offense but murdering innocent children is by far more serious and that is the crime you are risking. To sum this up, dog owners "keep your animal at home, or he may not come home" and parents, warn your youngsters about picking things up to eat. I know you do that anyway, but for their own sakes, stress it now more than usual. I don't want to re-report anything happening to one of our children.

#### BUDGET MEETING

Last Wednesday night was the end of the budget meeting for this year. The original budget proposed was approximately \$250,000, but the figure being voted on at the meeting was \$225,598.50. Part of this reduction, as you know, was a result of the Plainview Committee's work on the budget. The final figure approved by the voters was \$216,888.50 of which \$181,792.22 is to be raised by taxation. The difference will be taken care of by State Attendance Aid and Vocational Board Aid, plus the balance on hand. Let's hope that next year we can imitate Hicksville in having a larger budget and lower taxes.

#### LETTER FROM RILEY

The following is a letter from Norman Riley, President of the Briar Park Home Owners Assoc. He has asked me to give him this space to report to you on the meeting held last Thursday.

Friends and Neighbors:

"Mrs. Rooney has kindly allowed me to utilize her column to say a few words to you as the President of the Home Owners Association.

**GROUCHO MARX**—That's me. These are the passwords that usher the You Bet Your Life show into millions of homes every Thursday night at 8. Invariably a little voice within me receives this introduction with a determined "So what?" If I appoint myself spokesman for the little voice I risk becoming the target of the ire of many a Groucho Marx fan. In all fairness I want to give credit where credit is due: Mr. Marx is an outstanding personality in the section of show-business that tries to offer escape thru laughter. He is a true oldtimer and most of us remember him as one of three Marx Brothers, a comedy team that has brought us some of the funniest movies in the last fifty years.

In these movies Groucho was always the one who chased the girl and who whistled at every shapely exponent of the fair sex. In short, he was the ridicule version of the movie's romantic lead. His rapid climb to stardom is even more commendable because it was built on a grammar school education and on the none-too-glamorous background a childhood in Manhattan's lower East Side can offer. Indisputably Mr. Marx is very intelligent, very witty and he makes the audience laugh, the last being his most important attribute.

He makes them laugh, all right — at the expense of the innocent lambs who have volunteered to be contestants on his You Bet Your Life show. He is an expert at twisting the contestants' words around, at interrupting them at, I admit, very strategic points and at making them feel uncomfortable.

Most of the contestants take the ribbing good naturedly. Some don't quite know how to take it and some are obviously annoyed. Every once in a while, much to my delight, one of the contestants beats Groucho to the draw. If raising your eyebrows a number of times while staring at the audience can be accepted as an outward manifestation of wit You Bet Your Life is the funniest show on the air.

As I said before, in all of his movies Groucho was the moustached, slightly bedraggled lover. But the lover he was and since the Johnston Office is only a product of more recent years no one objected to his gallant gallantries. Unfortunately, Mr. Marx has carried his movie mannerisms over to his television show not realizing that many a female contestant might feel embarrassed by the passes he makes at her.

We all know that Groucho Marx has been a showman for a considerable number of years and as with people of all walks of life age did not stand still. Mr. Marx chooses to ignore this fact and keeps repeating the same antiquated "what's your phone number? — I'll see you after the show" routine even if the contestant is a 19-year-old girl. Of course, it's all for a laugh.

In my opinion too high a price paid for "A Laugh".

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
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**TROOP MEMBER REPORTS:

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
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## Current Comment:

# Carpenter Is Only Choice

NEXT WEDNESDAY, June 4, at Hicksville High School between the hours of 4 and 9 p.m., there will be another election of trustee for the five-member Board of Education. In some ways this election is a duplicate of the annual election on May 7, won so decisively by Emil J. Szendy.

There are some differences, however:

We find there are more people registered to vote—more than 2,000 now have qualified by registering personally on the stated date. This is an increase of 600 but still hardly a true representation as some are still shunning their civic obligation.

Further, we find there are three candidates in the race, including Mrs. A. J. Apicella. We fail to see how her "platform" has improved in the past few weeks. She says her reason for running is the same as it was for May 7. We found no cause to support her then and can't find it now.

There is another difference: In the last election the incumbent was not a candidate. Today we have Allen S. Carpenter, a member of the Board by the selection of the Board who must work with him, running for election to fill out a term of less than one year. He was named to succeed Robert Corcoran whose term would have expired next year.

And in the race is Edward Ripple about whom we know very little except that he feels he can handle the job. He is a pleasant young man not given to irritating charges and statements. However, he has not during his residence in our community demonstrated, as Mr. Carpenter most certainly has, his willingness to participate in community affairs prior to his remarkably sudden decision to run for the School Board. We do not mean to imply that election to the Board should in any sense be regarded as a "reward" for faithful community service in other fields but rather that voters are entitled to some outward preliminary expression and demonstration of interest in our community affairs. This is essential if for no other reason than the simple opportunity to "size up the candidate".

Mr. Carpenter, as is well known, has repeatedly displayed his willingness to take a part in the community activities even though he is not that almost extinct and misrepresented creature—"an old timer". During five years residence in Hicksville he has found the time and opportunity to work with our youngsters in Scouting. He is well-known for his efforts as a member and officer of the American Legion Post. He is a capable administrator as his position in the business world indicates. He is well qualified and the community is fortunate that it will have the use of his services as a member of the School Board.

We urge his election next Wednesday.

## A Word About Our Honor Roll

THERE ARE MORE than 250 men and women from mid-Island communities in the armed forces of the United States on this Memorial Day it is noted today as the Herald publishes the first honor roll in this area in the current war. Three men have died in combat operations. There are 193 names on the list for Hicksville, 33 for Bethpage, 18 for Plainview and 10 from Jericho. The list was compiled with the assistance of local ex-servicemen's organizations and while it is admitted that there have been unintentional omissions, we believe the project will establish the basis for an official record of those who have served.

We will be grateful for notification by card, letter or telephone of those who have not been included so that future publications will become more accurate.

### CORCORAN ON COMMITTEE

Members of the Committee supporting him include Robert Corcoran whom he succeeded on the Board, and Lawrence C. McCaffrey, members of the Board, who did not seek re-election earlier this month.

Ripple, while not receiving the endorsement of the NLHOA at a recent meeting, is being actively supported in the Levitt area by leaders of that organization. Among his most active workers is David K. Sigerson, president of the Levittown Community Council.

"We appreciate the opportunity of appearing before this Committee to offer our comments on legislative proposals designed to create a GI Bill for Korean veterans.

"As a result of a 1952 convention mandate, we have established a Korean GI Bill as a number one legislative priority during this session of Congress. Already thousands of Korean veterans have returned home and we in various organizations know that they have turned their eyes and hearts toward this

Committee as you deliberate a subject which means increased citizenship opportunities for them.

"Recommendations contained in the Teague Select Committee Report have been accepted and endorsed, in part. Veterans cannot accept as valid, any argument that the World War II Bill should be continued in its present form merely because the benefits therein were available to veterans of World War II in a certain prescribed manner. Likewise, we cannot accept the theory that the Bill should be discarded merely because of minority abuse. However, common sense indicates to us that abuses must be corrected when possible; unworkable laws must be amended; wasteful benefits must be abolished; difficult programs to administer must be provided in a more advantageous atmosphere; and good programs must be continued.

### EDUCATION

"1. We ask for a new Readjustment Act, separate and apart from Public Law 846 of the 78th Congress. We believe that the World War II Act has been amended and re-amended as to make it unadaptable to entirely new provisions for Korean veterans."

## The Home HANDYMAN'S CORNER

By TOM CASHEL

### FENCES

A good fence has more than utilitarian value. It can be a decorative addition to your grounds—a frame to set off your house to its best advantage. There are many types and styles of ready-made fences, but the fence which is designed and built to fit the house always has more individuality and charm.

A wooden fence, of course, offers a greater scope for individuality of design. The picket fence, in spite of indiscriminate use, still retains its original charm. Its design can always be varied by departing from the standard height and regularity of spacing. There is an almost indefinite number of designs in wooden fences. They run all the way from the regular post-and-rail and the ranch-style fence to elaborate modern geometrical patterns worked out between two horizontal rails. The architecture of the house and the contour of its surrounding grounds are the determining factors in selecting the most suitable style for a fence. If you are planning a new fence, you are well advised to spend some time in checking the types of fences in your neighborhood.

The type of wood used in the construction of a fence is extremely important to the homeowner. If poor quality is used in a picket fence, for example, it will not take paint well and is likely to need replacement at an early date. Post-and-rail fences are much less costly to maintain, in general, but they too must be built of a durable hard wood. It is especially important to get the best-quality wood for posts. Types of wood best suited are, cypress, cedar and redwood, but whatever type is chosen, it is wise to have the ends treated with creosote.

The effect of the fence itself can be either destroyed or enhanced by the gate and the post which are chosen for it. Obviously, the type of gate is dependent upon the general pattern of the fence. Obviously, too, sturdy rustproof hardware in keeping with the pattern should also be used. The temptation to hang a "nearly right" gate on a new fence because it is readily available is often strong. But you will find that the difference in the finished appearance of the fence will make it well worth any extra effort necessary to find or make the right one.

Fences may be—and are—painted to suit individual taste. White is the traditional color and the most universally attractive choice. Starting and contrasting colors may occasionally be used effectively, but they are difficult and are more often failures than otherwise. It is sometimes desirable to leave a wooden fence in its natural state until it weathers to the deep wood tones of the old rail fences. But whatever you do, remember: You built the fence to add to the charm of your home. Don't spoil it by an ill-considered choice of paint.
