## Carpenter Sees Victory As Vote For School Board

**HICKSVILLE** — Allen S. Carpenter of 11 Loretta Lane immediately reseated his seat on the Board of Education, to serve until June 30, 1953, following the special election held on June 4. Sixty-two percent of the 2,000 voters registered cast their ballots to give Carpenter 871, Mrs. A. J. Apicella 273 and Edward Ripple 74 votes.

"I am very pleased with the great interest the people of the district showed last week," Carpenter told the Herald. "The large vote in this special election, following so closely upon the heels of the regular school election, proves that the people are interested in their school system. The heavy majority vote for me

is without a doubt, a confidence vote for the School Board. My slogan was 'I am running for the school board, not against them'."

He calculated that 76 per cent of the additional registrations of May 24 turned out to vote on June 4. Further that 50 per cent of those registered from the Levitt-section cast their ballots and 74 per cent of those registered from the rest of the district, voted. On a "minimum statistical basis" he believes that 31 per cent of those voting from the Levitt section cast their ballots for him.

The Hicksville Kiwanis will mark its 15th anniversary on June 18.

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




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## HIGHEST HONORS FOR TRIO: **Girl Scout Court Of Awards**

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

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

# RR Bridge Of Sand Alarms Civics

The cave-in of the sandpit wall on West John St. has caused many inconveniences to travelers going to and from Hicksville. Moreover, it has created an even greater menace in the possible undermining of the LIRR tracks which are used by thousands of commuters daily.

President McCarthy and I toured the area of West John St. during the week checking first the so-called "natural flow of water" which resulted in more damage after the thunderstorm Monday. We then had a closer look at the LIRR noting how close the sandpits are to the tracks. Acting immediately, McCarthy forwarded correspondence to the LIRR asking that they advise us what safety measures if any have been taken in the area of these sandpits. He further stated that the close proximity of the two sandpits to the railroad tracks and the recent cave-in on West John St. may tend to undermine the tracks. McCarthy reminded the LIRR of the Blackville Centre and Richmond Hill tragedies which caused loss of life. We do not want the same to happen in Hicksville.

### Politics, Roads And Planning

I never intended to do a piece that would approach any semblance of things political. But after reading a story that appeared in a Nassau daily this past week, I just couldn't resist the caustic urge that welled up in me and comment on the remarks of the County Democratic mogul who fathered this exhortation of Nassau's Republican planners.

A Mr. Carreau, who apparently is "Mr. Democrat" to the party faithful of the North and South shores, vehemently castigated the Republican powers for their alleged lack of county-wide planning.

Since elections are approaching, IOWLING campaigns top the agendas of most political encampments from here on out; these utterings do have somewhat of a tambour-like ring although there are a few facts interspersed among the usual political generalities and crazy-quilt pattern that makes up a statement of this kind.

Outstanding among these, it seems to me, is that portion of Mr. Carreau's remarks that have to do with roads and drainage. If you do much travelling on some of the new development roads east of Mineola you know what I mean.

Many community-minded organizations have sprung up in areas near and around Hicksville with a noble intent in mind. Unfortunately, in many cases, they are literally bucking up against the proverbial stone wall when they endeavor to accomplish something such as a decent road or improved drainage.

I know of two instances where civic groups decided to see if they could do something, anything, about improving their lot road-wise and struck upon an impenetrable barrier — "the file map." Not too much can be done they were told because land purchased for the construction of small homes and appearing on a filed map doesn't necessarily have to come up to County standards in construction roads. All the builder is required to do is mix a better

of pebbles and tar and presto — a road. Macadam or similar roads are out of the question in these instances where the majestic file map prevails. Of course, the roads — actually they're trails — will eventually be macadamized but then it will be Mr. Taxpayer and not the builder who will be afforded the privilege of flashing his greenbacks around. It must be pointed out, however, that a goodly number of builders have put in decent roads.

The "file map" isn't a particularly plausible answer to supply to these road-harassed homeowners and the naivete of the politicians on this score surprises me. These citizens — and there are many more with more to follow — aren't interested in "filed maps" or any other kind of chart. They look to the local officeholders and public officials to change this legal loophole so that even if it's too late for them to reap any benefit, at least, the future residents of Nassau will be able to move on in good roads. Other things can be changed so why not this "Filed Map" regulation?

With regard to drainage, planning, all you have to do is check back a few days and scan the headlines of Nassau's newspapers. I'm told that it's being bantered about in other circles that if you're planning to move to Nassau it's a good idea to have an automobile but it's an equally good idea to purchase a raft, canoe, outboard or whatever you can scare up in the way of seagoing equipment. Doesn't the prospect of visiting a float-in movie excite you? Just the thought of holding hands with your best gal while the sofa glides down Main Street into the aqua-theatre is enough for me. Of course, if the picture is of the obtuse variety you

can always float over to Emil's for an inundated hotdog.

Well, thank you, "Mr. Democrat," for providing me with something to say that I probably shouldn't've said in the first place. In any event someone either Democrat or Republican should come up with a plan to eliminate such public nuisances and "Filed Maps" and bad drainage. That's one way to get votes?

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

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

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

## Riding The Microwaves

with

MARGARET SAVIN

LAST WEDNESDAY one of the contenders for the presidency of the United States faced the television cameras and made his first campaign pitch. I purposely use the term "presidency" instead of "Republican nomination" because I can think of many a Democrat who will cast his vote for General Eisenhower this coming presidential election.

Plenty of pro and con has been printed and broadcast since the event took place; therefore, I shall keep my comments in the framework of a TV column without trespassing into the domain of news reporting and editorials. The blankets of rainwater that shrouded all of Abilene, including the speaker's platform and the microphone, didn't prevent the general from facing the TV cameras and thru them the millions of Americans who were waiting...

It was our first chance to observe "Ike" at close range and to listen to what one of the greatest military figures of our time has to say about the future of our country.

If Academy Awards were in order for speech making the general would certainly have been the recipient of a "Michael" in this field. Watching his face during the speech and even during the pauses set aside for applause brought a very simple but very definite thought to our mind: He seems to be a regular guy.

He didn't smile much and he didn't try to keep his audience's attention by entertaining them with homespun jokes. Ike Eisenhower doesn't have to compete with Milton Berle, as one well known political figure does, in order to gather an extra vote here and there.

His serious speech made for excellent listening, it was perfectly balanced and had plenty of punchline. We do hope those beautiful words will materialize into decisions to be carried out by President Eisenhower should the man who led the American armies to victory be elected to lead the American people to prosperity and peace. I FOR ONE enjoyed his whiplashing at overbureaucracy, super red tape and wasteful spending by all government agencies. It had such a familiar ring. It was pleasant to listen to promises that have so readily been forgotten by those who made them in the past. Let's hope that this type of political amnesia won't beset the general once the campaign is over and the business of being president is on.

From a TV point of view I hope Mr. Eisenhower will learn to look "into" the camera occasionally so the viewer will get the impression that the speech is made especially for him. And I also hope that a man with a dark suit and a loud voice will be eliminated from General Eisenhower's future TV appearances. This man's loud yipes were completely uncalled-for. Same goes for the unnecessary blowing of automobile horns every time the general stopped to catch his breath. I like to bring to that man's attention that he was attending a serious political lecture, not a sideshow.

A PERSONALITY of General Eisenhower's standing does not need a professional claque to highlight the important points in his speech. TV viewers are known to have eyes and ears; give them credit of having a brain, too, and let them decide for themselves whether they do or do not like what the candidate says.

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# What's Hold Up On Home Rule?

By FRED J. NOETH

**THIS IS INTENDED** to answer a frequently heard question about the progress of efforts to incorporate our community of Hicksville with its own local village government. The question is "what's taking so long?" or a variation, "how is it progressing?"

You would be delighted to know from whom this question comes. It comes from many prominent citizens. It comes from old timers and new comers alike, who all want local home rule. It demonstrates the urging to "do something" about solving our local problems.

It is taking so long, as best we can determine, because of the tremendous growth of the community.

Before an application (or petition) for a local referendum vote on the question of incorporation can be made to the Oyster Bay Township Board, there are several state law requirements which must be met. In the first place, there must be a petition signed by at least 50 resident property owners. That is simple. The Committee has more than 200 names, including majorities of local water board, school board and fire board members.

But this petition must be accompanied by a "consent" to bring the question to a vote, signed by persons who represent at least one-third of the total valuation of the area which proposes to incorporate as a village. And that's where the rapid growth enters the picture.

Our community today has a total assessed valuation of \$88 million. Last year it was \$20 million and the year before \$16 million. After August 1st, when the new valuation is announced, it will probably be above the current total. New homes, new factories, new stores are all adding to the total week by week.

To get the one-third (approximately \$11 million dollars, plus) signatures must be obtained on consent forms from property owners who must state, next to their signature (two signatures, if property is owned jointly by husband and wife) the valuation on their holdings. This is slow work with homes assessed on the average of about \$4,000. At this rate, it would require at least 2,750 signatures of individual property owners or double that for dual ownerships. According to the most recent tally, the Home Rule Committee has about \$4 million represented in signatures.

Of late, the tally has been running better with a couple of signatures representing as much as \$50,000 valuation apiece. These are from owners of extensive business property, etc. But it's an up-hill pull with the valuation gaining all the time.

With \$4 million signed today and about \$11 million needed, the Committee has better than one-third of the job completed. But when August 1st rolls around, and it's coming mighty fast, that \$4 million may only represent a quarter of what is needed. And so it has been going.

The petition, consents and a check for \$100 (which has been contributed by homeowners and is waiting in the bank) must then be offered to the Town Board who will call a public hearing regarding the legality of the application (form of petition, etc.) but not upon the issue of Home Rule vs. Remote Control Govt. Thereafter, the Town Board has a specified period in which to call the local referendum vote.

The Committee has been pleased to find that a number of people have signed who are not necessarily in favor of Incorporation. They have signed, they told the volunteer workers, because they want to see the issue brought to a decisive vote, one way or the other.

A little extra effort right now will clean up the consent forms. If you are willing to devote a little time in your own neighborhood right now to finish up this one-third of the valuation, send us a card or call William L. Geyer, chairman of the home canvass, at Hicksville 3-1677 and he will give you the necessary materials.

Let's bring it to an early vote and settle the issue.


