Recruit Sky Watchers Here On Friday Night

HICKSVILLE—The first sidewalk recruitment of Civil Defense volunteers in Nassau County for sky-watching duty, required by the U. S. Air Force, will take place this Friday night (July 11) in front of the Long Island National Bank on Broadway, starting at 7 o'clock, it was disclosed yesterday by Frank Sutter, local CD director. Men and women are needed to give two hours of their time each week to man an aircraft warning post in Syosset.

Persons already enrolled in CD are being urged to volunteer for the sky-watching assignment also. Every volunteer this Friday will be fully processed on the spot and will receive his ID card by mail a few days later. On hand for the sidewalk recruiting will be, tables, forms, fingerprinting equipment and a photographer.

Cyril C. Ryan, Nassau CD director, said that it is now urgent that all nine ground observer corps posts in the county be manned for 24 hour, around-the-clock operations on and after next Monday, July 14. Direct instruction and orders have come to Ryan and Sutter from the Secretary for Air thru the state CD director, Gen. C. R. Huebner.

During World War II an aircraft lookout point at Plainview was manned by volunteers of this area for more than three years under the leadership of John G. Harbes who racked up more than 6,000 hours of time as a volunteer spotter.

HICKSVILLE—Report of the property committee and its recommendations on a site purchase will highlight the Fire Dept. meeting here next Monday night. A six-acre site is being suggested for use as a tournament grounds in coming years as all available street sites are fast being occupied by dwellings.

HICKSVILLE—The South Hicksville Assoc. of Levitt Home Owners is keenly interested in provisions for full safety of school children in the vicinity of two new schools scheduled to open this fall. The executive committee, according to President Arthur Isakeen, has contacted authorities asking for traffic protection in the vicinity of the Old Country Rd., school and near Levittown Pkway and Dutch Lane. (Hempstead Ave).

Hillview Section Asks Ban On Heavy Trucking

OYSTER BAY—Elimination of thru trucking on seven Hicksville streets was considered by the Town Board as an amendment to the Hicksville Park and Parking District at a public hearing Tuesday morning in the Courtroom of Town Hall. There was no objection to the proposal to eliminate through trucking on Mead, McAlester, Underhill, Gerald, Mineola, Somerset and Marvin Avenues.

A group of residents from the Hillview Farms development in North East Hicksville presented a petition to the Town Board to have streets in their development included in the amendment to prohibit heavy trucking.

Councilman Frank Chlumsky said that the petition requesting through trucking prohibited on Garden St., East End Ave., Linden Ave., King St., Queen St., and Honved St. will be considered at a public hearing before the next meeting of the Board. The Hillview Farms petition also requests that the Town Highway Department repair the streets already damaged by heavy trucks of development workers in the area.

LAWNS OR HOMES?

Water Supply Falls, Fire Hazard Looms

Householders throughout the mid-Island area were again warned by district officials today to conserve water supplies. Plainview has given a sternly worded second and "final notice" that no lawn sprinkling will be permitted for the balance of the summer.

Hicksville and Bethpage water authorities ask all residents to carry on necessary lawn sprinkling only after nine o'clock at night. In these two districts additional pumping equipment is being constructed but will not be operating, even with emergency power, for days or weeks despite strenuous efforts.

Water works officials are gravely concerned over the possible damage and property loss due to fire with the current scarce supply on hot days.

"Would you rather have your lawn burn up, or insist upon watering and then make it impossible for firemen to control a fire?" one official asked. "The lack of adequate reserve water supply could result in many dwellings being lost in a case of 'that would ordinarily be a small fire.'"

In the Hicksville District, householders are asked to take turns at lawn sprinkling and then only after nine o'clock at night. Those south of Old Country Rd. are given Monday,

Final Plainview Warning

Plainview residents today got their second and final warning not to waste water. All lawn sprinkling and flower garden irrigation is PROHIBITED under penalty of a fine of \$50 and complete shut-off of their water supply, the Plainview Board of Water Commissioners said today. There will be no further warnings, an official stated. "In the future, violators of this order will be fined as provided by law. The situation in Plainview is critical. There must be no further waste of water, no lawn sprinkling by any means."

Farmers and vegetable gardeners may irrigate only between 9 at night and 9 o'clock in the morning. Homes in Plainview are located east of South Oyster Bay Road.

Wednesday and Friday and north of Old Country Rd., Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

Plainview Water District is supplied by Jericho district, although plans to install local wells are now being developed. All lawn sprinkling, outdoor showers, garden watering, etc. is now being prohibited under penalty of a fine of \$50 and

shut-off of a consumer's supply until the fine is paid. Farm and vegetable crop irrigation is being restricted to after nine o'clock at night.

Sound trucks and notification by registered mail was being used in Plainview this week as the water commissioners asked the Herald to publish a second and final warning notice.

Escrow Deficits Up To \$130

Local residents whose mortgages are held by the County Trust, Tarrytown, can expect notification that they must pay to make up a deficiency in their escrow accounts. The notices were received last week by the occupants of the first Levitt houses on Spindle Road and can be expected to continue until all the homeowners affected are notified. The bank has made it a policy to issue yearly statements at approximately the anniversary date of the mortgage, and the billing is included in this statement. The amounts owed have varied from \$98 to \$130, not including the monthly mortgage payment.

A spokesman for the bank stated they have no figures available on the average deficit to be paid, so later amounts cannot be predicted. It would seem reasonable to assume they will not vary greatly from the first totals.

BALANCE OVER DRAWN
The statement issued by the bank to the Herald concerning sums owed, breaks down the total to "Required Minimum Reserve" which is owed, plus a "balance overdrawn", which is also owed. These two figures added together result in the total sum due to the bank. This has been in general between \$100 and \$130. Apparently no statements have been received to date which indicate a sufficient balance in escrow.

Mylan Byelick, of the County Trust's mortgage department explained that the balance overdrawn is the sum the bank had to advance each account to forestall a tax lien on the individual property. Since this sum was not covered by the individual and the bank supplied it, he must pay the bank as soon as possible. The "required minimum reserve" is the sum the bank feels must be maintained at (Continued on Page 18)

Ambulance Is Now Necessity

COMMUNITY AMBULANCE service was a good idea for Hicksville ten years ago. Today it is practically a necessity. Last week North Massapequa Fire Dept. announced the purchase of a vehicle formerly owned by Bethpage, explaining "no longer will the residents of the Massapequa area have to endure the agonizing wait for an ambulance". Bethpage, by the way, has a new ambulance.

We have been pledged to secrecy, but a community much closer to Hicksville than North Massapequa and much smaller than Hicksville (which now has a population of over 24,000), is ready to place an order for an ambulance. The news will be out in a couple of weeks.

Recently, Farmingdale Fire Dept. got a new ambulance after a canvass covered rescue truck had proved so very valuable to the residents of the community.

A reader has suggested that Hicksville needs a local hospital. There are many angles to this suggestion and the question was explored rather thoroughly at the time the community was considering a "living war memorial". Hospitals do not exist on the fees they charge, which means they require substantial financial help from contributors. Small hospitals are generally not practical and conversion of a private dwelling to such purpose is not economical.

An ambulance for the community is very practical as the experience of smaller neighboring villages has shown.

Ten years ago there was a wait of up to a half hour for an ambulance in time of emergency. Today, delays of up to two hours are not uncommon. The reason is simple: the county has grown.

An informal survey among the medical men of the community shows uniform approval for a local ambulance service. Some of our firemen friends are not enthusiastic, but we believe most of the objections voiced can be overcome by leaning upon the experience of Bethpage, Farmingdale and other areas which have found the plan both practical and essential.

The Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc., starting a new year, has named Mrs. Lucia McIntosh as chairman of its ambulance committee. Under her leadership, we believe the community desire for such a service can be organized and carried through to completion. As a starting point, there is a small fund of several hundred dollars which was collected for an ambulance during the war years. The drive was discontinued only because such vehicles were not available.

NORTH WEST NOTES: Highway Dept. Starts Project

For the past week the Township Highway Dept. has been at work in our development on Kuhl Ave. and will continue on through the entire area to eliminate bad road conditions with the best equipment at their disposal. John I. Brandt, Highway Supt., in an interview with your reporter stated, "we will endeavor to eliminate the road conditions and drainage problem in the Spiegel development as soon as possible. My men will remain in the area until the job is completed, if necessary until the fall."

There are plans to install 200 feet more of lateral pipe on Ohio St. & Kolmar Ave. where the water rises during rains etc. Answering my questions, Mr. Brandt summed up by stating that he will curb a good portion of the area, but not at the low spots at present until his men can bone out the dirt and debris etc. They will then oil the roads after completing the curbing which includes a section of driveway for your car entrance.

Financial assistance has been obtained from the builder for the installation of proper drainage where it is needed together with the additional work planned by the Highway Dept. It is felt that in due time the residents will have fine roads and no more floods after the job is completed. We will be ever watchful for the completion of this work in the near future with the hope that this will eliminate the bad roads and flood conditions that have prevailed so long.

LIRR GRANTED DELAY ON CHARLOTTE ST.

The Public Service Commission announced this week that they have granted the LIRR a delay in completing installation of automatic flashing light signals and short arm gates at the Charlotte St. crossing of John St. The LIRR informed the PSC that the National Production Authority has allocated materials for the work early next year, giving the LIRR until April 30, 1953 to complete Charlotte St.

The NPA has approved of delivery of material for the Charlotte St. job for the beginning of next year.

The North West Civic Assoc was instrumental in getting the ball rolling at this dangerous intersection here in NW Hicksville, Patrick Boland of 63 Myers Ave., then President, spent a great deal of time in New York City at the PSC in presenting the case of this unprotected and widely used crossing. After an investigation the

LIRR was ordered to install the necessary safety measures. It is our earnest hope that between now and next year all using this crossing will be ever so cautious; and that there will be no further delays on the installation of this equipment authorized by the NPA.

NEIGHBOR DOWLING VIEWS NEWS:

Schools, Water and Fire Fighters

As a result of the hard work of several groups of civic-minded individuals which ultimately resulted in unification of all sectional groups residing in Plainview into one organization, a definite upsurge of interest in community problems was detected this past week by this column.



More people seem to be asking questions about the community's present facilities, what the future holds and what can be done to provide the facilities most needed.

Most of the queries when boiled down usually have something to do with schools, the current water shortage and the persistent rumor concerning the establishment of another fire company in Plainview. On the schools, this column can

report that the school board's newly appointed Building and Grounds committee headed by Peter McIntosh, who is a civil engineer, is making remarkable progress toward what will finally result in—when all the detail work including public acceptance of the plan is completed—a new two story 20 room school building. At this time everyone is fully aware of the urgent need for additional educational facilities and public approval of the plan is not generally considered to be a major obstacle. However, before actual construction can get under way there is much to be done including approval by Albany educational officials of the building plans. It is not expected to begin school construction before late September and the new building will probably not be ready until sometime in 1953.

On the current water shortage, there are several factors to be considered by Plainviewites. First of all we purchase our water from


the Jericho Water District and they can curtail our water supply at any time as they are duty-bound to serve their own people first. This, of course, indicates that we must make provision for the construction of our own water system. This column understands that such a plan is already under way, but when it will be culminated or how far the Plainview Water Commission has advanced toward this objective is, as far as we can learn, still undetermined.

With the continued weekly rise in Plainview's population, there is a natural tendency on the part of the residents to learn more about their fire protection facilities. Further evidence of this lies in the fact that a rumor concerning the establishment of another fire company has been circulating around Plainview. This writer believes, as do many of the residents, that the more homes built, the more people move in consequently the more fire protection necessary.

NEVER GOT-REPORTED PETITION:

No Hearing Held By Hempstead Board On Reciprocal Pool Use

No petition affecting use of the Hicksville area pools by Levittown residents has been filed, and no hearing on the matter has been scheduled by the Hempstead Town Board, according to Councilman John C. McConnell of North Bellmore who handles the Levittown affairs. The filing of such a petition and the scheduling of a hearing

for 10:30 A.M. last Tuesday had been announced in one of the Levittown papers.

"We understand that filing of a petition is planned, but we do not know who will file it nor what it will contain," said Councilman McConnell. "If the petition is filed in time, the Town Board may consider it informally at its meeting

on July 16th and determine whether a hearing should be held. The earliest possible date for a hearing is July 29th. Fulfillment of requirements for published notice of the hearing may set the date forward. Also the Town Board is on summer schedule at the present time and the calendar for each meeting is pretty full."

Councilman McConnell also revealed that the East Meadow area of Levitt houses was added to the Levittown Park District on June 24th, at the time the Wantagh area was added. The HERALD representative at the hearing on June 24 heard no mention of the East Meadow area, and no representative from the area publicly requested the inclusion.

Be Alert for Red Herrings

Levitt home owners should be on their guard against "red herrings", statements intended to distract attention from the true facts and the real issues. The current "red herring", recently resuscitated, is "We cannot keep our pools if the Hicksville Park and Parking District is not split." We are keeping our pools. And the District has not been split.

The SENTINEL SWIMMING POOL SNAFU

Although tags for the two swimming pools in the Hicksville area were issued to limit use of the pools to Levitt-house residents in the Town of Oyster Bay, Levittowners with Hempstead town tags were admitted beginning Tuesday of last week. Their admittance was preceded by a major hassle between them, the Levitt office, and NLHOA swimming pool committee this past week. Difficulty developed because Levitt had promised "free use" of all the pools to residents of Levitt houses, and transfer of the six Levittown pools to the Levittown Parking District had rendered those unavailable to residents outside the Parking District. Also, for some reason, Levittowners were excluded by the powers-that-be from Hicksville pools this year. They were admitted last year. Hicksville area tags are still not being honored at Levittown pools. With Levittowners using Hicksville area pools, the load here on the pools now far exceeds the 1000-house-maximum-for-health emphasized by the NLHOA at the Town Board hearing.

No report has yet been published on the intended disposition of the funds collected by the NLHOA for guards, now employed by Levitt, and for swimming instruction, usually provided free of cost by the Red Cross. Levitt organization has said that it donated the tags. In addition to money collected this year, a balance of \$800. remains from funds collected last year, we have been told. . . . The Levittown Parkway pool was shut down "for repairs" on Saturday and Sunday and was not expected to be open Monday.

LEVITTOWN INCORPORATION

Levittown Democratic Club is pressing for incorporation of Levittown as a city. A booklet distributed at the Festival announces that "The incorporated city of Levittown will encompass the general area of homes built by Levitt and those neighboring communities that desire to share in the benefits of incorporation." Sections of Hicksville, East Meadow, Wantagh and Westbury are within the proposed boundaries. Rumor has it that "Levittown City" will soon be publicly espoused by a pro-Levittown local civic organization which has vociferously opposed the incorporation of Hicksville. The booklets were distributed from under a pink and white sugary conical roof supported on candy-striped poles, the similarity of the whole to a KANDY-BAR being undoubtedly purely coincidental.

LITTLE LEAGUES

Much favorable comment has been heard about the operation and direction of the Little League recently formed in this (so-called, North West) area. Factions sharply divided on other local issues are working together to make it a success. Hope has been expressed by some that the end of factional bickering is in sight.

LEVITTOWN FESTIVAL

Abraham Levitt's talk on the danger of communism to a festive crowd arriving with floats and bands from Levittown struck an odd note. . . . First prize for "most original" float went to Levitt Youth Committee,—the fore part of their float, mounted on a long platform truck, depicted the loose-ends of youth undirected in activities, and the aft part, baseball, dancing, and swimming forming part of directed youth activities. A strident voice on a stationary bicycle implored the audience to "change this to that". The undesirable undirected activities to be changed seemed to include reading at home. . . . Levittown Library Bookmobile formed part of the parade and established itself on the Pkwy Green for the duration, well out of bounds of its library district. . . . Baby Parade and contest produced the most puchritudinous children and mothers ever seen anywhere in any contest. They were all outshone, however, by the father and escort of one of the contestants, resplendent in the most colorful beach costume ever seen in these parts. . . . Levittown Pageant turned out to be two short movies; one showing the building of Levitthouses and the other entitled "The Price of Freedom". The latter film strove to arouse the audience to participation in community affairs. . . . The Parkway (Continued on Page 11)

LAWS AND ORDER:

Levitt Deed Restrictions

Many owners of Levitt houses are aware that there are restrictions on their property, but few are fully familiar with their meanings. These restrictions are on file in the Nassau County Clerk's office in Mineola and may be examined by interested persons during the regular business hours. For the convenience of many readers the restrictions most likely to affect the home owner are described briefly in this column. They affect the use to which the owner may put his property and what additions and alterations he may make.

The listing of the main restrictions follows:

Duration. The restrictions are to remain in force until January 1, 1975, (ie, for the next 23 years).

Usage. The house may be used only as the private dwelling of one family, or as the professional office of a physician, dentist, or other similar professional person resident therein.

Business or Trade. No business or trade is to be conducted on any lot.

Garages. A garage may be constructed on condition that it, and any breezeway or other structure

connecting it with the dwelling must conform in architecture, material, and color to the dwelling. No vehicle other than for private passenger use is to be stored in the garage. The location of the garage must be such that no part of it is nearer than 25 feet to the front lot line, nor nearer than five feet to any side lot line, nor nearer than 25 feet to the rear lot line. Also, the total width of the side yards on the two sides of the house must add up to at least 15 feet.

Note. For most houses purchased from Levitt and Sons after July 1950, detached garages or additions may not be erected. An attached garage or addition may be erected if it is not more than 12 feet wide, 26 feet deep, does not project into the front yard, nor project into the rear yard more than ten feet beyond the rear wall of the dwelling.

Other Structures. No building or structure, other than the garage, may be built without the written approval of Levitt and Sons. Any such structure must lie within the same bounds as the garage as de-

RANCH HOUSE BLUES:

Is Your Attic Hot?


(Note: The planned article on "fireplaces that smoke" has been postponed to a more seasonable later date.)

If your attic roof has not been insulated the temperature in the attic on a sunny day may be as much as 25 to 35 degrees higher than the outdoor air temperature, with good cross ventilation in the attic and an adequate wind to move the air through it, the attic air temperature will be lowered, but still be sufficiently higher than the outdoor air temperature to make the attic untenable and practically unusable.

INSULATION

The palliative is, of course, insulation; but insulation alone is not a cure for a hot attic. On a hot sunny day the temperature on the asphalt shingle surface will reach 140 degrees and the underside of the roof boards 135 degrees. This heat, transmitted through the insulation, will raise the temperature of the attic 5 to 10 degrees higher than the outdoor air temperature. And when the outdoor air temperature in the afternoon is in the nineties, the attic is really HOT.

To keep the attic cool it is essential to remove the warm attic air, and, where practical, cool the roof construction at the same time. An attic fan is practically a must, to achieve this. The fan should be (Continued on Page 10)



Carefully located and judiciously operated. Early morning operation will bring cool morning air into the attic and correspondingly lower the maximum summer temperature during the heat of the day will have little effect, as the cooling effect of warm air is correspondingly less. Evening operation must be for long enough periods to cool the surfaces which are radiating heat, in addition to removing the overwarm attic air.

From the standpoint of summer comfort, not much is gained by insulation exceeding 2 inches in thickness or compressing more than one layer of aluminum foil, but greater thicknesses and more layers are beneficial in maintaining higher winter temperatures. In the summer time, thicker insulations store up more heat and add to evening discomfort.

When you install insulation, do not forget to provide a vapor barrier. On wool bats and blankets there is usually an attached asphalt paper which serves as the barrier. The insulation should be installed with the paper on the inside (room side) without the barrier, moisture will condense and freeze on the roof boards in the winter time.

The Hicksville Community

We residents of Hicksville, come easily under that definition; we live under the same laws and regulations. We have many interests in common, schools for instance; and we are so organized that we served in common by Service Districts having the same boundaries, the boundaries generally considered to be the boundaries of Hicksville. And last but not least, our post office address is Hicksville.

Our interests are identified with Hicksville. Hicksville Water District serves us with water; if our house catches on fire, Hicksville Fire Department is called to put it out; some of our public forums and meetings are held in Hicksville High School; Hicksville Garbage District manages the removal of our refuse; and School District No. 17 of Hicksville, provides for the education of our children.

 described in the previous paragraph.
Exterior Alterations and Additions or additions may be made to the house or garage, the written approval of Levitt and Sons must be obtained.
Painting. To repaint the house or garage in other than the original colors, the written approval of Levitt and Sons must be obtained.
Fences. Fences of any kind must be approved in writing by Levitt and Sons before erection.
Border Shrubbery. Shrubbery exceeding four feet in height is not to be planted along property lines.
Signs. Only family name or professional name signs or address plates may be displayed without the written consent of Levitt and Sons.
Laundry Pails and Lines. Only one portable revolving laundry dryer, not more than seven feet high, may be used in the rear yard. It may not be used on Saturdays, Sundays, or legal holidays. It must be removed when not in actual use.
Lawns. Lawns are to be cut and tall growing weeds are to be removed at least once a week between April 15 and November 15. If the owners fail to comply, Levitt and Sons may do the work and charge the owner for the expenses incurred.
Garbage and Rubbish. When placed outside the house, garbage and rubbish is to be kept in closed metal containers at the rear of the house, except when it is placed otherwise for removal.
Animals. No poultry, horses, cattle, hogs, or other animals, except two household pets, may be kept.
Trailers and Tents. No trailer, tent, shack, or other structure is to be located, erected, or used, either temporarily or permanently.
Nuisances. No activity which may be or become an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood is to be carried on.
Enforcement. These restrictions are enforceable in the civil courts by Levitt and Sons, its successors and assigns, and by the owner of any land affected.

908 Children Use Playgrounds, May Triple Last Year's Record

HICKSVILLE—With attendance at the summer playground program in the community this year running 135 per cent ahead of last year, the sponsoring Board of Education may be forced to engage more adult assistance, it was reported this week.

As in the past, the playgrounds are proving very popular with the

youngsters and the attendance of what they want. The daily average attendance for last week was Monday 410, Tuesday 537, Wednesday 616, and Thursday 590. The supervisors were so busy taking care of the youngsters that the total registration of 908 at the present time does not include all the children that attended the playground. Last year the total registration was 534. With only a short week of registration, the playground registration should be tripled over last year.

East St. School is the most pop-

ular playground with a daily average attendance of 206, Dutch Lane 184, High School 168, and Nicholas School 86. Nicholas Street School averaged 85 for the last two days of last week.

Because of the overflow in the playgrounds, the Costuma Parade will be postponed from July 11 to July 18 to enable the administration to set up proper supervision for the youngsters this week. However, on July 18 the first special event, Costume Parade, will take place and as usual is being anticipated by the youngsters.

(Continued from Page 1) all times to cover unexpected demands on the account.

The total unexpected debt may be larger than the homeowner can carry at the moment and in recognition of this Mr. Byelick advised the homeowner who is unable to pay the "required minimum reserve" immediately, to write to the bank and suggest a workable method of payment over a period of time. The bank will, on this basis, try to arrange payment with the homeowner. However, he stressed the fact that the sum labeled "balance overdrawn" must be paid immediately.

A spokesman for the FHA indicated that the tax situation in many new communities is so complex that the banks find it difficult

to forecast how large a monthly payment would be necessary to cover expenditures. When advised of the previous notice that had been issued by the Bowery Savings Bank several months ago, he stated the FHA would make routine inquiries at both banks. Many residents are annoyed at the lapse of time between statements of both banks and wondered if the County Trust had just discovered the insufficiency of monthly payments when the Bowery sent out its notices.

In addition to escrow deficiencies the homeowners have had their monthly payments increased from six to twelve dollars. The County Trust had no figures to indicate the average increase. Mr. Byelick stated that the bank was taking steps to see that the situation "would not recur in the future."




