Fire Commissioner Elections Tuesday

Election of fire commissioners in Hicksville, Bethpage and Jericho is scheduled for next Tuesday night, Dec. 2, between the hours of 7 and 10 P.M.

OFENLOCH WITHDRAWS

In Hicksville district, Harry Gieckler who has been a volunteer fireman for 35 years and has served 17 years on the board, is apparently unopposed. Medard Ofenloch, who had been a candidate, this week withdrew in favor of Gieckler and announced his support of the incumbent. Also scheduled is the election of a treasurer of the fire district with Bernard Schuster apparently unopposed.

Henry Stranber will apparently be unopposed for re-election as commissioner of Bethpage Fire District next Tuesday. No other petitions of candidacy had been filed with Secretary James Sturtevant.

In Jericho, Harry Stewart is apparently unopposed for re-election as a commissioner of the fire district.

Plainview has a three-way race for water commissioner on the same day with polling hours from 5 to 10 P.M. at the firehouse. (See page 4 for details of this election).

Reorganize Advisory Committee

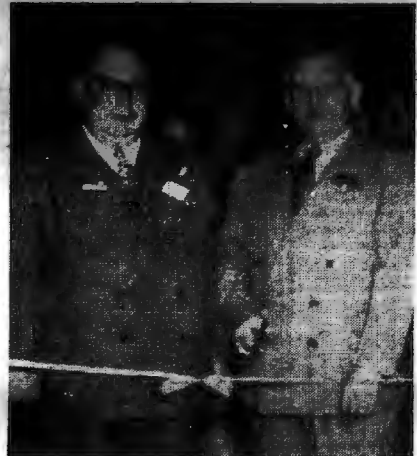

Another Test For CD Jan. 22

Another air raid alert exercise was scheduled for Thursday night, Jan. 22 by Nassau County Civil Defense authorities this week as results of the mobilization on Nov. 19 were being studied. Cyril C. Ryan, county CD director, announced that future drills will include patrols by auxiliary police and wardens, and the dispatching of personnel and equipment for "incidents".

In the test last Wednesday night Hicksville - Plainview unit with about 800 enrolled in various services mobilized 418 volunteers, according to local Director Frank Suttar.

Bethpage announced that with 300 members, there were 83 on duty including 45 auxiliary police, 13 wardens, 5 communications, 3 public relations, 3 supply, 11 welfare and 3 at headquarters.

Hicksville - Plainview area reported 27 percent for public works, 104 auxiliary police, 58 wardens, six of control centre staff, 12 officials, 16 messengers, 4 radio operators, 68 of education, welfare and transportation, 75 Hicksville firemen 60 Plainview firemen. Also present at the Hicksville control centre was official CD observer.

Civics Hear Data On Fees Paid Attorney, Architects

HICKSVILLE—The question of fees paid the attorney of the school district in connection with the expansion of school facilities was aired at the Civic and Community Assoc. meeting, Monday night. Harry Ernenwein, school board member, frankly discussed and answered questions by the audience on this topic.

Michael Sullivan, attorney for the school district is on a regular annual retainer with the district for \$1200. He has been paid \$37,850 in the past two years in addition to his annual retainer on the basis of one percent of bond issues for new construction.

The School Board has adopted an arrangement for the new high school, which is expected to cost \$3 1/2 million, to pay a one per cent legal fee on the first million dollars of the bond issue, three-quarters of a percent on the second million, and a half per cent on remaining millions, Ernenwein said.

There were also questions on fees paid Knappe and Johnson, school district architects. They have received \$168,000, based upon a six per cent fee. Ernenwein said this

rate is general among local district and has reached seven percent in some unnamed neighboring areas. He said the architects fee on the new high school will be 5 1/2 per cent.

It was stated that the one per cent attorney fee on bond issues is generally paid by this area. While there have been reports that some neighboring districts have worked out other arrangements, board members and those present at the meeting were unable to name such districts or detail arrangements, Monday night.

Strong Approval Of School Board Seen In Record Vote

PLAINVIEW—In a record-shattering 339 affirmative to 12 negative votes, the people of Plainview lined up solidly behind their Board of Education's recommendation to float a \$1,250,000 bond issue for the purpose of constructing an urgently needed new school, this week.

The residents filed into Mallett Hill School Nov. 19 at 8 p.m. and promptly began casting their ballots after the meeting was officially called to order by the chairman.

Upon completion of the first half hour of balloting it became apparent that the vote would be overwhelmingly in favor of the bond issue. Previously, the Board of Education and its Building and Planning Committee had stated they "felt confident that the proposal would be received favorably by the residents."

On-the-scene observers during the balloting attributed the unprecedented affirmative vote to the cooperation between the Board of Education, its appointed Building and Planning committee, Parent-Teachers Assoc., the Civic organization and the Board's public information program.

"The Board and its committees

have made a sincere and vigorous effort to bring the full story of the district's educational requirements to every resident in the area.

"How can you fail to react favorably when everybody is cooperating," commented one resident.

Old Country Road School Opens In Early December

The Old Country Road School will be the next of the new Hicksville schools to open this fall. The opening is scheduled for early part of December. On that day approximately 500 children from Kindergarten to fourth grade will go there instead of to the Nicholas St. School where classes have been held pending completion of the new school.

In the new building the children will have the most modern facilities. The building itself is almost identical to the Dutch Lane School, which was opened about a month ago, and is located on a plot of 20 acres. It is planned to grade the land and install equipment for outdoor activities in the near future.

MEET THE PRINCIPAL

According to Murray Duncan, principal of the new school, the second, third, and fourth grades will be on full sessions. The hours for these grades will be from 8:30 to 2:30 P.M. The first grade will be divided into two sessions with two classes being held from 8:15

A.M. to 12:15 P.M. and the other two from 12:30 to 4:30 P.M. The kindergarten classes will be held for two-hour periods throughout the day.

The homes served by the Old Country School lie within the general area enclosed by the LIRR, Underhill Ave., Old Country Road, Newbridge Road, Beech Lane, Arrow Lane, and Wantagh Parkway. The boundaries of the area are subject to some change as shown by experience to be beneficial, it was indicated by Mr. Duncan.

Principal Duncan, comes to Hicksville after eleven years experience in the elementary and secondary schools of the town of Lake George, N. Y. In addition to his teaching duties, he also served as coach for the athletic teams of the schools. He is a native of Buffalo and he attended Syracuse University where he received the degree of Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees in 1939 and 1940, respectively. He has also done graduate work in education at the University of Buffalo and at the Albany State Teachers College.

Mr. Duncan now resides at Huntington Station with his wife, Mabel, and two sons Bruce, aged 8, and Neil, aged 3.
Mr. Duncan will have the following teaching staff serving under him. Kindergarten: Miss Edith Renta, Miss Ellen Kessler, and Mrs. Naomi Eisner. First grade: Miss Barbara Ray, Miss Doris Bertram, Miss Virginia Butler, and Miss Frances Opendack. Second grade: Mrs. Tamar Kremp, and Mrs. Marion Michaels. Third Grade: Miss Suzanne Healy, and Fred Young; Fourth grade: Miss Joan Wells, and Mrs. Virginia Spatola.

According to William Sill of 2 Bank Lane, chairman of the Save our Pools Committee, his neighbors are gravely concerned over the recent Levitt ultimatum that unless Town of Hempstead takes on the responsibility for the operation of the pools located on Newbridge Rd and on Levittown Pkwy by Dec. 31, 1952, he will permanently close them down.

Operation of the pools by Hempstead Township would prevent their use by non-residents of the Township, those who live in Oyster Bay township, it is claimed.

"We are hiring legal services, thanks to the generosity of those who have already volunteered to donate, to look into this problem which can only be settled in court," Sill stated. "We were promised the free use of these pools by Levitt and Sons when we bought our houses and we intend to make every effort to hold him to his promise."

Sill, almost single handedly was successful in campaigning for garbage collection service in his neighborhood of some 2300 homes after such a move had been first stalled and then killed off by the North Levittown Home Owners Assoc. He obtained more than 500 names on petitions and personally carried the plea for regular rubbish collection to the town officials.

Today his area has such service at a rate of 30 cents per \$100 compared with 66 cents per \$100 paid by property owners in Levittown Garbage District.

Contributions and pledges may be addressed to Sill at his home, 2 Bank Lane. All donations will be acknowledged, he said, and a complete accounting of all funds made to those interested.

"Free" Means Free, Say the Lawyers

It has been reassuring to find that lawyers who have been approached to take the case against Levitt should legal action be necessary to prevent closing down the pools are unanimously of the opinion that "Levitt is stuck with it".

The case against Levitt would be predicated on the "free use" clause in the following advertisement and many like it which some people do not recall:

"Full price for everything—including television, including 60 by 100 grounds all landscaped all equipment, all fees, charges, etc., including free use of six gorgeous swimming pools—is \$7990!"

Indicating acceptance of the common meaning of the word "free", Levitt and Sons advertised their rental cottages as follows:

"Cape Cod cottage. Living room, two bedrooms, kitchen, bath, stairway to big open attic. G. E. Refrigerator, Bendix, steel kitchen cabinets, radiant heat. Free use of all Levittown swimming pools. Rent \$70 monthly, occupancy 30 days. Write for application to Levitt and Sons."

Free use to renters could certainly not imply payment of a municipal tax. That would be paid by the landlord, Levitt and Sons. The renter was to receive free use as commonly understood,—it would cost him no money.

Also reassuring have been the voluntary pledges already made to finance legal action.

All, including NLHOA, now admit that operation by Levitt and Sons at their expense would be the best solution. That possibility should not be discounted just because some abetting Levitt's desire to shed it upon the taxpayer say it can't be made to stick.

Paternalism At A Price

When Levitt gave Levittown a Christmas present of the Hall in 1950, the newspapers quoted him as saying, "We have felt for a long time that Levittown needed a civic center for community gatherings, so we decided sometime ago to build one."

Building of the Hall was therefore a voluntary venture on the part of Levitt and Sons. In it was enshrined, shortly after completion, a memorial to Abraham Levitt.

At the East St. School hearing (in May) it was vigorously denied by proponents of the "split" that the Hall was part of the package to be transferred to municipal operation, although it had been specifically included in the petition for the "split". The proponents seemingly hoped that it would ride through on acceptance of a more generally desired facility, the pools, without awareness of the implications and cost involved.

There has been in the past a general reluctance to press for municipal operation of the Hall as an avowed objective, quite probably because there exists no precedent therefore, and possibly because it cannot be demonstrated that it is an essential recreational facility. Most communities exist without community halls and manage very well without them.

Those communities use facilities dedicated to some primary purpose which provides major financial support, such as school auditoriums, Legion Halls, Masonic buildings, and fire houses. Publicly owned facilities are available at no cost to out-and-out community activities,—at the schools, usually,—and private and semi-private organizations pay a reasonable fee for the use of publicly available other facilities.

In most communities, as in Levittown, the number of "joiners" is small, and there is no thought of providing tax-supported facilities for their use.

The local situation summarizes as follows: Wm. Levitt built a community hall not requested by the community; in it he enshrined a memorial to his father; for some 18 months he operated it at his own expense making strenuous efforts to promote its use; by exercising a form of paternalism he fostered a taste for it among the organizations using the facility. He is now endeavoring to capitalize on that taste to establish governmental paternalism, a paternalism which would maintain in perpetuity in Hicksville a facility not needed in other communities, supported by all for the benefit of the few, A Levittown Hall named after Levitt and containing a memorial to Abraham Levitt.

It could happen only in Levittown.

The Levitt-Owned Newspaper Protests

The SENTINEL was established to be just what the name denotes—a guard, a vocal guard, against the ill things with which this area is beset, numbering, among others, misrepresentation, lies, aggression, pressure, efforts at disruption, hate-Hicksville propaganda, and slanted journalism. One of the frequent offenders in several categories, especially slanted journalism, was and continues to be, the Levittown Tribune, owned lock, stock, and barrel by William and Alfred Levitt. That should not be surprising: back in April, 1948, when Robert E. Abrams, editor, announced sale of the Tribune to the Levitts he editorially said, quite frankly, "There will be no hypocrisy about ownership and objective of this newspaper. Its control will rest in the hands of those who built Levittown."

It was to be expected, therefore, that the Tribune would back Levitt's present effort to transfer the pools and the Hall to municipal ownership; in fact, Abrams was publicly instructed to do so by Wm. Levitt himself at the Oct. 27th meeting in the Hall.

Freedom of expression is especially prized by most editors; lack of it in this instance must occasionally make Abrams bitter.

What motivated Mr. Abrams' last week's editorial effort to promote Levitt objectives by a vituperative attack upon Fred Noth, Walsh, Szendy, and the SENTINEL, whether it was bitterness or Mr. Levitt, is a matter for conjecture. In any case the attack was vicious to a degree disproportionate to the objections raised. There was criticism of one inconsequential typographical error and the following gem of editorial expression:

Only bitterness could motivate Mr. Abrams; he is just not understood.

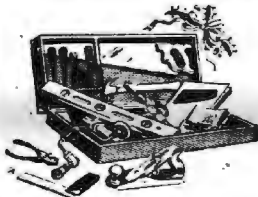

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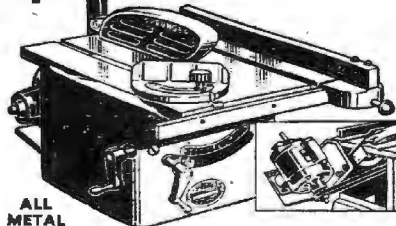

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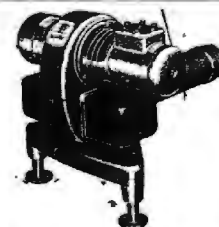
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As Szendy Sees It:

Opinion on Levitt-House Matters
By a Levitt-House Owner

Public Discussion Needed

Sane and sober consideration of the so-called "issues" of disposition of the pools and Hall reveal that these are "issues" only because their direct and forthright solution has been avoided. Instead there have been projected, by Levitt and the NLHOA, plans for splitting the Hicksville Park and Parking District, first by action of the Town Board of Oyster Bay, and now by annexation of this area by the Levittown Park District. The protagonists, Levitt and the NLHOA, are obsessed with the idea of the "split", and are attempting to put it across, now by threat of closing down the facilities, previously by contending that "Hicksville is trying to take away your pools", instead of honestly solving the problem.

At the present time an air of urgency has been added to the "threat of loss" by setting a time limit, Dec. 31, 1952, after which Levitt says he will close down the facilities, although, quite obviously, the pools are closed down now and will remain closed for the next six months. Everyone must recognize the technique of the super-salesman who rushes the unwary into buying something available "for a limited time only", before the purchaser has adequate time to evaluate the pros and cons of the offer. That air of urgency, that need for "emergency" meetings, (NLHOA last week) obviously manufactured artificially and arbitrarily, should in itself make the "solution," offered for a limited time only, suspect.

Further grounds for suspicion were provided last week when the NLHOA "hard core" opposed the idea of open forum discussion after the idea had been generally accepted at the NLHOA meeting and, it seemed to the writer, favorably voted upon. As finally recorded the suggestion had been watered down to a mere discussion meeting of the executive committees of SHALHO and NLHOA, with a forum a possibility only if it appeared desirable to the NLHOA committee. SHALHO had already gone on record favoring the forum.

It will be remembered that NLHOA refused to participate in a forum held in April before the "split" hearing in May.

Reason would dictate the evolution by discussion of an equitable and amicable solution which would secure the desired end result without destruction of other desirable conditions, such as good relations with our neighbors, and without threat to other favorable circumstances, such as lower tax rate.

However, if NLHOA were sincerely interested in an amicable solution it would have been engaged in friendly and open discussion much before this. It would not be endeavoring to thwart the present proposal for an open forum. It would have explored and be exploring all possible solutions instead of advocating only those which would necessitate split of the Hicksville Park and Parking District. It would be busily engaged in protecting the interests of the people of this area against the attempt of the developer to railroad through a personally dictated "solution". It would be acting like a civic association, promoting good relation, civic betterment, and equitable and amicable solutions of our problems, and not pressuring for acceptance of something demanded by Levitt.

Let's hope that this time we get down to open discussions and amicable solutions before public hearings or legal action.

Full stops must be made at Levittown Parkway and Blueberry La., Blueberry La. and Clarissa Dr., and at Clarissa Dr. and Marginal Rd.

NOTICE OF ENACTMENT OF ORDINANCE
 TAKE NOTICE that by resolution of the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, N. Y., duly adopted by said Board and entered in full upon its minutes on the 15th day of November, 1952, following a public hearing duly held thereon after advertisement according to law, the following Ordinance was duly enacted:

ORDINANCE
 The Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay hereby ordains and enacts in the manner in which excavations may be made in or under Town Streets, Highways or Sidewalks in the Town for any purpose, outside of Incorporated Villages or Cities:

ARTICLE I
HIGHWAY EXCAVATIONS. No person, firm or corporation, public service, water, light or power company shall excavate in any street, highway or sidewalk in the Town for any purpose without first obtaining a permit from the Superintendent of Highways as hereinafter provided.

2. PERMIT. Upon application in writing filed with the Superintendent of Highways, stating the purpose, extent and location and nature of a proposed excavation or other disturbance of a street or highway in the Town, the Town Superintendent of Highways may grant or refuse a permit therefor. Except where such excavation or disturbance shall be directly authorized by law, the Superintendent of Highways shall require the applicant to deposit with the Superintendent of Highways a sum of money which shall be determined by him to be adequate to pay all the expenses to which the Town may be put to replace the street, highways or sidewalk, pavement curb or gutter in proper condition and each applicant must file an insurance policy or certificate with the Superintendent of Highways insuring the Town of

Oyster Bay in the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) personal liability and Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for property damage.

3. FEES. Excavations otherwise provided by law, or where permits as above are granted for work done at the direction of the Town Superintendent of Highways, each application for such permit shall be accompanied by a fee of Three (\$3.00) Dollars for each excavation to be paid to the Town. The fee and permit herein required shall be in addition to permits required, if any for construction of any sidewalk, curb or driveway.

4. NOTICE TO PUBLIC SERVICE CORPORATIONS. No work shall be commenced under any permit granted pursuant to this Section unless or until such notice as shall be directed by the Superintendent of Highways shall have been given to public service corporations having lines, mains or other property in the streets for the protection of their property.

5. PROTECTION OF EXCAVATIONS. All excavations in streets or sidewalks shall be surrounded by suitable barriers or guards for the protection of persons using the streets in the daytime and in addition thereto by lights or flares from twilight continuously until daylight. Such barriers and lights shall conform in kind and number to the requirements of the Superintendent of Highways. Failure to provide barriers and lights conforming to the requirements of the Superintendent of Highways shall be prima facie evidence of a failure to provide suitable barriers and lights.

6. PROTECTION OF PROPERTY. All permits granted for Town street, highway or sidewalk excavations for any purpose shall be conditioned upon the adequate protection, at the expense of the applicant, to the property of the Town and public service corporations. All excavations shall be backfilled properly upon completion and a written notice thereof given to the Superintendent of Highways. All excavations shall be maintained for six (6) months after such notice of completion has been given.

7. PENALTIES. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance

shall be liable to a fine or penalty of not more than One Hundred (\$100) Dollars for each offense and the violation shall constitute disorderly conduct and the person violating the same shall be deemed a disorderly person.

ARTICLE II
TITLE OF ORDINANCE. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as "An Ordinance Regulating Excavations in Streets or Highways in the Town of Oyster Bay".

3. DATE OF EFFECT. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

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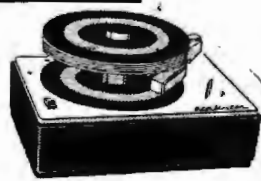
