In Hicksville, voters will have their first of 2 days to register this Saturday, Apr. 21, from 10 AM to 8 PM. Tuesday, April 24, from 4 PM to 10 PM is the last opportunity for registration. While potentially more than 12,000 persons could register and qualify, it is estimated that less than a third of that number will protect their right to vote on May 1 on the budget and May 2 in the election of three School Board members.

In Bethpage, the voters have their second opportunity this Saturday from 9 AM to 6 PM at the Broadway School. Only 129 reported on the first day, last Friday. The final date for registration is Wednesday, April 25 from 2 PM to 9 PM.

In Jericho registration takes place in the Robert Seaman School on Leamy Ave. from 1 to 7 PM this Saturday, April 21.

Saturday also marks the last day for the filing of candidate petitions with the respective school district clerks. (See legal notices in this issue).

To register, voters must be adult citizens with at least 30 days residence prior to the election date. They need not be taxpayers; parents of children attending local public schools, providing they are district residents, are also qualified.

In Hicksville there are six candidates for three positions on the Board of Education.

In Jericho William Mayhew has requested a petition form. The term of Hamilton Hadden, Jr., president of the Board, is expiring.

In Bethpage there are three candidates filed for two positions.

In Plainview there are four candidates for two terms becoming vacant this year.

Report To Taxpayers:

The last meeting of the Hicksville School Board was held in two sessions; the first session, Friday evening, April 13; the second the following morning. Several items of interest to the taxpayers were considered.

The custodians were granted a flat increase of \$300 per annum under the proposed new budget. A regular custodian will now start at \$3400 per annum. Originally, the Administration had proposed a \$200 increase. At that time, a taxpayer had protested that the salaries were so low that even a \$300 increase would hardly be enough. The Administration subsequently revised its recommendations. The Board approved. I am proud to say that the taxpayer was Mrs. Zimmerman.

A motion to accept the previously tendered "resignation" of Mr. Yocum and to hold an election to fill the vacancy was made by Trustee Szendy. It was defeated by the negative votes of Trustees Cawley and Sutton. Mr. Cawley imagines that the Yocum case is now a "cause celebre" and is being watched with avid interest throughout the nation. This District is now a guinea pig.

Prof. Maloney, the expert, on government, should inform his teammate, Mr. Cawley, that since the founding of our government, the courts of this land have insisted, and quite properly, on their rights of jurisdiction. They have claimed the right to review the acts of legislatures and have declared many such acts null and void. They have established their rights of jurisdiction. They have up by the executive or legislative branches of our federal or state governments. Does Mr. Cawley think that the N. Y. State Court of Appeals will permit the destruction of our governmental system of checks and balances? Will the Court say to the nation, "We accept and acquiesce in the action of the N. Y. State Legislature in creating an agent whose decisions will be final and not subject to review by the Courts of this State?" Mr. Cawley knows full well that the day when this happens will be a sad day, indeed, for the cause of Justice and Liberty throughout the nation.

The Annual Election will be held on May 2. The hours of voting will be between 4 P.M. and 10 P.M. The Board has agreed to increase to three, the number of voting machines at each of the four polling places. Do not forget to Register and Vote.

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for a minimum increase of \$1,800 per annum for elementary and junior high principals and a minimum increase of \$1,300 per annum for senior high principals. The approved Schedule is given in the accompanying table.

Feelings were very strong during the vote on these items. Considering the intensity of feelings, the Board conducted itself with admirable restraint.

This exhibition of restraint and self-control differed considerably from the behavior under equally emotional circumstances during the Regime of the Board Majority. This former lack of restraint gave rise to a technique of school government which may justly be called, "The Technique of Personal Abuse." At this point, it is difficult to say whether the Technique originated on the Board and filtered down to some of our more reckless citizens or whether the movement was in the opposite direction. At times, the abuse heaped on Trustees Szendy and Erlich were

Powerhouse" whereby the rights and privileges of the Minority Board members were trampled and destroyed. To date, no responsible spokesman for the Board Majority has denied the use of these Techniques as a deliberate practice of school government. What is more appalling, there has been no statement from any member of the "Team" that he deplores these Techniques and will shun them in the future.

Public utterances by this faction indicate, beyond a reasonable doubt, that the election of the "Team", Leavitt, Maloney and Soininen, will assure this District a school government by a bloc which will utilize fully these vicious Techniques of School Government.

One of the major members of the School Board majority once said that his concept of legal advice was being told how to do what he wanted to do, legally.

When the concept is applied, the progression to the fringe of legality and beyond, is rapid. Action is not patterned to comply with the law; the law is likely to be interpreted to justify the action.

The law, and especially the intent of law, should govern Board actions. Board procedure should follow accepted rules of order and decorum.

In the past year, what the Board majority wanted to do, it did. Accepted rules of order and procedure went by the board. From the chair came preposterous rulings; the preponderance was overruled; the normal rights of minority members were voted out of existence.

Yocum and Soininen, known to be partial to the majority, were seated on the Board, and this was done, according to Judge Haimm of the Supreme Court, contrary to the "clear and unmistakable" meaning of the Statutes. Yocum and Soininen then voted to appoint Milton Leavitt, although their own right to act as Board members was in question.

In the usual course of events, such actions go unchallenged. The cost, in time and money, of challenging them, is more than can be borne by any individual or group of individuals. The Board majority has public money at its command. The attorneys employed by the Board are well paid, \$10,000 a

year for part-time services plus \$100.00 a day for litigation to Mr. Crane; \$5,000 to Mr. Stoll for securing affirmation of the right of the majority to pay high attorney's fees to Mr. Sullivan. The protesting taxpayer must dig into his own pocket and take time out from gainful employment, frequently he can afford neither.

Harry Goebel, attorney, personally witnessed the fantastic 4:30 A.M. appointment of Milton Leavitt, made while taxpayers pleaded for delay and a special election. Goebel had already been overruled by Crane on the Yocum-Soininen election. That morning, right and law gained a new and determined champion in Goebel.

Right and law won—Yocum, Soininen and Leavitt were ousted. But only after months of delay during which Yocum, Soininen and Leavitt, working hand-in-hand with Cawley and Sutton, established an enviable record.

Those were the days of the "Yawn Patrol", with controversial issues held until the wee small hours of the morning; of one-sided information channelled through school children to gain approval of a referendum; of stacking of an Advisory Committee by vetoing contrary-minded citizens; of information withheld from minority members; of attempts to censure members for publicly expressing contrary opinions; of censure of the Herald; of editing of the official minutes before submission to the Board; of refusal to accept corrections and essential additions from minority members; of innumerable irregularities and planned harassment of opposition.

Those days should go forever. Law and order should be restored to the Board.

Soininen and Leavitt are candidates for election on May 2nd. With them is an added starter, Professor Maloney, who has expressed his admiration for the majority. Yocum remains suspended animation; Sutton and Cawley have again refused, as recently as last Friday, to permit a special election to fill the position. It seems possible that, should these candidates be elected, they might again attempt to thwart the right of the taxpayers to elect, and appoint Yocum to the Board.

Shall we restore Yocum, Soininen and Leavitt to the Board, plus their admirer, Professor Maloney, and hazard again the condition of

Soininen Says We Can Pay

To the Editor:

One year ago today the defunct Taxpayer's Assoc., now known as the "Committee for Better Government in School Affairs" in a Pro-Szendy election release predicted a scare School Tax rate of \$3.90 per \$100.00 of assessed valuation for the school year 1955-56. The actual rate was \$3.55.

We don't know what scare tactics will be used in this campaign; but, despite an estimated 1,100 increase in next year's school population, the maximum increase that will result in our School taxes is 30 cents per \$100.00 of Assessed Valuation or \$3.85 a year to the average taxpayer. When you consider that the cost of educating each and every child next year will average \$400.00 (excluding debt service (which is another \$60.00) this a nominal increase in our taxes.

Reading the papers last week we find that some School Districts will climb as much as \$1.54 per \$100.00 (Roosevelt) to a tax rate of \$4.96—Elmont to \$4.29—Franklin Square to \$4.55—and West Hempstead to \$4.73; we in Hicksville are indeed fortunate when we look at \$3.85.

Why is this? Are these other districts taking in more children than we are? Are they spending like crazy for frills? The answers are NO. It is because Hicksville is in a fortunate position as regards Assessed Valuation. At present of the total valuation of \$65,000,000, about an estimated \$40,000,000, or 8/13's is residential

which means that Industry is paying 5/13's of our taxes and Industry does not send children to school. Of the expected \$5,000,000 increase in our Assessed Valuation next year comparatively little will be due to Residential. The following year the full impact of the new Shopping Center will appear in our Assessed Valuation totals which will jump from \$70,000,000 to \$83,000,000. By 1961 it will climb to \$91,000,000, and by 1970 it will level off around \$100,000,000.

These figures are not meant to be used as Campaign Material for the Leavitt, Soininen and Maloney campaign; it is only to bring to the Taxpayer's attention the "Ability of Hicksville" to pay for the good education that our children are entitled to. The PEAK school tax rate would never exceed \$4.25 per \$100.00 of Assessed Valuation if the educational policies of the three aforementioned candidates become the policies of the District. Barring unforeseen events the School tax rate should not exceed \$4.00 for more than 1 or 2 years.

In the past we have been conservative in our Financial Forecasting of taxes, budgets, etc. and the facts have proved us right. Every scientific method of calculating the above figures will prove them to be correct.

Hicksville has the Ability to Pay for the high educational standards that we want for our children. We will be a Richer Community for it, both education wise and morally.

Every effort will be made to provide full-time classes and a single-session program. This may require staggered use of school facilities to fully utilize classrooms and buildings during the peak enrollment period.

I shall strive to present each public referendum, on the above matters, for the parent and taxpayer's consideration, in such a manner as to give them a choice as to method and cost. I shall do my best to bring to an end the "Eastern European" method of giving our people a choice of either voting "yes" or getting nothing for our children.

I will do all that is in my power to assure that good business

practice becomes the normal operating procedure of our district. I will do my utmost to see that board actions are in accord with both the letter and the intent of the educational laws of our state.

I am in favor of, and will make it my business to, create an attractive teacher pay schedule, consistent with the income ability of an average Nassau County Community.

I will support and, in cooperation with the teachers, introduce additional salary benefits for exceptional teaching service. The purpose of this is self-evident: to help raise classroom teaching levels, and to better compensate the above-average teacher.

Administrators, principals and teachers will be treated as ladies and gentlemen. Respect for each man's personal dignity is a principal value highly. I shall treat fellow board members with the respect their dedicated service deserves. I will do my utmost to restore to our district a tone and atmosphere more conducive to the educational process.

Installation ceremonies will be at the Aerie Hall, 25 E. Marie St. here.

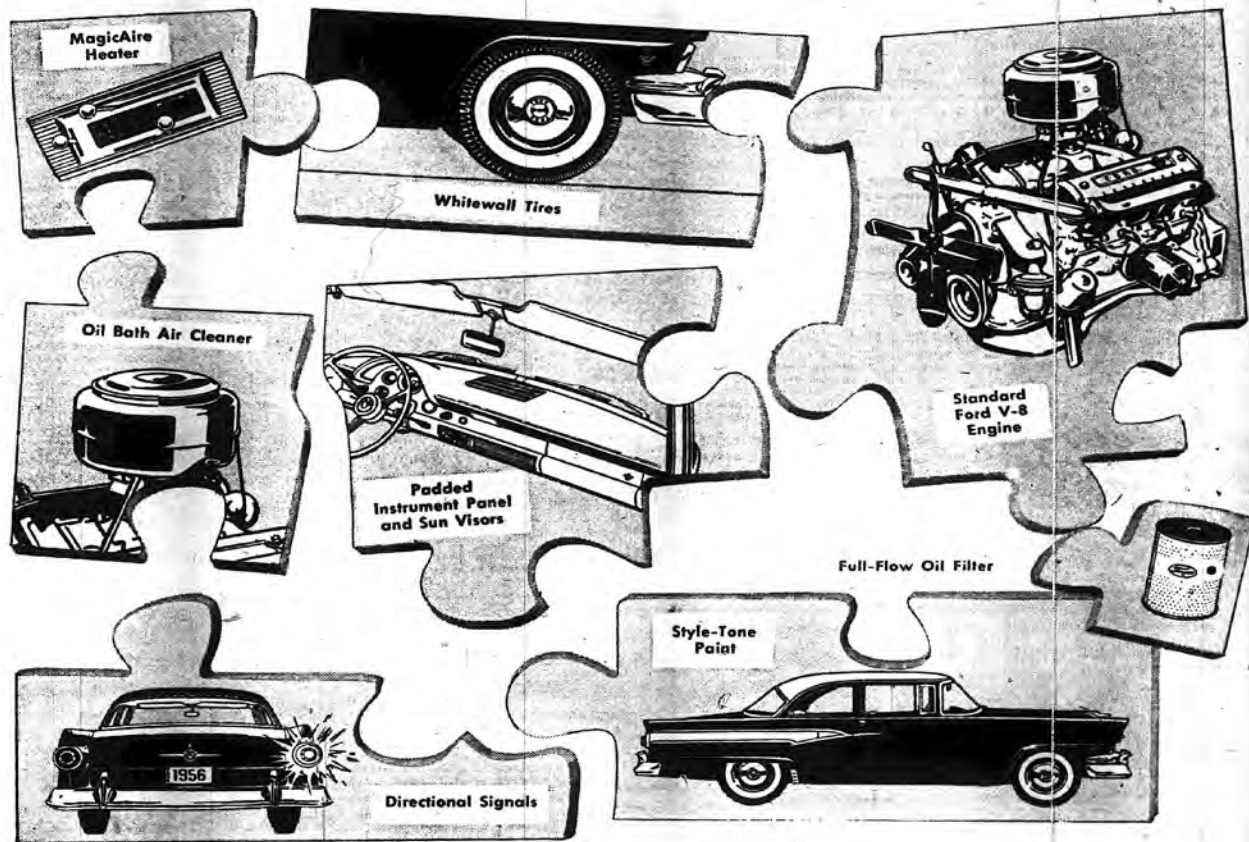

In the possibilities department Martin Watkins took an early lead with a 5 foot 11 inch spring in the high jump. The good start could foretell an exceptional year. Marty will also compete in the low hurdles.

John Roberts carries the hopes in the broad jump and John Magee is expected to get points in both the shot put and discus.

Jim Perry in the 220 and Dick Proffee in the 100 are additional bulwarks to build the team on.

The young man who distinguished Hicksville's first varsity wrestling campaign—Ted Greve—is causing McNamara some concern. He has demonstrated such all around ability that just where to use him has become a problem.

Frank Estrada will be called upon in the 880-yard dash and Louis Tricola will expend his efforts in the pole vault.

McNamara has additional hopes but refuses to go into them now fearing to place too much pressure on the younger members of the team. He does, however, feel that there may be some "surprises".

Persistence gave us only one reward. He conceded that Alan Roseberry may make a mark in the mile event.

Hicksville will play a North Shore League schedule of eight dual meets facing the same division schools as the basketball team.

There are some who remember when the Orange didn't lose one of those matches for over five years but to those who have been close at hand recently three or four wins this year would be something.

The luck continues bad for the Hicksville High diamond team but the "punk" exhibited in the opening win over Westbury caused some sunshine.

Pat Sarle pitched very well until two giant late inning home runs jarred him. We never saw one clear the rightfield fence but the one Westbury lad really gave the ball a ride over in this one.

For the record the team is playing its games on the old High school diamond which is still in as poor if not poorer condition than it ever was.

The 7-3 decision would have been much more heated were it not for two snappy Comet plays.
