KEEPING PACE WITH GROWTH:

Town Acts to Restrict 6 Beaches to Residents

OYSTER BAY—With the opening of the swimming season on Memorial Day, town officials today disclosed plans to restrict six of the township beaches to residents. A public hearing will be held by the Town Board here next Tuesday upon the proposed restrictions and the issuance of auto parking permits on a seasonal basis.

Supervisor Lewis N. Waters pointed out that the population growth has made it necessary to propose limiting four north shore beaches—Oak Neck, Staehle, Beeckman and Centre Island—and two Massapequa beaches—Florence Ave. and Alhambra Ave.—to township residents only.

Non-residents will be permitted to use Roosevelt Memorial Park at Oyster Bay, Tobay on the Atlantic Ocean, and Harvey Tappen Beach (formerly Sea-Cove) at Glenwood Landing.

To offset the loss of car parking fees formerly paid at the beaches by non-residents, the township is planning to issue season permits for the parking of cars of residents. A \$3 season fee is proposed and stickers would be issued by beach attendants and at the Town Hall, here, and Town Annex on Broadway, Hicksville.

Residents who don't want a season parking permit will be charged 75 cents on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays; 50 cents on weekdays. Non-residents would be charged \$2 at the three beaches open to them on weekends and holidays and a \$1 parking charge on weekdays at such beaches.

Non-resident pedestrians will be charged 50 cents. Resident pedestrians will be admitted to beaches without charge as in the past.

Fairview Section Forms Association

TWO DATES CANCELLED:

Another Week Goes By Without Meeting

HICKSVILLE—The Board of Education has not met since the annual district meeting with two scheduled meetings during the past week cancelled. A meeting was planned for Friday, but was abruptly cancelled because one of the four members required to be present could not attend. Another meeting last Monday night was cancelled for the same reason. In both instances, Vice President Joseph Cawley was unable to be present.

It was unofficially reported at press time, the Board may not meet any night this week. The regular monthly meeting is scheduled for Friday, May 25.

Among the many items listed as an agenda for last Monday's session was "implementation of taxpayers' opinion as expressed at annual meeting concerning, principals' salaries, teachers' salaries, transportation and recreation proposals." This agenda item was requested by Board President Edna Sutton and Cawley.

While the Board did not meet, Monday night, bids were

opened on the new public library. Base bids were found to be \$56,000 above the amount appropriated.

Attorney Bertram Crane has held that four board members must be present to conduct business. The present members are Mrs. Sutton, Cawley, Emil Ssendy and Arthur L. Dirich. After July 1, trustees-elect Robert Eaton and Allen Carpenter will take office. A determination is still to be made on the William Yocum vacancy.

The Herald was unable, at press time, to obtain confirmation of a report that Stanton Miller, assistant superintendent of schools for education, might soon resign. Published reports that Donald Walling, assistant superintendent for business administration, is planning to resign as of July 1 have not materialized as yet.

The position of District Clerk of the District is also due for consideration. Emily Waxberg is reported to have resigned as of May 15 (Tuesday). The Board has been without the services of a secretary since Yocum's resignation.

Amend Article V, Section C-9, Article VI, Section D-9; and Article VII, Section E-9, to read as follows:

Building Area. The total building area, including garage space, shall not exceed 30% of the total lot area. Where no garage space is provided, the total building area shall not exceed 30% of the total lot area, less 250 square feet.
