Hundreds Donate To Better Govt.

HICKSVILLE—Jerome Zettler, treasurer of the Citizens for Better Government in School Affairs, today disclosed that nearly \$700 was contributed by homeowners, members of the organization, in the recently school district election. A breakdown of the costs of the campaign was also made public by Zettler who expressed the thanks of the Citizens for Better Government to all who had contributed.

There were hundreds of one and two dollar donations to the cause, he said. Expenses totalled \$692.50 of which the largest portion, \$322.50 was for the printing of leaflets, signs and cards. Postage was the second largest expense, representing \$190 of the total. Other expenses were: Photostats and certifications \$45, advertising \$85 and rental of sound truck \$50.

The Citizens Committee, of which Ernest F. Gossy of 137 Dartmouth Dr. is chairman, supported the successful election of Arthur L. Eirich, Robert Eaton and Allen Carpenter, as trustees of the School District, each for three-year terms, starting July 1. Eirich is an incumbent.

Walling Resigns

HICKSVILLE—W. Donald Walling, assistant superintendent of schools for business, has submitted his resignation to Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of the school district, effective this June 30, and it has been accepted by the Board of Education. Walling plans to take the last three weeks in June as "vacation".

During the School Board meeting last Friday night Walling made some observations of the type for which he has become "famous". He told Trustee Emil J. Szendy "I think you are a crazy man". He admitted he had told a civic association recently that the annual meeting of a year ago had been "taken over by apes". He said his recent comment at a public meeting about people with "low IQ's" had been intended for Trustee Arthur L. Eirich and the publisher of this newspaper.

Walling declined, in fact, refused to have his pending resignation the subject of an executive session of the board. The motion to have an executive session was lost by a vote of 2 to 2. Szendy and Eirich in favor, Joseph Cawley and Edna Sutton voting no.

Szendy and Eirich said they favored the executive session in consideration of the fact that it was a matter of personnel.

Walling said "I don't think it's safe to go" into executive session with the Board.

Mrs. Sutton commented "the whole thing is regrettable. We need you", she told Walling. "The Board needs you. You have taken untold and unwarranted abuse."

Szendy remarked: "The district has taken unwarranted abuse" and noted Walling's "poor choice of language".

Walling pointed out that he had been employed for the 1955-56 school year at \$10,000 and since he is an "educator" was actually, he claimed, engaged on a 10-month basis.

"I could readily collect an additional \$1,000, but I am not going to do it", he said, adding that it is "very generous of me".

A motion was made at the end of the meeting, and tabled without action, which would require all persons reaching the age of 70 to retire. The next School Board meeting was scheduled for this Friday night, June 1.

Arranbee Doll Company Leads 'Undressed' Field

HICKSVILLE — A local manufacturer particularly equipped to make little girls happy was able to give little Helen Bing the one thing "Strike It Rich," the television program, forgot — a new doll.

Michael Emerson, vice president and sales manager of Arranbee (or R & B) Doll Co., Inc., did not hesitate when he was told that the little girl's dolls were destroyed in a fire and that a doll was what she still wanted.

"Do you want to take it with you now?" he asked a Herald staff member.

That's how "Nanette," a little girl doll in a school dress, with jointed knees and rooted hair, came to be presented to Helen, when the "Bing Fund" collection was turned over to her father this week.

The 37 year old Arranbee company is still a newcomer in this community. It moved here from Manhattan in April, 1955, and now leases half of the Santa Straw Co. building at 250 Duffy Avenue.

The company made a survey of the Hicksville area before moving here, Emerson said. The survey indicated that the residents here welcome new industry, that conditions were uncrowded, and it was cleaner than Manhattan, and that transportation facilities were good.

For these reasons, Hicksville became the new home of the only doll company in Nassau and Suffolk counties, and one of the ten top doll manufacturing firms in the country.

The concern moved in April, the start of the heavy production season for doll firms. Arranbee was hard pressed to fill orders and get settled at the same time. Now it is beginning to organize production the way it had planned.

Plans for 1956 and subsequent years call for production steadily maintained all year long, Emerson said. He expected that the company will be ready for the heavy production season at the end of the month.

Dolls made now are slated for next Christmas' sales and for 1957. According to Emerson's expectations, production here will be for 10 or 11 months ahead of the selling season, whereas in New York the company was only 9 or 10 months ahead.

Designing of dolls and dresses is even further advanced than production. Designs formulated now will be produced for 1958.

Doll styles come into fashion, disappear, and then reappear years later, the sales manager explained. Jointed knees were considered new in 1954. Few people knew that

they had appeared in 1905, although in a more primitive mechanism. "Walking" dolls were featured in 1932, but they had come into the doll fashions of 1920.

Among the features developed by the Arranbee Co., was, in 1954, a doll whose eyes wouldn't close when it was laid down until it was rocked to sleep. Arranbee developed tearing eyes in 1938. In 1927 they were the first firm to find a way to put eyes with movable lids into a head made of soft material. The company has made boy dolls, too, but found them less successful than girl dolls. The sex of a doll is determinable only in older dolls which have hair and clothing costumes.

Arranbee leads the "undressed" field, in which they sell the doll and her clothing separately. The company expects 90 per cent of its production to be of two such unclothed dolls, "Littlest Angel" and "Sweet Pea." "Littlest Angel" is a little girl doll and comes dressed in underpants. Thirty-six possible costumes, are sold for her. "Sweet Pea," a diapered baby, has had 15 designed for her.

Selling separate costumes for dolls, which come only with a diaper or pair of pants means that buyers no longer will judge a doll by what she is wearing, Emerson pointed out. Also, he said, dolls won't be discarded because their clothing is torn or ragged, and new clothes are sure to fit.

So far about three costumes have been sold for every doll sold with this new system, Emerson said.

Arranbee makes about 750,000 dolls a year. Much of the actual "molding" of the bodies, and the manufacture of the molds themselves, is sub-contracted. On Duffy Ave., the bodies are assembled, dressed and packaged, sold and shipped. The dolls' clothes are also made there. Arranbee also has a sales office in New York City.

In February, the slow period, a skeleton force of about 50 works in the Duffy Ave. plant. Summer and fall peak periods bring about a new in 1954. Few people knew that
