Ques: by James Cawley, Plainview: What is an Election Board?

Ans: An Election Board consists of three inspectors and two clerks, who are bipartisan, and who are appointed in each election precinct by the county authorities. The Board determines the qualifications of voters; it supervises the polling and sometimes counts the ballots.

Ques: by Frank Lang, Hicksville: I have seen "I LIKE IKE" stickers on local car bumpers—where can I get one?

Ans: I suggest that you contact the Nassau County Republican Headquarters, Mineola, where they will be more than pleased to fill your request.

Ques: by Josephine Flynn, Hicksville: I am desirous of changing my party affiliation this coming Election Day. How do I do about this?

Ans: Go to the Polls on Election Day, vote for your favorite candidate and then when you have finished voting, you will be handed a Party Affiliation Blank, put an X in the circle of the Party you have chosen. Place this paper in box provided at Polling Place. You will automatically be placed on the rolls of your new party.

Ques: by George Barth, Hicksville: The name of Secretary of State Dulles appears in the head-

lines and on TV a good deal of late, just what are his duties?

Ans: Secretary of State Dulles is the ranking member of President Eisenhower's Cabinet. He is head of the Department of State and sits at President Eisenhower's right hand at the council table. He is the principal adviser to the President in the determination and execution of American Foreign Policy.

Ques: by George Walden, Hicksville: Is there a Republican Club in Hicksville?

Ans: Yes. It is known as the Hicksville Republican Club, Inc. Its President is Michael J. Sullivan. The club meets on the second Friday of each month at the Masonic Temple, 35 West Nicholas St., Hicksville. Dues are \$2.00 per year and are payable upon signing of your application blank. Ques: by Anon: How and when did the Donkey and the Elephant become the respective symbols of the two American parties?

Ans: (thanks to Edgar A. Mowrer): The cartoonist, Thomas Nast seems to have invented both for Harper's Weekly. In 1870 Nast pictured a "Democratic" donkey labeled "Copperhead Press" kicking a (presumably) Republican lion. Almost five years later, in November 1874, he depicted the Republican elephant as a timorous and unwieldy animal. Both symbols gradually became accepted by the respective parties and endowed with the virtues which they supposed these animals embody at their best.

to the one-room school house in Plainville.

"When the family moved to the northeast corner of Broadway and Cherry St., Ernie transferred his scholastic allegiance to the then modern school building on Nicholas St. "He continued to excel in his studies for the legal requirement in those years of 100 days following his 12th birthday. At which time this full-fledged scholar with his formal education behind him, secured his working papers and appeared on the Hicksville scene as Ernest Francke, breadwinner.

"As a kid, Ernie was no petunia but a real, solid, typical, fun-loving American boy reared in a rural atmosphere that is truly America. We played cowboys and Indians in Hicksville before the Plains surrendered to an always welcome and increasing population that by comparison makes Hicksville today a metropolis of upwards of 24,000 souls as against less than 1,000 when we were kids.

WHEN WE WERE KIDS
"When Ernie and I were kids," Eisemann continued, "and this incident stands out in my memory because we considered it quite an achievement—the movie industry, like us, was in its infancy and the nickelodeon was located in a hall that was formerly a blacksmith shop on E. Barclay St. Ernie and his pals were a pretty noisy bunch and whether by coincidence or design, more boisterous when playing directly outside the movie house. This was the day of the silent movie and the whoops of the kids playing a riotous game of cops and robbers did not go any too well with the tender love story unfolding on the screen.

"The noise was so distracting to the movie paying public that finally in desperation, the distracted proprietor would chase the whole gang in to watch the movie, just to keep them quiet."

In his remarks at the previous dinner, Eisemann also recalled other incidents in the early life of the guest of honor.

Last Saturday night, the invocation was given by Rev. Howard Rogers, formerly pastor of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church in Hicksville. The program was opened by John Petrone, president of the Lions Club.

There were also remarks by Supreme Court Justice Marcus Christ and a brief response by Francke who paid tribute to his wife, Pearl, and expressed his gratitude for the honors bestowed upon him.

There was a fear that Hicksville High's Comets might have to learn a painful lesson that youth and inexperience have their limitations on a football field.

It was not, however, expected to be a self inflicted lesson. It was! Bethpage, good, sly and knowing, did not overpower the Orange and Black, 20-7, Saturday, with any awesome display of might.

The Golden Eagles were aided by some very foolish and unthinking mistakes by the Comets.

In the first quarter Hicksville threw back two thrusts inside its thirty and finally the bottled up Eagles were forced to punt from the 36. Long after the kick was away an Orange shirt saw fit to gently deposit the punter to the turf. The senseless act induced a 15-yard penalty and swept the Eagles to a score.

Within a minute the Eagles had another tally. On the first play from scrimmage Joe Naso looped a pass into the flat. It was intercepted and returned 46 yards to the Comet 15. A quick simple pass resulted in the second TD. This of course was just an unfortunate break.

Hicksville's confidence was jarred but still full blown. Late in the second period John Roberts (he made 71 yards in nine attempts) and Vice Sadachany pulled the Comets up by the bootstraps.

It started on the Comet 35. Roberts got five over tackle, Ted Grieve hit the left side for 12 yards and Sadachany picked up 10. A holding penalty pushed it back but Roberts came hurdling over the right tackle and scampered 31 yards to the Eagle 11. With a minute to go confusion disturbed execution and the half time gong sounded with a down left on the seven.

Hicksville wasted little time after Roberts' slashing 31-yard return of the second half kickoff. In six plays 53 yards were sliced away and he got the score on a final ten yard run. It was around end for the extra point.

It took Bethpage five plays to run the count to 20-7. Two long passes after pretended runs at the Hicksville flanks consumed 58 of the 80 yards needed.

Five minutes and five hard running plays later (Comets outgained their victors 158 to 109 net on the ground), Hicksville was on the Eagle 13.

Only a minute was gone in the last period and the tide appeared to be turning. However, on the very first play a Hicksville lineman actually grabbed and held. Assessed for offensive holding the Comets went 15 yards back.

At that point Naso lofted a majestic leading pass some forty yards in flight. John Magee—he had an excellent day in blocking for the quick bursts over tackle—eluded the defense but could only make 39 yards 11 inches in his bid to snare it.

That was the end. Two additional fumbles of four that bounced from Comet hands were yet to come and sent off even a consolation score.

Aware of the Hicksville weakness on pass defense the Eagles shot 9 and made good on five for a total of 81 yards. While it has run off 768 yards, running Hicksville this year has one pass completion for 11 paces.

This fact only adds to the fine running ability of Roberts, Grieve, Sadachany and Dick Stillman. The opponents defense is naturally drawn in but the runners still move.

It was a rough game. Flying elbows, knees and clinched fists marked the contest. The officials marched off 160-yards in penalties against Bethpage. They were still very lax.

There is no question that the Comets have a long way to come from the desolation of 1955. They can help themselves by thinking. The greatest coach in the world can not help if they invoke foolish penalties at crucial moments on themselves.

The biggest Garden City team in years will come to the local gridiron Saturday. Some two thousand fans are expected to sit in and watch the unbe-

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Eisemann Recalls Boyhood Days Here With Ernest Francke

GARDEN CITY — A capacity audience attended the testimonial dinner given at the Garden City Hotel, Saturday night, by the Lions Club of Hicksville in honor of Ernest F. Francke. For some present it recalled a gala event in April 1952 in the same place where Francke was honored by the community. Henry G. Eisemann, long-time friend of the guest of honor, recalled the dual events. He was principal speaker at both affairs.

Eisemann restricted his remarks last Saturday night, but at the affair in 1952 he spoke of a "sentimental journey into the past". He recalled "the Francke family migrated from Far Rockaway . . . and this was back in 1897 . . . when the trip from Far Rockaway to McCarthy's Lane in Jericho was truly a journey. Thus began the life of our beloved friend in our community."

"My family followed Ernie into Hicksville several years later. The Francke clan soon made the house on McCarthy's Lane bulge. It is readily understandable. Ernie had six sisters. The next move, therefore, was to Plainview where they occupied a house on the site where Tony Ocker now lives.

"It does not require much imagination to understand why the next move was to Hicksville. Even back in those days Hicksville presented possibilities. Though the family was ever on the move to increasingly larger quarters, Ernie continued to study his readin', writin' and 'rithmetic.
