Continuous Fence Pledged, P-TA Says

HICKSVILLE—The Burns Ave. P-TA, continuing its efforts to obtain the closing of three streets on the westerly side of the Mid-Island Shopping Plaza to vehicular traffic, this week called attention of Supervisor Lewis N. Waters at Oyster Bay to a declaration recorded three years ago which provides for complete fencing of the area on three sides.

According to the P-TA executive Board, Walter Stackler and Leonard L. Frank in a declaration dated Sept. 8, 1953 and recorded in the County Clerk's office on Oct. 7, 1953, pledged to erect a "continuous" six-foot fence on the north, west and south boundaries of the

land which is today the Mid Island parking field.

Noting that fencing of the area has started, the P-TA points out the openings have been left for traffic thru Prose, Windsor and York Streets. "We feel that under

From the Long Island Sound to the Atlantic Ocean the Republican victory was complete as was the polled 69,929 votes and Stevenson 29,501 (with four election district returns missing out of 118).

In Hicksville the President received 13,766 ballots and Stevenson 5,701. Plainview recorded 4,133 for Ike and 3,488 for Adlai while Bethpage gave the GOP 6,922 and Democrats 3,306.

Thomas R. Pynchon, the only township candidate on the ticket, received 65,325 votes and Henry Conych of Plainview got 35,114.

Sullivan in commenting upon the results said: "The overwhelming support given by the voters of the township—both long time residents and new homeowners—to our great president is evidence of the high regard the people of the township have for him and their confidence in his leadership of our nation."

An Installation Dinner for new officers is planned for this January—a repetition of last year's successful dinner, which has become an annual event for NBPA members.

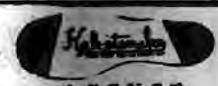
