# Do We Remember Pearl Harbor?

FIFTEEN YEARS ago tomorrow (Friday) our nation on a Sunday afternoon heard the stunning radio news bulletin with disbelief that the Japanese airmen had blasted Pearl Harbor.

Where were you that Sunday? How did you react to the news? The writer was busy getting ready for the next edition of the community paper. We were in the office which at that time was located in the present address of the Hat Box at 103 Broadway.

We got the news via a telephone call from our home where the bulletin had been heard. We splashed the news on a large sheet of newsprint with red poster paints.

There was little traffic on the Hicksville streets on that Sunday afternoon and the bulletin attracted scant notice. Monday morning, at the request of the late Oscar Berry who was then head of the local CD air raid wardens, we made up some mimeographed bulletins advising the public where they could enroll in Civil Defense. Our office became the principal place.

Plans were underway at once for a big community CD meeting which, as we recalled, took place in the firehouse auditorium on Thursday night. Hundreds turned out and more than 700 people volunteered for

CD within the week. People were frankly worried and disturbed.

Word got around that Hicksville's first casualty at Pearl Harbor had been Cleveland Dodge. A solemn announcement to that effect was made at the big meeting in the firehouse, which, as we recall, was conducted by John R. Brandt, then our Councilman and head of the CD, and Frank Chlumsky. The late Dr. Elwood A. Curtis, chairman of the Selective Service Board, had a role in the meeting.

Later it developed that the news about Cleveland Dodge had been incorrect. A telegram to his family reported him as missing. He was a sailor aboard one of the ships in the Harbor on that infamous day. By New Year's Day his family received further notice

# Board Adopts Merit-System Teacher, Principal Pay Scale

HICKSVILLE -- The Board of Education adopted a new salary scale for Teachers, Supervisors, Assistant Principals and Principals which is based upon a merit system, at a special meeting, Tuesday night. The new scale was adopted for the 1957-58 school year and was also made effective for all personnel concerned as of Jan. 1.

The Board action, taken by vote of 4 to 2, followed the presentation of a report and recommendations by Trustee Allen Carpenter speaking for the special board committee which included Robert Eaton, Joseph Cawley and Mabel Farley.

Carpenter said the recommendations were approved by both the Classroom Teachers' Assoc and Administrators' Assoc of the district.

President Emil J. Szendy and Trustee Elwood S. Kent voted against the proposed scale, but the motion carried. Szendy objected on the grounds that the merit system was not adequate in itself and argued for inclusion of an in-service training program and an all-month basis.

It was reported that putting the schedule into effect as of Jan. 1 will cost approximately \$70,000 which is within the additional funds authorized for salary increases at the annual district meeting last May.

The new scale ranges from \$4,000 to \$9,000 for teachers on 20 steps, from \$4500 to \$9500 also on 20 steps for supervisors, from \$6,000 to \$9500 for assistant principals on 9 steps and from \$7500 to \$11,000 for principals on 6 steps.

Also approved were a range of \$9500 to \$13,000 for assistant superintendents on four steps and from \$12,500 to \$16,000 on three steps for the Superintendent.

The Assistant and Superintendent's scale does not take effect Jan. 1.

Fundamentally, the new merit system plan provides for annual

HICKSVILLE - Harold "Hawxle" Hawxhurst was elected a commissioner of the Fire District, Tuesday night, as more than 1380 votes were cast. He received 878 ballots while incumbent Fred Miller received 337. The two other candidates for the office were Robert Hammond who got 176 votes and Cono Brigandi who received 171.

Hawxhurst said he was grateful to all who cast their votes for him and pledged himself to be worthy of their support. For Miller, the election ended three consecutive 5-year terms in office.

During the coming week, Dec. 10 to 14 and the following week, Dec. 17 to 21, the main office and Plainview branch is open from 7 AM to 7 PM. Gertz station is open 10 AM to 7 PM and contract stations from 9 AM to 7 PM.

On Monday, Dec. 24, the Main office and Plainview is open from 7 AM to 6 PM; Gertz station from 10 AM to 6 PM and contract stations from 9 AM to 5 PM.

Postmaster Cotter said there is no change in hours for money order services.

# Do We Remember Pearl Harbor?

correcting the earlier report. By a strange coincidence, his father, Cleveland Dodge, Sr., was incorrectly reported missing in action during World War I. However, Hicksville did have a casualty at Pearl Harbor, the brother of someone who worked closely with us on the paper for a number of years. John Haughey, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Haughey of Third St., Hicksville, was among the victims of the sneak attack on Hickam Field and Pearl Harbor. At first he was reported among the missing, later he was declared a victim of the attack.

## 19 GAVE THEIR LIVES

By the end of the war in 1945, the list of those who were killed or died in service of their nation had grown to 19 names: Fred Anderson, Henry A. Gebhardt Jr., John Holubowicz, John Haughey, John Looney, James Madden, Andres Manelski, Robert Matschat, Arthur F. Noeth, William M. Pakaluk, Jr., Anthony Petrone, William Remy, Melvin Rohrbach, Wallace Schaeffer, Elsworth W. Steinert, Gregory Stock, Robert Ulmer, Raymond Zeltman and John Zieler.

More than 840 names are listed on the bronze tablets of the World War II Memorial at the Junior High School grounds as the men and women of Hicksville who served their nation between Dec. 7, 1941 and Sept. 2nd, 1945.

Pearl Harbor Day and World War II cannot be mentioned without glowing tribute to the Hicksville Comfort Committee, a unique organization which had its start in World War I and was revived as selective service and volunteer enlistments called away hundreds of our boys and girls.

Frank Chlunsky and Henry G. Eismann in World War I had been principal factors in the Comfort Committee which sent those in service small but important comforts from home. As more and more Hicksville boys and girls left their hometown to wear uniforms, Mr. Chlunsky, Mr. Eismann, together with William Braun, the late John Puvogel, and the late Edward Schluter began wrapping monthly parcels of smokes and other items which continued monthly throughout the war.

The accompanying snapshot taken by the writer was one of the first gatherings of the committee in the office of seaman and Eismann. Community residents and organizations were generous with their donations which kept this fund going and provided 10,000 gift parcels. At the war's end the committee had a "Welcome Home" sign strung across Broadway. The committee, principally through the efforts of Frank Chlunsky, maintained complete records of all those in service and their service addresses.

Phil Gendron of Thorman Ave., deserves special mention also for his continuous efforts during the years to patiently letter the names of those called

into service for the honor roll maintained on Broadway prior to the development of the permanent memorial.

As the war closed, community leaders sought to develop a fitting tribute to those who had served and those who gave their lives. We recall writing numerous articles and public opinion, as we recall vividly, was agreed upon the thought that the memorial should be something "living." Suggestions were numerous and ranged from development of the high school grounds into a recreation centre complete with swimming pool to a local hospital and to a community hall.

## LIVING MEMORIAL

One of the saddest facts which did develop was the failure of the community to develop the "living" memorial, although Frank Sutter and his committee worked tirelessly to have the plan developed. Eventually it was concluded that a Memorial Mall would at least assure formal remembrance of those who died and those who served.

It was another Pearl Harbor Day, Dec. 7, 1947 --- nine years ago --- that a public ceremony was held in the high school which dedicated the new memorial and rededicated the memorial of World War I which the community had moved to the school grounds from the Rail Road Station plaza.

The program included selections by the high school band and glee club, as well as the Hicksville Choral Society, Supreme Court Justice Cortland A. Johnson was principal speaker.

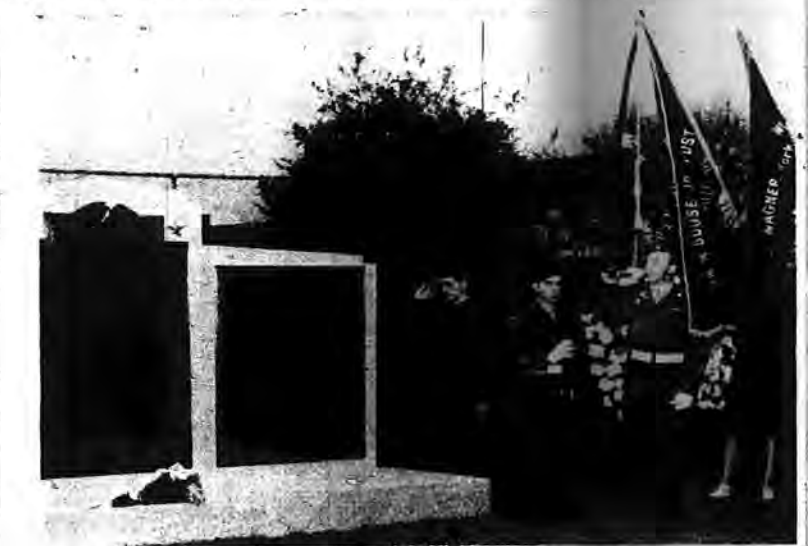
Others on the Memorial Committee with Chairman Sutter included Mr. L.H. LeBaron, then superintendent of schools, as secretary; Sarah Huettner, Cleveland Dodge Sr., Frank Shea, Frank Chlunsky, Charles H. Stoll and the writer.

Incidentally valuable memorial dogwood trees at the Memorial Mall were the gifts of the Republican Club, Kiwanis Club and the Charles Wagner Legion Post and Auxiliary. The funds for the mall, which cost about \$10,000 were provided by remaining treasures of the Civil Defense and Comfort Committee and by the individual contributions of residents.

We don't believe that it is too late to see the dream of those who were concerned as World War II drew to a close still become a reality. Our community is today in the process of building a new, enlarged public library not far from the Memorial Mall.

We would like to see the library dedicated to the memory of those who have served our nation in time of war. Perhaps it would even be possible, with public contributions, to get that memorial flag pole erected on the library grounds which was the special thought of the late Dr. Curtis.

Tomorrow is Pearl Harbor Day. Do we keep the faith? Do we still remember?

## Fire Up New Incinerator Furnaces

OYSTER BAY - Furnaces in the Township's new incinerator in Old Bethpage will begin "firing-up" this week as plant engineers commence testing equipment and drying out firebrick work in the huge 500-ton capacity plant. Supervisor Waters said today.

Located on a 28-acre site on Winding Road, the new \$1,800,000 plant, which has been described by engineering experts as the most modern in the country, is concealed from view by natural foliage with only the two 143' high chimneys visible.

In commenting on the new plant, waters pointed out that the Town Board initiated the project in 1954

in order to provide adequate refuse disposal facilities for the Town's vastly increasing population. The Township's taxpayers voted approval of the new plant by an overwhelming 4 to 1 majority after Democrat leaders sought to prevent its construction. It is interesting to note that in 1937 only 12 tons of refuse per day were burned in

the Township.

"The new incinerator, together with the existing Locust Grove plant," Supervisor Waters said, "will increase the Town's refuse disposal capacity to 800 tons per day and will take care of the homeowners' needs for years to come at a tremendous savings in cost to the taxpayers."

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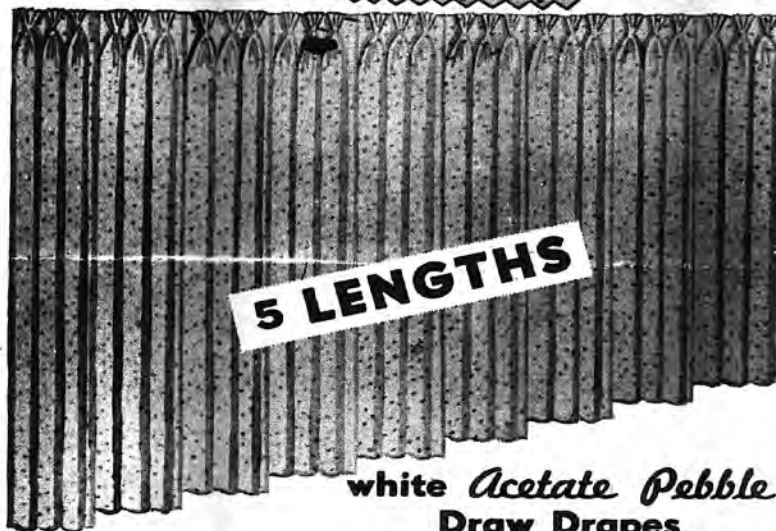

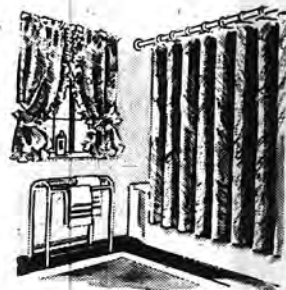

- shall have a drain line extended to within 4 inches of the floor.
19. 1. 8 All installations of laundry wash trays are to be supplied with water through a swing spout over the rim faucet; the use of wash tray cocks is prohibited.
19. 1. 7 SIZE OF PIPES: The water service pipe from the street supply to the building shall be of lead or copper piping of not less than three-quarters of an inch in diameter.
19. 1. 8 WATER SUPPLY: Where water service pipe and sewer are placed in the same trench, the water service pipe shall be placed on a vertically excavated shelf one foot above on the side of sewer line but at no time shall the water service pipe be less than four feet (4 feet) below grade.
19. 2. 1 No plumbing fixture or device shall be supplied directly from a water supply system through a flush or other valve unless such valve is adequately protected to prevent pollution of the water supply.
19. 2. 2 No plumbing fixture or device shall be installed which will provide an inter-connection between a distribution system of water for drinking and domestic purposes and a drainage system, soil or waste pipe or make possible the backflow of sewage or waste into the water supply system.
19. 2. 3 Cross connection between a public and private water supply system is prohibited unless approved by Nassau County Department of Health.
19. 2. 4 Plumbing fixtures and devices for the protection of the water supply against pollution and back siphonage shall conform to the design accepted by the National Plumbing Laboratory.
19. 2. 5 FLUSH-VALVE FIXTURES: Flush-valve controlled fixtures with submerged inlets supplied directly from the public water supply system, (and not supplied from separate river and tank), shall be equipped with an approved vacuum breaker in the supply line not less than 4" above the overflow level of the fixture to prevent siphonage or backflow of contaminated water into the house water distribution piping.
19. 2. 6 TOILET COCKS: One piece toilet combination where the flush tank is less than 3" above the rim of the fixture and operated by ball cocks, there shall be an approved vacuum breaker located not less than one-half inch above the overflow outlet of the flush tank.
19. 2. 7 SUBMERGED INLETS: Water supply inlets of type which shall be located at least one inch above the overflow level of the fixture, except when submerged inlets are approved by the Department of Health for the proper functioning of a fixture, an approved vacuum breaker and check valve shall be installed.
19. 2. 8 STERILIZATION: Water supply piping connections to sterilizers are prohibited. The waste piping for sterilizers shall not connect directly with any drainage system; such waste piping shall discharge above an open water supply, trapped and vented fixture.
19. 2. 9 ASPIRATORS AND WATER Siphons: Water supply connections to aspirators, water siphons or similar apparatus shall be equipped with an approved vacuum breaker and check valve. The waste pipe for this type of apparatus shall discharge directly with any drainage system but shall discharge above an open water supply, trapped and vented fixture.
19. 2. 10 BIDETS AND BEDPAN WASHERS: Water supply connections to bidets, bedpan washers or similar apparatus shall be equipped with an approved vacuum breaker and check valve, the latter located between the fixture and the vacuum breaker.
19. 2. 11 ROOF OR SUCTION TANKS: Water supply inlets to roof or suction tanks shall be located at least two inches above the overflow level of the tank.
19. 2. 12 CONDENSERS: Direct water connection to refrigeration unit for cooling purposes shall be equipped with an approved check valve to prevent possible back flow of ammonia or other refrigerant agents from the condenser coils or jackets, except in such installations where the water supply piping is entirely outside of the piping or tank containing the refrigerant and two independent wall thicknesses of metal separate the refrigerant from the public water supply system.
19. 2. 13 REFRIGERATION UNITS: Containing more than twenty pounds of refrigerant shall be provided with an approved relief valve in the form of an approved relief valve installed at the outlet side of the check valve; such relief valve being set at a pressure not above the maximum water pressure at the point of installation.
19. 2. 14 SWIMMING POOLS: Water supply inlets to swimming pools shall be in accordance with 20. 2. 1, 20. 2. 2, 19. 5. 1.

## RAG PICKERS IN THE END ZONE

By Howard Finnegan

With the score 20-13 Hicksville High had extended itself beyond its capabilities. Superiority in weight and numbers sustained Westbury and in the final minutes the Green Wave converted two intercepted passes into a 35-13 victory.

Westbury thus earned the right to meet Mineola in that first Thanksgiving Day game back in 1945 and rapped the County Seaters hard for the North Shore title.

With a record of 19 wins, 2 losses and 4 ties, coach Lou Millevolte found that assembling a schedule for 1946 wasn't any easier than the previous season when he could only get five games.

It was to be a year that a generation had to learn how to lose. It was a year that the rags were replaced with acceptable uniforms. The complete lack of a foundation program for the past decade would take its toll on the sport.

And it was a year that the Hicksville banner was just as feared and respected at the conclusion of the season as it was at the outset.

Smug Garden City, haughtily casting aside any playoff suggestions with Hicksville in 1943 and 1944, was ready in 1946. The Trojans had 14 varsity lettermen back from '45 in which they lost only to County champion Valley Stream.

But Hicksville wanted it badly. Halfbacks Pete Haughey and Frank Pepe swarmed around the flanks and George Van Wickler drove hard at the tackles. Van Wickler capped a 78-yard drive in the first period for a 7-0 lead but the Trojans roared back to knot it.

City then called upon Andy Thompson, second highest scorer in the County the previous season, for a field goal from the 27 and it shot the Trojans into a 10-7 lead.

However, Haughey, Pepe and Van Wickler running had the Comets ahead 13-10 at halftime. City tried to regroup in the second half but Gus Econopoulis at center, and ends Herman Rigby and Lou Koji contained the Trojans. Pat Hennerty, John Hogan, Andy Hebert, Bill Zirk, Walter Kuras and Mike Pakaluk joined in with stubborn line play and late in the fourth period the pressing Comets forced a safety. The score ended 15-10.

Powerful Oceanside which went on to a 5-0 win, 1 tie and 1 loss for the campaign recorded a 7-0 over the Orange in a sturdy battle.

In a night game at Freeport, the legions of the football-conscious school ran up a 28-0 lead before Dick Wesnofski and Pete Haughey could score for Hicksville for a final 28-14 score. The Red Devils had 5 and 2 for the year.

Washington Irving of Tarrytown had not been beaten in three

regular seasons and had won 46 out of 50 games when Millevolte put them on the schedule.

It was a pleasant trip for the players and students but two fumbles inside the Hicksville ten lead to Author TD's and a 14-0 loss. The hosts had a 6 and 1 record for 1946.

Stung by the three straight losses the Orange players rose in wrath against Meapham. In the running for the South Shore Class A title the Bucs were heavy favorites. A second period score gave them a 6-0 advantage.

### CIRCUS CATCH

In the third period Hicksville was stopped on the one yard line. Again with three minutes left in the game the Comets pulled up one stop short. After the Bucs kicked out Hicksville had a fourth and 19 on the 29 when Van Wickler passed to Pepe for the two. It was in truth a circus catch but as he went down he sprayed over the goal.

Tied 6-6 Meapham was furious. Four quick passes brought them to the Hicksville 11 but time ran out. The Bucs, traveling in very fast company, lost only two games on the season.

Van Wickler broke the Farmingdale stubbornness with a third period 6-yard hit for a 6-0 win at Bethpage.

With a blitz passing attack Westbury ran up a 5 and 2 mark with wins over Freeport and Hempstead. The aerial game was the big weapon and Millevolte spread his line wide for in a bid for a big upset.

The Green Wave gained 242 yards rushing but completed only four of 10 passes. One however scored in the second period.

Hicksville held off the Wave and then forced Westbury to the defense in the last period. Bill Lenzner reeled off a 35-yard jaunt. The last defender pushed him out on the 35.

Van Wickler passed to Herman Rigby to the 23 and Joe Webnoski bucked to the 17. The ball was lost on downs. It ended 7-0.

The mark went to 2 wins, 4 losses and 1 tie for the year.

In 1947, the backfield was much the same as the previous year with left-handed Pete Zeiher adding deception plus running

power. Lou Zirk in the line teamed with Bill Zirk, Bob Watson, Lou Caruso, John Wysolovsky, John Hennerty, Thomas Langion and Al Cannon were young but were Millevolte's idea of a future team.

Reserves in the backfield were John Econopoulis, Elias Stetz, Ed Miller and Dave Allen.

Garden City was surprised again, 13-6. Freeport continued in high gear, 18-7. Frank Pepe made a 43-yard dash to even the score with Washington Irving, 6-0. Oceanside went home a winner by a touchdown.

Lou Koji broke his arm in the first quarter at North Bellmore and Meapham survived 6-0. Farmingdale was as spirited as ever but Hicksville won again, 12-2.

In a rousing finale at Westbury, Hicksville scored twice in the last period to gain a 12-12 deadlock. With a 3 win, 3 loss and one tied record Millevolte's ledger with Hicksville soared to 24 wins, 9 losses and 5 ties.

The outlook was very bright. Millevolte was sure he had his soundest club ready for the 1948 season. It was perfect on balance and ability.

It was good. It stumbled in losing to Meapham 6-0 and was tied 13-13 by a good Oyster Bay team. On the final day of the season it defeated untied, unscored upon, unbeaten Farmingdale 20-0.

With victory over the Dales came an invitation to the North Shore bowl game and a chance for sweet revenge. But Washington dropped Hicksville in 1944 with a terse comment on its high scoring ways.

Port had won the North Shore title two years running but the Orange team of promise denied a third 6-0.

However, Millevolte was not at the helm.

### OUT OF END ZONE

With a clear and shining record of 24 wins, 5 ties and 9 losses at a school described by many as the least enviable at which to coach, Millevolte stopped down after the 1947 season.

The ragpickers left the endzone. The Orange and Black has not been back in such distinguished profusion since.

Increases for teachers until a certain step is reached. Thereafter a separate recommendation is needed for each successive advancement up the salary scale.

Sol Zimmerman, speaking as a member of the audience, advised the Board against taking such "revolutionary" action and urged them to table consideration of the merit plan until it could be widely discussed and debated in the entire district.

In other action at the meeting, President Szendy deplored the staging of a "rump" session of the Board members, Monday night, at the Administration building. In answer to Szendy's comments, Trustee Joseph Cawley, who had suggested the meeting, said "door was open" if the public had wished to attend.

It was also determined at the meeting to authorize payment of \$6 a mile to custodians who use their cars in district business, based upon certification and authorization by Richard H. Cairns, superintendent of buildings and grounds.

At the Board meeting last Friday night, it was voted to extend the "right of way" arrangement with Stacker & Frank for their road across school property into Mid Island Shopping Plaza from W. John St. until Jan. 15.

It was indicated the district may

have a special referendum in January or early February covering a supplemental appropriation needed for student transportation, the question of a property transfer with Stacker & Frank, and the election of a Library District Trustee.
