## State Orders Traffic Controls

ALBANY--The State Traffic Commission today ordered the issuance of permits on the installation of traffic control signals in front of Mid Island Plaza, North Broadway, Hicksville and prohibited the parking of vehicles on both sides of the state highway in front of the Plaza.

Earlier this week signs were posted by police prohibiting parking or standing of vehicles on both sides of North Broadway for a distance of several hundred feet north of John St. intersection. Business concerns Business concerns in the area were not pleased with the action.

## Adult Courses Enroll 1,775

HICKSVILLE--Open house was held, Monday night, at the High School on Division Ave to mark the conclusion of the most successful Adult Education Program in the history of the community. An all-time record enrollment of 1,775 was reported by Program Director Elery Bean. More than 350 attended the open house when examples of work by the "students" were on exhibit. Enrollment for the new spring term is scheduled for Jan. 14 and 15, Bean said.

## Permits Ready For New Year

Hicksville - All-day parking permits for residents of the Park and Parking District, which is the same area as the School District will be available for the new year at the Town Hall Annex office, 32 Broadway, here starting Monday, Dec. 17.

One parking field is now set aside for all-day parking by residents of the district who display their permits on their cars and another will soon be made available, town officials said.

The Town Hall Annex also has available dog licenses for the year 1957. Under a town Ordinance, it is unlawful for any person to permit a dog to run loose unless the animal is under the immediate and full control of the owner or person in charge and while the dog is on leash. Violators of the ordinance may be subject to a fine of not more than \$25 for each offense and the dog warden may seize any dog found at large or not under the immediate control of the owner or person in charge.

Copies of the ordinance, enacted in 1954, are available at the Town Hall Annex here as well as the Town Hall in Oyster Bay.

## 4 Absent, Board Unable to Meet

HICKSVILLE--The Board of Education will meet tomorrow (Fri) night with an accumulating backlog of items to be considered. The meeting set for last Friday night could not be held when four trustees were missing, failing to achieve a quorum. A special meeting was held Monday night for the purpose of holding an executive session on "certain policies".

When the time for the meeting arrived last Friday night it was announced that Trustee Arthur L. Elrich has given notice early in the day that he could not be present. Trustees Robert Eaton and Elwood Kent had advised the administration late in the day they could not attend. Miss Mabel R. Farley brought notice that Trustee Joseph Cawley was ill and also could not attend.

With only President Emil Szendy, Trustee Allen Carpenter and Miss Farley present, the group lacked a quorum.

A special meeting was called for Monday night at the request of Trustees Kent, Eaton and Elrich. President Szendy and Trustee Carpenter were not present. After a few minutes of open session, the Trustees went into executive session, reconvened the meeting at 10:55 PM, went back into executive session, again reconvened at 12:25 AM and then adjourned.

During one of the "open" intervals, Monday night, the Board voted to hold a special meeting this Friday night and the regular monthly meeting on Dec. 28. Both sessions will be in the High School Cafeteria at 8:30 PM.

President Szendy has protested the meeting being held last Monday night on the grounds that insufficient notice had been given and that the purpose of the session was not clear.

Among the numerous items placed on the agenda by individual board members for coming meetings is the subject of tape recording of the Board of Education which began with official action on July 8.

The agenda item has been listed by Trustee Elrich.

At the meeting of Sept. 14, the Board voted to have duplicate copies of the official recordings made and placed in the public library for the use of qualified voters of the District. At the same time, five rules for the use of the tapes in the library were adopted.

Since enactment of the tape recording decision, 50 seven inch reels have been duplicated and placed in the library where they have available for listening. The official recordings made at meetings are in the custody of the District Clerk and locked in the vault of the School District.

Levittown School Board has recently followed suit and is now tape recording its sessions.

## Magnet Of Plaza Plus RR Crossings

THE IMPACT OF Mid Island Plaza upon shopping this Christmas season for the other business people of Hicksville will not be known for several days yet, but there are indications that between the magnet of the big shopping centre and the aggravating traffic conditions on the north-south streets, the final word will be less than pleasing to some.

Conversation leads us to believe that the impact of the Plaza, plus Roosevelt Field and other newly opened collections of retailers has also been felt in Levittown, Hempstead and other communities.

It is frankly admitted that positive action upon the grade crossing elimination for Hicksville will go a long way towards making everyone more comfortable and happy. East-west traffic is now almost impossible, every day of the week. North-south movement continues to be a bumper-to-bumper procession with the backup now running as far as two or three miles south of the Plaza at peak hours.

With the opening of the new session of the State Legislature within a few weeks we send a hopeful prayer to Albany that those who control the money bags of the state loosen up enough to get our RR crossing elimination program on the road. You can help the situation by writing to our legislators, the Governor and State Dept. of Public Works at Albany.

### SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

The National Board of Fire Underwriters advises shopkeepers to take these fire safety precautions:

1. Several times a day, dispose of cartons and waste materials that accumulate from unpacking goods.
2. Clear back rooms and cellars of such materials each day.
3. Permit smoking only under controlled conditions.
4. Keep aisles and exits clear.
5. Drill clerks in the handling of fire extinguishers and other equipment that may be used for the control of small fires.
6. For decoration, use non-flammable or at least slow-burning materials, and keep them away from electric light bulbs.
7. Call in qualified electricians for new wiring or extensions. Have the work inspected.
8. Check fuses. Be sure each one is a proper size for the circuit it protects.

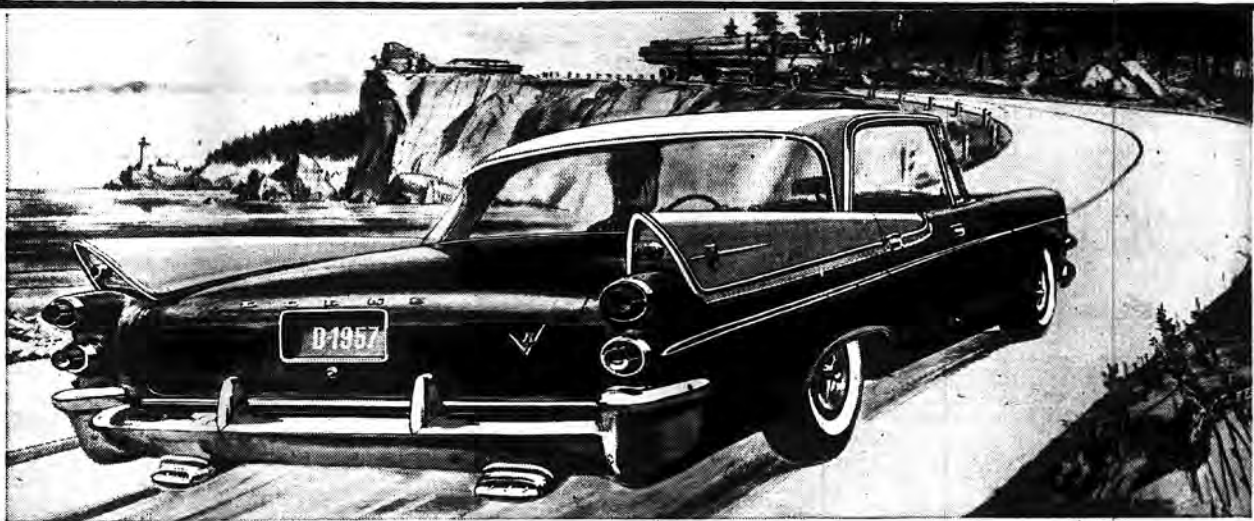

Adults should take care also in purchasing chemical sets for children. Toys requiring alcohol, kerosene, gasoline or carbide lamps may be hazardous in children's hands.

Parents also should supervise any play with electrical toys involving fuels and chemicals.

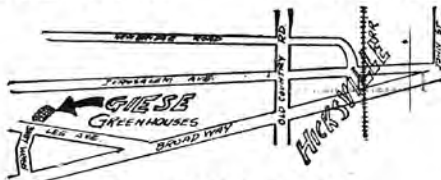

## Decorations To Supplement The Candle Cause Many Fatal Fires

"Fires across the nation have killed 23 persons, most of them children, on the eve of the Christmas holiday celebration."

"All but 10 of the fire victims were children eagerly awaiting the excitement and gifts of Christmas."

That was last year. Will it happen again this year?

And the saddest thing is that such tragedies often occur around the Christmas holiday—sometimes even around the Christmas tree itself—at the happiest time of the year.

The reason the tree burns so fiercely and so rapidly is because it's filled with pitch and resin—among the most combustible substances known.

What can you do about the tree?

First of all, the National Board of Fire Underwriters suggests that you select a small one. There will be 30,000,000 on the market. Some 4,000,000 Christmas trees reach retail outlets in New York State alone.

It's best to keep the tree outdoors until a few days before setting it up. During that time occasionally throw water over it. This will keep it moist, fresh.

When you bring the tree inside, cut the butt slantwise to open the pores, then stand it in a tub of water. Be wary of chemicals or other substances sold for "fireproofing" trees. In some cases this process is ineffective.

To placing the tree, the National Board advises that you avoid "hot spots" such as those near the fireplace, stove, television set, radiator or electric bulbs.

Never, warns the National Board, use untreated paper ornaments or untreated cotton batting or gauze for decoration. Cotton and gauze can be made flame-resistant by dipping in a gallon of water mixed with nine ounces of borax and four ounces of boric acid.

Also, use only electric lights, never candles. Be sure, too, that wires are in good condition and bear the UL tag denoting Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc., which shows they have been tested for safety. Frayed electric cords, the National Board points out, are a fire hazard.

The switch for turning on the tree lights should be placed some distance from the tree. Never use an outlet or plug under the tree or run electric trains around the base.

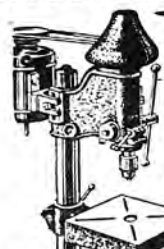

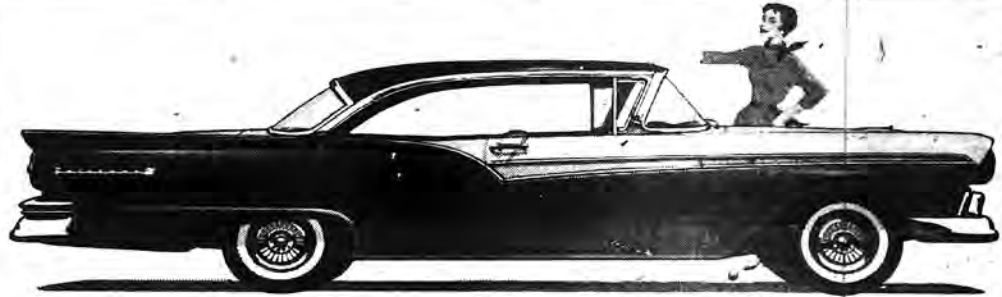

More than 100 answers were received in the recent MID-ISLAND HERALD contest in which readers were asked "How Good is Your Memory?" Three-quarters of the replies were correct as to the location in the top picture, with a current photo by Gus Hansen published for present-day comparison, but there were two rules: (1) earliest reply and (2) most complete comment.

W. Arnold Jeanson of Plainview Rd., former chief of Hicksville Fire Dept., submitted the following prize-winning answer:

"The scene published in your Nov. 22 issue was taken approximately 40 years ago. At that time it was the frontage of St. John's Rectory, now known as the Mid-Island Shopping Plaza. The large flagpole shown was always surrounded by a beautiful flower bed. The hitching post along the curb was used often by Father Fuchs of St. Ignace Church on his visits to the home and whenever services were held at the chapel.

"The chapel was to the left of the photo and the home building which housed a hundred or more boys was directly

behind the flag pole, the first building on the right in the photo housed the farm-workers who maintained the grounds, raised the crops and farm stock which supplied the Home, also the Home in Brooklyn. The last building shown was and is still occupied by the Jeanson family. The boy, standing on the (then) gravel path is John Jeanson, eldest son of the Jeansons. The cows and horse shown were pastured across the road. This is now driven over every day thru the traffic circles for the shopping Plaza. The road as at that time only an oiled macadam (Hicksville-Jericho Road, Route 106-7). You will note how low the utility poles are. During many a winter storm these poles would be covered by snow, sometimes only the tops were in sight. (I have pictures to prove it.)

"Sister Adelaide was Mother Superior at the Rectory in those days. William Thorman, who still resides in Hicksville was the superintendent of the farm. George King was superintendent of buildings. I assure you this scene recalls many happy memories.
