Must Be Ready: Civil Defense Urgently Needs More Workers

HICKSVILLE—An all-out appeal for volunteers to join the local Civil Defense forces is underway with a special meeting for the registration of men and women this Thursday night, Dec. 21, in the VFW Clubhouse at 8 o'clock on Grand Ave. off Fourth St. Frank Sutter, CD Director for Hicksville-Plainview, said last night that the community force has been alerted by proclamation of County Commander, Gen. C. W. Wickersham.

"The Civil Defense setup is proceeding favorably on the county and community level," Gen. Wickersham said this week, "but more men and women volunteers are needed throughout the county for all branches of service. New York City might be the second 'Pearl Harbor.' We can't wait until a bomb falls to organize. We must be ready and at full strength immediately."

All volunteers must be fingerprinted, take the loyalty oath and have a photograph before they can be issued identification, Sutter said. Fingerprints have been taken of nearly 300 volunteers in the area, but almost three times that number are needed for a minimum force.

Those interested may enroll their services at the Herald office, 162 Bway, during business hours, or call Hicksville 3-1400. Training courses for auxiliary police and wardens are scheduled to start shortly and a local control centre is being established.

Sector wardens are being selected for the warden posts, of which there are nearly 30 for Hicksville-Plainview, Sutter explained.

Members of the Disaster Committee of the Red Cross branch, led by Miss Gertrude Wetterauer, are expected to report tomorrow (Thursday) night also at the VFW Clubhouse.

WHAT TO DO IN Atomic Bomb Attack

ALWAYS PUT FIRST THINGS FIRST AND

1. Try to get shielded

If you have time, get down in a basement or subway. Should you unexpectedly be caught out-of-doors, seek shelter alongside a building, or jump in any handy ditch or gutter.

2. Drop flat on ground or floor

To keep from being tossed about and to lessen the chances of being struck by falling and flying objects, flatten out at the base of a wall, or at the bottom of a bank.

3. Bury your face in your arms

When you drop flat, hide your eyes in the crook of your elbow. That will protect your face from flash burns, prevent temporary blindness and keep flying objects out of your eyes.

4. Don't rush outside right after a bombing

After an air burst, wait a few minutes, then go help to fight fires. After other kinds of bursts wait at least 1 hour to give lingering opportunity radiation to die down.

5. Don't take chances with food or water in open containers

To prevent radioactive poisoning or disease, select your food and water with care. When there is reason to believe they may be contaminated, stick to canned and bottled things if possible.

6. Don't start rumors

In the confusion that follows a bombing a single rumor might touch off a panic that could cost your life.

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NEW CONCERT SEASON BEGINS:

Donald Dame Molds His Audience

By HARRIET SPINK

Reasons why Donald Dame is one of our most popular tenors became immediately obvious to his hearers here on Monday night, Dec. 11, at the opening of the Hicksville Community Concert Association 1950-51 season. To start with, Dr. Dame has an extremely friendly and ingratiating personality which at once lets the audience in with him to share his enjoyment of singing. This they did with enthusiasm and the more easily because there was no formal barrier between the artist and the audience. Mr. Dame's frequent comments and explanations were made with great ease and charm and often were extremely witty. As a result the audience was his to mold at his will to the changing moods of the music.

Skillful Program

The program itself was put together with notable skill and perfectly adapted to the group for which he sang. This reviewer was especially glad to see "Comfort Ye" and "Every Valley" included at this session. Several slight changes in the score, including a cadenza at the end of the aria, were extremely interesting.

These deviations from the traditional presentation were the result, according to Mr. Dame, of a new edition of the messiah which has just recently been completed after 17 years of research. It was questionable to this hearer, however, whether the cadenza referred to really adds to the beauty of the aria, or whether it may not have been a concession by Handel to his tenor soloists.

His second number from Mozart's "Magic Flute" showed Mr. Dame's understanding of the suaveness and grace of the Mozart style. It was performed with consummate artistry but was to this listener one instance where the original German would have been much preferable to the English which seemed to make inconsequential words intrude upon the beauty of the music.

In Mr. Dame's second group however, the English versions of The Post, The Trout and The Spring were much more felicitous and did, without doubt, add greatly to the understanding and enjoyment of the music. The artist's own understanding and feeling for the style of these "lieder" was a joy. In fact, throughout the entire

evening his interpretive gift was one of Mr. Dame's outstanding assets which endeared him to his listeners. I might add that the clarity of his diction whether in German, Italian or English was also outstanding and contributed greatly to the success of each song. The German group was to this writer one of the artistic highlights.

In his third group, Mr. Dame omitted the famous Des Grieux aria from Manon and substituted



In its place the song of the stammering bridegroom from Smiciana's "Bartender Bride." If any one missed hearing "Le Reve," he certainly soon forgot it in the hilarious interpretation of the stammering country bumpkin as presented by Mr. Dame. It was also amusing to note that in receiving his applause, Mr. Dame remained in the character of the part until he went into his encore number which was a delightful unaccompanied Irish folk song, "Little Mary Cassidy" rendered with complete simplicity and charm.

2 English Groups

Following the fine piano group by Charles Ruischi, the accompanist, Donald Dame offered two English groups which showed him at home in a variety of styles. The Smuggler's Song by Marshall Kennoch gave him an opportunity for dramatic intensity and a little outright acting in which Mr. Dame showed himself a master. Immediately following and contrasting perfectly was Vaugh Williams' "The Water Mill" which was purely lyrical in character. Still another contrast was offered by "The Wind Mill" by Taylor, the words of which come from an old Sussex fence post. Donald Dame interpreted this as the song of a simple, not-too-bright country fellow who sang through his nose. It was completely amusing yet I wonder

if Dame might not have been moved to smile. Mr. Ruischi's solo work up to this point was particularly beautiful as his accompaniment of German group especially "The Trout." Vaugh Williams' "Water Mill" was another high spot although there were many others. His solo group was very well received especially the ever popular A Flat Polonaise of Chopin. As encore Mr. Ruischi played his own arrangement of a group of Strauss Waltzes. There was no doubt that the audience would have liked more but Mr. Ruischi was not only modest but

The next group was made up of five folk songs. Simple songs of this type can be very boring in the hands of anyone but an artist. Done by Donald Dame they were completely delightful. The style and meaning of each song was entirely captured from the robust "Eric Canal" to the frankly entertaining "Stuttering Lovers" to the prattle of "Ohio Meneche." Special mention should be made of the delicate singing of "Has Sorrow" by Young Days Strayed" and the skill with which the dialogue was handled in the blood curdling "Lord Randall."

The final aria from Mozart's "None But Cowards Are Afraid" was made a high comedy. Doubtless much of the humor would have been lost in the Italian even if the music would have fared better. Whether or not the "long hair" fans would have preferred the original language it was refreshing to note that Donald Dame makes no bones about intending to entertain his listeners and that his programs contain not a trace of stiffness. There is also no doubt that his audience loved it and him.

His voice is round, smooth and surpassingly sweet. He does not sacrifice sweetness for the sake of power and has the musical intelligence to choose songs that emphasize his many strong points. Among these are beautiful sauveness of tone. At all times innate good taste and intelligence direct the final interpretations. One of the most outstanding points of this singer is his mastery of pianissimo singing and delicacy of style. Each song was completely understood and its message beautifully projected.

No review of this fine concert would be complete without more than a mention of the accompanist, Charles Ruischi, who was a

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invaluable assistance in his effort to get attention from Mr. Dame. He need not have worried, even though we would have liked another piano number.

All told this was one of the most successful of all the Hicksville Community Concert Association performances and makes an auspicious opener for the 1950-51 series.

Broadcast: December 16, 1950

9 oz. pkg. mince meat 2 tablespoons shortening
1 cup water 1/2 cup sugar
2 large beaten eggs 1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup milk
