### Town P On Res.

OYSTER BAY.—A referendum was conducted by the Town Board at a meeting on Friday, Jan. 29, regarding the question of Levitt's Community Hall and two swimming pools in Hicksville Park and Parking District, were received by the Board from Town Clerk Leslie C. Distrow here, Tuesday. There were 705 ballots cast with the hall rejected and the pool proposal accepted (see page 12 for earlier story).

Present at the Town Board meeting to compliment the Board for conducting the referendum to determine the will of the community on these two questions was William Sill of 2 Bank Lane. Supervisor Charles E. Ransom said he has had no time to check the election results with the Board. He promised to have a statement after he "has been in touch with Hempstead Town Board."

Marvin Sultan, NLHOA president, was also at the Board meeting but had no comment to make on the referendum. Councilman Frank Chlumsky told the Herald late yesterday that the Town Board has not been offered "any other election results by anyone."

Town Board on Tuesday also received a single bid of \$42,250 per foot from Lima and Sons for construction of 850 linear feet of fencing along the school frontage on East St and Coolidge Ave., Hicksville.

### State Considering New Route

HICKSVILLE.—John R. Brandt, Township highway superintendent, speaking at the Civic and Community Assoc meeting, Jan. 22, disclosed that a new route for state highway 107 thru this community is under consideration. Route 107 is Broadway which is scheduled for widening on the North end to 102 foot width. The proposed alternate route from Jericho south, Brandt said, would be down Bethpage Rd to Woodbury Rd, east to South Oyster Bay Rd and then south to remerge with Broadway (Hicksville Rd) near Grumman's.

### Strong Support For School Bus

HICKSVILLE.—Three hundred and fifty-five ballots were cast at the high school on Thursday, Jan. 29, as a special election was held upon a supplemental budget of \$143,475.16 for the school district. There were 313 yes votes, 37 no and 5 void ballots.

During the same election, an advisory vote was taken for the school board by a committee of volunteers representing the Parent-Teacher Assoc. The results indicate the community wants to see student transportation continued and possibly increased. The questions asked and the votes recorded were: (1) Do you favor bus transportation for pupils of 7th and 8th grades living one mile or more from the school attended? yes 257, no 73, blank 24. (2) Do you favor homeward bound transportation for 7th and 8th students arriving home after dark due to hour of dismissal? yes 255, no 44, blank 47. (3) Do you favor continuing transportation under the present regulations with no further extension? yes 80, no 176, blank 96, and (4) Do you favor continuation of present transportation? yes 41, no 221, blank 81.

## PUBLIC COMPLAINS, BUT Still No Rules Regulating Cabs

(First Article in Series)

For more than four years various Hicksville organizations and individuals have been seeking improved local taxicab operations. All they have gotten is a great deal of sympathy. Today with more people than ever before depending upon cab service, conditions are widely regarded as worse than ever (See letter from Thomas A. Burke on page 19).

The Herald files disclose that a strong, formal recommendation for the enactment of local taxi control was presented to Oyster Bay

Town Board at a public hearing in Hicksville in October of 1949. It was signed by representatives of the Kiwanis Club, Hicksville Civic Assoc, Lions Club and Business Men's Assoc as members of the Citizen's Advisory Committee on Parking with Rev. Howard Rogers as chairman.

The report was accepted and filed.

During 1950, Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc carried on correspondence with the Town Board, County Police and County Transit Commission on the prob-

Louis W. Schneider, then Deputy Chief Inspector of the County Police, wrote the Civic on May 2, 1950. "This matter does not come within the jurisdiction of this Dept; therefore we have no control over the rates or manner of operation of these taxi cabs. . . . Until such time as ordinances or regulations are adopted by the Town Board we cannot be of any assistance."

## Seek Landing Site For Helicopter Mail

HICKSVILLE.—Helicopter airmail connection of this community with New York City could be in operation within 60 days of the designation of a suitable landing field, an official of New York Airways, Inc. disclosed this week. Glen B. Eastburn, assistant to the president, was in the community on Tuesday looking at available sites with Postmaster William J. Molitor and Mail Superintendent William Staehly.

New York Airways, which already has regular helicopter service operating between LaGuardia, International Airport and Newark and has begun mail flights up thru Westchester County to Connecticut, has the franchise for operation on Long Island.

### SERVE LOCAL PLANTS

Eastburn said that several local sites are under consideration. The growth of precision manufacturing industries in the Mid-Island area, plus the location here of Grumman, Republic and other aircraft plants, now makes it practical to provide regular helicopter air mail and air cargo service.

Plans for the future include provisions for the transportation of passengers from the Mid-Island area to meet plane connections at New York's world airports.

A field about 200 x 200 with relatively clear approaches is needed for a heliport here, it was learned. New York Airways has been able to obtain the use of municipally-owned property in areas now served.

## Firemen Plan For 60th Birthday

HICKSVILLE.—Arrangements are being completed this week for the celebration of the 60th anniversary of Hicksville Fire Dept., it was announced today by Fire Chief Edward R. Schluter Jr.

An open house and inspection of the firehouse on E. Marie St. will take place on Sunday afternoon, Feb. 15, from 1 to 5 P.M. The fire dept was organized on Feb. 15, 1893.

Volunteer fire fighting service has been available in this community for more than 80 years. Almost a quarter century before the department was organized, the Hook and Ladder Protection Co. was organized by public-spirited citizens in 1860.

During the years that followed, two more fire companies were organized separately. In 1893, the companies were brought together

as a fire dept. Co. 4 was formed in 1904 and Co. 5 in 1928.

Today the dept has seven modern fire vehicles housed in a substantial structure, the third headquarters in the department's history. Symbolic of the modern fire fighting methods applied by the volunteers is the expected installation of two-way radio equipment for all apparatus this month.

All residents are being invited, Schluter said, to come to the firehouse on Feb. 15 and look over the equipment and ask questions. Uniformed firemen will be on duty to assist visitors. The committee for the celebration includes the secretaries of the five fire companies, Robert Courtier, Joseph Eisenmann, Clarence Rauter, Walter Werner, Fred Masters Jr., along with Fred Noeth and Henry Gebhardt.

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

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## NEIGHBOR DOWLING VIEWS NEWS Civics Board Meet On Problems

By JOHN DOWLING

Plainview civic leaders met this past Monday with Board of Education officials to review the district's current educational situation and to determine if possible a future course of action—designed to alleviate at least in part the over-crowding of the school facilities that is almost certain to come by September 1953.

Prominent among the topics discussed by the group, which included the Board of

Directors of the Civic Association, were plans to acquire additional land, the feasibility of erecting temporary facilities, additions to present buildings (the Manhasset Hill School) and the economic and financial outlook of the district.

As previously mentioned in this column, Plainview is faced with the problem of providing educational facilities for tremendous amount of children of school age that will move into the district within the next nine months.

In order to meet this problem and thereby enabling the Board of Education to plan for the future, quick action must be taken to acquire land where schools are most likely to be needed. This, of course,

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

## Voters Want Pool District, Reject Hall Tax Support

Residents of the South Hicksville area were today awaiting action by Oyster Bay Town Board seeking new state legislation which will lead to the formation of a South Hicksville Swimming Pool District in the Township. Residents of Levitt-built homes in the section voted overwhelmingly in favor of the new district proposal in a special Township referendum held Friday, Jan. 30, in Dutch Lane School. More than 700 votes were cast.

### Plan To Build Reform Temple

By ADRIEL W. MONCHER

The Hicksville area will soon have its first center of reform Judaism, with the construction of a building for the Levittown Reform Temple, according to congregation president George Moncher of 17 Tinder Lane.

Site of the building, on land deeded to the temple by Levitt & Sons, is at Carmen Ave. and Choi Lane, near the intersection of Old Country Road and Wantagh State Parkway. Architects Aarino & Hibner of New York, with the assistance of Lawrence H. Singer of 14 Bench Lane, associate designer, have planned the building in the modern manner, with complete facilities for religious, educational

and social activities. The Building Committee has been working on details of the proposed structure for nearly a year.

At present the many temple activities are held in various places: Friday evening religious services are held at the Levittown Community Church; adult education classes in private homes, and religious school classes at an East Meadow school.

To help finance the building, whose cost is estimated at \$70,000, a unique plan has been formulated and adopted by the congregation. Members will be entitled to purchase Dues Anticipation Notes in denominations of \$25 each. These notes, which will bear interest at the rate of 2 1/2% per annum, may be applied as partial payment of temple dues each year from 1954 through 1958. Further details concerning the plan may be secured from Moncher by calling LEVITTON 9-2517.

### New Traffic Light Working

A traffic signal at the corner of Newbridge Rd and Levittown Parkway, urged by civic organizations of the area following several fatal accidents at the intersection, was placed in operation this week.

The vote on the swimming pool district (prop no 2) was 495 yes and 177 no.

The resident taxpayers of the 2300-home area also rejected a proposed joint district with Levittown on the operation of Levittown Hall. Town Clerk Leslie Disbrow announced the official vote on prop. no 1 as 193 yes and 435 no.

A circular was distributed to all homes of the area which embraces about 20 percent of Hicksville, several days prior to the special referendum. Published at the expense of the Town of Oyster Bay, the town circular noted: "It is imperative that the desires of all the people concerned be known, in the event that it is necessary to procure legislation in Albany to amend present laws relating to special districts."

Prior to the vote it had been announced by town officials that Hempstead Township is ready to take on the operation of Levittown Hall. Since the Hicksville area has elected support of the structure, it is expected that the Hall will become the exclusive property of the Hempstead (Levittown) Park District.

### The Vote at Dutch Lane School

Voting on Friday, January 30, at the Dutch Lane School, conducted by the Oyster Bay Town Board, was orderly and steady. Three councilmen and the town clerk were in attendance, with Councilman Frank Chumsky in charge. Nearly 700 prospective voters were checked on their place of residence, registered, and voted at the machines. Six machines were in use. Each voter took about three minutes, minimum, for the entire operation, with no waiting. Promptly at ten o'clock, the doors were closed and guarded, and the machines were publicly opened and the total tallied. 495 had voted against the Bond District for the Hall and 193 in favor of it; 495 voted for the Swimming Pool District and 177 against its creation.

### The Rump Vote

The "rump" vote was conducted in an empty hardware store on the Parkway Village Green. Paper ballots were used, marked with a pencil, and placed in a box. All reports indicate that the voting was desultory. The adjoining supermarket and drugstore were continuously canvassed for prospective voters. Loudspeakers toured the area asking people to boycott the Town Board's vote and vote at the hardware store. Handbills were distributed widely, even in front of the Dutch Lane School. Nevertheless, as the evening wore on, no crowds gathered at the store to vote, no lines formed, no one was forced to wait his turn.

Many will recall recent school board elections when 1100 or 1200 people voted on machines, and the lines that formed toward the end of the voting period.

Nevertheless, to the amazement of all observers, 1400 people are claimed to have voted. In local voting, most vote after 7 P.M. to record 1400 votes more than 300 must have voted each hour after 7 P.M.—5 voters each minute, with paper ballots.

### Rank Dishonesty and Distortion

All week long the area had been bombarded by handbills. The Oyster Bay Town Board's proposal was inadequately or incorrectly presented and denounced; the rump referendum was advocated as the "only democratic procedure."

If the rump referendum and the inflammatory handbills that accompanied it are democracy in action, the SENTINEL went to the wrong schools and learned the wrong principles of law and order. "This isn't Russia!!", announced one handbill. Yet the entire pattern was foreign to the American tradition. At all costs, an expression of opinion on questions posed by the Town Board was to be prevented! A vote directed and controlled by a partisan minority was to be substituted. Democracy?

### Dr. John Liell, Sociologist

To give the rump vote the appearance of an honest assessment of public opinion it was advertised as supervised by Dr. John Liell, Dept. of Sociology of Yale University. Those who attended Dr. Liell's lecture sponsored by the Levittown Advisory Council, at Levittown Hall last summer on "Eugenio homo Levittownus", remember that he was far from objective. He openly ridiculed any attempt by Hicksville to maintain its boundaries. He commented that the rodents displaced by the construction of Levittown had migrated to Hicksville, and that was probably the cause of much of the friction. This was the man picked to be the director of the rump vote advertised as a "fair referendum". Protests were in order and were made. Dr. Liell quit.

### School Bus Straw Vote

In contrast to the stupendous turnout claimed by the "rump" group, only 355 out of a total registration of about 2300 turned out to vote on the supplementary budget to cover bus transportation and other items and arranged by the Hicksville School District on Thursday. In addition to the formal vote on the budget, a straw vote was taken to indicate opinion on increased transportation for the 7th and 8th graders, reducing the distance beyond which they would be carried from 2 miles to 1 mile. There had been much agitation in this area about the need for such transportation, and a good turnout was expected. It did not materialize. The vote on the issue was small, as had been the experience in the past on other school issues. Less than 100-voted recently to approve the bond issue for the Woodland Ave

### Telephone Company Error

The New York Telephone Co. made quite a sizable error in judging the sentiments of the residents of this area when they changed the name of the Hicksville 5 exchange to Levittown 9. We hope they now realize the error and that they are not too stodgy to rectify it. The recent elections, Hall and the pools, and school board elections of the last year, show a strong feeling to strengthen our ties with Hicksville, and reject any ties with Levittown.

The name of the telephone exchange we use many times every day, and which we give to our business associates, should reflect this feeling. Let the telephone company know how you feel about it.

### Poor Service

All too often on calls from our Levittown 9 phone into Hicksville it seems like an interminably long time before the connection is made. All the more reason for having a Hicksville exchange.

### The Community That Fights

Disquieting reports are coming in of fighting between "Levittown" and "Hicksville" boys in the Hicksville schools. 

# Voters Affirm Town Verdict

By FRED J. NOETH

**WE CAN LOOK forward, now, to cooperative effort on major community problems such as education, safety and traffic, assured of a united community.**

The voters have given their answer at the polling place. The Town Board now has a clear-cut mandate from the resident property owners. They don't want to be a part of any joint taxing district with Levittown on the support of the Hall and they are willing to be taxed separately for the support of the swimming pools they will use.

The vote on Friday reaffirmed what the Oyster Bay Town Board felt was the will of the community a year ago. A public hearing was held in May on splitting off a section of Hicksville and adding it to Levittown. The Board determined, on the basis of the hearing, what the people wanted. By a three to one majority the voters confirmed this verdict last Friday.

Some readers have asked the reason for our interest in this problem. We'd like to repeat what has been said here previously: The section of Levitt-built homes comprises about 20 per cent of the land area of Hicksville and nearly one-third of its total taxable valuation. Children from those homes, at Hicksville residents, attend Hicksville schools which are supported and maintained by taxpayers throughout the district. The same is true of other municipal services such as fire protection, street lighting, etc.

Their problems are our problems and vice versa.

Now that the Town Board has taken a well-advised public vote, it can proceed with full confidence and knowledge as to the will of the people.

We wish to compliment Supervisor Charles E. Ransom and the Oyster Bay Town Board for utilizing ballots to settle this constant bickering and haggling (almost exclusively stimulated, guided and directed by people from another Township and community) which has raged for almost three years.

As a united community we can now work together in complete harmony.

Hicksville Civics a copy of a letter from the County Transit Commission. George B. Swan, consultant, had written the town clerk: "This Commission is in the process of making an extensive taxicab survey in Nassau. Needless to say, the Hicksville area is included in this survey."

In December of 1950 the Transit Commission released a 50-page report, recommending a "Board of Taxi Cab Control" and enactment of comprehensive ordinances and regulations.

### SERIOUS CHARGES

The findings of the Commission listed serious charges: total lack of regulation, no adequate regulation of fares, inadequate liability insurance, too much speed, youthful drivers, drunken driving, inadequate cab inspection, rejection of "short hauls," etc.

Nothing further has been heard about the proposed regulations to date. Town officials have leaned upon the assumption "the county is going to take care of it."

Meanwhile, 82 per cent of the

county area is without any regulation or licensing. Riders are usually charged "what the traffic will bear".

When local efforts to get regulation of cabs commenced there about one third as many taxis operating out of Hicksville station as the 50-odd which pickup here today. Meanwhile new fields are opening for the cabbies and the passenger volume (and complaints) increase. Plainview is now becoming a fertile territory and will gain importance as a passenger destination when Morton Village occupancy starts.

Hicksville with a population of over 30,000 has no regulation. Glen Cove with 12,000 residents has a regulation.

Farmingdale Village with less than 5,000 residents has a taxi ordinance. Port Washington, which is unincorporated, has taxi regulations.

With county efforts at a standstill, residents of the mid-Island area must look to the Town of Oyster Bay for enactment of adequate taxi cab regulations.

# Urgently Need Taxi Cab Control

By THOMAS A. BURKE

One evening last week, the writer had an unpleasant disagreement with a driver for one of the taxicab services operating out of Hicksville Station plaza.

The altercation, its justification and the ensuing debate are, in themselves, unimportant and not to be argued here. What is important, however, was the subsequent revelation — derived from numerous conversations with State County and Town Officials — that with but few exceptions, there is a complete lack of regulation or supervision of taxicabs, taxicab-drivers or taxicab companies in Nassau County. This is a situation which calls for immediate remedial action.

Many inhabitants of Nassau County who live several miles from railroad or bus lines must depend either entirely or occasionally upon privately-operated taxicabs for their transportation needs. I am sure no amount of exposition is necessary to point out not only the injustice but the possible danger-

ous consequences to a dependent rider who might place himself in the hands of an operator who:

- (1) May operate without adequate provision for liability or other insurance;
- (2) May use vehicles which, not being subject to inspection, may be dangerously unsafe;
- (3) May arbitrarily establish his own rate of fares however inequitable;
- (4) May dangerously overcrowd his vehicle;
- (5) May submit his passengers to discourtesies or inconveniences with the full and satisfying knowledge that there is not one agency of our State or local governments to which grievances, no matter how justified, may be submitted.

It is paradoxical that while without exception, the official with whom I communicated are cognizant of this situation and agree that rules and regulations

governing not only the rights but responsibilities of these public carriers are urgently needed, nothing has been done to rectify this matter.

Of particular chagrin is the fact that there is at this moment available to County officials and others a comprehensive report prepared by the Nassau County Transit Commission dealing with this very problem and setting forth numerous recommendations upon which appropriate legislation may be based. This report has, it appears, been completely ignored since 1950.

Your fine newspaper would be doing invaluable service for your readers if you could comment editorially or otherwise upon this problem and press for a remedy to a situation which certainly is not in keeping with the progressive and enlightened government of which all Nassau County residents have been justifiably proud.

until it blisters. Stand it in a warm place under a cloth for 20 minutes. Cover kitchen table with white cloth and flour it. Place dough on cloth and pat out fairly flat, then pull out with hands very carefully to thickness of tissue paper. Spread with mixture made of sliced apples, melted butter, raisins, nuts, brown sugar, cinnamon and grated rind. Fold in the outer edges and roll dough about four inches wide. Slide carefully on to baking sheet and brush with melted butter or top milk. Bake in a very hot oven 450 degrees for ten minutes. Reduce the heat to moderately hot temperature and continue to bake 20 minutes. Let cool. Cut into slices about two inches wide.

Try this out and you'll be rolling in dough before long.

HERE'S HOW—to finish joints in SHEETROCK APPLY FIRST CEMENT COAT. Use only joint cement recommended by the gypsum wall-board manufacturer, mixing it to a putty-like consistency according to printed directions. Using a broad knife, apply cement into the channel formed by recessed edges of adjoining boards. Use moderate pressure, filling the channel evenly. Cover all vertical end joints with cement in a similar manner.

IMBED REINFORCING TAPE. Apply reinforcing tape to full length of each joint, centering it over the joint. Use moderate pressure on broad knife to imbed tape in cement. Remove excess cement, then cover with tape with the coating. Vertical end joints are treated in the same manner. At this time, all nailheads should be concealed by "spotting" with cement as later mentioned.

SECOND and THIRD COATS. Apply second coat of cement, feathering edges out as far as necessary to obtain a smooth, even surface. Cement is applied to end joints in the same way but feathered out a few inches farther. A third coat is recommended and the surface should be left as smooth as possible. If necessary, sand joints lightly when dry, avoiding heavy pressure which might scuff surface.

**NAIL HEAD CONCEALMENT.** Before concealing nailheads make certain that each board is tight against the framing and will not move on shanks of the nails. Fill depressions surrounding nailheads with first coat of cement. After drying, a second coat is applied. For better concealment, a third coat is recommended, left as smooth as possible. If necessary sand lightly with fine sandpaper.

**FINISHING CORNERS.** There is little difference between finishing corners (both inside and outside) and flat wall joints. The exception is that the tape is folded lengthwise down the center of the joint. These joints are also treated with three coats of cement, feathered out and left as smooth as possible. If necessary, sand lightly with fine sandpaper without scuffing the board surface. Ask to see sample of our new metal corners for extra reinforcing.

**SECTION 1.** Subject to the provisions of the resolution, and of said Local Finance Law, and notwithstanding the provisions of any other resolution or law, the Board of Education is hereby authorized to issue a sum of \$1,000,000 of bond anticipation notes and of \$50,000 and \$100,000 of said Local Finance Law and of any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the maximum cost of said specific object or purpose to \$1,000,000 and the plan of financing the issue in the levy and collection of taxes and the payment for the service of the serial bonds hereby authorized.

**Sec. 2.** Pursuant to the proposition set forth in Section 1, and of any anticipation of a tax in the amount of not exceeding \$1,000,000 thereby voted to be levied and collected in annual installments, serial bonds of the District, as authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$1,000,000 pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law and of the Constitution Chapter 28-A of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York, as amended, for the specific object or purpose described in Section 1, and notwithstanding the maximum cost of said specific object or purpose to \$1,000,000 and the plan of financing the issue in the levy and collection of taxes and the payment for the service of the serial bonds hereby authorized.

**Sec. 3.** The following additional taxes are hereby authorized to be levied and collected:

(a) The power of probable usefulness of the specific object or purpose for which the bonds authorized by this resolution are to be issued, and the amount so prescribed by \$50,000 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the maximum cost of said specific object or purpose to \$1,000,000 and the plan of financing the issue in the levy and collection of taxes and the payment for the service of the serial bonds hereby authorized.

(b) Current funds are not required to be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds authorized by this resolution.

**Sec. 4.** It is hereby stated that each of the bonds authorized by this resolution is to be issued in the name of the Board of Education and during the term of office of the President of the Board of Education and the chief fiscal officer of the School District.

**Sec. 5.** It is further stated that the validity of the bonds authorized by this resolution and of any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, may be certified by such officials as are authorized to violate the provisions of the constitution.

(a) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which no school district is not authorized to levy or collect.

For the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of such resolution are not included in this resolution, and any action suit or proceeding concerning validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of publication of such resolution, or such obligations are authorized to violate the provisions of the constitution.

**Sec. 6.** This resolution shall take effect immediately.
