Advance HS Vote To Beat Deadline

HICKSVILLE—The vote of the community upon a new 65-room high school building at a cost of nearly four million dollars has been advanced to meet the deadline of a state aid law, the Board of Education said today. Originally anticipated for balloting about June or July, the proposal will be submitted to registered voters within 23 days on Saturday, Mar. 28. Preliminary approval of the proposed three-story structure has been granted by the State Education Dept.

Three questions will be decided by voters on Mar. 28 with polls open from 11 A.M. to 9 P.M. While there are more than 2400 voters now registered, an additional registration will take place at the present Jerusalem Ave. high school on Tuesday, Mar. 17, between 4 and 9 P.M. All who have registered since Apr. 1952 need not register again for the forthcoming vote.

7-MILL LAW

The three proposals are described as related to the school building program. A spokesman said today that "the 7-Mill Law, which provides State Aid for construction is subject to annual revision by the legislature."

"Approval on Mar. 28 would give the School Board the opportunity to apply for aid by the Apr. 1 deadline on the 1952-53 law, or later under the 1953-54 law, whichever is most advantageous to the district."

A two-third vote of approval is necessary to carry the project since the school district bonded debt already exceeds the 10 per cent limitation on its assessed valuation.

The three questions up for vote are stated in full detail in a legal notice on page 22 in this issue of the Herald.

PROVIDES SPEAKERS

The Citizens Advisory Committee on Education, headed by George McIntosh, met Monday night and prepared to provide speakers on the high school proposition for all interested community organizations. Speakers may be obtained by contacting McIntosh at Hicksville 3-0118.

The 20-member advisory committee has been meeting regularly with spokesmen for the School Board and architects in relation to the project.

The high school, listed as prop. no. 2, calls for expenditure of \$3,900,000 for a 3-story building with a general capacity of 1800 students and emergency capacity of 1800. The site, bought five years ago by the district from the Bergold family, runs from Newbridge Rd. to Division Ave., south of Third St. The school would take about two years to build.

The building will front on Division Ave. and provide rooms for all departments, an auditorium

with 950 seats and separate gyms for boys and girls. The bond issue includes the cost of developing an athletic field.

The present high school, it is proposed, will be converted to junior high school use.

OTHER QUESTIONS

Prop. No. 1, which needs 2/3rds approval, calls for expenditure of \$30,000 on a plot of ground and dwelling on the east side of Newbridge Rd. The plot, 150x110, is said to be essential to development of the athletic field and parking area. The dwelling on the property would be moved to another part of the site.

Prop. no. 3, provides for approval of purchase of an area and a half on the north side of James St. adjacent to the Burns Ave. school. The sum of \$2500 to cover the cost of acquisition is provided in the current budget.

More than 8000 copies of a brochure explaining the Mar. 28 vote will be distributed during the coming week thru the school children by the Board of Education. Tentative plans call for a public discussion meeting on the question prior to the vote.

COUNCIL TELLS SCHOOL BOARD:

Town's Split Law May Handicap Vote On \$3,900,000 High School

HICKSVILLE—The Board of Education was today advised that there is grave danger that the community might not give the necessary support to the proposed \$3,900,000 high school project because it is planned for a site which might some day soon become officially part of Levittown. The Township Civic Council stressed the need for the new structure in a letter to the Board while conveying the sentiment of its member groups.

The Council, in a letter signed by the Chairman Gerard F. DeLorme, found it "unfortunate" that the vote on the important school facility had to be taken at a time when the Oyster Bay Town Board is promoting legislation "to legalize the intrusion of Levittown into Hicksville," disregarding the will of the residents as expressed in a referendum vote on Jan. 30.

The letter, dated Mar. 3, follows: Board of Education Hicksville School District

As the Civic Council of this area with membership including all the leading civic associations and organizations of our community, we feel it is our duty as citizens keenly interested in the educational

future and welfare of our children as well as other matters of grave civic concern, that we should call your attention to the following serious situation:

Your Board is preparing to ask for the approval of the voters of the Hicksville School District upon a \$3,900,000.00 bond issue for the construction of a new high school building. You must be aware of the obvious fact that the site of this proposed building is, well south of Old Country Rd and is contiguous to and well within an area which is currently the focal point of a controversy which has attracted interest and attention of all our citizens and community.

It is extremely unfortunate that this proposal should be presented to the voters at the very moment when this controversy is at its peak and may not be resolved prior to the date of the scheduled vote upon the high school building.

However, it has been brought to our attention and we feel it is our duty to relay this sentiment to you as you embark upon this essential and costly project: The current attitude of many voters (Continued on Page 22)

Lions Protest Town's Action

Joining the hundreds of individuals and local civic organizations on record as opposed to the action of Oyster Bay Town Board in proposing legislation "contrary to the will of the people as expressed in a public vote", the Hicksville Lions Club this week filed formal protests with Town Board and state legislators. At the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc meeting, Thursday night, the proposed law was described as "an insult to our community and its inhabitants."

Traffic Rules Up For Hearing

OYSTER BAY—One-way streets, 2-hour parking limits, no parking, loading zones, designation of taxi stands, full stops near the new schools in Hicksville are among the proposed amendments to the Hicksville Parking ordinance to be considered by the Town Board at a public hearing Tuesday, Mar. 10, in the Justice Courtroom of Town Hall here at 11 a.m.

One-way streets will be West Nicholas St. going east from Jerusalem Ave. to Broadway with no parking on the south side from 8 A.M. to 5 P.M., Railroad Ave. going north from Old Country Rd. to East Carl St. with no parking on the east side.

Two-hour parking is proposed for the south side of East Carl St., 100 feet from Broadway.

One-hour parking is proposed for the west side of Jerusalem Ave. between W. Nicholas St. and W. Marie St.; on the east side of Jerusalem Ave. from Nicholas St. to Old Country Rd.; on the west side of Jerusalem Ave. from Nicho-

lai St. to Cherry St.; on the north side of Old Country Rd. for 100 feet from Broadway; on the south side of Old Country Rd. 200 feet west of Broadway; on both sides of Old Country Rd. from Broadway to the railroad crossing.

No parking areas are planned on the north side of Duffy Ave. for 850 feet from Newbridge Rd.; on the north side of Hempstead Ave. for 380 feet from Levittown Parkway; on the east side of Levittown parkway from Hempstead Ave. to Acre La.; on both sides of Old Country Rd. from Mead Ave. to Lee Pl.

A new loading zone will be designated on the south side of East Barclay St. for 40 feet from Broadway.

Taxi stands will be set up on the south side of Herzog Pl.

Full stops are proposed at Acre La. and Levittown Parkway; Brittle La. and Levittown Parkway; Summit La. and Bucket La.; Carrington La. and Bucket La.; Kitcham Rd. and Fulton Ave.; First St. at Frevert Pl.; California St. and Burns Ave.; Cambridge St. and Nevada Ave. East Burns Ave. and Nevada Ave.; Meeting La. and Fork La.; Fork La. and Lantern La.; and Fork La. and Winter La.

Disney characters, complete with toothbrush. Everybody present was lucky enough to win a prize, which saved any broken hearts.

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
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Joint P-TA Council Set For Meeting on Apr. 28

Board Acts On 3 School Sites

A plan of action, having as its ultimate objective the speedy acquisition of land badly needed for school sites in the Plainview district, has been developed by the Board of Education following a conference with P-T A. representatives, civic leaders and the Board's general counsel. The conference took place at the Board's regular monthly session held last week in the Manno-Hill School.



It was decided to move swiftly toward obtaining the desired sites after several meetings with the largest developer in the area produced no favorable results. The Board's decision to act immediately was further enhanced when the school district's general counsel disclosed that subsequent negotiations with the builder had deteriorated into something considerably less than the bargaining stage.

Here are the facts that led up to the Board of Education's decision:

1. Several months ago the Board of Education initiated a series of conferences with the largest build-

er in the area for the purpose of obtaining land for school sites. After the first conference it was mutually felt among Board members that an agreement could be reached. In the meetings that followed, however, the builder and his attorney took the position that if the school district wants land within the confines of the development (the logical place for a school) they would have "fight for it". In the face of this attitude, the school trustees offered several proposals but none were acceptable to the builder.

2. The Board then designated its general counsel to continue the negotiations with the builder's attorney leaving sufficient margin for accord, but keeping in mind the recommendations of the Board's building and planning committee, which had made a complete survey of available land in Plainview and had selected several sites as most desirable for schools.

3. The Board of Education's building and planning committee, which consists of more than 15 of Plainview's leading residents including at least two graduate engineers, several mechanics, a builder and a group of businessmen, also pointed out in their report that land was being bought up at an unprecedented rate by developers and advised the Board

of Education to act as soon as possible.

4. The building and planning committee's report reflected accurately the feeling of the school trustees and after a final attempt by the Board's counsel to effect a satisfactory solution, concluded without progress, the Board deemed it necessary to act toward acquiring the urgently needed land.

5. Lastly, the Board examined the condition of other school districts and found that some when confronted by similar situations had taken the necessary legal steps to acquire the needed sites while others by delaying, now find it necessary not only condemn the land desired but must also condemn the buildings now erected on these sites.

In the light of these facts, the Plainview School Board has authorized its general counsel to take the steps required to procure two school sites of approximately 8 1/2 acres each in the area known as Morton Village and to make provision for the acquisition of another 27 acre parcel of land recommended by the school trustees building and planning committee.





Continue layers until all is used, with sliced potatoes on top. Add stock. Dot with pieces of butter. Make flaky pastry. Place cover of pastry on meat and bake at 350 degrees F. for 1 ½ hrs. Serve hot. Yield: 5 to 6 servings. Boiling water in which a bouillon cube has been dissolved may be substituted for stock.

Opinion on Levitt-House Matters
By a Levitt-Home Owner

Steering By Levitt

The Steering Committee, in promoting the joint district and the rumpus referendum, claimed that the costs of operation of the pools by the joint district would be less than by a local Swimming Pool District, and contended that the Joint Levittown District would be established "without interfering with the existing boundaries of the Hicksville Park and Parking District."

Figures published in this column (Feb. 12) have proven the first statement to be incorrect. The text of the legislation authorizing the establishment of the joint Levittown district proves the second statement to be even farther from the truth; the legislation plainly provides for the "division" of the Hicksville Park and Parking District and "inclusion of such territory as may be contiguous to the Levittown Park District in the Town of Hempstead in a joint district."

At the behest of this Committee, which has misled the public on at least two major points, we appear to be on our way to being joined to Levittown, although it is not in our best interests either financially or otherwise. Naturally, the question has been asked, "What is this so-called Steering Committee, and how did it come into being?"

The Committee, now openly called "The Levittown Steering Committee," has a membership predominantly from Levittown. Although it is engaged in "Aiding plans for municipal operation of the recreational facilities in the Levitt home section of Oyster Bay," only two of its members live in Oyster Bay Township. One of those living in Oyster Bay represents the Levittown Civic Council, and the other the NLHOA, well known for its pro-Levittown attitude.

Disposition of our facilities, is

therefore being attempted by people who do not even live in this area, and live in a different township.

Who appointed these people to speak for us? Not you, or I, or the people of this area. While the Committee claims that it "was elected by the delegates of the 150 Levittown organizations," the record tells another story.

It all goes back to that evening in October when Bill Levitt called a meeting of Levittown organizations in Levittown Hall and "laid it on the line." They were to pressure the respective Town Boards to take over the pools and the Hall in Oyster Bay under a joint district or else,—no hall,—no pools. Some 70 organizations were said to be represented at that meeting held in the small meeting room which accommodates a maximum of about 100 people. Levitt told them very plainly that their organizations comprised only a piddling part, less than 10 percent, of the total population.

To spearhead the pressure on the Town Boards he suggested the formation of a seven-man committee. He said the committee should include Republican and Democratic leaders and members of the American Legion and the VFW. Lester Ingile and Ray Brand were singled out by him for the first two. He directed that the Levittown Civic Council also be represented, as well as the Levittown Hall Advisory Council and Levittown Hall. To represent the Hall he named his own employee, Dick Geraso, the Hall director. These people made up the original seven-man committee, organized by Levitt and, to all intents and purposes, hand-picked by Levitt. In some unknown manner the committee has since been expanded to nine and now includes a member from East Meadow and an

City Proposal Still in Works

The present town line will be the northern boundary of the proposed City of Levittown, according to Democratic Leaders in Hicksville and Levittown. William A. Cister, Democratic leader in Hicksville and Thomas A. Powell, vice president of the Young Democrats of Oyster Bay, were unanimous in saying they would oppose "any extension" of the boundary to include the Levitt-built houses or other areas of Hicksville in the proposed city.

Ray M. Brand, Democratic leader in Levittown and chairman of the committee to incorporate Levittown, stated that his group at this time is planning to limit the area to be incorporated as the City of Levittown to the present postal district. This excludes those Levitt-built houses in Wantagh and East Meadow south of Southern State Parkway as well as the South Hicksville area.

Brand did say, however, that the Oyster Bay area may be included if the committee received and expression of interest by residents of this area. He was unable to say if the residents would have the opportunity of a referendum in their own areas to determine if all the people really wanted to join.

From this Committee have come repeated protestations such as, "The Committee members have never been and are most emphatically not concerned nor connected with any moves to incorporate Levittown." The reaction to those numerous and sometimes irrelevant statements has been, "Methinks thou does protest to much," especially when it was remembered that Ray Brand, Democratic party member — spokesman of the Steering Committee, was actively promoting incorporation of Levittown only last summer and was the

Opposition Builds Up

The most potent argument against the "split" has been found to be copies of the legislation itself (Assembly Bill No. 1826), now receiving wide distribution. Memory of the abortive attempt last year is still sharp in the minds of those who attended the Oyster Bay Town Board hearing last May in East St. School; that the attempt should be repeated again this year is more than decent people can stomach. It is apparent to all that the decision made at that time, based upon a careful evaluation of arguments pro and con and public opinion, is being disregarded by officials serving some force or influence and the identity of that force or influence can easily be

True Sponsors of Bill

In fairness to the Town Board of Oyster Bay it must be said that the legislation appears not to be of their choosing, design or liking. A comment by one proponent, that the Town Board of Oyster Bay appears to be giving only "lip service" to the Town of Hempstead, is enlightening. It confirms conclusions reached from statements made in authoritative circles, that the true backers and authors of the proposal are Supervisor Harold Herman of the Town of Hempstead and County Executive A. Holly Patterson.

Town Board Members Oppose Split

The surge of local indignation caused Councilman Chlumsky's phone to ring continuously for days on end. (Hicksville 3-0451). In fairness to him, as well, it should be recorded that he has expressed himself publicly as "refusing to be party to any split of the Hicksville Park and Parking District." Supervisor Ransom has been equally emphatic in claiming he is opposed to a split. Yet, the legislation introduced, supposedly with the blessing of both Town Boards, provides for nothing else but that. Obviously, tremendous pressure for it is coming from another source.

An Unpopular Move

Sitting on their hands, somewhat uneasily, have been some other local citizens, torn between their obligation to follow what appears to be party leadership and their loyalty to their community and people. What they do not seem to realize is that they may be mortgaging the entire future of Hicksville by not having the courage to speak up now. If they did, they might find surprisingly receptive ears. The whole move is acquiring a stench and stigma which even the high-ups would like to eliminate.

Curing a Sore Throat

It has been said before, the politicians, are in effect, trying to "cure a sore throat by cutting it." As was amply demonstrated at the hearing last year, the only facilities really in question are the pools, and their operation could easily be arranged as originally proposed by the Town Board and approved by the voters at the Jan. 30 town vote. Instead certain powers, presumably Herman and Patterson, are pressing for a split and have succeeded only in stirring up a hornet's nest of opposition with the prospect, if the split is made, of permanent dissatisfaction and resentment. It just does not make sense.

How Does Town Board Really Feel?

On many occasions since the introduction of the new "split" bill by Senator Huits and Assemblyman Burns both Supervisor Ransom and Councilman Chlumsky have said repeatedly that they are opposed to its provisions. Why, then, do they not call a halt to the proceedings? Only by withdrawing official support of this bill to split Hicksville asunder can the members of the Town Board regain the confidence of the community. Deeds always speak louder than words, and it must be assumed that unless our Town Board withdraws its backing, they must be for it.

Should Establish Swimming Pool District

Our Town Board should, without further delay, establish the swimming pools district in South Hicksville so that Levitt & Sons can turn over the pools to a duly constituted municipal body as was promised before the referendum took place. Speed is of the essence to assure that the pools will open on time. Swimming season starts on May 30, less than three months hence.

Levittown Incorporation Again

Rumors are again around about Levittown Incorporation. It is said that the plans for it will be sprung in June or July of this year, and that the proponents seem to be "unusually sure" that it will go through. Can it be that a deal has been made on it between the Democrats and the Republicans? In spite of what has been said about Steering Committee members being free from any association with the idea, Ray Brand, one of the members, is said to be a big wheel in the deal.

The published announcement from the Democratic Club last year said that the area to be incorporated "will encompass the general area of the homes built by Levitt and those neighboring communities that desire to share in the benefits of incorporation." The northern boundary freely proposed by bigwigs is, of course, Old Country Road. Splitting the Hicksville District right now would serve the Levitt-





Double Talk Or Sincerity?

By FRED J. NOETH

OYSTER BAY TOWN BOARD members insist that they will hold to their decision of last year, following the public hearing held in May at East St. School, Hicksville, and will not permit the split of the Hicksville Park and Parking District.

But at the very moment that they are making these somewhat pious assertions, they are on record endorsing the legislation now in Albany committee chambers which permits (1) the split and (2) entrance of a Joint Levittown district into Hicksville. The joint district is not even limited to the Levitt-built area.

Supervisor Charles E. Ransom and Councilmen Frank Chlumsky and Lewis N. Waters state flatly that all they have endorsed is the "introduction of Legislation". But the resolution adopted by the Town Board on Feb. 17th plainly gives endorsement to Assembly Bill no. 1826, the split-joint district act presented to the legislature by Assemblyman John J. Burns.

Mr. Burns admits his bill provides for the split-joint district.

If our Town Board is sincere, it can demonstrate this fact very simply. All the Board has to do is withdraw its support of Bill no. 1826. Burns and Senator Hulst both have asserted the bill will die if official township support is withdrawn.

The agitation of recent weeks has resulted in new promises by various officials—the bill is now going to be amended. We must insist that amendments can not make any improvements in a law which very plainly provides for "division" or split of Hicksville and further provides for a "joint Levittown district" rolling up to Old Country Road or beyond.

After denying that the bill provides for a split, the Town Board (which has since gotten a look at the law) now tries to soothe the ruffled community pride and attempts to palm off this legislation (described by one councilman as "vicious") as simply a device introduced to beat an Albany deadline on such laws.

It is not good enough, gentlemen. We would hate to be convinced that lousy legislation must be introduced to get "good laws". Would the Board even talk about amending the law if no protests had been made? Would the Board, for example, introduce a bill to legalize excessive speeds on our streets just to correct a parking condition?

Our Town Board can prove its sincerity by withdrawing the bill. Only then can the public regain some of the confidence it has felt slipping away in recent weeks.

Split Question May Nurture Vote

may be reflected in an adverse vote upon this very important project unless there is some substantial and positive assurance from governmental authorities that the site of this new high school will not and can not become, in a matter of months, a portion of a neighboring community—namely, Levittown.

We are referring to Assembly bill, 1826, Int. 1765, as introduced by Assemblyman John J. Burns with companion legislation in the Senate (no. 1582, Int. 1984) presented by State Senator William Hulst and endorsed by Oyster Bay Town Board by resolution at a meeting on Feb. 17, 1953.

We are painfully aware of the continuing efforts to incorporate Levittown as a city with Old Country Rd freshly mentioned as the northerly boundary. We have noted that Oyster Bay Town Board held a referendum vote on Jan. 30th of this year to determine the wishes of the people and despite a vote of 435 no and only 193 yes on the question of a Joint Levittown District, the Township has given its support to legislation which would legalize the intrusion of Levittown into Hicksville.

Emphasizing again that our member civic groups are keenly aware of the need for educational facilities in our community, we urge the Board to give very careful consideration to the hazard in the path of this new high school proposition as posed by this apparent Levittown expansion. Our member groups, at this point, feel that it is unrealistic to erect a new high school on a site which within a short span of time may be part of Levittown, city or special district.

We urge the Board to use its best efforts to induce the Town Board and our Legislators to withdraw the proposed legislation without delay and further to move for the eradication from the laws of the 1952 session the Burns-Hulst bill (no. 1982, assembly) introduced and passed as an amendment to the Nassau County Civil Divisions Act. The 1952 legislation provides the machinery for the annexment of the Hicksville community which is further implemented by the proposed act before the current session of the leg-

Malware.

Since there is little time prior to the public vote on the new high school, scheduled for March 28, 1953, we respectfully request a statement of the Board of Education.


