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## Assessment May Hit \$48 Million on Aug. 1

HICKSVILLE—The total assessed valuation of the community may reach \$48,000,000, a gain of \$9,000,000 over the present valuation of all property in the school district, when the new total is disclosed Aug. 1 by the County Board of Assessment. This was disclosed Monday night at the School Board discussion on the budget by President Henry C. Brenzel. He said that earlier he had learned the valuation total would approach \$45,641,976. Based on the anticipated valuation and the proposed budget, with consideration for anticipated state aid, it was disclosed the school tax rate next year would be about \$3.05 per \$100 compared with the current rate of \$2.81.

## King's Palace Plunderers Caught

SYOSSET—FBI John F. West of W. John St., Hicksville, was credited with the arrest of five youths who were caught as they caused \$25,000 damage in looting the 60-room dwelling here owned by King Zog of Albania. The boys were paroled on custody of their parents and charged with unlawful entry. West, who married the next day, was driving home in his own car after completing plans for the wedding, when he saw two heavily laden cars leave the Zog estate premises and gave chase.

## Red Cross Appeal Short of Goal

MINEOLA—The Red Cross fund campaign will continue until Apr. 30, it was announced this week by F. Howard Covey of Hicksville, county-wide fund chairman. Hicksville with a goal of \$3600 has reported \$1,582.68 with Henry McInnis as chairman. Bethpage has about half its quota of \$1200 with \$646 reported by Mrs. John Mitchell. Levittown is over the top, according to chairman Robert E. Hudson, with \$5,749.89 collected and a quota of \$4,362.

## Cancer Crusade At 40 Percent

HICKSVILLE—With collections of \$662, the cancer crusade in this area has reached 40 per cent of its goal, it was announced today by Chairman Charles Trojan who urged local people to "give where you live" rather than at their place of employment, to help the local campaign. 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## ALMOST \$4 MILLION SUNDAY Signers for Home Rule Near 60% of Valuation Needed

HICKSVILLE—The campaign to bring incorporation of Hicksville as a village to a vote moved into high gear this week, spurred by the addition of more than three million dollars in assessed value to the petition, placing the total now represented by signatures at 57 per cent of the required \$13,000,000. Rain and wet on Sunday slowed the effort in some sections but the Home Rule Committee was elated to find that better than \$3,000,000 was enrolled as over 1,000 property owners responded in the one day push. With \$3,782,308 previously reported, the total now signed exceeds \$7,382,300.

"The fact that Gov. Dewey signed the Levittown Joint District bill which makes it possible for the Town Board to hand over a large section of Hicksville to Levittown control and the estimated \$9,000,000 Hicksville assessed increase due after Aug. 1 has greatly stimulated the campaign", Lawrence A. Roman said today.

Residents who have not been approached are asked to telephone the Committee at Hicksville 3-1401 to have volunteer call or to enroll in person at 98 North Broadway. Workers will be out again in all areas this Saturday and Sunday.

## Civics Invite 6 Candidates For School Board To Speak

HICKSVILLE—There are today six candidates for election to the Board of Education for the two three-year vacancies on the Board based upon designating petitions filed with District Clerk Andrew B. Herberer just prior to the deadline last Monday. The two incumbents, seeking re-election, are opposed by four other men.

A "Parents Committee" is seeking the election of Arthur (Al) Ehrlich of 12 Elwood Ave and Richard School of 25 Hope Lane "as a team." As far as can be determined, the other candidates are all running independently for the vacancies.

The other candidates are: Allan S. Carpenter of 11 Loretta Lane and A. G. Soininen of 8 South Elm St., incumbent; Lloyd G. Smiley of 74 Wallesey Lane and Freeman L. Parr of 14 Charles St.

Carpenter was elected a year ago to fill out an expired term. At that time he defeated Antoinette Apicella of Acere Lane who has since moved from the district and Edward Ripple of Bridge Lane.

APPOINTED TO BOARD  
Soininen was appointed to the Board of Education a little over two months ago to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Harry Ernswein who became business manager of the district.

Smiley is secretary of the Hillside Terrace Civic Assoc., a candidate from the greatly expanded new home area in the north east corner of the school district.

Parr is an arborist who has been in business in the community for a number of years, operating under the firm name of Parr and Hanson.

SPEAKERS TONIGHT  
All six candidates have been invited to be present and speak regarding their candidacy at an open meeting tonight (Thursday) in the Hicksville Firehouse Auditorium on E. Marie St. starting at 8:30 P.M.

Incumbents Carpenter and Soininen have indicated unofficially that they may not be able to be present due to a previous commitment to attend a school board conference and dinner in Suffolk the same evening.

Election of school board members will take place on Wednesday, May 6, at the high school with polls open from 2 to 10 P.M. All persons desiring to vote for board members or upon the budget on the previous evening, May 5 at 8 P.M., must personally register. The final registration takes place this Saturday, Apr. 25, before 8 P.M. (Continued on Page 8)

## Budget Talk Centers On Transportation Cut

(For story on attorney fee issue see page 2)

HICKSVILLE—About 100 persons turned out for the preliminary discussion of the two-million dollar gross school district budget for 1953-54 at an open meeting in the high school, Monday night. The proposed reduction in the appropriation for student transportation and the Board of Education plan to continue the attorney on a percentage fee basis attracted principal interest at the session.

The budget is a half million dollars more than the 1952-53 appropriation and many of the individual items are increased. Estimated receipts in the budget are \$742,177

which would leave a balance of \$1,464,384 to be raised by taxation. Upon this levy, the board compiled forecast tax rates upon several valuations since the official valuation will not be known until after Aug. 1.

FOUR TAX RATES  
The forecasts are: \$40 million \$3.67; \$42 million, \$3.49; \$44 million, 3.33; \$46 million, \$3.19.

The budget provides for a salary of \$12,000 for the superintendent of schools who last year was raised \$1,500 to \$10,000. It also allows for two administrative assistants (Continued on Page 6)

## Town Clerk Was Newspaperman

OYSTER BAY—Burial took place yesterday in Fairlawn Cemetery, Prattville, N. Y., for Leslie C. Disbrow, Oyster Bay Town Clerk who died at North Country Community Hospital, Saturday. First named to the position in 1945, Mr. Disbrow was one of the most popular township officials. He was 72 years of age.

As a newspaper editor and publisher he had served his community in numerous civic activities before entering public office, he had been a member of the school board, volunteer fireman, scout committeeman, Red Cross and CD official, Rotarian and Chamber of Commerce leader.

Born in Prattville, his family came to Long Island in the early 1890s. Just before the first issue of the Oyster Bay Guardian appeared on Feb. 10, 1899, his father had started a printing shop in Oyster Bay. Mr. Disbrow was 17 years of age when the paper began.

He became a partner with his fa-

ther, the late Nelson H. Disbrow, in 1928. He surrendered his interest in the paper on Jan. 1, 1945 when he became town clerk. His mother, Emma R. Disbrow, who was 85 when he became clerk, is today 93 and survives him. Other survivors are his wife a son, Douglas; a brother, Stephen J.; sister, Mrs. Augusta Reynolds, and three grandchildren.

He was a 32nd degree Mason and was the senior past master of the Matinecock Lodge 806. In the early 40s he was Grand Director of ceremonies for the Grand Lodge of the State of New York.

Oyster Bay Town Board on Tuesday adopted a resolution upon his passing citing faithful service to the Republican Party, "years of service to his fellowman by actively participating in the community activities for the betterment and improvement of conditions for all mankind and the youth of the community in particular."

He had been ill about a week.

## Board Keeps Lawyer on Fee Basis

HICKSVILLE—The annual retainer for the school district attorney will continue at \$1,200, plus a percentage of the construction project costs, it was disclosed by the Board of Education this week. It had been reported unofficially that the School Board was considering a retainer of up to \$15,000 annually in the 1953-54 budget in place of the retainer plus percentage.

A formal statement of the Board regarding attorney fees was read at the discussion meeting on the proposed budget, Monday night, by Trustee Alan Carpenter. While

reference was made to a fee or percentage, no specific amount was stipulated. The Hicksville district have been paying on the basis of 1 per cent of the bond issue, although a sliding scale has been suggested on the \$3,900,000 new high school which would amount to a fee of \$27,000 on the ratio of 1 per cent for the first million dollars, 3/4 per cent for the second million and a 1/2 per cent for subsequent millions.

The estimate of \$27,000 on that scale was voiced by A. G. Soininen, board member, at the discussion.

**CITES OTHER AREAS**  
Lawrence A. Roman, past president of the Civic and Community Assoc., attacked the proposed fee basis at the meeting, charging that the community would probably be paying "the highest on Long Island."

Roman cited data on attorney fees he had previously presented to the Board which indicated that the attorney for the City of Glen Cove schools receives \$2400 a year with

no additional fee on bond issues, and further that the attorney for Manhasset School District paid a fee of less than 2 tenths per cent on a two million dollar bond issue.

He had also presented the report of the State Education Commissioner on the East Meadow case where the attorney was paid a half per cent. In that decision the state noted that a survey of rates being charged in other districts "approximates 4 tenths per cent."

The formal statement of the School Board, read at the meeting, follows:

"The Hicksville Board of Education has decided to continue its policy of engaging the school attorney at a fee based on building project cost because it is the consensus of belief of the board members that this method is in the best interest of the school district."

"After several thorough deliberations on the merits of annual retainer and fee arrangement based on project cost, the latter shows itself as the method that best guarantees the district a continuity of service which is vitally essential in a school building construction project. Under it the attorney develops and handles all legal aspects of the project from its early inception to its conclusion."

"It is to be noted that school board membership is subject to change annually, and therefore, if policy is to pay the attorney an annual retainer for all services including building project, it could happen that each year might bring a replacement of attorney. If times are such that the district has only routine business, annual change of

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attorney may be of no serious consequence. If however, district business is heavy, and particularly if building projects are under way, change of attorney disturbs the continuity of the projects and may result in loss of money, time and efficiency.

"It is the desire of the Hicksville Board of Education to provide for the district the soundest method for assuring proper legal services throughout project development. Insofar as general routine business is concerned, the annual budget includes a sum to cover that, and a board is free to retain the project attorney or another to handle routine matters. In our own particular case, Attorney Michael J. Sullivan has been handling all of the school district matters for the past four years to the complete satisfaction of the board. Although he has indicated a preference to accept the annual retainer method of payment for services, it is the board's well considered decision to continue under the project cost arrangement in order to assure the district of the continuity of Woodland Ave School and the new Hicksville High School."

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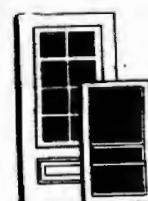
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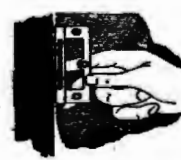
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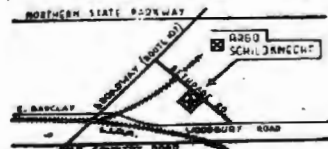

### Discuss School Budget Monday

The Plainview Board of Education will hold a preliminary public meeting on Monday evening, April 27, in the Manetto Hill School in order to acquaint the residents with the proposed school budget for the 1953-54 school year. It was reported today.

School authorities said this was in line with the Board's policy established last July of keeping the residents informed "early accurately and often."

It was also pointed out that the residents will receive a financial picture of the district's future. A report on the financial outlook will be in the hands of all Plainview residents prior to the April 27 public meeting. The annual meeting will be held on Tuesday night, May 5, at the Manetto Hill School.

Other Developments affecting Plainview: The Governor signed into law this past week a bill giving the State Commissioner of Education complete power in the

allocation of State aid. Briefly, the law states that the commissioner can flatly refuse to grant aid to districts which fail to comply with Education Department's request to hold a vote on a "merger plan." The law does not include operating aid, it was explained. Word from Albany indicates that the new school plans have finally been approved, which means that ground breaking ceremonies will come after Federal approval. Red tape is still hard to cut.



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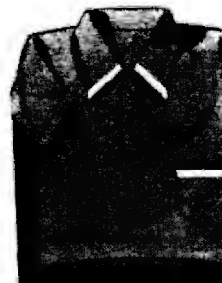

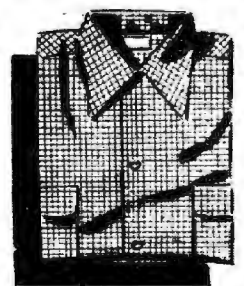


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## Why Bother With 'Hearing'?

GOV. THOMAS E. DEWEY has signed the notorious Levittown Joint District ripper bill. With his signature he has unintentionally furthered the cause of home rule for Hicksville more than any other person or group of persons could.

The Oyster Bay and Hempstead Town Boards will now go thru the motions of calling a "joint" hearing. The decision of the "joint" hearing has been decided already. In the first place, Hempstead has a numerically superior voting strength of one more than Oyster Bay (6 to 5). Further, Oyster Bay Supervisor Charles E. Ransom calls this plan the "only possible solution" and thus has already cast his vote even before the hearing. On top of this (now 7 to 4) Councilman Dudley McCabe has said in print that he'll go along with anything Supervisor Ransom is for, making the count 8 to 3 against Hicksville.

Councilmen Lewis N. Waters of Syosset and George Thomas of Locust Valley have not expressed their positions. Councilman Frank Chlamsky of Hicksville might be expected to vote patriotically against the joint district which shamelessly surrenders a portion of Hicksville to the control of Levittown and Hempstead Town Board.

All this before a hearing is held. The hearing will be a farce.

There were other significant facts in the news this week to prove that Hempstead Township controls the show for Oyster Bay Township. When Howard T. Hogan, Oyster Bay Republican leader, protested the appointment of Hempstead Town Attorney George Brennan as the new Surrogate in place of Oyster Bay's Leonard Hall, the County GOP Boss J. Russell Sprague said (according to an official news release from GOP headquarters) "There is an obligation to make adjustments (based upon the growth of Oyster Bay population), but the vote is the determining factor, not the potential".

Thus, unless Hicksville frees itself from the clutches of Hempstead Town Board (yes, that's what we mean—Hempstead) by getting its own local government we will never be able to solve the many, many problems of our home community.

We had suspected that Hempstead exercised tremendous influence in getting the latest "Join Levittown" bill thru Albany. It came into being right on the heels of an Oyster Bay Town Board decision not to split. "Our" Town Board in its decision had even commented upon the disposition of the Community Hall. It was therefore amazing that within days of saying, in effect, "the hall is the builder's concern", the same Oyster Bay Town Board was pushing for more legislation—and the results were even worse than the first split bill.

Under last year's bill, the merger of a part of Hicksville to Levittown was only in the background—as a subsequent step. This time we start right off with turning over a section of Hicksville—and for all we know it may very well include the present site of the new \$3,900,000 high school Hicksville has approved.

Now that Dewey has signed the bill, over the strongest kind of protest which can be mustered by plain, ordinary taxpaying homeowners, there is only one course of action left. By incorporating Hicksville as a village, right will finally triumph and the will of the people will be sustained.

It has been tough enough trying to get action out of Oyster Bay Town Board, which theoretically represents us, without having to suffer the dictates of Hempstead Town Board which is totally out of the reach of Hicksville voters. Let's be practical and realistic—incorporate and run our own community affairs.

for the superintendent at \$85,000 and \$10,000. Last year's budget provided for an assistant at \$7,000 but no one was engaged.

The bus transportation came in for considerable discussion. Based upon a preliminary and unofficial report from the state expert who recently made a study of the local system, the Board estimates that \$55,000 will be sufficient. However, this year more than \$100,000 is being expended on student transportation in the district.

It was indicated that mileage distances for children transported might be increased next year, reducing the cost. Kindergarten thru 3 grade which now rides from outside a half mile from school may walk up to three quarters of a mile. The 4 thru 6 zone may also be increased a quarter mile.

Copies of the budget are now available at the office of the superintendent and school principals. It will be published as a legal notice prior to the annual meeting on May 5.

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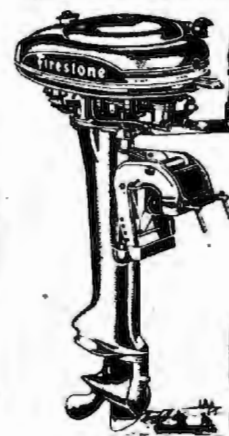

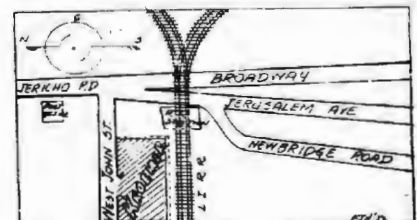

**RULES AND BY-LAWS GOVERNING MANNER OF MAKING NOMINATIONS AND SUBMITTING QUESTIONS OR PROPOSITIONS FOR THE PURPOSE OF PREPARING BALLOTS FOR VOTING MACHINES USED AT DISTRICT MEETINGS OF UNION FREE SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 17, TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, HICKSVILLE, NEW YORK.**

1. Candidates for the office of member of the Board of Education shall be nominated by petition directed to the Clerk of the School District and signed by at least 25 qualified electors of the school District entitled to elect the candidate so nominated. Such petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and whether such candidate is nominated for a full term or for the unexpired portion of a term, and shall also state by residence the address of each qualified elector signing such petition.

2. Each nominating petition must be filed with the Clerk of the School District on or before the third Monday preceding the date of the annual school election or special election, at which the office is to be filled, as provided by Section 1728 of the Education Law.

3. Each petition shall contain the name of one candidate.

4. The names of the candidates shall be arranged on the voting machines alphabetically according to their surnames in columns under titles or designations showing whether they are to be elected for full terms or portions of terms.

5. Qualified electors of the School District who desire questions or propositions to be placed upon the voting machines at any School District meeting must submit such questions or propositions by petition subscribed by not less than 25 qualified electors of the District, except where petition by a smaller number of electors is provided by statute, and filed with the District Clerk on or before the

third Monday preceding the date of the District Meeting at which such proposition or question is to be voted upon.

6. Notwithstanding provisions of Rule 5, a petition requesting the submission of any question or proposition required by statute to be published and advertised in the statutory notice of a District Meeting shall not be accepted nor the question submitted at such meeting, unless such proposition is submitted to the District Clerk on or before the fifth Wednesday next preceding such District Meeting.

7. All petitions submitting questions or propositions to be voted on at a District Meeting shall state such question or proposition clearly and concisely, and the Board of Education shall have the right to reform or revise such proposition to adapt it for voting machine use, provided however, that the sense of such question or proposition shall not be altered.

8. The right of qualified electors to submit questions or propositions to be voted upon at District Meetings shall be limited to such matters as may by law be acted upon by the voters at a District Meeting. Questions or propositions not authorized by law to be voted upon at District Meetings shall not be placed upon the voting machines.

9. Any question or proposition which the Board of Education is authorized by law to present at any annual or special meeting may be so presented without the filing of a petition, and such questions or propositions presented by the Board of Education without petition shall occupy the first positions on the voting machines and the Board of Education shall also determine the order in which all other questions or propositions shall appear on the voting machines.

10. Questions or propositions appearing on voting machines shall be numbered by the Board of Education in consecutive order beginning with number "1" and shall be placed on the machines in numerical order from left to right beginning with number "1".

11. All other provisions of the Education Law governing the conduct of District Meetings, the recording of votes, and the use of voting machines shall be complied with in the conduct of annual and special district meetings.

The above by-laws are being distributed by Order of the Board of Education to acquaint all residents with voting procedure in the District.

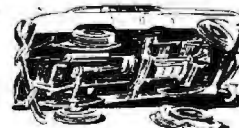

3. A nominating petition may contain the name of only one candidate.

4. Names of the candidates shall be arranged on the ballot alphabetically according to their surnames in columns under titles or designations showing whether they are to be elected for full terms or unexpired terms. The section of the ballot to be voted for full terms shall precede the section of the ballot containing the names of the candidates to be voted for unexpired terms.

5. All questions and propositions which the qualified electors of the District desire placed upon the voting machine at any School District Meeting of Election must be submitted by petition subscribed by not less than twenty-five (25) qualified electors of the District and filed with the Clerk of the Board of Education not later than the third Monday preceding the meeting or election, at which time such question or proposition is to be voted upon.

6. All petitions submitting questions, or propositions as provided in Rule 5 shall contain clearly and concisely the proposition or question to be placed upon the voting machine, but the form and language of such question or proposition may be revised by the Board of Education, the District, before placing upon the voting machine.

7. At the Annual School Meeting or Election, the proposition for the approval of the annual budget shall be placed upon the voting machine as Proposition No. 1 without the filing of a petition therefore. Any proposition or question submitted at an Annual or Special District Meeting must, at the direction of the Board of Education, be voted upon by voting machines, written ballot or by recording the ayes and nays.

## LEGAL NOTICE

8. The Board of Education shall examine each petition filed with the Clerk for the submission of questions and propositions and shall determine whether such question or proposition is for a purpose authorized by law to be voted upon by the qualified electors of the District, and if it shall determine that such question or proposition is for a purpose not authorized by law to be voted upon by the qualified electors of the District, shall omit such question or proposition from the voting machine.

9. The Board of Education may cause to be placed upon the voting machine any proposition or question without a petition therefor.

10. The Board of Education shall, in its discretion, determine the order in which all questions and propositions shall appear upon the voting machines.

11. When more than one proposition or question is submitted, each shall be numbered by the Board of Education from "1" upward and they shall appear in sections and numerical order.

**QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS**  
A person shall be entitled to vote at any school meeting for the election of school district officers, and upon all other matters which may be brought before such meeting who is:

1. A citizen of the United States.  
2. At least 21 years of age.  
3. A resident of the school district for 30 days next preceding the meeting at which he or she offers to vote.

In addition to the general qualifications, the voter must possess one of the following special qualifications:

a. Owns, leases, hires, or is in possession under contract to purchase, of real property in the district liable to taxation for school purposes. Occupation of real property by a person as a lodger or boarder shall not entitle such person to vote. (One may vote unless in both names.)

b. Is the parent of a child of school age who has attended the district school in this district at least eight weeks during the year preceding this meeting. (Both parents may vote.)

c. Not being a parent, has permanently residing with him or her a child or children of school age who have attended the district school in this district at least eight weeks during the year preceding this meeting. (One only may vote.)

4. Has personally registered as provided by Section 1727 of the Education Law, personal registration having been adopted by the Board of Education.

No person shall be deemed to be ineligible to vote at any such meeting by reason of sex who has the other qualifications required by this section.

### Governor Dewey Approves Joint District

Our confidence in the processes of democratic government is somewhat shaken by Governor Dewey's approval this week of the legislation which was sponsored by the Oyster Bay Town Board. The legislation permitting the Town Board to establish a joint district with Levittown, in the town of Hempstead, for the operation of the two swimming pools in Hicksville and Levittown Hall was sponsored by the Town Board contrary to the will and desire of the people which it asked for, and received, in the referendum of January 30.

If the governor had not been made aware of the facts in the case, his going along with the Town Board would be understandable in the rush of last minute legislation. However, many local citizens made concerted efforts to be certain that the facts were laid before Gov. Dewey. It is especially significant that practically all of the local civic associations, largely through the Township Council of Oyster Bay, joined in the effort to apprise Governor Dewey of the true state of affairs. With all this, the legislation was still approved!

### What Next?

Now that the Town Board has had its ill-advised legislation approved, it must call a public hearing. But where will the public hearing be held? In Hicksville? No, no. That's too practical. Too many interested people might come and upset the apparatus. The meeting is scheduled, according to previously announced plans, to be held in Hempstead.

### The Next Big Question

The big question of the day is "Will Levitt open our swimming pools on May 30 along with the opening of the pools in Hempstead?" Will he go along with his agreement to provide swimming pools to purchasers of his houses, or will he risk the wrath of the youngsters who look forward to a summer of fun in the pools and also their parents who believed the pools to be part of the deal as advertised when they bought their houses?

### Action At Once Is Needed!

William Levitt personally announced last October to a meeting of about 70 persons representing various groups of Levitt house purchasers that he would continue to finance the two pools through 1953 if arrangements could be made for their municipal operation.

The machinery for such public operation was agreed to by the people in the referendum of January 30. The Town Board of Oyster Bay asked the Levitt home owners in Hicksville for their advice, and they got it.

We call on the Town Board to set up the Swimming Pool District in Hicksville without further delay. We call on Levitt & Sons to get together with the Town Board and work out the details of operating the pools. And we call on both the Town Board and Levitt & Sons to do so at once so that there will be no reasons, real or fancied, for not opening the swimming pools on the traditional opening date—Memorial Day.

### Drive For Home Rule

A great many owners of Levitt houses in South Hicksville joined in the drive for the local government that Hicksville urgently needs. Preliminary estimates at the time of this writing indicate that about three-quarters of the owners approached signed the petition asking for a referendum on home rule, Sunday. Some people signed so that all could have the opportunity of expressing their feelings at the ballot box, even though they did not themselves feel strongly for an incorporated village of Hicksville. This was indeed a tribute to their fairmindedness.

### Big Day

Even though Sunday's drive brought in about \$3,000,000 assessed value in signatures, and was the biggest day of the entire campaign to establish a local village government in Hicksville, the total amount is still short of the goal. With a total of about \$7,000,000 in signatures on hand the campaign is more than half way to the needed amount of \$13,000,000.

### Still Time To Sign Up

If you haven't yet been approached for your signature, come to the Herald office at 98 North Broadway, next to the Hicksville post office, and sign the petition available on the counter. Or phone Hicksville 3-1401 and ask that a committee member call on you. Your signature is needed to bring effective local government to our community.

### Levittown Hall Opened Again—1 Day

After keeping Levittown Hall closed for more than three and one-half months, Levitt & Sons graciously opened it for one day last Saturday to accommodate the Red Cross Bloodmobile. The closing of the hall evidently hasn't appreciably inconvenienced any of the groups which met there prior to its closing last December 31. We seem to get along just as well without it.

### Little League To Use County Park

It's too bad that the youngsters of the Northwest Little League have to travel to the Salisbury County Park to play baseball this summer because the two ball fields on Ball Park Lane are being withheld from their use by Levitt & Sons. The League has the Carman Ave. field in Westbury, but there are too many boys to be accommodated there. We hope that Levitt will revise his attitude and make the Ball Park Lane fields available as they were last year.

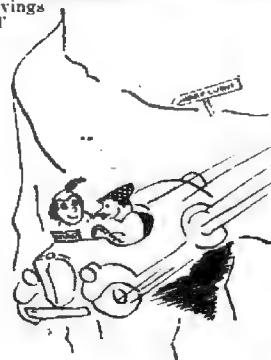

## CIVICS HEAR FULL REPORT

# State Dept. Frowns Upon Use of Outside Buildings for Classes

The Division of Elementary Education of the New York State Education Department, recently recommended that the Bethpage School District No. 21 keep all elementary children in the Powell Ave. and Broadway schools next year, it was revealed this week.

The recommendation was contained in a letter to Principal Victor L. Miller and covered a survey of facilities inspected on March 19 by Ronald P. Daly, Supervisor of the Elementary Education for the State.

The survey made at the request of the Bethpage school officials, included the proposed temporary facilities for primary grades at the American Legion clubhouse, VFW Hall, and Fire House Hall.

The question facing the local school district was whether outside facilities should be rented for primary grades and keep grades 5 and 6 on full-day sessions, or whether all elementary grades be housed in the two existing school buildings and the Powell Ave Annex by temporarily extending half-day sessions throughout the intermediate grades.

### SEES LIMITATIONS

According to the report inspection of the proposed temporary facilities revealed a number of handicaps and limitations which made their use undesirable for school purposes. Among the reasons given was that they were far removed from the Administrative-Supervisory centers of the two schools; that the use of outside facilities would result in costly, inefficient operation; that the children would be removed from the careful attention of the school nurse, and also lose out entirely on such services as school lunch, library and gymnasium.

Other objections in the report was that the proposed outside facilities were either primarily or almost entirely surrounded by parking areas and commercial

buildings. The buildings were also used regularly by their members and other groups, which would almost make it impossible for authorities to move and store equipment, materials or displays used by the children after a session due to the halls being used in the evenings by their members and other parties.

The report also stated that it would be far better to equalize the existing advantages for all the children for the year or two that it would take to provide full day sessions for all elementary children than to scatter class room

sections around the community in facilities not adaptable to elementary school classrooms.

It was pointed out that the use of such outside facilities would only retain the 5th and 6th grades on full day sessions next year. It was felt that this would not be justified at the expense of approximately 300 young primary children.

The complete report by the State Education Dept was read and made public by William Benintendi, President of the North Bethpage Civics, at a meeting of the Association on April 15.

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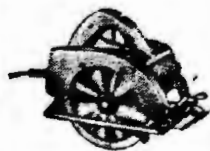

of combined liquids, heating constantly. When all ingredients have been added, continue to beat mixture for several minutes. Heap mixture into greased pie pan. Shape to form pie crust with heavy edge — using knife or spatula. Bake in slow oven 275 degrees, for one hour or longer until lightly browned. Cool in oven with oven door open. Fill with following in double boiler, place four beaten egg yolks, 1/2 c sugar, juice and rind of one lemon, 1 t flour, 1/2 c water. Stir and cook filling until it thickens. Cool. When pie crust and filling are cool, whip one c heavy cream. Fold in 1/2 t vanilla. Place a layer of cream in pie then lemon filling, then cream. Chill for several hours and serve. Other fruit fillings may be substituted. Such as sweetened strawberries, raspberries, etc. with whipped cream topping. You may also use a meringue filling.

## BITTERLY PROJECTED, LIGHTLY FELT

If they are going to stone Dick Crawley out of the North Shore Athletic League they had better not use pebbles for ammunition.

Last week the Athletic Directors of the NSAL in a letter to the Oyster Bay School Board censured Crawley for postponing his final basketball game of the year until the night before the Eastern-Western division championship match.

The league contended that his delayed contest with Farmingdale could have thrown the County playoffs into a big snarl had Westbury—winless in 18 starts on the season—beaten Sea Cliff in the last game of the season.

Such an event would have produced a tie between Sea Cliff and Oyster Bay, provided the Baymen cleared the Dalers. The North Shore title game was carded for a Tuesday and the County championship the following Friday.

All this over the shoulder conjecture has reacted badly on those Athletic Directors who lead the movement since the average fan in Nassau considers the matter trivial.

Many claim it was a vindictive act stemming from the fact that Crawley has had outstanding success at his tiny school much to the displeasure of his fellows.

Since it was a private meeting and he cannot repeat what went on Chet Jaworski of Hicksville, Crawley's biggest and most persistent foe in all sports, has had little to say about the incident other than that it should have been kept entirely confidential.

It is doubtful, however, that Hicksville voted with those who cast the stones on the grounds that the action was not a serious blow to the league.

To be sure Crawley is not an endearing personality in the NSAL sphere. He fights for every technical rule and vents his displeasure when ever he feels the best interests of his club is not being served.

However, the conduct of his teams have always ranked with the best and in the light of championship stress have held up well. There have been only two serious outbreaks between his teams and others and both were quickly quieted.

His home games and Oyster Bay fans, while vocal, have been soundly in order. He wins on the floor and not with the aid of a hostile crowd that threatens to tear the visitors apart should they dare to triumph.

Last year the members of the same body refused to recognize Bob Coles of Oyster Bay as the outstanding baseball player in the County, although he pitched and battered the Baymen through an undefeated season to the Nassau championship.

It was a spite vote against Crawley. That matter was corrected by the World Telegram Sun which chose Coles as the outstanding player in the entire Metropolitan area.

The present one can be corrected by the Oyster Bay School Board by merely throwing the censure of the NSAL in the nearest wastebasket.
