# Ten Days Left To Finish Home Rule Petition Drive

HICKSVILLE—The Home Rule Committee of local homeowners has ten days in which to wind up the preliminary phase of efforts to replace "remote control" of village affairs with government by locally elected citizens. The committee has set as its objective June 1 to complete a petition as required by law to bring the question of incorporated local government to a vote. Lawrence A. Roman, general chairman, said today the "goal can be achieved if we all cooperate".

The committee has enrolled and tabulated petitions bearing more than \$10 million in assessable property owner signatures with a backlog of petitions still to be checked and tabulated. "We have been so busy trying to reach every homeowner that we have not taken the time off this effort to tally and check-up our daily progress", Roman added.

#### TURN IN FORMS

Gerard F. DeLorme, chairman of the door-to-door canvass which is being made by a force of almost 200 volunteers, today urged every worker and captain to turn in all petitions by Sunday evening, May 24, at the Committee Headquarters, 98 No. Broadway, so the score can be determined.

Roman, DeLorme and all election district captains also urged all homeowners who have not been asked to sign or who may have been missed in the canvass of their area to come forward and add their names to the petitions. All interested can sign up any day including Sunday afternoon at 98 North Broadway, next to the Post Office. "We are so close to our goal that we feel confident that the petitions will be completed in time

## Few Attend Dual Town Hearing At Hempstead

**H**EMPSTEAD—Action by Oyster Bay Town Board in disregarding the expressed will of the people was denounced before the joint hearing of Oyster Bay and Hempstead Town Boards, here Tuesday morning, by opponents to the creation of a Levittown Recreation District which would embrace a fifth of Hicksville.

Emil J. Szendy of 5 Walnut Lane, a resident of the area which would come under Hempstead-Levittown control, keyed the opposition. He was repeatedly interrupted by the Chairman, Hempstead Supervisor Harold Herman.

The "lack of courtesy on the part of the chairman" was formally denounced at the hearing by Thomas Hogan, president of the Woodbury Gardens Civic Assoc., who noted that proponents were not questioned whereas the opposition was cross-examined and led into debate.

Hogan said he had not planned to speak but was impelled to do so by the manner in which the hearing was conducted. Gerard F. DeLorme, chairman of the Oyster Bay Civic Council, spoke in opposition and entered several documents into the record.

Florence Vry of 10 Rising Lane wanted to know from the joint boards why she, a resident of Oyster Bay, should hand over control of the district to Hempstead? She said such an arrangement would be "bad government and not make good sense".

Szendy asserted that the creation of the joint district would not be in the public interest, that it would "promote" disharmony, sectionalism and trouble. Martin Lauer, vice chairman of the Civic Council, also protested the proposed joint district.

David Sigerson, leader of the Levitt Steering Committee, presented his arguments for the joint district. He brought into the discussion the "critical recreational situation" in Levittown, expectant mothers, Red Cross bloodmobiles and the rump vote. Others who spoke for the proposition included a member of the Levittown F.D. band who said his members from Levittown, Hicksville, Wantagh, Massapequa and Syosset all want the district created; Marvin Sultan, NLHOA president, and Charles

## Vote On Another School Soon

When building a school system such as we must do in Plainview, the major objectives in the early stages of planning are usually considered to be the acquisition of sufficient land and erection of permanent buildings to house the present and anticipated enrollment.

At this time, Plainview School District owns or is in the process of obtaining school sites aggregating approximately 60 acres.

Generally speaking, these sites are fairly well located with two in Morton Village, 27 acres in what might be best described as central Plainview, 16 acres in the northwestern section of the district and present site of the Manetto Hill School which is about five acres.

Another factor to be considered in the school site problem is the 16-acre tract located in the southeast Plainview and presently owned by a developer. At this time, this land bears zoning which makes it almost impractical and certainly uneconomical for any



builder to erect small houses. On the other hand, however, if the present owner is successful in getting this parcel rezoned so that homes can be placed on plots 60 x 100 or smaller, it is highly possible that a school site would be desirable in this area.

For this reason, the Board of Education has, without cost to the residents, filed site plans with the Nassau County Planning Commission in the event the land should be re-zoned. This act reserves, temporarily at least, a parcel in the 16-acre tract and prevents any developer from tacking on any additional charges or fees on the designated site.

All in all, it is generally agreed that the district's school site problem is in pretty fair shape and consequently a portion of our objectives has been achieved. The next step is to erect permanent buildings on these sites.

In this connection, the residents have already approved a bond issue for the construction of an 18-room school on the 16-acre site in the northwest section of Plainview. It is hoped that ground breaking ceremonies for this project will take place in early June immediately following an examination.

ation of the bids which were opened May 20 at the Manetto Hill School.

Following this the next step in all probability will be a request by the school trustees for residents' approval of a bond issue to erect another school. This school, if approved, will be sited for location on one of the two district-owned sites in Morton Village.

The location of this building will be largely contingent on the rapidity with which the area becomes inhabited. Later it will be necessary to construct school on all sites. Actually there isn't any sure way of estimating, at this time, just how many schools the district will require during the period ahead. But it is generally believed that four or five is a conservative estimate. Assuredly, if the influx of residents continues at its present rate, bringing in with it the expected amount of school age and pre-school age children, four or five schools, in the opinion of many, is an extremely conservative estimate of the district's future educational requirements.

Well, that about brings you up to date on the existing school situation.

## ABOUT WATER SYSTEM:

### Leaks Can Be Expense To You

This is the first of the many open letters I hope to write to the residents of our District. It is my intention to try and keep you informed on the progress etc. of the water system. As most of you know, our new Administration and Control Building is located on the corner of Old Country Rd and Manetto Hill Rd. As soon as we have completed all our landscaping, drilling etc., I hope many of you can find the time to drop in for a visit. I will be more than happy to show you around and explain the system of operation. We have hopes of moving the office to our new location in about

a month; but at present we are located on the corner of Central Park and Cedar Dr.

In case some of you are wondering what those cement pipes about 40 inches long are doing around some of the new houses, they are our new meter pits. All meters for new homes under construction will be placed outside of the house in these pits. By having this arrangement it will not be necessary for the meter reader or repairman to enter your house when he calls. A word of caution regarding these pits and also your meters—it is your responsibility to see that the pits are kept "free". By this I mean, don't plant flowers, etc. around the pit so that it is difficult to gain access to this meter pit. Also for you people who have meters inside your home, please keep the access to the meter open and try not to hit or disturb your meter. It is your and our record of your water consumption.

Just a short word on water leaks—a 3/32" stream (a faucet dripping slowly enough so you can count the drops) will use 17 gallons in 24 hours. A 1/16" stream will use 970 gallons in 24 hours, and a 1/8" stream will use 3,600 gallons in 24 hours. So be sure your faucets, washers, etc. are in good shape because if they are not you are going to lose a lot of money "down the drain". Also you will find you use anywhere from 500 to 1000 gallons of water when watering your lawn.

From time to time I hope to pass on to you information which should prove helpful in saving your pocketbook by not wasting water.

Please feel free to call me any time if you have questions regarding your service, and I will do my best to be of assistance.

## As Village We End Bickering

AS WE SEE IT the only thing that is going to end the constant bickering and discord which has been raging between several factions in our community for the past three years will be the decision to incorporate Hicksville as a united village. The Oyster Bay - Hempstead Town Boards will probably decide in a matter of hours (if they have not already done so by the time you read this) to set up a new barrier to harmony and understanding when they form the Joint Levittown District.

Of this we are certain: If Hicksville votes favorably upon establishment of an incorporated village before the end of this year (and the vote should take place around Labor Day), the so-called joint Levittown District goes out the window. The joint district can not legally become effective until Dec. 31 of this year under the terms of the law which was jammed thru Albany by our unrepresentative Town Board.

The joint district can not be established for an area involving an incorporated village.

Hicksville has so many factors which are extremely favorable to the creation of an incorporated village. Our special district boundary lines such as schools, fire protection, street lighting, refuse disposal, etc., are co-terminous. Such a situation is unique in New York State. But that very fact makes incorporation both practical and desirable. In addition, we have a very favorable portion of local industrial properties to share the tax burden.

People sometimes ask: What is the other side? What if we don't incorporate?

Perhaps, in a small way, the following pathetic note from a nine-year-old boy will give a reason. It was written by Donald McVicker, 153 Cottage Blvd., Hicksville:

"Dear Sir:

"Please tell me why the boys in my class live in different built houses. We go to the same church. We belong to the same cub pack. Why can't I play Little League baseball with them? The team is called Northwest Little League of Hicksville.

"Yours truly, DONALD McVICKER."

Donald attends the Lee Ave. School in Hicksville and some of his classmates, also Hicksville residents, live in houses built by Levitt & Sons. As real boys with a keen hankering for baseball, classmates went out for the Little League tryouts on the ball field on Hempstead Ave. (Dutch Lane), Hicksville. Don made a farm team. His father was asked to assist in the program.

Little League ball is a fine activity and youngsters go for it in a big way. You can imagine, then, the heartbreak for a nine-year-old boy when he was abruptly told this week he had been dropped by the League for being "out of bounds". It seems he did not live in a Levitt house and therefore was not acceptable.

This is not the first instance of this type of discrimination being generated between classmates. A youngster at the Old Country Rd. School (also a Hicksville school) who lives on Duffy Ave. had the same experience.

On Saturday afternoon, May 23, there will be a parade and exercises to open the North West Little League season of play. There will be a parade up Levittown Pkwy from Newbridge Rd. to the field on Dutch Lane. Among the participants in the parade, we are informed, will be Nicholai School Band (of Hicksville), Cub Scout Packs 321 and 158, Brownies, 4-H Clubbers, Boy Scouts and team sponsors (which include several prominent Hicksville business concerns).

Our unincorporated status contributes to this kind of discord and lack of harmony. Being unincorporated leaves the field wide open for constant misunderstanding, discrimination, and bickering.

As a village with local government we can and will get together on common problems. We can make an official effort, for example, to have something done about our traffic-throttling R.R. grade crossings, press for action on nerve-wracking parking conditions, and make this a village governed by responsible local property owners acting in our best interests.

How much longer are we going to put up with "we are doing it for your own good" government, rather than government as we NEED IT and WANT IT?

to meet our own deadline" Roman stated. "However, to be on the safe side, we want to get more than the minimum of \$13 million which is one third of the total community valuation. We have made tremendous strides in the past fifty days, racking up more than \$9 million in signatures.

"This is a campaign from the grass roots by average homeowners acting in true democratic fashion, as provided by State Law. The men and women who have

been visiting their neighbors are non-politicians nor are they politically ambitious. They give what time they can so that this question can be brought to a vote."

TOWNS GET IT IN WRITING:

**Levitt Still Pulling Strings;  
May Open Pools 'This Summer'**

**HEMPSTEAD**—Levitt and Sons was still whistling the tunes at the joint hearing of Oyster Bay and Hempstead Town Boards, this week on Tuesday, here, as the precise terms which are the only ones agreeable to the Levitt organization were read into the record. No one appeared to speak at the hearing in behalf of Levitt and Sons although the swimming pools owned by the builder and the hall were the major topics of the discussion.

Nathan Bennett, Hempstead Town Clerk, at the end of the poorly attended 95-minute hearing, read a letter dated May 19 (same day as the hearing) signed by Ira K. Goldman as Vice President of Levitt and Sons.

Provided the two town boards jump thru the correct hoops and perform as Levitt dictates, the swimming pools on the West Village Green (Newbridge Rd.) and Levittown Parkway will be opened "during the summer of 1953." The opening date was not specified.

The Goldman letter, read by Bennett, follows:

Gentlemen:

We again confirm our offer to defray the cost of operating until December 31, 1953, the Levittown Hall and the two swimming pools located in the Town of Oyster Bay. This offer is made subject to the following conditions:

1. That there be forthwith established a "joint community hall and swimming pool district" em-

bracing the Levittown areas in the Towns of Hempstead and Oyster Bay, pursuant to Chapter 835 of the Laws of 1953.

2. That such joint district thereupon accept the donation and dedication by us of the hall and the two pools referred to.

3. That every effort be made by the joint district administration to arrange for the immediate use, by all of the residents of the joint district, of the seven other pools hitherto dedicated by us to Levittown Park District as well as of the hall and the two pools about to be dedicated.

4. That from January 1st, 1954, the joint district assume the responsibility and cost of operating the hall and nine pools as municipal recreational facilities for the benefit of all the residents of the joint district.

Upon the performance of condition 1 and 2, and confirmation of condition 3 and 4, our offer will

become effective and we shall proceed at once to make the two pools ready for use during the summer of 1953 and to re-open the hall for the balance of 1953.

P. S. As part of the above program and under the same conditions, we will be prepared to offer for dedication to the Hicksville Park and Parking District the ball field, lying between Hempstead Avenue and Ball Park Lane, and the park, lying between Acme Lane and Levittown Parkway, and any other park we may still retain within the Levittown area in the Town of Oyster Bay.

This entire letter is presented as part of the record of the hearing now being held on the establishment of the "joint community hall and swimming pool district."

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**The SENTINEL****Public Hearing Goes Off On Schedule**

The legal requirement of holding a public hearing before announcing their decision to establish the joint district between Hicksville and Levittown was attended to by the Town Boards of Oyster Bay and Hempstead on Tuesday of this week.

**Quick Announcement Expected**

There is little expectation that the two town boards will ponder as long as the Oyster Bay Town Board did last year. In the (1952) previous attempt to split Hicksville, three months from May until August—were required for a decision. This time, however, there is no need for delay. And furthermore, if William Levitt's demands, as publicly expressed last October, are to be met, and if he is to open the pools on Memorial Day, the Boards must announce the establishment of the joint Levittown District, post haste.

Unless our Oyster Bay Town Board decides to tell Levitt and the Hempstead Town Board that its responsibilities are to the citizens of Hicksville and unless it tells them that if Levitt wants municipal operation of the pools he can turn them over to a South Hicksville Swimming Pool District, we can expect the announcement within the week.

**Levitt Pool Committee Meets**

Even before the announcement of the joint district, a prerequisite to Levitt's agreement to open the pools this year, is made, the NLHOA Recreation Committee meets to discuss the summer recreational program for the pools. Seems like they must have some inside dope straight from headquarters.

It is interesting to note that an important item on the agenda will be the disposition of the escrow fund of monies collected from the community for the administration of the two Oyster Bay pools. Hmm!

**Dismemberment Of a Community**

For many months we have been unwilling witnesses to the attempted dismemberment of Hicksville. The initial attempt last year failed because the people of all parts of Hicksville rose up and told the Town Board they didn't like it. The Board listened and turned down the proposal to split the Levitt-house area off from the rest of Hicksville. This year the efforts were evidently made at the top levels—political and otherwise—and from all indications it looks very much like Hicksville will be dismembered. Unless, of course, Hicksville incorporates before the decision can become effective.

**Ernest "We Can Do It Cheaper" Francke**

Maybe Mr. Francke has read the book "Cheaper By The Dozen" and applies the same philosophy to government. In his talk opposing home rule for Hicksville at the SHALHO meeting last week Political Boss Francke said they could collect the taxes cheaper at Oyster Bay than in Hicksville, evidently because they have to collect taxes from so many communities. He failed to explain however, how the Town Board with so many communities to administer, can give adequate attention to any one of them. We are well aware that the Town Board could do much, much better for Hicksville.

**Administration By Pressure**

Some people have often said that the attention of the Town Board is focused where the pressure from the people is the greatest. Now that the Board is under pressure from Hicksville because of the imminence of home rule, we see that all of a sudden—after years of inaction—that Hicksville is to get a new parking field. To show that they really have our interests at heart they should also come up with some other answers. For instance, traffic in Hicksville's business district could stand a little attention. And how about the elimination of the LIRR grade crossings? The crossings at Broadway and at Jerusalem Ave. stagnate traffic and lives are still being lost at the crossings in town. And how about some public parks before all the land is gobbled up by new housing developments? What kind of pressure would be necessary to get these and a hundred and one other things that would go a long way towards making Hicksville a top ranking community of Long Island, as it deserves?

**Home Rule Can Overcome Shortcomings**

With Hicksville administered by a local government, the needs of the community would have the undivided attention of the elected officials. They would only have Hicksville to consider, and they would not be distracted by the numerous other communities whose destinies are controlled from Oyster Bay.

**We Get A Laugh**

Even in the middle of all this fuss about breaking up Hicksville, we still get a laugh out of some of the headlines in the Levittown newspapers. It seems that in last week's issue of the non-Levittown newspaper (although some rumors have it otherwise) there was a headline "Kindergarten Registration in Dist. 17 on May 25 and 26". The article states that the registration will take place at the East Street School.

Imagine a mother with several small tots wandering around Levittown looking for the East Street School! But, on second thought, maybe we shouldn't laugh quite so soon. Maybe they really mean it. Maybe they really believe that Levittown has already engulfed Hicksville.

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
