Mystery Hole Gets Bigger

HICKSVILLE—Fear that last week's downpour has widened the mysterious sink hole which has appeared in the rear yard of 16 Fireplace Lane, were expressed by William Bollinger, owner of the property. 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CHLUMSKY MADE MOTION:

Town Boundary 'Vanishes' As Levittown Rolls North

HEMPSTEAD—The historic boundary line between townships which have weathered the years and changing political tides since the 18th century has "virtually ceased to exist", in the words of Supervisor Harold Herman, as Oyster Bay and Hempstead Town Boards this week created the so-called Joint Levittown District. "This is a historic event", Herman said proudly, "because for the first time in the history of the State township boundaries have virtually ceased to exist in recognition of recreational and community needs".

Councilman Frank Chlumsky of Hicksville had the honor of bringing the district into being, thus erecting what opponents claim will be a barrier between one section of Hicksville and the rest of the community, along Old Country Rd. Chlumsky made the motion which was seconded by Councilman Ralph Case of Merrick and unanimously voted. The Levitt home area, about 20 per cent of the total Hicksville area, will thus come under majority control by Hempstead Township as of the first day of 1954.

Name Commissioners

Herman thanked Oyster Bay Town Board for its cooperation and Supervisor Ransom, who is retiring the end of this year, said that Oyster Bay felt at all times that the two towns would cooperate in the best interests of the

HICKSVILLE—The Home Rule movement appeared headed for achievement of its self-imposed goal with the holiday weekend remaining in which to enroll property owners representing one third of the community valuation, plus a little extra "just to make sure". A sixty-day drive to get the petition in shape for presentation to Supervisor Charles E. Ransom so that a vote can take place started in mid-April.

About 250 more property owners added their names to the consent to have a vote take place on the question in the past week, General Chairman Lawrence A. Roman reported. In addition, several larger property owners, one with a valuation of a quarter of a million dollars as industrial property, were also "signed up". Volunteers who have concluded their election districts are now assisting to the canvass, door to door, of areas which have not been finished. Francke, who has been the sole opponent to home rule for Hicksville under an incorporated village, said that he "has been authorized to announce that the results of the Committee's study and analysis lead to the conclusion that the proposed change of government in Hicksville to an incorporated village would be to the disadvantage

of the community."

The committee was described as including "bank officials, school board members, business and professional men, civic leaders and other residents who have been making a very careful study of the problems involved and expects to release its finding in approximately two weeks."

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Neighbors Strongly Object To New Business Zone

OYSTER BAY — Residents near Newbridge Rd. and Cherry La., Hicksville, voiced their objections to a request by John Wicks, Jr. to resone the residential property to a business use at a meeting of the Town Board here, Tuesday morning.

James Cass of 2 Winter La., Hicksville, spoke on behalf of the large delegation of neighbors who attended the meeting. In presenting a petition of objection with 375 signatures, Cass said that a shopping center would increase the traffic hazards especially on Newbridge Rd.

He said that he and his neighbors bought their homes in a residential district in order to live

on a "quiet street" where the children would be safe. He pointed out that Cherry La. would become the delivery entrance and that a shopping center would change the character of the neighborhood.

Cass said that property to the north of the Wicks property owned by Keller is also scheduled for a zone change request.

Had Checked Map

Mrs. Greenberg of 27 Cherry La. said that she and her daughter came to the Town Hall shortly after they moved here three months ago to check on the plans for the vacant property surrounding the development. She said they were shown maps of the section and advised that there "would be no reasoning for three years."

Supervisor Charles E. Ransom replied that no one could tell her that because the Town cannot stop people from making applications for zone changes.

Dr. Littman of 31 Barter La. said he objected to the business zone because his office is located near the Wicks property and traffic would be a hazard to his own children and to the children who come into his office.

Mr. Nolte of 21 Cherry St. told the Board he objected to a business section because he had picked his property to be on a quiet residential street.

The applicant, John Wicks, Jr., was not present. Although the case had been adjourned until the June 2 meeting of the Board, Ransom said the Board would hear the objectors when the audience groaned for having made a useless trip to Oyster Bay.

Women in the delegation objected to the adjournment for several of their husbands had taken the day off and lost a day's pay in order to attend the hearing.

Builders And School Sites

It is doubtful whether the builders of Morton Village will ever negotiate the sale of land within their development that has been earmarked for school sites for less than the ridiculously high asking price of \$8,500.00 per acre. For that reason the Plainview Board of Education, on advice of counsel, has taken steps leading to eventual demolition of the two required parcels.

Up until Friday of last week Morton attorneys were still talking "negotiations" but on their terms. They were also talking for the daily press stating they knew "schools were necessary"—wonder who told 'em—and that they were willing to "negotiate".

It is true that the School Trustees had one meeting with them since their utterances were made public; however, they were still singing the same old tune—"high costs, engineering fees, etc."

When the developers of a huge 3000-home project publicly declare "they know schools are necessary", despite the fact that they planned and designed this gigantic development without making provision for the public school system, the people of Plainview wonder what they mean.

At any rate, the School Trustees have every reason to feel confident that the condemnation proceedings will result in a downward revision of the present Morton asking price of \$8500.00 per acre.

From an overall standpoint, it is difficult for the average homeowner to understand how the state legislature, although acutely aware of the critical financial



position of many of these hard-pressed Nassau school districts, as evidenced by their annual approval of emergency state aid grants, can continue to overlook the additional need for remedial legislation in addition to the very much appreciated yearly emergency aid laws.

When a builder erects a huge development, turning almost overnight a rural area into a residential section, the existing school system is thrust into a state of emergency and literally swamped by the thousands of children moving into the area. The builder sells his homes and moves on to another section.

Although he plays a great part in creating the problem, he is never asked by official bodies—excepting harassed school authorities—to assist in solving it. The least he should do is set aside land for schools. A simple act of the legislature would correct this problem immediately.

While it is probably too late to come to the aid of Nassau County School Districts in this respect, the state law-making body should do some serious thinking about the same condition that is presently staring Suffolk County square in its educational eye.

Another factor in the overall picture, in many cases, is the antiquated township zoning ordinances which result in giving one district all the industry and another within the same township virtually none.

In our township, this writer is told, there remains on the books an old-time regulation which practically prohibits industry from entering Plainview although sufficient acreage is still available and several industries have ex-

isted at least a passing interest in these existing tracts.

Years ago this ordinance was probably a sound one conceived to prevent the manufacture of products by processes that were felt to be obnoxious and deleterious to the welfare of the residents of the hamlet.

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

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

Many homeowners of the area felt the structure should be maintained by a non-profit organization under which system those who use it would pay the cost of its operation. out the contention of Hicksville residents that only a few people could afford to attend the meeting, and that it would give no indication of the public's feelings.

Will It Be A Surprise?

Will our Oyster Bay Town Board give us a pleasant surprise and tell the Hempstead Board members, and other interested parties, that Hicksville and its future must come ahead of other communities, and vested interests? Will they wash their hands of the joint district mess? Frankly, we don't think so. But, nevertheless, it would be a most welcome surprise.

We Still Hold The Aces

Even if "our" governing body, the Oyster Bay Town Board, does the expected and dissects Hicksville, we still have the last word. One of the immediately beneficial effects of incorporation of Hicksville would be to make the expected establishment of the joint swimming pool and hall district an empty gesture.

Get On The Band Wagon

All residents are invited to get on the band wagon for home rule in Hicksville. The campaign to obtain the necessary number of taxpayer signatures is on the home stretch. If you haven't yet given your signature, do so at once. Drop in at 98 North Broadway and sign up. Or call Hicksville 3-1401 and ask for someone to bring a petition form to your door.

Can They Do It Cheaper?

Ask for facts and figures when they tell you they can do it cheaper. When they quote tax rates for incorporated villages, ask them what the rate includes. Ask if it includes a village police department. That one is good for 40 points per \$100 valuation. (Incorporated Hicksville will continue to use the Nassau County Police). Ask if the quoted rate includes sewers. Ask about bonded indebtedness, and how much it contributes to the tax rate. Ask how much parks add to the taxes. We don't have any parks, thanks to the Town Board. When the politicians tell you the town can do it cheaper, make them prove it with facts. Don't accept vague generalities.

Hempstead's Budget

Hempstead, with a somewhat smaller population than Hicksville, has a total of about \$79,000,000 (adjusted to the county assessment methods) in assessed valuation, or about double what Hicksville has. Hempstead is a busy, prosperous community with many fine facilities, many of which we have only in part or lack entirely. Suppose we eliminate the costs of maintaining their police department, their parks, and their sewer system from their budget to make it comparable to our conditions. And we don't even remove a nickel for costs of interest and redemption of their bonded indebtedness which amounts to a half million dollars this year (Hicksville would have a very modest bonded indebtedness or none at all for a long time). With these equalizing adjustments their tax rate is about \$1.27 compared with our comparable rate of \$1.17. Remove the debt costs from their tax rate and it goes way below the \$1.17. Can they do it cheaper?

Even If They Could Do It Cheaper

Even if the politicos could do it cheaper, would it be worth while for Hicksville to keep remote control government that has done so little for us? After years of inaction, the Town Board announces its plan to purchase land for a parking lot near the railroad station. We have heard vague reports about plans to install a \$700,000 drainage system. We can't help wonder if we would get even these promises if there hadn't been the pressure for home rule.
