### Again Asking Gas Station Okay

OYSTER BAY—A repeat application for a gas station in the Parc Terrace development of Hicksville will be presented before a meeting of the Zoning Board of Appeals Thursday night, June 11, in the Justice Courtroom of Town Hall here at 7:30 P.M.

Commercial Properties Inc. of 371 Irving Ave., Brooklyn, will ask for a special permit to build a gas station and install three 3,000-gallon underground storage tanks on the east side of Jerusalem Ave., 875 feet south of Tobias St., Hicksville.

Commercial Properties asked for a permit to build a gas station on Jerusalem Ave. at Dean St. at the May 7 meeting of the Zoning Board of Appeals. A motocade of 35 autos from the Parc Terrace development went to the hearing to object to the gas station and to present a petition of opposition bearing the signatures of more than 800 persons. Commercial Properties withdrew its application before the meeting started.

## ANSWERS DON'T COME EASILY BUT Supposed To Be 'Less Confusing'

HICKSVILLE—Residents of the Levitt Houses here, newly “annexed” to Hempstead Town Board control, are finding the overlapping Township authority confusing. Efforts to secure information from the Town Clerk’s office in Oyster Bay revealed that there was no data on record there. When the information was available, it was stated, the place to secure it would be at the Town Clerk’s office.

Questions directed to the Hempstead Township Park District were answered with the instructions to apply at the Levittown pools for a pass which could be used until pool tags were available. It was reported that the Community Hall might be re-opened by June 15, but this information was not definite.

Nassau County Dept. of Health meanwhile, announced that mother’s classes will re-open at the

Hall on Thursday, June 11 at 1:30. The classes will be open to all mothers and prospective mothers. There will be no fee or registration charge.

A resident inquiring at the Hempstead Park office identified himself as the owner of a “Levitt house in Oyster Bay” and was sharply challenged by the spokesman for the Hempstead department with the statement “You’re still in Levittown”.

Tax conscious homeowners remembering the argument that joint district control would be “simpler, and less confusing” are beginning to wonder if the answers to these first routine questions set the pattern for future management of the “joint” district.

The final bewildering touch was supplied when the Hempstead Town Dept., unable to supply the accurate date when the Hall would open, advised callers to get in touch with the “Levitt organization” in Manhasset.

## Need 'Few More' Signers To Get Home Rule To Vote

HICKSVILLE—"Just a few hundred" more signatures of property owners are needed to put the home rule petition "over the top", according to the Volunteer Committee; "but we have not reached our goal as yet." The announcement was made in answer to reports in circulation that the campaign to get a public vote on the question of incorporation of Hicksville as a first class village to a vote has reached its goal. Lawrence A. Roman, general chairman, urged that all who have not added their names to the plea do so without delay "so we can move forward to the vote".

He added "we must obtain more than the minimum amount because we want to be certain that all legal requirements of state law have been met when we turn this document over to Supervisor Charles E. Ransom".

Over Memorial Day weekend, despite rain, workers turned in a little more than \$1,000,000 in assessed valuation as represented by property owner signatures, it was disclosed by the Home Rule Committee.

"We are past the \$10 million mark and the only thing that can stop this question from going before the Supervisor will be a slacking of the efforts just as it is within reach", Gerard DeLorme, canvass chairman told a meeting of the captain of 14 election districts this week.

Meanwhile, Robert Corcoran and a number of volunteers are painstakingly checking each petition (Continued on Page 2)

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## YOUR WATER SUPPLY. Time To Read Meters Again

As many of you have discovered, it is time to read your water meter again. We started on Monday May 25 and it is anticipated to have the complete operation finished within a two-week period. Our meter readers are part-time workers and as such are familiar only with meter

reading and hence are not cognizant of the policies of the water district.

If you desire any information about your meter-leaks, etc., it would be appreciated by them if you would contact the plumber, water district, builder or whoever is concerned with your problem. So far the readers have not encountered too much difficulty, but there have been one or two cases worth mentioning.

In one case, the man of the house informed the meter reader that he was sleeping and could not be bothered. This is probably the same type of individual who would be the first to complain if his water bill was not mailed on time. It only takes the meter reader a minute to complete his job, and your cooperation would be greatly appreciated.

Also when the reader finds you are not home, he leaves a card in the mail box, and it would greatly help this office if you would return this card, with your reading on it, as soon as possible. We then will be able to get the water bills mailed that much sooner. If you do not return the card it means a "call back" by the meter reader, which in turn costs the Water District more to have the meters read.

We are trying to reduce our costs as much as possible, so if you will cooperate in this one matter, we will be one step closer to the time when we will be in a position to do something about the water rates. One "call-back" does not sound like a great expense, but multiply it by the number of cards we must leave at each reading period, and over the period of one year, it becomes a sizeable item of expense.

### Tara Down Pressure

For the benefit of people who are new home owners, it is suggested you turn your pressure down in your water system. By doing this, you will save quite a bit of "wear and tear" on your faucet washers, etc. Leave enough pressure for normal use, but you will find you can turn your valve down quite a bit and still have plenty of water for everyday use. The valve to which I am referring is your water shut-off valve, which is located on the service line, that comes from the street, a short distance after your meter.

We are now test pumping our third well, and in a short time we should be able to make our preliminary eight-hour test. By then our three wells will have been done, and ready for the pump house construction. Two of our pump houses are about completed and the electric pumps, etc., will be installed shortly. We are all looking forward to the time when the water from these wells will be flowing through the mains and then, when our storage tank is completed, we will be in a position to divorce ourselves from our present system of having to buy our water from Jerico.

## Why Not Let People Decide?

**DIFFERENCE IN OPINION** is a normal, traditionally American privilege. We can appreciate the fact that people do not find our views entirely in harmony with theirs. However, the injection of certain elements into what should only be a simple and basic problem cannot be allowed to pass unchallenged.

The question that is being posed is this: Shall Hicksville establish its own local government, operated and managed by local people, chosen by local people, under so-called incorporation or village home rule?

As a village, the people of Hicksville will have the right to decide for themselves what their government shall cost, what projects shall be undertaken to improve the community, and—perhaps even more important—know that what they are being taxed for is being spent right here in Hicksville.

We are now confronted with a flood of statistics. Figures, budgets, etc. will soon flow forth like water. But honestly, who can predict with any degree of pin-point accuracy what will happen next year, next month, or even 30 seconds from now?

A fast man with a slide rule can prove most anything with figures. It can be calculated, as a professional man pointed out this week, that you should be dead. For example, statistics show that one person in 12 dies of cancer. So if you are in a group with 11 others, and you are the 12th person, you had better see your doctor—because statistics say you are dead.

But that is ridiculous. You know, they say figures don't lie—but liars figure.

Seriously, our real concern is with the undertones of an effort to make the preliminaries to a vote on this question one of political significance. The movement is being actively carried forward without consideration for political affiliations. This happens to be everybody's affair. It is everybody's concern and the majority will decide the issue.

For more than 25 years Hicksville has been attempting to get along under the system of township government which is ideally suited for a sparsely populated area with few municipal problems. Over the years, in an effort to solve some extremely pressing questions, we have added layer upon layer of government until today we have such a complex and unwieldy structure that it threatens to permanently cripple the future of the community—in the process ruining what has been painstakingly developed.

The home rule movement is aimed at simplicity in government. Amalgamation of the various overlapping and conflicting authorities, commissions and agencies can only result in economies and efficiency. Then, as a self-governing municipality we can make ourselves heard in Albany, for instance, upon such exasperating projects as grade crossing elimination. Or shall we forever henceforth continue to set up "special districts", each with its own little tax rate, each with its own little sphere of activity but none coordinated or cooperating with other tax-extracting boards or commissions?

This is largely a "home owner's" campaign. The petition is being compiled with the signature of the average "little man". The bigger property owners, some of whom frankly confess an unwillingness to "offend" certain influential elements of the present system, express sympathetic interest but generally make themselves unavailable for canvass or beg off signing. Fortunately not all such larger property owners are so easily brought to heel or frightened off.

Let's get the petition completed and have the vote—we are not afraid to allow the people to vote. We have full confidence in the good judgment and intelligence of the American voting public. And there is no reason to believe that the people of Hicksville are less capable of making this decision than the people in such incorporated villages as Hempstead, Freeport, Sea Cliff or Island Park.

## All Hicksville 3 and 4 Subscribers Will Start Dialing Over Wide Area

Individual and two-party customers will be able to dial more than 4,500,000 phones in downstate New York and northern New Jersey

Later this month—at the same time Hicksville 3 and 4 telephones "go dial"—all individual and two-party line customers will be able to dial station-to-station calls direct to about four and a half million telephones in many communities in the area shown on the map below.

Four-party customers will be able to dial calls only to the other telephones served by the 16 central offices in their local calling area.


To dial a call to points outside the shaded portion of the map, an individual or two-party customer will only have to dial an area code, followed by the number. To call MOntclair 2-9970, for example, you must dial

the New Jersey area code, 201, first, followed by the number. For calls to places within the shaded portion no area code will be necessary.

All Hicksville 3 and 4 customers will be sent a booklet, which contains full information on how to dial calls. Handy indexed pages are provided in these booklets for listing frequently called numbers.

Years of research and development have been required to provide direct dialing of calls to distant points. In time this service will also be extended to other communities. It is another step in the continuing effort to make service still better, faster and more valuable.



## The 'Last' Blow

It is very regrettable that the final blow in the campaign which resulted in splitting Hicksville into two parts had to come from one of our own residents. Councilman Frank Chlumsky is a member of the Oyster Bay Town Board, and he lives in Hicksville.

## Hicksville Has Been Fortunate

Until now Hicksville had been very fortunate in that all of its special service districts and the school district have been identical in boundaries. The water districts has a small extension area in Hempstead township which is so designated.

It is common experience in Nassau County for a home to be located in "overlapping districts". For example school district may encompass a certain area, fire district another area, but overlapping into the school district, and the water district may serve still another area, but still overlapping into the school and the water districts. Sometimes it's apt to be a bit difficult to determine just where a person lives.

However, here, with the exception of the Levitt-sponsored and rail-roaded thru "Joint Levittown Community Hall and Swimming Pool District", there had been no confusion about which political subdivision we live in.

## Are Identical District Lines Important?

Indeed they are! When a community is small and has no local government of its own, the township, (in our case the Town of Oyster Bay), sets up service districts to provide the various community services such as water, fire protection, garbage collection, and the like. The school district, under the supervision of the state provides educational facilities.

As the community grows larger and capable of administering its own affairs, it may establish Home Rule and take over a great many functions of the town government which up to that point were being paid for under special districts. If the various districts, including the school district, have identical areas, incorporation or home rule is a relatively simple process. The previous governing bodies of Hicksville deserve a great deal of credit for setting up identical districts, looking forward to this day when Hicksville wants to incorporate and have its own local government.

## Joint District and Anti-Incorporation—Coincidence, or Pattern?

It is only coincidence that some people who pooh-pooh the idea of the joint district being the first concrete step of South Hicksville being absorbed by Levittown, also strongly oppose Home Rule for Hicksville? Or is it part of an overall pattern to make it difficult for any community in Nassau to obtain home rule? An interesting question, don't you think?

## When Was Joint District Decision Made?

It is pretty well founded in fact that the Hempstead Town Board wanted the joint district right from the beginning. After all, it would extend their jurisdiction, and who can blame them? As for our own Oyster Bay Town Board, it's a different story. A year ago they ruled against any split in Hicksville. In January of this year they asked the advice of the people via the ballot box and they got it.

A few days later, in February, they acted contrary to the advice solicited. They sponsored legislation in Albany which would split Hicksville and open it for expansion by neighboring Levittown. Why did they go contrary to the people's advice?

Perhaps they really did consider the objections from the people of Hicksville. Perhaps they did study pros and cons after the hearing in Hempstead. Perhaps they did decide subsequent to the public hearing. Who can tell? All we know is that a county daily newspaper said the joint meeting of the Board to make the decision took only 35 SECONDS.

## Now Is The Time!

Now is the time to free Hicksville from domination by Oyster Bay Town Board! The Board has clearly demonstrated that it puts other considerations ahead of the best interests of Hicksville. If anyone doubts this, let him ask himself if the joint district is good for Hicksville, and does it provide for the simplification and clarification of its problems?

Join your neighbors now in their efforts to obtain local government and all the benefits of home rule, as contrasted with the present government by remote control. Don't wait to be asked to sign the petition. Go to the office at 98 North Broadway and sign up. Or call Hicksville 3-1401 and ask that someone come to your home. You will be pleased with your part in bringing good government to your community.

## This Makes It Unanimous

At the last meeting of NLHOA President Sultan reversed his field by saying that "some day the Oyster Bay Town Board will learn to hold its public hearings in the evening so that interested citizens can attend and express their opinions without losing time from their work." Too bad he didn't say so in time to influence the Board about the joint district hearing which was held at 11 o'clock on Tuesday morning.

## "Through Our Children, We Will Be United"

At the same meeting Sultan announced that plans are under consideration to extend the Northwest Little League to "other parts of Hicksville". This would indeed be a good thing.

It may well turn out to be a major step in bringing together the various groups of people in our community. It happens all the time that people get acquainted with each other through their children's activities and learn that they have many interests in common. We sincerely hope that the plan materializes and that the Northwest Little League will expand to become the Hicksville Little League. And we hope that it will be done without delay so that the benefits can be reaped this summer.

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

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

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

**NORTH WEST NOTES:****Town Sings Same Old Song**

For over one year now we have heard many promises by town officials: roads will be fixed, drainage will be installed, curbs will be fixed. The residents of North West Hicksville know the tune whether the words are changed or not it still comes back to PROMISES.

At a special meeting held on May 13, 1952 Town Councilman Chlumsky mentioned the possibility of a sump being built to offset flood conditions through our streets, plus the fencing in of such property providing such land was made available by the builder. One year later and still no action! Jack Brandt stated at this same meeting since there were no laws or ordinances to compel installation of curbs he would, with the town's permission, substitute a plant mix to give curb effect. Said permission was given—a year later many sections still remain untouched—especially Kuhl Ave.

Later on in 1952 representatives of the Civic Assoc. met with the Town Board to discuss our problems—we were told by Mr. Ransom we would receive "top priority" on drainage with work to begin in March, 1953. Well this is June—what's the holdup?

What guarantees have the tax-payers that this drainage program, long overdue, will ever take place? Survey after survey have been made but nothing effective has been accomplished by the elected officials. The Town of Oyster Bay can float a bond issue for drainage for all areas in Oyster Bay, we'll pay for it—but Hicksville will only get so much. Under home rule status we would only pay for Hicksville—and get full benefit.

During the past week on my travels through the development a great number of residents wanted to know when pros and cons on the HOME RULE MOVEMENT would be discussed at one of our meetings. It is important that the people know the facts, when are we going to hear speakers on the subject? According to my column of Sept. 18, 1952 a motion was made at the September 9th meeting and

approved to continue meetings through July and August—said motion should be recorded in the minutes of that meeting—lets invite these speakers to our next monthly meeting!
