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New Police Hdq Gets in Shape

JERICHO—Headquarters for the Second Police Precinct will locate here on the west side of Broadway, just south of the Parkway Bridge, it was learned this week. The precinct which has been housed in a cottage on an estate in Syosset since 1926 will move to its larger quarters in a few weeks, according to Captain Vincent Chiment, commanding officer.

The white, wood shingled, former private home (near the Parkway Inn) is being renovated. The front entrance is being remodeled this week to change the old wooden steps to a two-staircase entrance. The second floor will be made into offices for the detective squad and installation of telephone lines, switchboard and other equipment will complete the renovation.

HEALTH DEPT. WARNING:

Obey Rules for Lawn Sprinkling

MINEOLA—Nassau County Health Dept. today urged local residents to cooperate with Hicksville and Plainview water districts in conserving the water supply. Both local water districts had published the rules governing the use of water for lawn sprinkling in the Herald.

Plainview requested owners of odd numbered houses to watering the lawn on odd numbered days from 8 to 10 p.m. only, and even numbered houses on the even numbered days of the month during the same hours.

Hicksville Water officials request that residents South of Old Country Rd. restrict the watering of lawns to the odd numbered days of the month; and those residents of the district North of Old Country Rd. are restricted to watering

the lawns on even numbered days of the month.

The drive will take place rain or shine. All garments, regardless of condition, will be collected and immediately transferred to waiting trucks for processing sorting and shipment to Korea, the committee said.

Scouts and other local service organizations are being asked to assist the drive and collection. Residents are urged to get their bundles of garments for all ages, shoes and other apparel ready for the Sunday afternoon pickup.

Officials of the United Nations Civil Assistance Command, Korea, distribute ARK's clothing supplies to the most needy throughout South Korea. More than 10 million men, women and children have been left destitute by the havoc of war in their country, Chairman Jackson pointed out.



Break Ground for School Sunday

This Sunday, June 28, at 3 P.M. ground-breaking ceremonies for the new northwest Plainview School will be held on the construction site.

Although actual work on the school began some two weeks ago, the ceremony was delayed in order to give all of Plainview's official organizations an opportunity to participate, it was pointed out. With the community's popula-



tion scheduled to skyrocket well up into the thousands during 1953-54 this ground-breaking ceremony is the forerunner of several more to be held in Plainview within the months to come.

Present Board of Education plans call for a vote by the residents on July 13 to approve a \$300,000 bond issue to be used to erect a 10-room school to be located on a tract south of Old Country Rd. in approximately south central Plainview. The site of this proposed school will be on one of the two parcels now in the process of being purchased from the developers of Morton Village.

This area was selected to seat the next community school because Morton plans call for an immediate development of that section there-fore to the school construction.

Conversely, if the other site located approximately in central Morton Village was to be developed for school usage at this time, it might possibly be necessary for the district to construct its own road in order to permit school construction, particularly since the developers don't plan to build in this area sections, until they've completed the other

In any event, another vote to approve a bond issue for the purpose of erecting a school in this area will in all probability be held sometime in the early fall.

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

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

Hidden Covenants

The covenants included in the deeds furnished to purchasers of the Parc Terrace homes, just east of Jerusalem Ave., point out the wisdom of the old adage, "Let the buyer beware!" Those who read their own deeds frequently run across the clause which reads, "Subject to covenants and restrictions of record". The cautious buyer checks the covenants and restrictions of record, or has an attorney do it for him. But with the developers advertising that there are no legal or attorney fees, and the great numbers of buyers who are unfamiliar with the many ramifications of home buying, it should not be surprising that so few people bother to check. And the sellers don't seem to be bashful about taking advantage of the buyer's inexperience.

Written Record and Oral Promises

The covenant in the Parc Terrace deeds, in which the buyers allegedly agreed not to object to a gasoline station adjacent to their homes, evidently did not deter the sales department from promising a gas station would not be erected. It must have been quite a surprise for the buyers when they learned the truth.

Buyer At A Disadvantage

People don't very often purchase more than a very few homes during their lifetimes. It shouldn't be surprising then that every once in a while something is put over on them by a "smart" seller who knows all the ins and outs. The wise buyer recognizes the limited extent of his knowledge of home selling practices. If he believes himself capable, he investigates the conditions of purchase, covenants and restrictions, himself. Otherwise, he engages a qualified person to do so, and advise him.

Happens Just Often Enough

Many developers and other sellers of houses are thoroughly reputable. Purchasing a home is probably the most important business transactions for most families. It's worth the cost to check and be sure.

Parking Fields

Additional parking space for commuters and shoppers is long overdue. There is little doubt that the Oyster Bay Town Board will decide to proceed with the construction of the two new Hicksville fields. A total of about 290 cars will be accommodated.

Should Ease Traffic

The new off-street parking facilities should make quite an improvement in traffic conditions on Broadway and adjacent streets. Many of the drivers during busy hours are merely driving through Broadway hoping to find a parking-place. With 290 such drivers eliminated, traffic should flow much smoother and faster.

False Fire Alarms

False fire alarms are not funny! The fire alarm system is a necessity for the protection of our homes. It must be kept accessible to all members of the public at all times. The members of the fire department give heavily of their times and energy, and often risk life and limb to save other people's homes from damage and destruction. And they do these things without compensation other than the satisfaction derived from performing a necessary public service. Anyone who abuses the fire alarm system, or permits it to be abused, is doing his neighbors a very serious disservice.

The letting out of school for the summer vacation is a signal to ask auto drivers to be a bit more careful in the handling of their cars. We all know that moving cars and children do not mix very well. A little extra care may save someone a lot of grief.

The next time for cautioning drivers will be in September when school reconvenes. You will then be asked to be extra careful because the children are on their way to and from school. In other words, you are asked to be careful at all times.

The latest figures indicate that the goal of having owners of one third of the property in Hicksville sign the petition to get a referendum on Home Rule for Hicksville is just about achieved. If you are not yet among the signers, you can still join your neighbors in bringing good, effective, and economical government to your community. Your signature is important. Drop in at 88 North Broadway, the Herald office, and sign the most extensive petition ever circulated here.

What Comes Next

The next step in bringing Home Rule to Hicksville is to submit the petition and proposition for incorporation to the Town Board. The Town then call for public hearing in Hicksville. After determining that all legal requirements have been fulfilled, an election is held in which all resident property owners may vote. If the majority votes for incorporation and Home Rule, Hicksville becomes an incorporated village as of the date of the election. All this can take a minimum of 35 days to a maximum of 90 days after submission of the petition to the Town Board. Shortly after incorporation, an election to choose our local officials will be held. Then we will be running our own affairs within the framework of state and county laws.


The police use the sound truck equipment in similar emergencies such as the water incident at the railroad depot in 1951 when it was feared two boys had fallen into the tank.

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

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

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
