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New School Official Starts

38 School Windows Broken

HICKSVILLE—A School Board spokesman today expressed concern over the breaking of 38 windows in the new Burns Ave. School in a two day period, June 29 and 30. There have been "repeated acts" of destruction in the playground area and the board is calling attention to the condition wishes to enlist the aid and cooperation of the parents and taxpayers in the district.

"The school district has spent and is spending thousands of dollars on a summer playground program because it realizes that the energy of children must be channeled wisely or it will seek an outlet in less constructive activities," Mrs. Edna Sutton stated.

"In addition to the broken windows there have been instances of bolts and nuts being removed from the playground equipment, which if carried to any great length would endanger the children who use the school facilities," she added.

The police have been notified of the breakage and they are cooperating with the School Board.

Home Rule Petition Near Goal, Deadline

HICKSVILLE—The volunteer organization of small homeowners striving to get a community-wide vote on the question of home rule for the community was today confident of reaching its objective before the new assessment for the area becomes effective as of Aug. 1, provided another couple of hundred signers are obtained in the next few days.


"We can do it, despite the obstacles being placed in the path of what is basically an uncomplicated procedure by powerful, entrenched self-seekers," Committee Chairman Lawrence A. Roman said confidently last night. "In a 60-day period we have obtained the signatures of property owners with a total valuation of over ten million dollars. Many of these signatures came from people voluntarily coming in to help bring the question to a vote."

PROGRESS MADE

"To understand what number of signatures we have means, we need only recall that the total assessable value of the entire district in 1946 was only twelve million dollars. In other words, we have today more than the total 1946 value of the district now represented on the petitions asking the Supervisor of the township to call a public hearing and then the referendum."

The Home Rule Committee took note of the report that an elaborate and expensive brochure in opposition to the question has been prepared by the Anti-Incorporation Committee headed by Ernest F. Francke, local political boss. The book is scheduled for widespread distribution.

Held By Russians as 'US Spy' Woman Rejoins Sister Here

HICKSVILLE—Back in the U. S. after 16 years in Germany and several stints in Russian jails on spying charges, Mrs. Magda Groeger landed in New York aboard a freighter, Monday.

Relatives met her at the pier and she is now staying with her sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Zolnoski of 50 Myres Ave. It is the first family reunion in 16 years.

Mrs. Groeger and her late husband went to Germany on a business trip for Pan American Airways before World War II started. He died there eight years ago and Mrs. Groeger was not permitted to leave the country.

She had been arrested several times and charged with spying for the United States. Her last arrest led to a six-month confinement on the same charge. She was eventually released after continuously answering the charges with the truth—that she was not a spy for the Americans.

She left the Russian sector of Berlin on the pretense of a shopping trip into the eastern sector. Unable to take any possessions with her, she sold several pieces of jewelry to buy some clothing once she reached the American sector.

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

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State Achieves Centralization

Despite legal maneuvering and impassioned pleas to the residents, opponents of the State Education Department's plan to centralize the Glenwood Landing, Glen Head and Sea Cliff School districts, as predicted in this column earlier, went down to defeat the past week when the State's plan was accepted by the residents of the three districts by a vote of 1,658 to 1,191 against the merger.

This vote vitally affects the mid-Island school districts of



Plainedge, Island Trees, Old Bethpage, Bethpage and Plainview, inasmuch as they are apparently next on the Department of Education's centralization program, although no definite moves have been made as yet and won't be until several surveys have been concluded.

The important thing to remember and watch for in the months to come, in our opinion, is the position the Education Department will take in advocating the merger of the five mid-Island districts or a portion thereof. If State Department officials adhere to the same policy established several weeks before the three-district north shore centralization vote, the tip-off should come when anyone of the five districts involved submits high school plans for Albany's approval.

In Plainview, the Board of Education plans to provide adequate classroom space for the district's children continue to move ahead as residents are scheduled to go to the polls on July 18 to vote a \$300,000 expenditure to be used to construct a new 10-room school on the district's south central area south of Old Country Rd.

In connection with the vote, the Board has announced that a district-wide public meeting will be held Monday, July 13.

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In the Manetto-Hill School at 8:30 P.M. to discuss with the residents the new school plans and the district's educational outlook.

The most important factor of the above mentioned report is the welfare of our children and causing a fire. We should all endeavor to protect life and property on the 4th of July by not having fireworks on hand. The commissioners' office has requested all police departments in the County, cities and villages to make every effort to check violations and the assistance of the fire companies had been requested.

The Sentinel is one year old this week. For the past 52 weeks facts and opinions concerning the interests of the home owners of the South Hicksville area have been published. Enlightened self-interest and better understanding among the residents has been, and will continue to be, our constant aim.

Basic Premise

The basic premise behind the ideas expressed is that this area is in every way an integral part of the community of Hicksville. We believe it to be to the advantage of home owners here to continue, and to strengthen their affiliation with Hicksville. That the houses we live in were built by the same building developer who built the houses of Levittown is small argument indeed for throwing over the advantage of being part of an established community. If anyone doubts this, let him look at the tax bills for identical houses in South Hicksville and in Levittown.

The Levittown Fiction

Although this area is in every way an integral part of the community of Hicksville, many people have been led to believe that it is part of Levittown. This fiction has been aided and abetted by the newspapers of Levittown who have continually referred to it as "North Levittown". At times they have gone to laughable extremes to avoid mentioning the name of Hicksville. We can understand why the Levittown paper wishes to apply the name of Levittown to all areas in which Levitt & Sons built houses. But we can't let Mr. Levitt's vanity dictate the community in which we live.

Signs of Progress

In a two-page ad the Whelan drug store gave its address correctly last week as "Levittown Parkway Village Green, Hicksville". And in the Levitt-owned newspaper, the editor referred to our school board as the "Hicksville Board of Education" instead of "District 17 Board of Education", as they have done in the past. This is certainly progress and we certainly hope that it continues.

Things We Would Like To See

There are many things we would like to see done to improve conditions in our community. Insofar as South Hicksville is concerned, probably the most important thing would be continued improved understanding of the feeling and problems of the various groups here. Much progress has been made during the last 12 months, and we would like to see more mutual understanding in the months to come.


Local Government For Hicksville

The most important improvement for Hicksville as a whole would be, without question, for it to become an incorporated village and to have its own local government. We believe that much of its future progress and its becoming one of the leading communities of Long Island depends to a very great extent upon the establishment of a responsive and capable local government.

School System

The School Board has had a difficult time in trying to keep the school facilities space with the phenomenal population increase. We hope that before too long the school facilities will be fully equal to the demands placed upon them. We particularly hope to see the proposed addition to the Fork Lane School completed and in use. We also hope to see work on the new high school proceed on schedule so that the school will open as soon as possible.

We would like to see the School Board take the public into its confidence a bit more on questions which are likely to be controversial. The Board faces problems which are not always fully appreciated. (Continued on Page 14).



HOLY FAMILY Catholic Church is nearing completion on Fordham Rd. off Newbridge Rd., Hicksville. The above is a sketch of the various buildings in the parish group-church being constructed of combination brick and frame. By the use of modern fold doors, the seating capacity of the church (which is 300) can be increased to 1,000 by utilizing the community centre. The structures in the group, reading from left to right, are the rectory, the church, community centre and convent.

The rectory has accommodations for a pastor and two assistants. It is joined to the sacristy by a sun room. The community centre structure has a stage at the right of the

sketch, is flanked by ante rooms, kitchen and wash rooms. An unusual feature of the centre are the recessed folding partitions, indicated on north and south walls, which can be closed to create several separate classrooms for instruction. The convent building on the extreme right of the sketch will accommodate eight nuns and contains a chapel, community room and refectory.

Holy Family Church has been holding Sunday masses at the Meadowbrook Theatre until this structure is completed. Architect for the parish group is Henry V. Murphy. Rev. Martin O'Dea is pastor of the church.

by the public, and the reasons for the Board's decisions may not be readily apparent to many people. The reason may be very good, but unless the Board makes a special effort to be sure that the public understands, the decision is apt to be an unpopular one.

Long Island Rail Road

A most desirable community improvement would be greatly improved service on the Long Island Rail Road. The two new trains recently added to the schedule have made some improvement, but much more is in order. Elimination of Jamaica as transfer point seems beyond reach for quite a few years.

Grade Crossings

The elimination of rail road crossings at grade would be highly desirable. People will undoubtedly continue to be killed and injured, and traffic will continue to be tied up in the business section as long as we have these crossings.

Traffic and Parking

Traffic and parking are twin problems in our business section. The parking areas proposed by the Oyster Bay Town Board will help in removing autos from the streets, although somewhat overdue. This will reduce the traffic problem to some extent. But the continually increasing population brings new traffic and we would like to see a comprehensive, long range program to ease traffic and parking.

Highway Lighting

Improved highway lighting would be another desirable improvement. As an example, Jerusalem Ave. south of the town line is well lighted by modern fixtures closely spaced. But north of the line, in Hicksville, the highway lights are few and far between. We hope to see adequate lighting on all streets and highways.

Youth Activities

We hope, and expect, to see continued programs by such groups as the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, 4-H Club, Police Boys Club, and the Little League. In fact, we would like to see the Little League extended to include all boys in Hicksville. Groups catering to teen agers would be very helpful.



Plain boiled potatoes invariably accompany this dish as they help to mop up the delicious sauce. Yield: 8 to 10 Servings. We tried this one a few days ago and we loved it.

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
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Democrats Get Best Wishes

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


