1,309 New Houses in Half Year

OYSTER BAY — A total of 1,309 new homes were constructed in Hicksville during the first six months of this year, according to the Building Department of the Oyster Bay Township. Plainview has 552 new homes built since January and Bethpage had 562 new homes built for the same period.

PARC CIVICS MEET MONDAY:

Boulder Sues New Homeowners Who Objected to Gas Station

HICKSVILLE — Two homeowners are being sued for \$10,000 each for alleged "damages" to a builder whose model house was patrolled in protest of a gas station proposed for Jerusalem Ave. near Dean St. and opposite Walnut Lane. It was learned today.

The Park Community Civic Assoc. had successfully opposed the gas station; application was rejected last month by the Zoning Board of Appeals after presentation of a

2,000 signature petition. Papers served upon Mrs. Peter Ferrara of 17 Terry St., wife of the president of the civic association, and Dr. Sidney Berkowitz of Jerusalem Ave., allege that picketing of the model house of the 12th Construction Co. in June had "interfered" with the sale of houses. It is also alleged that "reckless statements" were made in a leaflet which were "in part false". The civic group has affidavits

from home purchasers of the area who swear that they had been told the site proposed for a gas station would be a children's playground at the time they bought their homes. The Park Community Assoc. will hold an important meeting next Monday night, July 27, at 8:30 at 12 Terry St. regarding the legal action which is being brought in Kings County Supreme Court.

Two Churches Merge Oct 1

HICKSVILLE — The First Reformed Church on Jerusalem Ave. and the Parkway Community Church on Hempstead Ave. will be merged into one congregation and will be known as the Parkway Community Church, it was learned this week.

Until the formal union on Oct. 4, the two congregations will continue to hold religious services in their individual buildings. The union will make a congregation of over 600 families with a Bible School of approximately 700.

The First Reformed Church, located at the corner of Newbridge Rd. and Jerusalem Ave., near the railroad depot will be closed after Oct. 1 and will be sold. The church property on Ketcham Rd. which was previously planned as the site of a new church will be sold. Dr. Marion G. Gosselink, pastor, will continue his residence at the parsonage at 146 Division Ave. Dr. Gosselink came to Hicksville five years ago.

A new parish house with modern offices and educational and recreational facilities will be built on the Hempstead Ave. church grounds. The Parkway Community Church is located on Hempstead Ave. near Levittown Parkway. The Rev. Douglas R. MacDonald resides at 85 Hempstead Ave.

Dr. Gosselink and Rev. MacDonald will be co-pastors and share equal responsibilities for the parish which covers the Hicksville, Levittown and Westbury area.

EXPECT HEARING WITHIN MONTH:

Home Rule Petition, Massive Document, Going to Supervisor

HICKSVILLE — The petition to bring about a vote on the question of home rule for this community will be presented to Township Supervisor Charles E. Ransom in the next few days, it appeared certain last night. It will be a massive document, according to the Home Rule Committee which has labored over it for three years. However, according to Lawrence A. Roman, committee chairman, the bulk of the petition has been compiled in the past 90 days.

The petition is being bound into four volumes. It numbers nearly 700 sheets and bears thousands of signatures of local property owners, large and small, whose total assessment must represent about \$13 million or one third the total value of the area seeking to incorporate as a first class village.

In addition to the petition which is about six inches thick, there are other supplemental papers and documents required, including the proposition for incorporation, signed by over 200 property owners, and a certified check for \$100 as required by law.

HEARING IN MONTH

The Home Rule Committee has estimated that a vote on the question could take place 36 days

after the proposition and petition is turned over to the Supervisor. However, that would be the minimum time. The maximum time, unless there is litigation, would be about 90 days. A public hearing on the question, which must be held in Hicksville by the Supervisor, is anticipated within 30 days of the petition presentation to Ransom.

Those who have not signed up yet and wish to have their names on this historic document, bringing the question to a vote, are urged by Roman to do so without delay—today, at 98 North Broadway, the committee headquarters.

More than 300 residents have labored on collection of signatures,

off and on, which has been the work of average homeowners, Roman said today.

Opposition to the campaign to bring about local home rule in place of a remote town board is being organized by Ernest P. Francke, local political boss and recently elected Nassau County Clerk. The opposition is focusing its efforts upon preventing, if possible, a vote from taking place on the homerule question.

Obey Watering Rules In Your Community

Regulations for lawn sprinkling vary in Mid-Island water districts:

HICKSVILLE—South of Old Country Rd. on odd-numbered days of month, north of Old Country Rd. on even-numbered days, watering permitted by householders. No specific hours. Farm irrigation PROHIBITED every day between 4 P.M. and 9 P.M.

PLAINVIEW—Even-numbered houses on even days and odd-numbered houses on odd days, watering permitted ONLY between 8 P.M. and 10 P.M. Houses without numbers permitted to water south of Old Country Rd. on odd days, north of Old Country on even days. Also Old Bethpage on odd days. Violators fined.

BETHPAGE—Even-numbered houses on even days and odd-numbered houses on odd days permitted between hours of 9 in evening and 7 P.M. next day only. No watering between 7 P.M. and 9 P.M.

LEVIITOWN—(Town of Hempstead)—Watering permitted only from 7 A.M. to 9 A.M. and from 7 P.M. to 9 P.M. only. Violators fined.

Move 2nd Police Precinct Stationhouse to Jericho

JERICHO—The Second Police Precinct is today operating from a new stationhouse on Hicksville-Jericho Road, just south of Northern State Parkway, on the west side of the highway. The command moved here from a building on a Muttontown estate Tuesday.

The Second Precinct had been established on the estate (generally called the 'Syosset' Precinct) since it was organized in 1926. The new stationhouse has increased floor space for the force of 126 men who patrol 85 square miles of the county including the mid-island area north of Hempstead Tpke.

County Executive A. Holly Patterson, Police Commissioner John M. Beckmann and other high police officials were present for a brief dedication ceremony on Tuesday afternoon. A squad of policemen stood at attention in front of the remodelled house while Robert Bransby, commander of the Jericho VFW Post, presented a new U.S. flag.

Beckmann thanked the VFW, promised W. Everett Horner, superintendent of county buildings for the remodelling done on the premises, and acclaimed the move as "another step forward in the department". He said the move

"will increase the efficiency of the command in rendering police service to the public. The atmosphere of these surroundings will also tend to make working conditions more pleasant".

Patterson also spoke of the more pleasant working conditions available for the command.

The phone number of the station house has been changed from Syosset 6-0672 to Hicksville 8-7700.



Kneeling Pads vs Home Rule

THE PETITION asking the Oyster Bay Township Supervisor to hold a public hearing and then a local vote on the question of whether or not Hicksville shall be privileged to run its own affairs is nearly completed. It may be in the hands of Supervisor Charles E. Ransom before the next issue of the Herald reaches you.

It has been three years and one month since June 22, 1950 when a public meeting was held—for all interested residents—in Hicksville Firehouse auditorium for the purpose of organizing a committee for incorporation of Hicksville. We were acting secretary of that meeting and the minutes reveal that among those present and offering motions was none other than Ernest F. Francke. The minutes show that Mr. Francke's motion, obviously made as an active participant in the events of the evening, was to limit committee chairmanship and membership to residents of Hicksville.

Debate on the question, as we recall, centered on the fact that it had been hoped to get a non-resident attorney with wide experience in incorporation of villages for legal advisor. Francke's motion was carried. Lawrence A. Roman became general chairman at that meeting and has served since.

Actually the movement to get Home Rule for Hicksville was officially put in motion when the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. was organized late in 1946. It was officially adopted as a project or platform for the Association and has remained one ever since. However, the meeting in 1950 saw the real start of the effort. Incidentally, in that year the total assessed valuation of Hicksville was \$16,738,355. Today, one third of the present value amounts to \$13,000,000.

The campaign to get the question to a vote got rolling late in 1950 following the preparation of the petition forms by a legal committee headed by Robert Corcoran. Almost three million dollars worth of property valuation was enrolled on petitions following a mass meeting of workers. The effort gradually slowed to almost a walk to be revived with tremendous vigor in the spring of this year.

Perhaps the incident which gave the greatest spur to the present effort—which appears destined for success—was the shenanigans of the Town Board on the Levittown issue. A year before the Town Board, after a public hearing attended by over 500 persons, had decided against chopping off a section of Hicksville in favor of Levittown. Then early this year, the question was revived by pro-Levittown elements and with most unbelievable support from a neighboring township rolled thru right over the top of a public referendum of the Oyster Bay Township Board which had solicited the opinions of property owners. The vote was a decisive "no" but the procedure, apparently dictated on a level higher, was jammed thru anyway.

Shocked into action by this surrender on the part of officials who might be expected to give first consideration to their constituents rather than to super-political strategy, the home owners of Hicksville have come to the realization that their only hope lies in the creation of a local municipality. Those whose interests are apparently better served by preventing home rule for Hicksville—and they have almost limitless resources at their command for propaganda carefully designed to charm and appease—have brought forth wordy pamphlet. The contents of this booklet, we found, was first read by most of those names who appear as sponsors AFTER publication.

Frankly we learned a "great deal" from the booklet. For example, according to the book, "town board members are thoroughly experienced in the conduct of municipal affairs and devote their full time to those affairs". From this we might expect an edict someday to banish future elections since only those who hold office "are thoroughly experienced". Also, folks who have waited for months and years for action on local parking, traffic signals, etc. will be glad to know that "full time" is being devoted to these projects.

Of course the most famous line in the book comes near the end: "If Hicksville community representation to the Town Board is made in a proper respectful manner by those who can demonstrate that they represent the entire community of Hicksville, the Town Board must recognize the reality of Hicksville's overwhelming importance to the town . . ."

And what authority shall be taken as demonstrating representation of the entire community?

Kneeling pads are certain to become part of the official equipment of the town hall for those who want to present a "proper respectful manner".

The long-awaited draft of a taxicab ordinance which could be used by Nassau County's towns and incorporated villages to bring about control by respective municipalities and assure mutual respect and reciprocal recognition was submitted to the Town Board of Hempstead this past Tuesday by Acting Town Attorney John Morehouse and a public hearing was set immediately for Tuesday morning, July 28th at 10:30. "This proposed ordinance had its origin in a joint conference of counsel for Nassau's three towns," stated Supervisor Harold P. Herman, "and the committees preparing it has been in conference with village officials so that an ordinance might be forthcoming which could be adopted by all municipalities. We are holding the public hearing to focus attention of the need for such an ordinance and hope that as a result of it, we may obtain a mutually satisfactory local law."

New Air Cadet Program

The Dept. of the Air Force recently announced that high school graduates now have the opportunity to apply for Aircraft Observer training and become flying officers skilled in navigation, bombardment, radar operation, aircraft performance engineering and related technical flying specialties.

For the first time since World War II, a young man with a high school diploma can apply directly from civilian life for flying training.

In addition to being a high school graduate, an applicant must be between the ages of 19 and 26, and in good physical and mental health. Minimum vision requirement is 20/60 if corrected with glasses to 20/20.

An individual is placed under obligation by submitting an application for training. He will not enter the Air Force until he is found fully qualified for Observer training and desires to enter the program.

The Aircraft Observer course is divided into three phases — Pre-Flight, Primary and Basic. The three month Pre-Flight consists of intensive officer type training that includes drills, customs and courtesies, physical training, etc.

Upon completion of Pre-Flight, Aircraft Observer cadets receive 30 weeks of Primary training which covers the fundamental skills and techniques common to all Aircraft Observer duties.

After completing the Primary phase, the Aircraft Observer cadet attends one of several basic courses that trains him for a specific aircraft position on a bombardment, interceptor, reconnaissance or transport type aircraft.

After approximately a year of training the cadet will be commissioned a second lieutenant in the Air Force Reserve.

Full information concerning Aircraft Observer Training can be obtained by visiting or writing Aviation Cadet Selection Team No. 53, at Mitchel Air Force Base.

A representative of the program, T. Sgt. Don Milligan, will be at the Herald office, 96 North Broadway, next to Hicksville Post Office on Friday morning, July 24, starting at 9 A.M. to answer questions regarding the Aircraft Observer training.

The SENTINEL**Water A Weapon Against Fire**

Water is the by far the most effective weapon the fire fighters have. Without it they are helpless. It is the height of folly to use up all of our water and deprive the fire department of it when they may need it very badly indeed. We may feel that an individual home owner uses only a small portion of the total water supply. But when several thousand individuals all get the idea at the same time to water their lawns, the water can disappear mighty fast.

Storage Tanks Can Be Emptied in 2 Hours

Water has been used in Hicksville in recent weeks at a rate which would empty the elevated storage tanks in less than two hours! The early evening use was 18,000 gallons per minute on a number of occasions. The nine wells in the Hicksville Water District can supply 8600 gallons per minute. The capacity of the storage tanks is about 1,000,000 gallons. Simple arithmetic tells us that the tanks can be emptied in less than two hours. This is the reason for the restriction of lawn sprinkling to alternate days for different parts of town.

If CAN Happen To You!

It is human nature to relax with the thought that accidents always happen to the other fellow. Perhaps it has been that way. At least, up until now. Who can tell when his turn will come? It may well be your house, or your neighbor's house, that is next. Protect your home, and the homes of your neighbors, by restricting your lawn sprinkling as requested by Frederick R. Davidson, superintendent of the Hicksville Water District.

House Destroyed

Fire struck in Levittown last week. A house was completely destroyed. Another house was damaged, and it was saved from destruction because the firemen blanketed it with water.

Pressure Dropped During Fire

The fire occurred in the afternoon, before the heavy lawn sprinkling began. A member of the Levittown F.D. said that after they had been fighting the fire for some time, a number of people evidently turned on their sprinklers entirely unmindful of the handicap they were placing on their fire department. This experience led the Levittown vamps to request that when the fire alarm sounds, all sprinklers should be turned off.

Is It Really True?

It is really true that the political masterminds of Nassau don't want any more incorporated villages? We have to admit that they haven't confided in us. So all we can do is to examine the evidence of words and deeds.

It Happened In 1938

The charter form of county government was introduced in Nassau County 15 years ago in 1938. With it came powerful deterrent for any community, no matter how well integrated it might otherwise be, forming its own local government.

It Happened In 1950

In 1950 the privilege of operating its own police department was "taken away" from areas which might incorporate as villages after that year. Villages incorporated previous to that time, and that includes all presently incorporated villages, may at any time organize their own police departments. But when Hicksville, or any other community in Nassau County, incorporates, they will continue to use the Nassau County police department.

And In 1953

The popular, grass roots campaign to incorporate Hicksville reached a peak this year and the initial phase is virtually complete. Many old timers and newcomers have joined together in trying to make Hicksville a better place to live. There is one "old timer" in particular, however, whose ties have evidently gone beyond Hicksville, and he doesn't seem to share in the enthusiasm for home rule. He has consistently opposed local government here, and he is the spear head of the opposition to incorporation. We can't help wondering why.

Party Line

Much of the argument advanced by Ernest Francke simply does

Local Concern Adopts Kun Kuk

NEW YORK CITY—The Lahey & Appel office at 81 Jerusalem Ave., Hicksville, has "adopted" Lee Kun Kuk, a 7-year-old Korean boy through Foster Parents' Plan for War Children, Inc., it was announced this week by Plan headquarters at 85 W. 42nd St., here.

"Adoption" is financial, not legal. The foster parent merely promises to contribute \$15. monthly towards the child's support for at least a year. In return, the Foster Parent receives a brief history of the child and a photograph. Correspondence through the Plan Office is encouraged since the children need the feeling of being loved and belonging to someone.

Lee Kun Kuk was born in Seoul where his father was a blacksmith. The family led a happy life until the Korean war broke out and they suffered hardships with the rest of the population. The child's father died of pneumonia and when the allies retreated from the city, the little boy and his mother joined the stream of refugees flowing toward the safety of Pusan.

However, in Pusan, the relief the mother sought was not to be found. Mrs. Lee and her boy wandered in the streets begging rice to keep alive and at night slept in the backyard of the City Hall. They were picked up by a section of Social Affairs and placed in a refugee camp. The mother has been feeding herself and her son by selling groceries in the market. But she is daily growing weaker from lack of sufficient food and can no longer go to work every day.

Lahey and Appel's aid help to keep him alive and their friendship will brighten the lives of the mother and child, the Foster Parents' Plan said.





Rules of Safety For Boatmen

Mid-Island boatmen . . . and there are many, are asked to cooperate in certain safety rules that have long been recognized by the "old salts" in this part of the country. Henry Hartmann, Nassau County Red Cross safety service director urges all boatmen to observe the following rules:

1.—To stay with the boat if it capsizes. Wood and metal boats with good air tanks don't sink.

2.—Not to wear a life jacket.

3.—Not to overload the boat. A wise rule in one person to a seat.

4.—Not to use matches or smoke near outboard motors . . . particularly when refueling.

5.—Not to play "hot pilot" with a sail or power boat.

6.—Not to stand up or rock the boat.

7.—To head for shore if a storm threatens.

Mr. Hartmann said Red Cross safety instructors have been posting the safety regulations at boat rental stations. Special stickers will be placed in boats to remind the users to observe the rules.

He said safety figures show more than half the nation's drownings occur in conjunction with small boats.
