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Lift Sprinkling Ban

PLAINVIEW—The ban on home irrigation and outdoor use of water for the water district, imposed early in July with fines for violators, was lifted by the Board of Commissioners as of Wednesday, Aug. 12, according to John Trask, superintendent of the water district. The Board asked the continued cooperation of home owners and other water consumers in conserving water whenever the supply and pressure declines.

Board To Offer Vote On Signs

HICKSVILLE—A proposition to spend \$2,000 for the erection of uniform street signs in the fire district area will be included in the fire district budget when it is voted upon later this month, the Board of Fire Commissioners advised a committee of the North West Civic Assoc. at a meeting Tuesday night. Present for the civics were President Herbert Johnson, Patrick Boland and James Cummings.

Teen Canteen Adults To Meet

HICKSVILLE—An open meeting for all adults interested in establishing Teen Canteen on a broader and more permanent basis is scheduled for next Monday evening, Aug. 17, 8:30 at the VFW hall.

Originally planned to provide weekly chaperoned dances for youngsters in the School District during the summer months, the program of Teen Canteen is meeting with overwhelming success. More than 1700 teen agers have attended a series of eight dances.

Among the activities the Canteen plans to sponsor in the coming weeks is a dance at the VFW hall on Grand Ave Hicksville Thursday, Aug. 21, and an excursion to see "A Night in Venice" at Jones Beach Thursday, Sept. 3. Tickets for the Jones Beach affair, which will cost one dollar including transportation and admission, will be sold at the weekly dances.

Start Work On Tourney Course

HICKSVILLE—Development of the course for the tournament of volunteer firemen on Labor Day will begin this Sunday morning on Levittown Parkway, according to General Chairman John Jeanson. The volunteers will start to place the grandstand seating facilities for over 5,000 along the sides of the Parkway where about 60 entrants will race for handsome trophies on Monday afternoon, Sept. 7. Fencing of the area and erection of the judges arch over the roadway will be among the final installations, Jeanson said. All members are being asked to report Sunday morning at 9 o'clock.

Flower St Objects To Business And Cites Youthful Population

OYSTER BAY—Residents of Flower St., Hicksville, presented a petition in objection to a proposed zone change on Old Country Rd., Hicksville, before a public hearing of the Town Board in Town Hall here Tuesday morning.

Joseph Dockow had asked the Board to rezone the residential property on Old Country Rd. at Newbridge Rd. which is backed by Flower St. to a business zone. He said the property will be used to establish a shrubbery and nursery business and an office. Dockow said he'd like to also build an office for himself on the property.

Joseph Axler of 163-18 Jamaica Ave., Jamaica, representing the residents of Flower St. said that there are 27 children under the age of 14 on Flower St. and that the proposed business use would increase the traffic hazards. He said the residents did not object to the Old Country Rd. zone change but are opposed to making any part of residential Flower St. a "business zone."

Dockow said it would not be necessary to rezone the Flower St. part of the property. The Board reserved decision on the case.

Unfinished House Burns

HICKSVILLE—An unfinished house at the corner of 5th Ave. and 6th St. caught fire Tuesday afternoon, Aug. 11, but damage was confined to a portion of the flooring on the first floor. Firemen were called to the scene at 4:46 P.M. The building is owned by Roberta.

MYSTERIOUS TELEPHONE CALLS—

'Breather' Terrifies Housewives

"The Breather", who may be a practical joker, a child or someone with more sinister motives, is alarming housewives in the north section of Hicksville, the Herald learned this morning.

The dial telephone is being used by "The Breather" and the fact that dial equipment was recently put into service in the Hicksville exchanges makes it difficult for the telephone company to provide relief.

"We know it is very annoying but there isn't very much we can do about it with dial equipment", a phone company official told a customer who complained.

The mystery calls began on Sunday and have continued almost daily since. One woman received four calls of this kind on Tuesday, more on Wednesday and the experience has almost unnerved her.

The phone rings and when it is answered, a person can be heard

breathing heavily but does not speak. Then the connection is broken.

The police have suggested the matter be taken up with the telephone company and the utility says it can do nothing unless the experience persists. Only then, with police cooperation and special telephone equipment, can an attempt be made to trace the source of the calls from "The Breather."

Mid Island Shopping Plaza 'Miracle Mile' Sans Traffic

OYSTER BAY—The 25 million dollar shopping center on North Broadway, Hicksville, (formerly St. John's Home property) will be a "Miracle Mile" without the traffic hazards of Manhasset's Miracle Mile, it was revealed at a public hearing of the Town Board as the Stackler and Frank Builders asked the Board Tuesday morning for an additional area of business property for the shopping center.

Attorney for the developers Robert Richtner showed the Board elaborate sketches and aerial views of the proposed shopping center which has been revised and improved since plans for its construction was first announced last year.

Richtner said that a major department store will be the center of regional shopping area, an entirely new design for shopping areas. He said the multi-million dollar project will benefit the community of Hicksville, both economically and socially, as every consideration has been given to

Six GOP Contests

MINEOLA—Opposition to incumbent Republican committeemen seeking re-election, taken by many political observers as a move to challenge the GOP leadership of County Clerk Ernest F. Francke in Hicksville, became a fact late Tuesday as the unheard of competition for six committeemen positions became official.

Designating petitions for the Primary Elections on Sept. 15 have been filed with the Board of Elections for candidates in the 16th, 41st, 44th, and 47th election districts, all in Hicksville.

The following Hicksville GOP contests are in prospect:

16th District—John J. Finnegan

of 62 Kuhl Ave. and Sofia Schult of 32 Indiana St. are the new candidates. Incumbent committeemen are Clifford Place and Leroy Wells.

41st District—Robert D. Eaton of 225 Lee Ave. and Leon D. Parker of 15 Fairview Court are the new candidates. Old timers being opposed are William Reicherl and Andrew B. Heberer.

44th District—John F. Larkin of 16 Nevada St. is seeking election. Incumbents are John Jeanson and Stanford Wies.

47th District—Florence Duffy Vry of 10 Rising Lane is a new candidate. Incumbents are Louis Kappstatter and Nelson Baldwin.

Forecasting the possibility of contests, Political Columnist Fred Clausen wrote recently in the L.I. Daily Press "while the incorporation movement and the newly whistled drive to unseat Ernest F.

Landia Becomes Jericho Hills

OYSTER BAY—The name of the new development in Jericho formerly known as Landia has been changed to Jericho Hills by the Gross Morton Builders, it was announced at a public hearing before the Town Board here Tuesday morning.

Attorney for the builders, Howard T. Hogan, asked the Board for relief for the builders in order that they might build new homes on 197 acres south of Jericho Pkwy. on each side of Hicksville-Jericho Rd.

Hogan said that the builders have had harmonious meetings with the Jericho Civic Assoc., Board of Education, Water District and Fire District. They have sold 15 acres to the School Board at condemnation prices and one acre to the Fire District.

Willets Underhill of the Board of Education told the Board that he believed the negotiations to be a fair solution. Underhill said that

the Taxpayers Assoc. has been concerned with the area for the past five years and feel strongly that Gross Morton are the builders to develop the land.

Plainview Tax Rate Cut 40%

Plainview—A 10-cent reduction in the school tax rate here for 1954, dropping from the county-wide high of \$3.57 per \$100 to \$3.165, was announced by the School Board this week with the warning that the tax relief will probably only be temporary. Unanticipated emergency state financial assistance has brought the rate down but with new school construction underway and more needed, the rate can be expected to soar again after 1954, a spokesman said.

Suffers Heart Attack

HICKSVILLE—A paperhanger suffered a heart attack while working at 14 Willwood Rd. Tuesday, Aug. 11. David Shulman, 64, of Brooklyn was treated by Dr. Joseph LaPenna of 2 Essex Ln. and taken to Meadowbrook Hospital in a police ambulance.

Industry Wants Bullet Factory

OYSTER BAY—A metal mold shop is planned on the northwest side of Duffy Ave., Hicksville, in the building formerly known as the "bullet factory," attorney Eugene Levitt for the Alumag Corp. told the Town Board in a public hearing here Tuesday morning.

The corporation asked the Board

to rezone the property from its present business to industrial use zone. Levitt explained to the Board that the property is near Peffack fertilized company and near the "town dump". Supervisor Charles E. Ransom corrected the attorney in his reference to a "dump". He said that it

was a pit, owned by the Township of Oyster Bay, "which we use for dumping".

Alumag Corp. was in business in a residential section of Brooklyn without complaint of adjoining occupants. Levitt said the shop would use the general method of melting of alloys and pouring into molds. He said there is a cleaning process in an acid bath and then the parts are shipped.

Ransom asked if there will be any disposition of waste material from the acid bath for he did not want the water supply in the ground for Hicksville to be contaminated.

"That has happened, you know?" Town Attorney Theodore Summers said. "Bathgate lost three wells."

Levitt said the acid bath is 80 percent water and that the tanks are only emptied about once a month so that there would be no contamination of the water supply, he claimed.

The Alumag Corp. would make parts used in airplanes and radar mechanism. Some of the companies who purchase their products are General Electric and helicopter companies, it was reported.

Attorney Levitt said there will be no noise and no odors from the shop. The firm plans to use the present building on the property and will ask for an extension in the future if it is needed.

There was no opposition to the request and the Board reserved decision.




