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Fire District Budgets Up For Vote Next Tuesday

The fire headquarters in Bethpage, Jericho and Hicksville will be the scenes of the annual district budget voting on Tuesday, Sept. 8, from 7 to 10 p.m. Resident taxpayers may vote on the proposed budgets for the coming year at that time.

Hicksville district proposes a budget totaling \$49,950 for 1953-54. Bethpage Fire District on Broadway proposed a total budget of \$80, 850. The budget proposal of the Jericho Fire District on Oyster Bay Rd. is \$17,550.

HICKSVILLE—Pupils in the kindergarten and first six grades, "so far as possible" will attend their neighborhood school or the school nearest their homes, it was announced today by Dr. E. H. LeBarron, superintendent of schools. All pupils will attend for a full day when classes resume Wednesday, Sept. 9.

Parents and students were notified by their principal last June of the school and hours they are to attend. Bus passes are being mailed before school opens, to those pupils who are entitled to ride (kindergarten thru 6th grade). There will be dancing to a five-piece orchestra.

Plunge To Street Kills Linesman

HICKSVILLE—A 23-year-old Lighting Co. linesman died in Meadowbrook Hospital of injuries at 2:30 Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 1, three hours after he fell from a 40-foot pole at Broadway and Herzog Pl. at the Long Island National Bank corner. He had finished his work and was descending at the time, it was reported.

John Fisher, age 23, lived with his wife and two children at 69 Ridge Lane, Levittown. He had been an employee of the Lighting Co. for the past four years. A spokesman for the utility company said an investigation into the cause of the accident was being made. He asserted that it had been established that the linesman's belt had not broken.

Fisher was a member of a line crew replacing a pole at the intersection. Crews have been working on Broadway for several months.

Merchants To Get Shoppers' Survey Report On Tuesday

HICKSVILLE—The findings of a comprehensive survey of shoppers' opinions in this area made by the Business Men's Assoc. in cooperation with the New York State Dept. of Commerce and the assistance of the membership of 32 local religious, educational and service clubs will be presented to members of the BMA next Tuesday night, Sept. 8, at the Alibi Restaurant, according to BMA President Irving Kenner.

Robert E. Barron, senior business consultant of the State Dept. of Commerce, who prepared the 25-page report will be present to discuss the findings. Also present will be John F. Deming, manager of the Regional office of the State Dept. of Commerce at Mineola.

"The progress and prosperity of the State and Nation are dependent on continuing local improvement programs," Barron commented at Albany yesterday. "The cooperation of merchants and shoppers, as

evidenced by this survey, is a further constructive move in this direction in Hicksville."

The survey represents a cross-section of shoppers' opinions. There were 466 questionnaires answered by women of the community and their comments and reactions are tabulated and analyzed. Better parking facilities, it is anticipated, will be the primary complaint of the shoppers.

If you are interested in voting on a proposed expenditure of your tax dollars, you can do so on Tuesday, September 8 at the Hicksville Fire House between the hours of 7 and 10 p.m.

A total budget for '53 and '54 is listed at \$49,980 for insurance, light and power, building repairs and maintenance, water, truck repairs and equipment, uniforms, hydrant rental, telephone, reserve fund, alarm system repairs, legal and audit, salaries and election expense.

In addition there are five propositions listed for approval and these cover No. 1—parade and tournament, \$500; No. 2—street signs, \$2,000; No. 3—new equipment and fire alarm system, \$12,000; No. 4—three parcels of property for future fire houses, \$20,000, and No. 5—inspection, \$1,000. Taxpayers whose names appear on the last assessment roll and have resided in the Fire District 30 days prior to the date of the election are eligible to vote on the above matters.

The official legal notice to taxpayers appeared in the Aug. 25 issue of the Herald.

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Having Faith In The People

WITHIN THE MEMORY of a goodly portion of today's population of Hicksville are the events related to the change in the form of government for Nassau County. The county is comparatively new. It was created in 1899 from Queens County. The area had had tremendous growth since 1920 and it was not very long before it became apparent that the form of government had to be improved to meet new, challenging conditions.

A drastic change was made, following a referendum of the people of Nassau. The present-day charter government for the county was in effect by 1940. Discussing the evolution of the county, J. Russel Sprague in 1940 as the first county executive said: "When people gather together in numbers they create problems for each other. Their very number demands governmental improvements and services as well as schools, and other new functions of government."

A parallel can be found in the county experience and the present effort to obtain Home Rule for Hicksville as an incorporated village. Hicksville's population has skyrocketed in a more recent interval. It numbered only a couple of thousands prior to World War I, climbed to over 5,000 after the First War. It rose slowly but steadily and had reached 8,000 by the end of the Second War. It has since zoomed tremendously, tripling in the past two years, and today's inhabitants are in excess of 30,000.

The need for a local municipal government has thus become even more acute for Hicksville as the change in county government became so necessary as Nassau grew.

The public officials and students of government did not hesitate to strive for improvement in the County. Why then should it be improper for Hicksville people to seek improvement on the local level?

County Executive Sprague in his 1940 report to the people discussed the reasons for the change in county government. A non-partisan Commission had been established in 1934 which included in its membership Dr. Elwood a Curtis of Hicksville. The theory of the new Charter, Sprague stated, was that of "two layers of government generally speaking. In the lower layer there were to be retained or preserved to the several communities such as the special districts, Villages and Towns, complete control and power over those functions of government, which were closest to them, which they knew the most about, and over which they desire to continue their authority. This was for the preservation of home rule to the separate communities over those functions of government which were to so continue." (Bold face ours).

We have taken this opportunity to review the theory and fact behind the County Charter since the Charter has been cited by the anti-Home Rule element as a document which somehow, they would have you believe, prevents or makes undesirable the establishment of a village government for Hicksville.

In the same 1940 report, Sprague made another statement which has significance for our community. When certain of his official family argued against portions of the charter form on the grounds that the taxpayers, in confusion, would blame the county officials for the results of the change-over, Sprague said "my answer to all these arguments was and is, 'I have faith in our people'. . . I agree with the (Charter) commission that the correct time to right a wrong is as soon as possible."

We sincerely hope that this viewpoint is held today by Township Supervisor Charles E. Ransom who will conduct the hearing here upon the petition for a vote on incorporation Sept. 17. "Have faith in the people", let the public decide the issue. Let the question come to a vote in the truest democratic fashion. The people are well-qualified today, just as the property owners of the 1930s were, to decide on changes and improvement in the management of municipal affairs.

We can't believe that any public-spirited community or political leader worth his salt would seriously seek to prevent a decision by the traditional American forum—at the polls.

Cynics will not agree, but we find it significant that the drive to get the petition completed was launched on Patriot's Day—the anniversary of the famous ride of Paul Revere, and that the hearing before Supervisor Ransom will take place on Constitution Day, Sept. 17.

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HICKSVILLE—The official bus stops for the 1953-54 term in this school district were made public today by the Board of Education. It was disclosed the Board has accepted a transportation program "recommended by the Superintendent and his staff and based upon the recommendations resulting from the survey made by the State Education Dept."

"Primarily an area plan," it recognizes the importance of housing children in the neighborhood school in so far as the facilities permit, and it gives consideration to age or grade level of pupils, their distance from school which they attend and hazards enroute.

"In general, kindergarten thru third grade beyond the one half mile limit, four thru six grades beyond the one mile limit, and seven and eight beyond the two mile limit will be transported from stops beyond designated streets which form the area boundary," the board explained.

"Where hazards exist bus service will be provided regardless of area or distance."

One Last Swing For the Fence

Botto Bros. gets one last swing for the fence over the Labor Day weekend. The Hicksville crew has held on just enough to gain a playoff berth in the Jones Beach Little World series which will be held on Sunday and Monday afternoons.

Redemption for a totally disappointing season is to be had by pulling the beach title out of the fire, but the current of the season isn't likely to be changed in the final hours.

Long Island Neon, Post City and Botto were definite qualifiers for the series as we went to press with Republic, Levittown and Franklin Square, in a desperate triangle for the final opening.

The first place team will face the third and the second and fourth pair-off in one game sets. The two winners meet Monday for the title while the two losers will vie in the preliminary for a consolation prize.

If conditions are ideal, the two-day affair is expected to attract close to 10,000 fans.

The bats of Ed Coleman and Jerry Kiesel are respected in crucial moments with the opposition careful to the extent of walking Ed 17 times and Jerry 13.

A free pass has been issued to Fowler seven times and Rigby has picked up just two.

A strikeout doesn't set anything in motion and Botto has been deft in that department.

Jack McCrosson leads the swingers with 23 while Coleman has gone down 18 times. Rigby shows 16 K's in the book and Fowler 12.

Of the regulars Brian Masterson, Kiesel and Sommers with 2, 4 and 6 strikeouts against them have done the most to get a piece of the ball.

Actually the club has been on the downgrade since that ball went in the dugout against Long Island Neon six weeks ago and it will take a big explosion to regain the bounce needed to win the playoff.

It is apparent that major softball will return to the Island next season and the extremely talented Fowler, Masterson and Sommers must be included in any large move.

This must be their last season with Botto and it may be the last chance to snare the beach bunting.

Top flight club softball could easily pass from the Hicksville picture with 1953 for the community has fallen short with adequate replacements, in number, to carry it in the high pressure circle that Jones Beach and ASA has gotten to be.

One shot is left. There are very few who believe that Botto can put the ball over it.

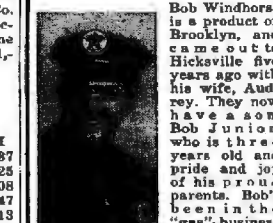
