KEEPING PACE WITH GROWTH:

Huge Water Tank Going Up

HICKSVILLE—Steel has been delivered and construction will start next week, it is expected, upon erection of a huge water storage tank on the rear of the Water District property on Bethpage Rd., north of the RR. It will be the biggest tank in the district with a capacity of one and a quarter million gallons. Construction is expected to take about three months, depending upon weather conditions.

The district already has a small tank with a 150,000 gallon capacity on the same property. Other storage consists of 300,000 and 500,000 gallon tanks on the west side of Newbridge Rd., near the township boundary line. When finished, the new tank will make the total storage capacity of the district 2.2 million gallons, according to Harry Borley, chairman of the Board of Water Commissioners.



Voters Approve Fire Budgets

A substantial vote carried the Hicksville Fire District's proposed 1953-54 budget Tuesday night, Sept. 8, at the Fire House. There were 145 yes votes, 13 blank, and 5 no, on the \$25,950 budget.

The five Hicksville propositions, including parade and tournament, inspection, new equipment for fire alarm system, three parcels of property for future firehouses, and street signs, at a total of \$35,500 were also carried.

Voters in the Bethpage and Jericho Fire Districts approved respective budgets of \$30,350 and \$17,550. The Bethpage District's proposition for painting and repairs to the fire station was also carried for \$4,500.

Eginton Accepts Resignations

MINEOLA — A news release from county Civil Defense headquarters today stated that Charles D. Eginton, Hicksville CD director, had mailed notices to 26 members of Unit 312 accepting their resignation and directing them to turn in their equipment prior to Sept. 18. "You are further advised that if this equipment is not received on or before this date prompt action will be taken as provided by law for the collection of the same," the letter added. Among those notified on Sept. 8, according to the release, were Thomas Cullen, formerly assistant to Eginton; and George McCarthy, author of *Citizen Civic Comments* appearing Tuesday in the Herald.

Six Republican Committee Contests On Primary Day

HICKSVILLE—This community will have the most exciting Primary Election Day in years, next Tuesday. There are six Republican contests in four election districts. These are the first inter-party battles for GOP positions here in more than 20 years with newer residents seeking to unseat men close to Ernest F. Francie, local Republican chairman.

Polls next Tuesday, Sept. 15, are open from 12 noon to 9 P. M. Two of the six "newcomers" are women, contesting the all-male local GOP organization.

FOUR KEY DISTRICTS

While both Republican and Dem-

ocratic committeemen will be elected in every one of the 14 districts here, two for each party. Interest is focused upon the contests slated for the 16th, 41st, 44th and 47th.

Stanford Weiss is running in the 44th District as a pair for re-election while John F. Larkin, also of the Spiegel Homes, is attempting to win one of the two positions. This district votes at Nassau Motors on E. Barclay St.

In the 41st District the "newcomers" paired are Robert Eaton and Leon Parker, both from the Frank Homes area, opposing old-time incumbents William Reichert and Andrew B. Heberer. The 41st votes at the high school on Jerome Ave.

Florence Duffy Vrynn is running in the 47th dist., which also votes at the high school, where the incumbents are Louis Kappstatter and Nelson Baldwin.

Typical of the reasons for running in this bi-annual primary are the views of Mrs. Vrynn: "I think the district and the party would benefit by a more representative choice of committeemen. In a district where two-thirds of the voters are here less than five years and have interests and problems slightly different than those of the more established sections of the community of this group would give better balance to the organization."

An active growing party should have a choice of good people willing to work and a contest allows the voters to make their own choice."

Speaking in behalf of his neighbors, Bob Eaton and Leon Parker, the following statement was made

by William Bennett regarding the vote in the 41st: "They are honest and will fight for anything that affects youngsters in our neighborhood. These men have been in fights for safe streets, safe drainage pits—which they did something about—and a lot of other things."

Reacting to the outburst of almost unheard of competition in the Republican ranks, Chairman Francke and his committee today officially sought to rally eleventh hour support for "his boys" with newspaper ads pleading for a "unified Republican committee" which, the ad states, "means strong Hicksville representation."

Enrolled GOP party members are urged in the ads to "vote for these regular Republicans who have proven their loyalty to their party and Hicksville." The late spurt of energy on behalf of "loyal" party candidates, just hours before the balloting, was taken by some observers as evidence that the outcome next Tuesday was considered far from "in the bag" by the old guard.

Plainview Cuts Water Charges

PLAINVIEW — The Board of Commissioners of Plainview Water District, Ralph P. Atchue, Chairman, August Keute, Treasurer and John C. Edwards, Secretary, announced Tuesday night the adoption of a resolution reducing the water rates within the Water District on all water consumed on and after Dec. 1, 1954. The present rate of 60 cents per 1,000 gallons will be cut to 55 cents per 1,000 gallons. The present minimum charge of \$4 per quarter is retained but will allow for the consumption of an additional quantity of water for the minimum fee, the commissioners said.

The Water District has been expanding from a small farming community of less than 400 consumers to an estimated 4,000 by Dec. 31, 1954. Prior to July 1953 all of the water consumed within the

District was purchased from adjoining water districts.

During the past year and one half the District has acquired three land sites, in addition the District has constructed and installed three wells and a modern administration building which are now in operation. It is anticipated that the million-gallon, one quarter gallon elevated water storage tank will be erected in time to meet the demand of

the summer of 1954. Although the District has undertaken a bond issue of \$750,000, it is the opinion of the Commissioners that the savings effected through the modernization of its plants and billing system, and through the installation of outside water meter pits in all new construction, a sufficient saving will be effected to allow for the decrease of rates established by this resolution.

The Sunday Church School will be divided into two sections, meeting at 9 A.M. and at 10 A.M. Children

may be registered any day of the week by calling the Church office, Hicksville 3-5788. Children who are registered on Sunday mornings, however, will not be assigned to classes until the following week.

The Church plans to continue this schedule until additional facilities are provided for the growing Church School. It is hoped that an educational unit will be added to the present Church building during the coming year.

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

Adequate Water Supply

Even though we don't have enough water to sprinkle our lawns continuously throughout the summer, the supply is adequate to meet all normal demands. We are more fortunate in this respect than some of our neighbors who obtain their water from other water districts. The water pressure in the Hicksville Water District, serving all of Hicksville and a small area outside its borders, has been maintained at a sufficiently high level for any fire emergency that might arise, except for a few nights before sprinkling was curtailed.

Neighboring water districts have evidently not been so fortunate. We understand that the water pressure has been dangerously low in some parts of Levittown and that in a test firemen were unable to use some of their equipment on this account. This is another good reason why we should feel pleased that Levitt and Sons built some of their houses in Hicksville and that we were the one to buy them.



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
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

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Spending Money, Scientifically

I was speaking to Harold Robbins last Tuesday evening, and I happened to ask him when is the "right time" to trade my car in price-wise, of course. He replied that after two years, according to experts, the family auto required mechanical repairs other than routine attention, normally necessary. This would place the ideal trade-in at two years.

In case you don't already know who Harold Robbins is, I might describe him as one of the individuals in our midst who could lead you to the proper conclusion in a problem concerning the most scientific manner in which you may spend money.

For instance, when you buy a can of pens, how much canned water do you pay for? The old problem of, "Should I take high octane or regular gas?" When you buy sheets by size, are you disappointed when they are 6 to 8 inches shorter than the "store size" or "out size" listed on the label?

Harold is holding forth at the high school this semester, at the adult education sessions—in an aptly named series entitled "Consumer Education."

In clothing, there's buying pre-shrunk and sanforized items. You may not know about the coal tar dyes in cosmetics. Other facets of his course will go along lines of automobiles and household items, food and drink, real estate, appliances and health buying. If you are included in this course, you will probably find yourself in the laboratory with a spoon and a piece of paper, all ready to check the butterfat content of your favorite milk, (or heretofore favorite)

I asked Mr. Robbins if it was correct that women shoppers, although they are known for hunting and finding bargains, sometimes spend more than the value received. He said, in effect, that it often happens and that through a systematic approach, women can reverse this situation, and actually save money. Also for you ladies: will you take Harold's experiment with the washing machine, and let me know how you make out? There is always so much confusion as to what soap or what-have-you to use in the family wash. Try this: ordinary soap suds and a water softener. That's all. Let me know.

I asked about perfumes, natural, synthetic, and foreign and domestic. It seems that all countries

manufacture excellent perfume, and though France is credited with a superiority in this field, this feeling is unfounded. However, our synthetic and natural perfumes are so alike that it would take an expert to tell the difference.

The course might inform you that domestic wines may differ from imported wines of the upper price range. Soil conditions that may be too costly to copy elsewhere lend the vine and the grape that "something". You might test ordinary everyday products in the lab or you might find yourself knowing more about real estate and buying a house with necessary knowledge of zoning and assessed valuation. Mr. Robbins tells me that they will discuss food and freezer plan. This is a favorite subject of mine, and someday I'd like to write an article about it, but in the meantime I'll conjure up some delicate approach. In such a plan the saving of money is highly questionable to me. However, I'm deviating.

The course is new and different. It will include many open discussions providing entertainment with education.
