# Bethpage Tax Bill Climbs; Most of Hicksville Down

OYSTER BAY—Bethpage property owners, as well as taxpayers in the Levitt-built section of Hicksville, are confronted with tax increases for 1954 while the average tax bill will decline in Hicksville proper and Jericho and remain unchanged in Plainview, it was learned today by the Herald.

The proposed tax rates for the various special districts, together with the appropriations for the coming year, are included in the township budget which will be the subject of a public hearing at the Town Hall, here, on Tuesday morning, Oct. 27 at 10 o'clock. No copies of the budget are available or published as a notice. A copy is filed with the office of the Town Clerk here.

**NEW JOINT DISTRICT**  
Every special district tax rate for Hicksville proper is the same or less for the coming year. However, the rate for the Levitt-built area of about 2,200 homes is due for a boost because of the new rate for the "Hempstead—Oyster Bay Joint Community Hall and Swimming Pool District" which comes into operation on Jan. 1, 1954, when operation and expense of operating the hall and nine swimming pools is officially transferred from Levitt and Sons to the shoulders of the taxpayers.

Excluding the town highway tax of 43 cents per \$100 or \$16.20 on a house assessed at \$4,000, the county and police tax rates which will not be known until November, and the school tax for which bills have already been delivered, the special district charges in Hicksville will be \$27 on a house valued at \$4,000 compared with \$29.80 for the current year. In the Levitt-built section, however, the rate will be \$37.76 for 1954 compared with \$27 for the rest of Hicksville. The increase is due to the Joint District which amounts to \$6.76 on a \$4,000 value house and a higher garbage district tax for that area which is "Extension No. 5", due to new home occupancy.

In Bethpage, where the charge for special districts was \$26.40 on a \$4,000 valued house this year, the new charge will be \$44. In Plainview, which has only the water and fire protection districts, the charge remains the same at \$27.80 while Jericho shows a decline from \$22.80 on a \$4,000 value house to \$16.20.

If there is no charge in the county rate or police rate, the total Hicksville tax rate (excluding schools) will be \$27.93 per \$1,000 compared with \$28.88 this year and in the Levitt section it will pay \$30.62. On a house assessed for \$4,000 this amounts to a tax bill of \$111.72 for the coming year for Hicksville proper and \$122.48 for the Levitt section, excluding schools.

## Hall-Pool District to Cost Levitt Homeowners \$6.76

OYSTER BAY—A total budget of \$131,315.89 has been prepared by Oyster Bay and Hempstead Town Boards for the operation of the so-called "Hempstead and Oyster Bay Joint Community Hall and Swimming Pool District" which comes into being on Jan. 1. The cost of the operation of the Hall on Levittown Pkway., Hicksville, and the nine swimming pools—two of which are in Hicksville—will amount to \$6.76 on a Levitt house assessed for \$4,000.

### DETAIL BUDGET

The tax rate will be exactly the same for the property owners in the Hempstead section and the Oyster Bay area, 16.9 cents per \$100. For the purpose of raising the appropriation, the Hempstead area is assessed at \$67,296,146 and Oyster Bay (Hicksville) at \$10,844,755. The total budget is divided with Hempstead (Levittown) charged \$112,097.83 and Oyster Bay (Hicksville) \$18,225.77.

The first year budget follows:

General Administration, 9 pools and hall, \$23,398; Hall salaries and wages, \$7,388.16; Hall maintenance and supplies \$6,425; permanent and temporary labor for nine pools, \$58,056; pool maintenance and supplies, \$38,900; adv charge 5/21/53 \$86.48; filing fee \$10.50; adv charge 8/14/53 \$51.75 to make a total of \$131,315.89.

The Hicksville area will pay about one-seventh of the total.

## Protest County Sump Fronting on 10th St.

HICKSVILLE—Depreciation of property values and the hazard for children of the neighborhood is being cited by residents of Tenth St. and Division Ave., here, in protest against the creation of a huge drainage sump in the area by the County of Nassau.

The petition has been addressed to John C. Guilbert, county commissioner of public works at Mineola, and a copy to Councilman Francis Chlumsky. The sump is now being established on the south side of 10th St.

The objectors point out that the sump will:

"1. Create a hazard to the children in the neighborhood. The memory of two children drowned in sumps less than a mile from our

homes is still vividly recalled by us.

"2. As taxpayers who have been paying taxes for the last four years or more, this will mean a great depreciation in the value of our properties.

"We vigorously object to a sump being put up and facing our homes; but if it must go there, then there seems to be enough property to have the sump moved further in so that another row of houses could be built to face 10th St. with the sump in back of them."

#### Nothing Like Home Rule!

So says the editor of the Long Island Press in hinting at the possibility of a future "Nassau City" in last Saturday's editorial column. We are glad to see that a large influential newspaper thinks as we do that concentrated and highly centralized power under a city form of government in Nassau County would not be advantageous.

#### Worth Repeating

Some of the editorial applies very aptly to our local situation on incorporation and home rule, and it is well worth repeating. It states that "When it comes to grassroots democracy, where people run their own show, there's nothing like home rule. Let's not be persuaded to give it up. Let us never be BAMBLED (Capitals ours ED.) to concentrate and centralize OUR local government to dilute the power of the average citizen's vote. The bigger the town, the less YOU count." Amen, and our compliments to the editor.

#### Why Is Home Rule Best?

We shouldn't just accept what anybody says about home rule, whether he may be an editor, or a politician, or a business man.

Examine the facts, and fundamentals of home rule, and then decide if it is good. Ask "Just why is home rule good?", or ask "Just why is home rule bad?" After separating the wheat from the chaff, the facts from the hogwash, one outstanding fundamental fact stands out. It is that in any form of cooperative human endeavor, whether it be the family, a business, a society, or a government, continued success can be assured only by having decisions made at the lowest possible level in the organization.

In the family we teach our children to make their own decisions. As they grow older, they decide more and more for themselves, with signs of relief from the parents. In business and industry, great sums are spent on training foremen and supervisors to make decisions affecting their own activities. The higher echelons of business organizations concern themselves with the overall problems, leaving the local departmental decisions to those directly concerned. So it should be in government.

#### Flat On Its Face

Someone may point out a business whose success has been due to the owner exerting his iron will over every aspect of the business. Sure, there are lots of them. But, and it's a very big but, what happens when the owners is incapacitated or dies? The business may stagger on for a while, but sooner or later it falls flat on its face.

#### Case In Competent Hands

The fate of the Hicksville incorporation vote petition is at last in competent hands free of politics and prejudice. The appeal from Supervisor Ransom's denial has been made to the County Courts and we can be sure of an adequate legal review of its merits. The judge reviewing the appeal has the benefit of a rigorous legal training plus many years of experience in applying the fine points of the law. He will not face the political pressures that Supervisor Ransom faced. He will have only his knowledge, his conscience and his legal training to guide him.

#### The Judge Will Know

The judge will know which assessed valuation figure is proper to use, even if the Town Supervisor apparently did not. He will know that men cannot be required to act on knowledge to which they have no access. He will know that the petition was properly based on a valuation of the year 1952-1953, and not the next year as claimed by Ransom, because the new higher figure was a state secret until the first part of August. He will know about the other things, too. We have every confidence that the judge will permit a popular local vote on home rule for Hicksville.

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

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**New Books About Nazi Rulers**

There have been some very good works published this Fall about the rulers of Nazi Germany. It is certainly valuable for all of us to know the origins of this movement, unique in modern history, and the nature of this fantastic group. Hitler, by Alan Bullock, sheds much light on this period and its number 1 leader. It shows how this remarkable man, coarse and ignorant, but possessed with amazing political acumen rose to power in depression-ridden Germany by a combination of rabble-rousing oratory and ineffectual leadership in the government.

Never getting a majority of the votes, Adolph Hitler rose to the most absolute dictatorship of modern times, and took a nation of 80,000,000 people to destruction simply because he would it so. It is the best full length biography of Hitler to appear.  
The man who was Chancellor of Germany when Hitler came to power has published his Memoirs. Franz Von Papen, whose career spans over four decades, has written a spirited defense of his own conduct, and the behavior of Germany before Hitler. While you may not agree with his thesis, and most have not, this book is good history about the last fifty years.



# First Hall-Pool Charge \$6.76

(Continued from Page 1)  
was the subject considerable debate and civic controversy for over two years.

Last year William Levitt, builder of the Hall, announced he would close the Hall and pools unless future maintenance was taken over by local municipalities. Certain homeowners of the area argued unsuccessfully that the "free use of the pools" was pledged in newspaper advertisements when they bought their homes.

**TOWN SAID "NO"**

In May of 1952, Oyster Bay Town Board held a public hearing on a proposal to create a special district out of Hicksville Park and Parking District to assume the cost of maintaining and operating two pools in the Hicksville area. The town board finally turned down the proposal stating "The (town) board is of the further opinion that the pools presently owned by the developer as well as the community hall are intended for the free use of the purchasers of

the developer's houses and should therefore not be a matter of concern with respect to operation, care and maintenance by the Town".

After Levitt had closed the Hall (the pools were closed for the winter) on Jan 1 of this year, new pressure to create a taxing district was generated by pro-Levitt town forces led by David K. Sigerson (who is attorney for and one of the formal objectors to the Hicksville Home Rule Vote today), and Oyster Bay Town Board finally decided to hold an election on Jan. 30 of this year to find out if the residents wanted to be included in a Joint District on the Hall and Pools.

**VOTE WAS "NO"**

The vote was 3 to 1 against the proposal. However, legislation was introduced over vigorous protests and enacted in Albany to permit creation of the joint district.

The NLHOA, which had long ad-

vised the taxation of Levitt residents in a Joint District to carry the cost of operating the Hall and pools, had argued in Sept. 1951 that the "full cost" of their program "should not exceed \$5 per year". Later the figure was revised to \$7.50. The tax rate just forecast indicates a cost for the first year of \$6.76 on an average house.
