Santa is also expected at the North West Civic Assoc Children's party at Burns Ave School on Saturday, Dec. 19, and at the Parc Community Civic Assoc visit to the neighborhood the same day.

He is also due to put in an appearance in the Mannetto Hill School, Plainview, at the children's party of the Plainview Legion Post on Sunday, Dec. 20, and there is a tentative date for Santa in the Cedar Cliff Civic Assoc area on Christmas Day. The Rotarians will hold a Christmas Party for children of members at the Millerville Inn, Jericho, on Dec. 19.

Hicksville Lions Club party for children of members takes place Sunday afternoon, Dec. 20, at Hicksville Inn. Chairman Jack Weber says Santa will be present.

He will be at the 6th annual free Christmas party for all the children, sponsored by the L. I. National Bank, at the Hicksville Theatre at 9:00 A.M. Wednesday, Dec. 23.

Santa will make house to house visits along Twinlawn Ave., Hicksville under the civic assoc auspices on Thursday, Dec. 24, shortly after dusk.

A public hearing was held Tuesday morning upon the expenditure of not in excess of \$50,000 for the development of the field on the property east of the LIRR between E. Nicholas and E. Marie St.

Councilman Frank Chlumsky said yesterday that following the public hearing, the Town Board in closed session directed immediate progress on negotiations and ordered the preparation of plans and specifications by Chester Voorhies, engineer for the parking district. It is expected bids will be requested on the 50-car field "in about a month."

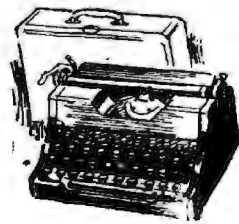

PLAINVIEW VAMPS REPORT: Word Of Caution For Season

We know that the Christmas season is just around the corner so feel that a few words of caution are in order. There are still people who use candles on the traditional Christmas tree. This is the most dangerous means of lighting a tree. We suggest that this practice be discontinued at once. The second, and most practical way is by means of electric lights, but this also can be a costly way unless checked properly.

It might be a good thought to get your lights out now and check them so that they are ready for Christmas Eve. You will also be putting extra wiring inside and outside the house which should also be checked. These should be placed some distance from the branches and decorations because of the amount of heat they generate. Many things are advertised as fire-proof but up to now nothing has been proven.

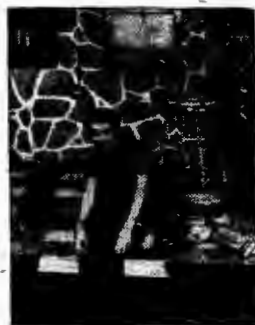

Whats Route Of Expressway?

By Fred J. Noeth

DANIEL J. BOVE puts into a letter a subject which has caused considerable concern among a large number of homeowners in Hicksville and Plainview.

Mr. Bove, who lives at 24 Haverford Rd. in the Hillside Terrace section of Hicksville, writes: "If possible, I would like to know the exact route of the proposed Horace Harding Expressway. The best I can find out on my own is that it passes north of Hicksville, then crosses Old Country Rd. and South Oyster Bay Rd. If this means the intersections of these two roads, then it will cut thru many residential areas. I feel that the residents involved would like to know as far in advance as possible if they will be affected."

We have been in touch with the State Dept. of Public Works in an effort to get more data. A very rough map was published some weeks ago in the daily papers. Actually, it was little more than a line drawn broadly across the mid-island landscape.

At Babylon, where the Public Works Dept. has a regional office, we found that the officials are just as much in the dark about the exact route as are most homeowners. The Babylon office has been swamped with inquiries since the publication of the map and a story about a proposed six-lane expressway running from an extension of Horace Harding in Queens out thru Nassau and Suffolk toward Montauk Point.

Officially, the route has been generally decided (which means, an official told us, is little more than "drawing a line on the map") as far east as Guinea Woods Rd. just north of Westbury. Further than that, there is absolutely nothing official. As for the portion going out thru Suffolk, that is even more vague.

Admitting that on occasion thruways and expressways have been developed with what appears to be little regard for the structures on properties along a determined route it hardly seems likely that a route will be chosen which would dispossess the largest possible number of persons.

On the other hand we learned this week about a gas station operator on the North Shore, for example, who was given just two weeks to pack up and move, once the route of what is generally known as the Cedar Swamp Road improvement was decided. However, we also recall that there was about ten years of talk and more talk before the project was started.

Furthermore, it has been found that occasionally the state in mapping new thruways actually selects two or more alternate pathways to eliminate as far as possible land speculation.

Concern about the proposed expressway in this section has reached the point that several homeowners are hesitating to make such improvements as building garages and patios because they fear they may be forced to move out.

It would seem that the authorities who have given out the first news of this proposed highway would have more reassuring information for those concerned before giving circulation to rumors and fears.

We propose to continue keeping in touch with this project and will make public information on it as soon as something definite becomes available.

Meanwhile, we wonder what ever happened to the Newbridge Road in Hicksville widening project? Newbridge is a state highway. Plans have been drawn but at last report there was no money available.

COMPLETE TOWNSHIP TEXT:

Disclose Policy On Use Of Hall

HEMPSTEAD — Proposed policy of the commissioners of the Hempstead Oyster Bay Joint Community Hall and Swimming Pool District, regulating the use of Levittown Hall in Hicksville by organizations, were discussed at a public hearing in Town Hall, Wednesday.

The text of the regulations, devised by the commissioners, as obtained from Supervisor Charles E. Ransom of Oyster Bay, follows:

Section 1—Declaration of policy.

The essential purpose of the community hall is to serve as a civic center for the residents of the community hall, and swimming pool district. As such it should serve as a meeting place where they conduct affairs of their community organizations. It is the intent of the commissioners to make the hall available in an orderly, reasonable manner to fraternal, social, political, civic, educational and kindred societies and organizations, comprised substantially of residents of the district. To carry such intent into execution requires that use be permitted only on written applications. In the disposition of applications, the director shall be guided by the standards hereinafter set forth. It being the considered judgement of the board of commissioners, based upon study and experience, that a community hall, owned and operated by the residents through the medium of a special district for the general betterment and welfare of a patriotic community, should not be used for the conduct of activities of groups and organizations whose aims and purposes are subversive of the government of the United States and calculated to give aid and comfort to nations who have procured armed violence to be launched against the United States and it being the further judgement of the board of commissioners that granting the use of the community hall to such groups for such purposes would create such resentment and agitation as to constitute a clear and present danger to the peace and good order of the community, the board of commissioners hereby directs that in applying such standards and carrying out the aforesaid intent of the commissioners, the director shall consider the nature, activities and purpose of the applicant society or organization and the scope of the affiliation of the applicant, if any, with any organization, individuals or groups of individuals who advocate or espouse a program inimical to or subversive of the fundamental principles of the constitution of the United States or with any communist organization, communist-front organization or communist-front organization registered with the attorney general of the United States or required to be so regis-

tered by order of the United States Subversive Activities Control Board in accordance with the provision of the act popularly known as the "Subversive Activities Control Act of 1950".

Section 2—Permits. No society or organization shall use the community hall for any meeting, function, affair or activity without having first obtained a written per-

mit from the director.

Section 3—Standards. In determining applications or revoking permits, the director shall be guided by the following standards:

(a) Is the society or organization comprised of residents of the district?

(b) Is the general policy of this society or organization, or the provisions...

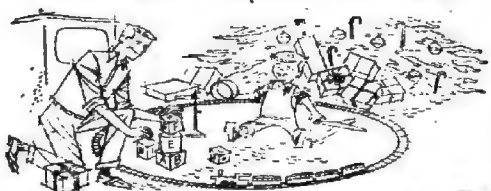

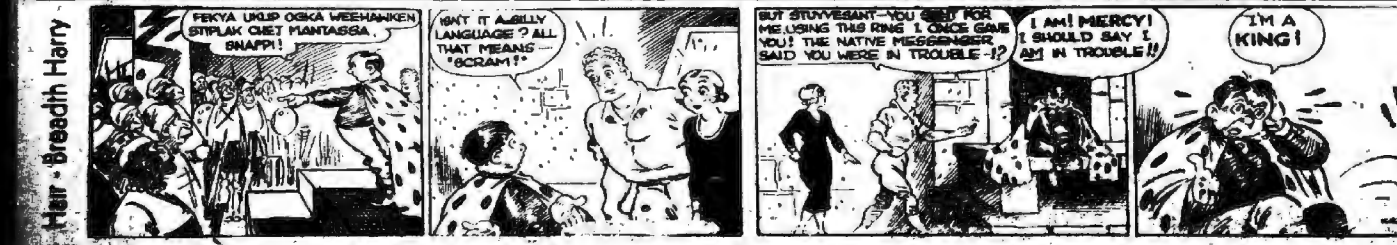

HALL POLICY
 (Continued from page 1)
 The committee will be held in the community hall without constituting a club or organization. The purpose of the committee is to coordinate the activities of the community.
 (c) Has the prior consent of the society or organization in its use of the community hall been so disciplined and orderly that the society or organization can be expected to use the hall without probability of damage to the hall, unwarranted noise or other disturbance disruptive of the peace and good order of the community.
 Sect 4—Priorities. Where a conflict arises because of requests by two or more applicants for the use of the hall at the same time, the director shall consider the following in granting priorities as to use:
 (a) The identification of the society or organization with the community as evidenced by the number and residence of its members.
 (b) The purpose of the society or organization and the nature of the proposed use.
 (c) The possibility of conducting the use at another time.
 (d) Such similar facts and circumstances as may obtain the most equitable distribution of permits consonant with the essential purpose of the community hall.
 Sect 5—Hearings. Whenever the director may deem it advisable, he may call a public hearing before determining an application.
 Sect 6—Appeals. An applicant may appeal in writing to the board of commissioners from the director's refusal to issue a permit.

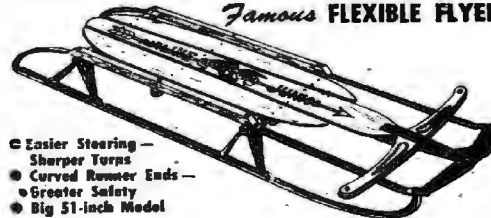
