## Nothing Pending Before Town on Newbridge Tract

**HICKSVILLE**—There are no plans for construction of an incinerator plant nor a request for a zone change on property on the east side of Newbridge Rd. between the Glenbrook Homes and the Holy Family R.C. Church at Fordham Rd., it was stated flatly today by Councilman Frank Chlumsky. Reports are current in the neighborhood that "some kind" of unsatisfactory activity is scheduled, causing considerable concern among the residents of the Glenbrook section. Chlumsky said that there is nothing regarding this property currently before the Township officials.

He also reported that the Town Board is preparing to extend the garbage collection district to cover the last two uncollected areas of Hicksville. These include part of the Glenbrook section and the Vidoni Homes on South Broadway. Extension of the district to cover both sections is expected to be concluded early next year.

## Mrs. Bergin To Head Polio Drive

**MINEOLA**—The appointment of Mrs. Thomas Bergin of 111 Park Ave as chairman of the 1954 March of Dimes in Hicksville was announced today by Mary B. Moloney who heads the county-wide campaign.

"The 1954 drive is the most vital ever staged in the long war against polio because it brings the first definite hope that the disease may be vanquished forever," Miss Moloney stated.

"More is needed this year than ever before. The objective of the campaign which starts Jan. 2 in \$300,000 is Nassau. This is \$75,000 more than the quota topped in the last county drive. More is needed to mass-test the vaccine developed by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis which gives promise of providing immunity against polio."

"Until these tests can be completed more gamma globulin must be made available for 1954 and the Nassau Polio Chapter must be prepared to aid all those stricken in the county and to continue its help to more than 500 Nassau polio victims of former years who it is now aiding," Miss Moloney pointed out.

# Expect Judge's Verdict On Vote By Christmas

**MINEOLA**—Nassau County Judge Cyril J. Brown may give the entire community its biggest Christmas present in generations if he rules in favor of the plea for a vote on incorporation of Hicksville as a first class village. His decision is anticipated by next Tuesday, Dec. 22.

If Judge Brown reverses the decision of Supervisor Charles E. Ransom who on Oct. 5 turned down the request for a vote on home rule, an election or referendum can be expected in a 20 or 30 day period, under the village law. Within five days after "the right to an election is complete", Town Clerk Henry Curran is required to give notice of the election date and place in Hicksville. The notice fixes the time not less than 15 days or more than 25 days from the date that notice is given.

### START OVER AGAIN

However, if Judge Brown sustains or upholds the decision of Supervisor Ransom, then the large committee of homeowners who want the right to hold the vote must start anew with petitions. Lawrence A. Roman, chairman of the home rule committee, has made it plain the homeowners propose to begin from the beginning if necessary.

While the Village Law provides that the County Judge shall decide on the appeal in a 10-day period, it is also noted in legal citations that the law on this point is "directory and not mandatory". All parties concerned agreed to Judge Brown's request for a 30-day extension which ends Dec. 22.

Meanwhile the Home Rule Committee is going forward with plans for a dance and television award on Jan. 8 at the Legion Hall on E. Nicholai St. to raise funds for the legal action to date. Tickets for the dance will be limited to 200. John Finnegan of Kuhl Ave. is chairman of the ticket committee, assisted by Sue Schult and John Larkin.

## 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF AVIATION:

# Recall Hold-Up of Daring Aviator Here Nine Years After First Flight

**HICKSVILLE**—The 50th anniversary of the first powered aircraft flight yesterday (Thursday) by the Wright Brothers recalls the fact that this area was prominent in early aviation news. There were three private airplane flying fields in the immediate vicinity up to five years ago when post-war home building took over the countryside.

Nine years after the first flight of the Wright Brothers, a daring before-dawn hold-up of an aviator at Hempstead Tpke. and Massapequa Rd. by two "unknown knaves" gave local people plenty to talk about in 1912.

"Mr. Brown, one of the flying men located at the New Bridge airship grounds, was making a flight with his aeroplane when he discovered something wrong with the engine. He quickly lowered to the ground to remedy the defect, landing at Hempstead Tpke. and Massapequa Rd.", reports Hicksville news item in the Farmingdale Times of June 21, 1912, uncovered recently.

The intersection, now considered part of Bethpage, is one of the busiest on the Tpke. today. Mal Pierce Pontiac, Nonley's Happyland, Food Fair are located on the

## Did You Hear Something?

Hundreds of mid-island housewives jammed police precinct and newspaper switchboards, Tuesday morning, when an explosive reaction and noise rocked homes in Hicksville, Levittown, Plainview and Bethpage. The blast noise, which some described as an "explosion" and others as being similar to the shooting of a heavy artillery shell, was heard about 20 minutes after eight in the morning. 

#### Who Pays The Taxes?

Levitt & Sons "neglected" to pay more than \$3000 in taxes on Levittown Hall and adjacent South Hicksville property according to the published list of delinquent taxpayers. After this had been brought to public attention by the Herald, the best the Town and County authorities could say was that there was "some kind of a clerical error". Maybe so, but they didn't say that the taxes had been paid, so undoubtedly they haven't.

#### Rubbing It In

Forcing the unwanted building upon the taxpayers wasn't bad enough. They now apparently have to pay the school and other taxes for past several years on it, to, before it even becomes "their" property. Naturally, when any taxpayer, including Levitt & Sons, refuses to pay their just taxes, the burden must be borne by the rest of us.

#### Joker?

Who will make up for Levitt's unpaid taxes? Will it be the owners of the Levitt houses in Hicksville? Will it be all of the Levitt house owners in the Joint Pool Hall district? Or will it be all of the taxpayers of Hicksville? Your guess is as good as ours and it will be most interesting to see how the Town Board works out that little joker.

#### Complications

Levitt's tax delinquency brings about several complications. It is obviously unfair to force only the Hicksville Levitt house owners to fork over the entire amount. It is equally unfair to force taxpayers of Levittown in the Town of Hempstead to make up for delinquent taxpayers in the Town of Oyster Bay. And imagine the anger of Hicksville taxpayers, not owning Levitt houses, when they are asked to pay back taxes on the Hall whose use they have been repeatedly denied!!

The Town Board's problem is further complicated by the law requiring the County to make up for unpaid school taxes. Naturally, the County has to get the money from the taxpayers of the school district. And, of course, that includes all taxpayers in the Hicksville School District No. 17, the great majority of whom do not live in Levitt houses.

and shell out. They relieved Mr. Brown of a roll of \$214 and jumping to their automobile, quickly disappeared in the direction of Hempstead.

"Word of the hold-up was quickly sent out to the officials of Nassau County and surrounding towns but no arrests have been made."

All this took place at 4 o'clock in the morning, according to the report. Another item in the same issue hinted at what became of the flying man the following day:

"Carl Carlson started on Thursday afternoon for Poughkeepsie in his EMF automobile with Aviator Brown's flying machine in tow. Mr. Brown intends to make a number of flights in Poughkeepsie and other up-state cities during the coming week."

No one seems to recall the "New Bridge Airship Grounds" of 41 years ago, but many remember that the Long Island Aviation Country Club here, was known in aviation circles around the world.

The private club, which included a clubhouse and swimming pool, was

situated on the west side of Seaford Avenue, just below Friendly Rd. Covering the area today are the Levittown streets of Blacksmith Rd., Glazer, Saddler, Haymaker, and Weaver Lane.

Charles T. Lindberg taught his wife, Anne, to fly there and many prominent national figures kept their private aircraft at this exclusive field.

St. Bernard's Catholic Church on Hempstead Tpk., Levittown, was formerly an airplane hangar for a flying field which extended south of the Tpk.

One of the last private flying fields in this area to close down was the Hicksville Airpark, today the Hicksville Farmer's Market on Robbins Lane near the township incinerator plant. The operation of this flying field was the subject of long-drawn out legal controversy concerning the variance given for the flying field and the opposition of neighboring property owners.

The Air park ceased as flying field about five years ago.

FLEW OVERHEAD

In 1928 when Hicksville held a celebration parade at the time a move to change the name of the

community was defeated, newspapers of the day reported that "overhead R. L. Esslinger, a town boy and son of Jeweler R. A. Esslinger, flew in an airplane over the parade. He is very clever in the art of flying and it was very nice that he could add so much to the home town parade."

The link of aviation with the community history was also portrayed in the 1948 Centennial Parade when a Piper Cub plane was carried on a truck as the float of the Wing Scouts, a senior activity of the Girl Scouts.

In the late 1930's an airmail flight from Hicksville to Floyd Bennett Field took place and in more recent years helicopter mail service was tested. Regular helicopter service for Hicksville mail is now depending upon establishment of a suitable landing site.

Here it is Christmas time again, and I recall in the Herald last year a reprint of a letter received by the Zivica family from their son in Korea. It appeared in the "Armed Services" column, and the epistle dealt with his thoughts—there on the battlefield at Christmas.

The letter had such appeal because it typified the anxieties a GI endures amidst the hell and fury of a hot war, at a season of the year which heretofore was accompanied with "peace on earth—good will to men", with glad handshakes, the giving and receiving of gifts, Christmas Carols, shopping sprees, happy toasts, Santa Claus, the company of the family and friends, etc.

Yet without heroes like these, our future Christmas may not be as Merry. Robert Zivica doesn't know that I have the following paragraph in my possession because he is extremely modest. I had to smuggle it through his sister, Dolores. It is a citation Bob received while in the Navy, and later attached to the Marine Corps.

"For excellent service in the line of his profession while serving with a Marine amphibian tractor company during operations against the enemy in Korea from 7th of December 1952 to 5th of May 1953. Serving as platoon corporal, Hospital Corporal Third Class ZIVICA displayed outstanding ability and professional skill. Throughout the period, he conscientiously discharged his responsibilities in a highly commendable manner and rapidly won the respect of both his superiors and subordinates.

"On three occasions, he disregarded his personal safety and exposed himself to intense hostile artillery fire in order to treat and successfully evacuate wounded personnel. On each occasion, he exhibited resourcefulness under fire

and rendered expert medical aid despite the trying conditions. His presence of mind, determined efforts and reassuring manner comforted the injured Marines he skillfully treated. Hospital Corporal Third Class ZIVICA's conduct throughout served as an inspiration to all who observed him and was

in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

(Commemoration Medal Pendant with Combat "V" Authorized.) This honor was signed by Major General R. McC. PATE.

All of the neighbors near Vincent Road are happy to see Bob home for Christmas—quite unlike last year when we heard from him at this time in Korea, just as all of our good wishes go out to the many other men who did so much for their country.





It is to be hoped that the Hicksville PBC will reexamine its player rosters to be sure that all the boys playing on its teams are using their right names so that we do not have a recurrence of that bitter ineligibility charge that rocked our town some three years ago.

That famous case involved a technical point wherein one boy, because of poor paper work all the way around, was signed on two lists.

A legal eagle discovered this after Hicksville had won the first round of the Nassau playoffs and was headed for the Eastern States championship at Philadelphia.

The decision from Mineola ordering all Hicksville games forfeited so enraged the persons locally that the sponsors of the PBC even voted to leave the County organization.

After months of wrangling the local PBC voted to stay with the County setup but the games were recorded as forfeits and the air still had the charge that Hicksville used a ringer.

We have a disdain for substitute names in any athletic contest. That practice is one of the principal reasons semi-pro football has died.

But of major concern to us is for those people who went to bat so determined three years ago.

If a similar case were to arise again it would be embarrassing to all concerned.

Reexamining please!

We are deceived.

It has always been a comforting thought that someday those people who talk of over-emphasizing athletics and its evils would bring their weight to bear and crack down on the free hand with expenses that schools extend to officials of scholastic games.

There has been no attempt to cap the rocketing official fees nor has there been an effort made to open the Long Island area to young, alert and physically more capable officials who have come to live here only to find the good jobs sewed up by the old school boys.

To us it was always a question of just how long school boards would put up with the situation.

In fact the Council of Sane Approach to the problems of intercholastic athletics made a noble stand on the subject last year, but backed down when a self consideration greased press gave out with the hearts and flowers for the poor old whistle blowers.

We still had hopes, but now they are dashed.

The news is that a member of the board of education in a south shore district has taken up the demanding art and is working jay veer games with his eye, of course, on the big money that comes from the varsity contests.

The thought now comes that if the field has been made so attractive that members of the final governing board in these matters are taken to it, we are lost.

But if it's sanity we want, perhaps members of boards of education should concern themselves with turning any extra revenue the games may net into more liberal insurance protection for the school boys rather than funnel it into the pockets of a few.

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

## Fire Chief Warns Of Hazards

Holidays can be dangerous days for the youngsters according to Chief Edward R. Schuler Jr. of Hicksville Fire Dept., who warns that the menace is fire.

Actually, fire is a year-round threat to children—their No. 1 killer in home accidents. But at this time of year, added seasonal hazards increase the danger. Excited and over-tired youngsters are especially vulnerable to the dangers of loosely woven costumes and party dresses, decorative candles and unsafe toys, the Chief said.

Protect them advises the National Board of Fire Underwriters, by

following these simple fire safety suggestions:

1. Flameproof children's clothing made of loosely woven materials. Dip such garments in a solution of 9 ounces of borax and 4 ounces of boric acid to a gallon of water. Wring by hand, then hang to dry. Flameproofing will last until the clothes are laundered; then it must be repeated. Use it on doll's clothes, too, as well as adult's clothing, diapers or any washable fabric.

2. Remember, candles are dangerous at any time—but particularly when there are children around. El-

ectric candles are just as effective in decorating, and much safer.

3. When buying electrical toys of any type, always look for the UL label. It means the toys have passed Underwriters' Laboratories tests for fire and shock hazards. As an added safety measure, supervise play with even safe electrical toys.

4. Some types of toys, such as those involving flame or pressure, should not be given to little children. Others, such as chemical sets, should be selected with care, and play with them should be supervised.


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
