

GRADE CROSSING MUST GO: Civics Request Sprague Help on Elimination

HICKSVILLE — County Executive J. Russel Sprague was urged this week to give consideration and support to the campaign for the elimination of six Rail Road grade crossings in the community. The request was made by James J. Condon, chairman of the Civic Assoc. Rail Road Relations Committee.

Complimenting Sprague for his official stand taken as a result of the Rockville Centre and Kew Gardens Rail Road disasters, Condon stated "I realize that at the present moment the safety operations of the LIRR are of paramount importance, but the safety of the people in Hicksville is also of paramount importance to us in the Civic Association.

"We strongly urge the elimination of six of the LIRR grade crossings at the hamlet of Hicksville." The crossings include Jerusalem Ave., Broadway, E. Marie St., Nicholai St., Old Country Rd. and Woodbury Rd.

Waste Paper Drive on Sunday Morning

All residents of Hicksville and Plainview, including the Levitt-built new home section, are asked to have tied bundles of paper on their curbs by eight o'clock Sunday morning, Dec. 3, for the first monthly paper collection by the Civil Defense. 'Levittown Candidate Seen As Test Of Political Weight

HICKSVILLE—A commissioner of the fire district will be elected next Tuesday night at the Firehouse; here, and some residents believe the future unity and development of the community is at stake. There are four candidates for the non-paying 5-year job, filling a vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of William Braun, who is not seeking re-election. This election may well be the forerunner of like competitions for other town and special district positions in the months ahead, observers believe.

Contests Tuesday In Most Sections

Contests are scheduled for special commissioner elections in Hicksville, Bethpage and Plainview, next Tuesday night, Dec. 5.

In Bethpage, William DeFanis, a long-time member of the volunteer fire department, is seeking re-election as a fire commissioner for a five-year term. He is opposed by James Sturtevant, a member of the fire department and rescue squad lieutenant.

In Plainview, August Keute is seeking re-election for a three-year term as a water commissioner. He is opposed by Fred Baum of 30 Vernon St., a new resident. The Water Board in an open letter to people of the community this week requested Keute's re-election to office.

No contest appears likely in Jericho where Percy Remsen is seeking re-election for a five-year term as fire commissioner.

Voting hours next Tuesday, Dec. 5, are from 8 to 10 p. m.

Two of the candidates are long-time residents with years of service in the local volunteer fire department. Both Daniel Munch and John Leckie have held company leadership rank positions and have been chiefs of the department. A third candidate, Edward C. Quimby, a retired professional fireman, is a resident of the Frank Home section of the past couple of years.

Sink Sectional Wedge

The fourth candidate in the field, Charles C. Miller, of 24 Summer Lane, is openly and frankly a "Levittown" candidate. In announcing his candidacy he stresses affiliation with Levittown and thus may be considered testing his vote support in his neighborhood when weighed against the rest of the community.

His bid for election is viewed by some as an attempt to sink deep a permanent wedge between the residents of houses built by Levitt and Sons in Hicksville and the rest of the district. Before deciding to run for the office, he managed to alienate most of the fire department and its boosters by spearheading an "investigation" of the Fork Lane fire incident of Oct. 16.

He is one of the organizers of the "North Levittown Home Owners Committee" and has been one of its most active members. As chairman of the utilities committee, Miller presented the recommendation at a "public meeting" that Stanford Weiss, chief of the fire department be removed from office. Weiss, it is recalled, was re-elected on page 3.

Building Permits Exceed 6-Year Total

OYSTER BAY — Permits issued by Town Building department during the current year, through Nov. 24, have exceeded the total of 8,117 permits for the previous six years. This year's total so far is 8,214. Town totals were 233 in 1944, 354 in 1945, 1,015 in 1946, 1,258 in 1947, 2,232 in 1948 and 3,095 in 1949.

Plainview Board Raps 'Agitators'

PLAINVIEW — Denouncing "agitators" for "misrepresenting" the facts, the Board of Water Commissioners today went on record and asked the community to re-elect member August Keute as a commissioner of the district, next Tuesday. An open letter to qualified voters, signed by the three Board members, claimed taxpayers were saved \$65,000 during the past year through progressive administration.

The letter follows:
 We or any other duly elected Board or operating group must at all times entertain and invite just criticism. But no duly elected Board that is operating pursuant to law must subject itself either individually or as a duly organized Board to the unjust, untrue charges that have been submitted to the Town Board in a so-called petition

and also in letter form which has been brought to our attention and will be properly handled when all apparent matters are complete. We find that the so-called petition which really is only a bunch of loose sheets of names, containing many names of people who are not really qualified to render objections because there are different qualifications for a voter for most each type of special district and it is the individual voter's duty to learn about his own qualifications. We also find that most of the good people did sign the above mentioned so-called petition because a few agitators went around and misrepresented the facts.

Your Board of Commissioners through cooperative, progressive administration of your district has saved the taxpayers of the Plainview Water District within the last year over \$65,000. Where does any mismanagement enter into such administration of your affairs? And in regards to the water rate, we have stated several times and the records show that there is only one schedule of rates in the Plainview Water District. For every consumer in the District the same schedule of rates apply and your meter establishes your rate, except for the Nassau County Sanatorium which is the only one in the district to enjoy a special rate. We hope the above will remind the good people of the facts and also that the new residents who don't understand some of (Continued on Page 3)

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
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

fused permission to speak at this meeting in his own behalf.

Last week the NLHOC flatly refused to withdraw its charges in the face of factual evidence gathered by the Fire Commissioners which sharply contradicts the data compiled by Miller and his friends.

Needlessly to report, the candidacy of Miller has been greeted enthusiastically by the Levittown newspapers which, incidentally, omitted the fact that three other men were already seeking office.

Miller is weighing his potential backing from the "Levittown" what's-a-boundary-line advocates against the this-is-still-Hicksville vote. And the latter vote is being split two if not three ways.

Munch, Leach and Quimby may be expected to round up, between them, most of the general Hicksville votes but in turn may find their individual shares of the total just small enough to permit Miller, if he gets the backing from his neighbors, to slide through.

Voters in the new Levitt homes are not unlike the new residents in other sections, it has been observed. They exercise considerable interest in voting at the first opportunity which comes to their attention, display great independence of thought, and then gradually fall into the same lethargy which keeps vote casting percentages of total population low across the nation.

If Miller can swing the trick, Tuesday, and make a considerable impression or win election, it can

safely be predicted that the NLHOC will enter the lists for township recognition — strictly on a sectional basis — and also go after the school and water boards.

However, a single sectional member on a five-man board such as the school or fire boards may find it difficult to make a mark when the rest of such board membership is concerned with the over-all community needs and requirements, it is felt. However, Tuesday night will tell the story.

Since normal voting qualifications and 30-day residence are the only requirements, more than 8,000 persons are thus eligible to cast their ballots at the firehouse next Tuesday between 7 and 10 p. m. Voting will be by paper ballot.
