LILCO Wants Property Value Cut Two Million

The Long Island Lighting Co. with real estate holdings in Hicksville assessed for tax purposes at \$5,638,940 is seeking a reduction of \$2,056,748, it was learned this week as the Nassau County Board of Supervisors acted to hire industrial appraisal engineering experts to fight the LILCO certification petitions. In the entire county, the utility company is assessed for \$132,036,020 and pays ten million dollars a year in taxes. The total reduction sought by LILCO is \$22,295,000 including the Hicksville area.

Last August Supreme Court Justice Howard Hogan granted Mid Island Plaza in Hicksville a reduction of 1,184,780 in its tax assessed valuation. This action is being appealed in a higher court by Nassau County. The total valuation of Hicksville for 1960-61 is \$89,798,687 without the Plaza reduction.

Opposition To Zone Change

Vigorous opposition was voiced to a proposed zone change on about three acres of property running from Old Country to Plainview roads, Hicksville, when a public hearing was held Tuesday before Oyster Bay Town Board. The application was made by Walters & Donaldson and Anna E. Wojtylak for a change from residential to business F zone.

The applicant stated that Walter Donaldson planned to build a Volkswagen show room and auto repair shop facing Old Country Rd. The firm is currently located in Old Country Rd at the corner of Monroe Ave.

Three petitions in opposition with a total of 247 signatures were presented by residents of the area. There were 35 persons present at the hearing concerned with the issue.

Opposition was voiced by the

Rev. Richard H. Weiskotten, pastor of Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran Church, who recently completed edifice is directly adjacent to the site of the proposed auto showroom. He said the proposed land use would be detrimental to the church property.

Also opposed was Rabbi Elie D. Skolst of Congregation Shaarei Zedek which owns property across New South Rd, opposite the Lutheran Church. Rabbi Skolst told the Town Board the congregation is planning a \$400,000 structure and that construction is expected to start in six months. He cited the increased traffic congestion in the area which would result from the proposed application.

The petitioner stated that the property is not suitable for residential use and that it would produce more tax revenue as business zoning.

County Tables Branch Plan: Continue Efforts To Get College

The Hicksville School Board is determined to continue its efforts, led by Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of schools, to get a college for Hicksville. The Board of Trustees of the Nassau Community College last week recommended to County Executive A. Holly Patterson that the proposal by the Hicksville Board to develop a branch of the County College here to be tabled.

A six-page report on the "Hicksville Proposal" was written by the College Board of Trustees following a meeting between the College Board and representatives of the Hicksville School Board held Nov. 16.

The "Hicksville Proposal" to the County was that the High School building and faculty be used for college classes in the afternoon and evening after 4 PM as an immediate expedient, and that immediate steps be taken to acquire property in Hicksville to erect a branch of the County College accommodating 600 students.

The Trustees' report to Patterson was discussed by the School Board at a regular meeting, Friday night. It was felt that the plan for a college in Hicksville should not be dropped and that Dr. Lamb should proceed along other avenues.

Disappointment

Dr. Lamb in a letter to the County Trustees, made public on Monday, strongly expressed his disappointment and asked the County to "reconsider rejection of our application."

"The failure of the Community College Board to recognize the needs of adequate college facilities in Nassau County, and specifically in Hicksville, is a great disappointment to me and the Hicksville Board of Education," the Superintendent Lamb stated. "The lack of questions on your part when we presented our ideas to your Board had encouraged us to believe that our needs had been demonstrated adequately."

"Because of your failure to approve a college for Hicksville it is now necessary for me, in accordance with instructions from the Hicksville Board of Education, to proceed rapidly to get a college for Hicksville some other way. I believe that we have excellent elementary and secondary school programs in Hicksville and intend to do all I can to make certain that the education of our children does not have to end there. The taxpayers of Hicksville are paying their share to support the college in Mineola. I am sorry that you

"Enrollment pressures in Nassau and Suffolk Counties will be very great by 1965. The two community colleges, recently established in these counties will be hard pressed to accommodate the anticipated enrollment."

Board, Recreation Advisors To Meet About Indoor Pool

The proposal by the Recreation Advisory Committee for the installation of an indoor swimming pool and 15-foot diving tank together with bleachers, steam rooms, etc. as an attachment to the Hicksville Senior High on Division Ave. will be considered by the School Board as a committee of the whole. The meeting between the Advisory Committee and the Board members is set for this Saturday morning at the High School.

Jeiry Zettler, liaison member of the Board of Education to the Recreation group, reported that on Dec. 20 the Recreation Committee unanimously adopted the proposal. He distributed individual copies to each Board member of the plan which included a layout by William Damm.

There was little discussed pending the formal presentation by the Recreation Committee, supplementing the written recommendation with oral comment.

Submission of the plan to a public referendum will require action by the School Board.

George Neder, Sr., of 92 E. Marie St., Hicksville, long active in Hicksville Fire Dept., celebrated his 94th birthday on Tuesday of this week. A Hicksville resident for 51 years, he is presently living with his daughter, Mrs. Edward Wilson of Bethpage.

Residents in the Town of Oyster Bay are requested not to leave their cars on the street overnight during the next two months when snow is predicted or begins to fall.

Emergencies Close Schools

It has been necessary to close the schools of Central School District #2 (Syosset) on three of the scheduled days of instruction: one day in connection with the hurricane and two days in connection with the December snow storms. This leaves but one day in the district calendar on which the schools can be closed because of storm conditions without the necessity of opening the schools to make up for lost time.

This situation arises from the State Department ruling that school districts, regardless of the formal calendar, must have at least 180

days of actual instructions.

With the larger portion of the winter still ahead it is possible that storm and snow conditions may require the closing of schools on more than one day. If this occurs, the administration proposes to make up one additional day by opening schools on Monday, May 29, a day specified in the current calendar as a holiday providing a long weekend in connection with Memorial Day, Tuesday, May 30. If emergency storm conditions require more closing than two days, it would be proposed to shorten the Easter recess at the end of the week after Easter.

Bill Tightens Inspections

A bill to amend Section 807 of the Education Law was submitted by Assemblyman Edwin Fehrenbach which would require the Commissioner of Education to adopt rules and regulations for the construction and maintenance of school buildings through-out the State on fire prevention sections. The bill provides for immediate inspection of school buildings by the Commissioner of Education and the State Department of Safety. The bill also provides for the violation of rules and regulations on fire prevention and construction shall make a reinvestigation within 30 days. If the violation has not been corrected or if the person responsible for the failure to correct these violations, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. The bill not only covers public schools but private schools as well. The bill is not a misdemeanor but the utter disregard of the rules by those in authority shall be a misdemeanor under the proposed bill. Assemblyman Fehrenbach successfully piloted this bill through the Senate last year, but it was not passed.

cannot perceive that the County has a financial responsibility here as well. I predict, flatly, that within a very few years, unless you change your present plans, the shortage of college facilities in Nassau County will become disastrous.

The College Trustees in their detailed report urged against "decentralization" and the development of "branches". The Trustees claimed that operating in Hicksville High after four in the afternoon "is highly disruptive in terms of the student's life" and that psychologically, high school graduates do not like to return to a high school for college work after graduating.

A good part of the report was devoted to a master plan for the County College, use of part of Mitchell Air Force Base when the Air Force moves out, etc.

cusses 1959-60 Hicksville High School juniors and seniors and their college-bound interests. It states that 322 students were polled and 242 were found interested in a two-year college program. As of Sept., 1960, the County College had 21 applications from Hicksville of which 18 were accepted. Seven later notified the college they would not attend and 11 were registered. In addition 40 from Hicksville were enrolled on a part-time basis. The full-time students from Hicksville, numbering 11, repre-

sented 2 percent of the total enrollment of 454. The forty part-timers represented 4 per cent of the total of 873 in that grouping. Since the College in Hicksville is proposed to serve principally Hicksville, Levittown, East Meadow and Plainview, the report gives

the County College enrollment from the four communities.

Full time students were 20 from Levittown, 23 from East Meadow and 5 from Plainview. Overall, full and part-time students from the four communities total 181 or 13 per cent of the total.
